**BEGINS WAR ON STANDARD OIL**

**Moody Files Suit at St. Louis to Break Great Monopoly**

**UNDER SHERMAN TRUST LAW**

**Octopus' Seventy Subordinate Concerns Are Included—Attorney General Says that Criminal Action Will Be Considered Later.**

St. Louis, Mo., Nov. 16.—The United States government made yesterday the initial move to dissolve the Standard Oil so-called monopoly by filing in the United States district court in St. Louis a petition in equity against the Standard Oil company of New Jersey, and its seventy constituent corporations and partnerships, and seven defendants, including John D. Rockefeller and William Rockefeller, asking that the combination be declared unlawful and in the future enjoined from entering into any contract of combination in restraint of trade.

The suit is brought under the Sherman anti-trust act, which the Standard and its constituent companies and the seven individual defendants are charged with violating. In a formal statement by Attorney General Moody he says that criminal prosecution is reserved for future consideration. The government's petition in the suit is signed by William H. Moody, United States attorney general; Milton D. Purdy, assistant to the attorney general; Frank B. Kellogg, Charles D. Morrison, and C. A. Severance, special assistants to the attorney general.

The petition contains 194 pages of printed matter or about 100,000 words and an additional 84 pages of exhibits, consisting of by-laws and minutes of Standard Oil meetings and organizations and a map showing the retail outlets of oil in every state and territory of the union. The defendants now have one month in which to enter their appearance and an additional month in which to file their answer. They also have the option of filing a demurrer to the bill.

Following the filing of the government's petition, an order was applied for before Judges Sanborn and Adams of the United States circuit court of appeals to bring non-resident defendants into the jurisdiction of the district court at St. Louis to serve them with subpoenas. It is considered probable that a special commissioner will be appointed to take the evidence in the case, and that he will certify the record to the United States circuit court of appeals as was done in the Northern Securities case.

**'FRISCO MAYOR AND "BOSS" INDICTED**

San Francisco, Cal., Nov. 16.—The grand jury brought five indictments against Eugene Schmitz and Abram Rueff on the charge of extortion. On each charge bail was fixed at \$1,000.

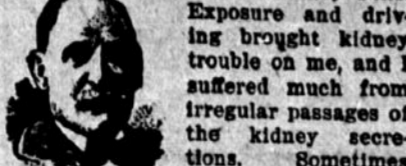
The first alleged crime was in connection with the "Poodle Dog" restaurant, and the indictment recites that Rueff and Schmitz demanded money from the proprietor. As this demand was made, it is said, on two occasions, two indictments were returned. Extortion believed to have been practiced upon Ed Marchard, proprietor of Marchard's restaurant, is the basis of two indictments. A demand made upon Jo Mafalanti, another restaurant man, is the alleged offense on which the fifth and last indictment was found. The indictments were returned for the grand jury by Foreman E. P. Oliver, who presented the documents to Judge Murasky, who read them and placed them on file. He then proceeded to fix the bail for each charge. Abram Rueff last night gave bonds of \$50,000 after having surrendered himself to the sheriff and was released. In the presentation of the indictments against Mayor Schmitz and Boss Rueff, Assistant District Attorney Henry has fulfilled the promise that the first action taken by the grand jury would be to accuse Abram Rueff of felony. This promise was made in open court two weeks ago, but nothing was then said that Mayor Schmitz would be drawn into the scandal. The indictment of Rueff was expected by the public, but they were not prepared for immediate direct action against the city's chief magistrate, who is now on the Atlantic returning from a visit to Europe. For nearly two years, the alleged objectionable relations between the French restaurants and the municipal administration have been a subject of severe criticism, and public denunciation.
