FROM ST. LOUIS TO MEXICO CITY

Elegant Trains Make the Trip Without Change in 60 Hours. In the Latin-American republic beyond the Rio Grande, lies the wonderland of the present day tourists, as well as the richest field of investment that now challenges the attention of American capital and enterprise. Only a few years since Mexico was looked upon as a country too remote for the average traveler to entertain hopes of crossing its threshold; to-day we are told that on and after January 16th its capital city will be but 60 hours distant from St. Louis. Beginning on that date a semi-weekly train service will be established, via the Iron Mountain Route, the Texas and Pacific and the International and Great Northern, representatives of the Gould interest, and the National Lines of Mexico beyond the "Laredo Gateway," leaving St. Louis at 9 a. m. each Tuesday and Friday, and reaching the City of Mexico on the Thursday and Sunday following. The train will be equipped with compartment and standard drawing room sleepers and observation and dining cars. Its remarkably speedy schedule is made possible by doing away with all changes or layovers, and, for the first time since the sister republics were joined together by links of glistening steel, an interchange of visits across the national boundary means simply the journey of a few hours, surrounded by all the pleasurable amenities of modern travel. Much of good can be expected from these changed conditions. The people of Mexico have long evidenced an enlightened appreciation of the kindly interest of their northern neighbors in their country and its history, institutions and wonderful resources, while on our part there is an acknowledged recognition of the fact that a closer social and commercial relationship with that progressive nation is in every way desirable. The inauguration of this new train service is a step in the right direction and meets the needs of the hour. It is typical of the tireless interest shown by the roads concerned in the upbuilding of the great Southwest, and will doubtless receive the hearty encouragement and support of the traveling public.

RATE REGULATION OCCUPIES SENATE

Body Does Not Wait for Introduction of the Bill.

SENATOR CLAY MAKES SPEECH

Aldrich Declares Hearst is Founder of Proposition to Confer Rate Making Power on the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Washington, Jan. 23.—The question of regulating railroad rates occupied practically all of the time of the senate yesterday notwithstanding no bill with that end in view has been reported by the interstate commerce committee. The discussion of the subject was in connection with Mr. Clay's speech, Messrs. Aldrich, Faraker, Bailey and Newlands being the principal participants in addition to Mr. Clay himself.

Mr. Clay advocated the passage of a bill which would give the interstate commerce commission power to regulate rates when complained of, and said if there was no legislation along that line the country might count upon agitation of the question of government ownership. In that connection he referred to the large vote given Mr. Hearst in the late New York municipal election as an indication of the popularity of the municipal ownership of public utilities.

Mr. Aldrich indicated a purpose to oppose such legislation as that outlined, and declared that Mr. Hearst was the author of the proposition to confer the rate making power on the commission. He also took occasion to declare that the signs of the times point to the naming of either Mr. Hearst or Mr. Bryan as the next candidate, but when pressed to indicate the probability in the republican party he declined to make a prediction, and also avoided answering a question of Mr. Bailey as to whether the president would be a candidate for a third term.

RATE BILL IS AGREED UPON

Republicans and Democrats of Committee in Full Accord.

WILL BE NO MINORITY REPORT

Report in Favor of Measure Chosen is Unanimous—Hepburn Bill is Used as Basis, but Changes Were Made.

Washington, Jan. 24.—After a conference lasting all afternoon the house committee on interstate and foreign commerce agreed on a rate bill to be known as the Hepburn bill and to be reported to the house with the unanimous recommendation of the eighteen members of the committee. In the main the bill is the original Hepburn bill, but a number of concessions were made to the democrats and their ideas as set forth in the Davie bill were incorporated in the new measure.

Mr. Hepburn and the other republicans agreed to accept the wording of the democratic bill in the provision for the fixing of maximum rate. The amendment which was adopted provides that the commission shall fix a reasonable, just and fairly remunerative rate which shall be the maximum rate.

It was maintained by the democrats that under the original Hepburn wording the commission was authorized to fix the highest of the reasonable, just and fairly remunerative rates in case there were several such rates. Chairman Hepburn and the republicans do not believe there is any difference in the two wordings but were perfectly willing to accept the language of the Davie bill. The amended bill also provides for seven members in the interstate commerce commission instead of nine, as provided in the original bill.

FRANCE TO OBTAIN FULL SATISFACTION

Paris, Jan. 25.—Ministerial circles here are much annoyed over the published reports relative to France's alleged hesitation and nervousness regarding the Venezuelan question. A high official of the foreign office said on this subject:

"France has always been and still is determined to obtain the fullest satisfaction for past and present affronts from Venezuela. She, however, will elect her own time for action. France will not act at anyone's bidding. She will choose her own hour and moment and then act as becometh her with absolute resolve to have her rights accepted."

To a question whether a blockade had been ordered, a direct negative was given.

PASS BILL TO PUNISH WIFE DESERTERS

BATTLESHIP IS COFFIN FOR CREW

Rio Janeiro, Brazil, Jan. 23.—The Brazilian turret ship Aquidaban has been sunk at Port Jacarapaga, south of Rio Janeiro, as the result of an explosion on board. It is reported that 300 of her crew perished and that only one officer was saved.

GREAT WESTERN KNOCKS ON "Q"

Says Road Has Been Giving Rebates To Jobbers. Chicago, Ill., Jan. 25.—At a meeting of western railway men here yesterday a sensation was sprung by Great Western officials charging the Burlington railway with granting secret rebates to Missouri river jobbers for the past three years. The charge was not refuted. The matter caused considerable of a stir among the railroad men and a warning has been issued to all the road that the rebates must be eliminated in order to prevent a rate war and to prevent the matter being used in favor of the retirement of the present railway rat bill by congress.

MARSHALL FIELD WILL IS MADE PUBLIC

Chicago, Jan. 26.—The will of Marshall Field has been filed in the office of the probate court of Cook county. In bulk it was a counterpart of the size of the estate it bequeathed, being the most extensive document of the sort that has fallen into the hands of the court.

The will, consisting of 22,000 words, makes disposition of an estate that doubtless exceeds \$100,000,000, probably reaches \$120,000,000 and may go even to \$150,000,000.

No estimate was made of the value of the estate by the attorneys who carried the will to court.

The document specifically provides for the disposition of \$25,298,000, not including the Field residence at 1905 Paris avenue and its contents, the value of which is not estimated, and which is left to the widow, Della Spencer Caton Field during her life. When she dies the house and household furnishings will fall to Marshall Field III.
