Slavery Exists in Louisiana in Spite of U.S. Constitution

New Orleans, Feb. 3.—Black slavery, comparable to that which existed in ante-bellum times, was the object of an extended investigation today by department of justice agents.

The indictment yesterday of Webb Bellue and John D. Alford, of Amite County, Miss., on charges of abduction, sale and enslavement of five Negroes is to be followed by disclosure of peonage in St. Helena and Tangipahoa parishes in Louisiana, if evidence now in the hands of the United States district attorney here proves substantial, officials said.

Dear Editor: I noticed an article in the Bystander of January 22nd, relating to the Heroes of San Juan Hill. Since it is to be filmed I hope it will meet with great success and I think it will have a tendency to kindle the flame in the hearts of our young Boy Scouts. I hope it will have a great impression on those that are unacquainted with warfare. I wish to congratulate the writer, Mr. Jimmy Smith. But without prejudice or slander, Mr. Smith could not have been an eye witness of the affairs in and around Santiago de Cuba or he was exaggerating. I was in the 24th U. S. Infantry. I had 15 years service at that time. I noticed that the writer had regiments mis-named and misplaced and misused. I beg to inform you, sir, that there was not a 1st and 3rd and 6th vol. cavalry and what cavalry we did have was dismounted with the exceptions of a few troops used for dispatch duty. It is true that there was a 3rd Brigade of Cavalry but dismounted.

The colored soldiers did well, they far surpassed the whites in a great many details, but I must say that the colored and white soldiers were in the same Brigade and commanded by the same commanding officer and fought on the same line at the same time. 
