FREDERICK DOUGLASS' PENN

PRESENTED TO N. A. A. C. P.

To Be Deposited in Harlem Branch of New York Public Library
New York, Feb. 18—The gold tipped pen with which Frederick Douglass wrote his Autobiography has been presented to the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People by Robert H. Blackall of New York City, and will be deposited in the Harlem Branch of the New York Public Library where the Arthur Schoenberg collection of books by and about Negroes is now housed.

Mr. Blackall, in connection with his gift to the N. A. A. C. P., writes as follows: "My father, Berton F. Blackall, was responsible for getting Mr. Douglass into Canada from Rochester N. Y. at that time he was Superintendent of the B. O. & S. W. Telegraph Company at Rochester and overheard the message coming over the news wire, immediately after which he got in touch with Mr. Douglass and got him over into Canada, to avoid being taken back South. The pen was given to my mother, who left it to me when she died." The N. A. A. C. P. has communitated with Miss Ernestine Rose, Librarian of the 135th Street Branch, who has expressed eagerness of hav-

ing the pen there on permanent exhibition. The pen will be turned over by the N. A. A. C. P. with appropriate ceremonies at a date to be announced later.

N. A. A. C. P. WARNS AGAINST ANTI-INTERMARRIAGE

BILLS IN NORTH
New York, Feb. 18—The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, 69 Fifth Avenue, today sent out a general warning of attempts throughout the North to enact bills inspired by the Ku Klux Klan, which would prohibit the intermarriage of white and colored people. The latest such bill is reported from Michigan by H. A. Lett, Chairman of the Legal Redress Committee of the Lansing Branch. The Michigan bill discriminates not only against the Negro but against Japanese, Chinese and Turks. Mr. Lett reports that such a bill has been introduced in the Michigan legislature for the past 8 years, being always defeated. N. A. A. C. P. Branches throughout New England States are fighting similar legislation. In a statement on the concerted effort to enact such laws, James Weldon Johnson, Secretary of the N. A. A. C. P. today said: "There is no doubt of a concerted campaign, especially in the New England States, but radiating throughout the North, and sponsored by the Klan and allied groups, to pass anti-marriage laws."

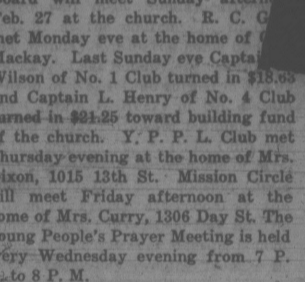
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
