Fowler of Marinette, Wisconsin, and two members of his regiment. He belonged to Company A, 60th Iowa, colored infantry, during the civil war. Mr. Fowler who is now an old man, has been trying for years to obtain a pension from the government. But he must have two persons who knew him while he was a soldier, to identify him. This is the only obstacle to his securing the pension.

I am requesting that you send me the names and addresses of any men who were during the war of the rebellion, members of the 60th Iowa, colored infantry, Co. A. Mr. Fowler originally came from Missouri; Harvey Johnson, William Johnson and Cain Lucas. Do you know them? Any information you can give along this line will be greatly appreciated. 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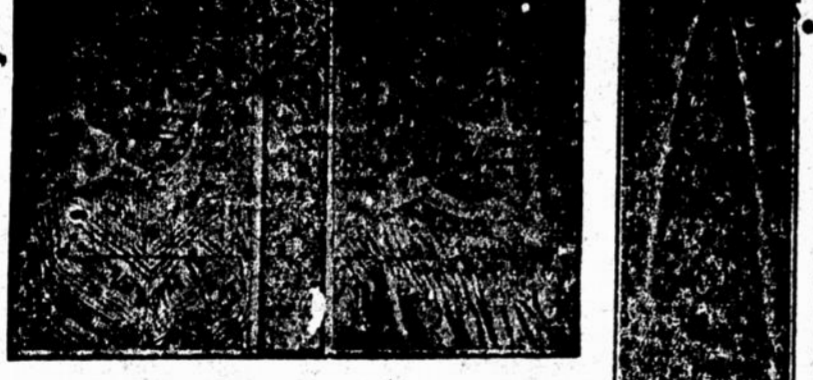

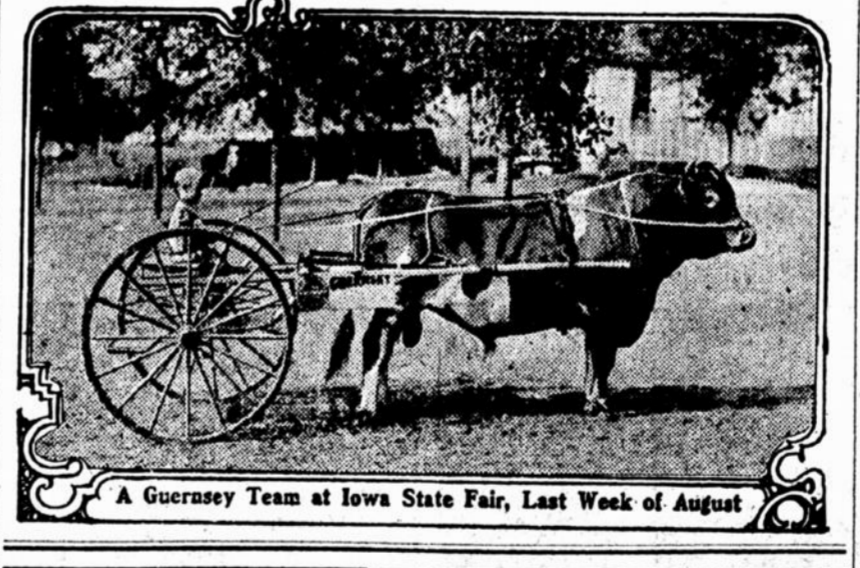
