There are a number of items of importance and interest that should be brought to your attention . . .

The President Speaks.

From where I sit it looks like an exciting year for the AAAP. Hopefully, many projects will be completed and new ones initiated. Certainly the opportunities for our group is almost unlimited. We still have many opportunities in the public relations field to let people know who we are and what talents we have available for their use. Several things have already been started this year in an attempt to accomplish that task. One giant step has been to accept the Whiteman-Bickford Manual on Poultry Diseases as an outline for the introduction of avian diseases to veterinary students. board has decided to go ahead with the publication of that manual and an ad hoc committee has been appointed to act as an editorial board to bring information up to the current state of the art, to prepare an introductory section and to decide how it is to be published. We have established a target date to have it available for teachers of avian medicine in the fall of 1980. Dr. Charles Whiteman has been made chairman of that ad hoc committee with Dr. Art Bickford as cochairman.

We need suggestions from our members for the nomination to the special service award. As you remember, at the meeting in Seattle, no one had been nominated and that award was not presented last year. It is all of our responsibility to select some individual who has made outstanding contributions to the field of avian medicine and recognize him at that time. If you have any recommendations be sure to pass them on to our awards committee which is headed by Dr. Dave Anderson.

I have had recent contact with Dr. Charles J. Farho, who is the president of Industrial Veterinarians, regarding the veterinary practice acts and what limitations those may place upon avian veterinarians that are working in many different geographical locations. We agreed at the time of our conversation that the AAAP would support the Industrial Veterinarians in any way that the group felt would be advantageous. As of this time they are surveying the practice acts throughout the United States to obtain an accurate status of each state. They will summarize their

information and hopefully come up with some firm course of action. We will keep in touch with Dr. Farho and if any of our members learns of any action that we should be taking in this area, I hope they will contact myself or one of the members of the board.

Dick Witter and I have had our first meeting for the planning for the Scientific Committee for the AVMA program to be held in Washington D.C. We did not visit the location as Charlie Beard and I did last year but from the information presented in Schaumburg, it looks like an exciting location for our program. It has been decided that we will have a block of rooms, as we did this year. They will be in the Shoreham Hotel. Poultry will be meeting in the Palladian room at the Shoreham. Dick Witter is pursuing the concept of poster presentations. He will be requesting that any of you that would like to make a poster presentation make the application at the time of our call for papers.

Hopefully, we will have a seminar in Washington related to federal regulatory activities that may affect the availability of drugs, control research funds into avian medicine or change in any way the way we practice our profession. Any seminar suggestions that any of the committees may have should be prepared and presented to the board, myself or Charlie Hall at the earliest possible date.

I want to remind all committee members as well as the board of directors that we are planning a board meeting in conjunction with the Southeastern meeting in Atlanta. We have tentatively set our meeting at 9:00 a.m. on Thursday, January 24th in the convention center. The room location will be announced as soon as Harold Ford advises me of the location.

I am sure that most of you are now aware that P.P. Levine passed away on September 27th and that we as members of AAAP would like to suggest the possible naming of the AAAP Research Paper Award to be titled the P.P. Levine Award. It seems only appropriate that Dr. Levine be recognized in some way for his fathering of the Journal of Avian Diseases as well as his many years of dedicated work to the field of avian medicine in research as well as teaching.

In closing, I again encourage every one of you to take an active part in your own state in alerting veterinary and agricultural students to the opportunities of avian medicine. Talk to other people who are involved in the management of avian species and encourage them to become a part of our organization. Certainly, anyone in the field of nutrition or pet and exotic birds would make major contributions to our better understanding of the problems that surround us as well as they would find many valuable resources in our existing membership.

The board and myself are always open to any suggestions to make our organization better. Looking forward to those comments and have a good year.
