31st Annual Report

American Association of Avian Pathologists for the Year Ending April 30, 1988

The financial status of the AAAP is fair. We have been in a

The American Association of Avian Pathologists enters its 32nd year with a membership of 938 (757-domestic, 181-foreign). The membership presently is made up of 652 members, 197 associate members, 45 retired members, 20 life members and 24 student members.

Subscriptions to AVIAN DISEASES increased this year to an average of 1915 copies per issue of Volume 31, 1987 (Volume 30 averaged 1820 per issue).

In the 1987-88 audit for AAAP business transactions prepared by Joe Robinson of Elko, Fischer, McCabe and Rudman of Media, PA the following items were particularly noteworthy.

Unrestricted fund revenues were down (\$8,485) and totaled \$153,973 for fiscal 1987-88. Revenue generated by AVIAN DISEASES was down (\$4,255) and totaled \$93,664. This represents a decrease in page charges (down \$5,835), contributory support (up \$200) and advertising (down \$1,180).

The sales of AVIAN DISEASE MANUALS (\$11,112) and ISOLATION AND IDENTIFICATION OF AVIAN PATHOGENS (\$1,444) were down from last year. Sale of the new AVIAN HISTOPATHOLOGY MANUAL was quite good at \$12,493. The income from the sale of slide study sets was \$4,099 (down \$7,686 from last year). Interest income was down \$495. Royalties for DISEASES OF POULTRY were down \$964 (\$4,712).

Unrestricted fund disbursements were \$163,686 resulting in a loss of \$9,713. This was due mostly to the decrease in the AVIAN DISEASES income and the investment cost of printing the AVIAN HISTOPATHOLOGY MANUAL. Annual meeting expenses were up \$1,307 (\$5,246) due to the added cost for donuts and coffee served in the poster room in "expensive" Chicago.

Restricted Accounts include the Cab Bottorff and Reed Rumsey Funds. The new Cab Bottorff Fund now totals \$33,152. The Reed Rumsey Student Fund now totals \$38,780. Two student awards will be given this year from the interest generated from the capital account. The two student awards last year totaled \$2,000 and \$1,452 in travel expenses and were paid from generated interest.

The financial status of the AAAP is fair. We have been in a \$7,000 - 10,000 deficit situation the past few years. I will recommend to the Board of Directors in July increases in dues and subscription rates that more adequately reflect the real cost of the AVIAN DISEASES journal and the costs of operating AAAP.
