VOTE FOR A CHANCE TO HELP YOUR BOYS

Negroes should remember that in this campaign there is a question at issue—it should not arise in a republican party primary—whether Negro men and women should be employed in certain offices in Polk county. Those candidates who give Negroes no consideration should be defeated.

There are candidates who absolutely refuse to employ Negro boys and girls in their offices "for fear the other help will kick." There are some candidates, both out and in office, who propose to see that Negroes get a share of the jobs. This latter group should be supported regardless of any other consideration. The Bystander has often said that jobs and power were the chief spoils of a political campaign. There is little power to be had but several jobs. Inquire of the Negro people who know and they will set you right who the "right candidates" are.

NOMINATE GOVERNOR HAMMILL

Iowa goes to the polls Monday to nominate candidates to be voted on in the November election. The race for the republican nomination for governor attracts great interest for two clean cut issues have been developed: Governor Hammill favoring the road bond issue and Senators Bowman, Skromme, et al, opposing; a proposed bank guaranty law which Gov. Hammill opposes and the others favoring it.

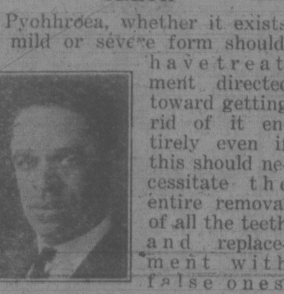

Weekly Health Talks

TEETH

Pyorrhoea, whether it exists in mild or severe form should have treatment directed toward getting rid of it entirely even if this should necessitate the entire removal of all the teeth and replacement with false ones.

Teeth, which are curious or show decay and old roots which are even with the gum, or worn down almost to the gums, should be removed as a protective measure against the occurrence of diseases which have been found to result from them at times. Such a procedure should be followed if for no other reason than to furnish a normal chewing surface for food which a normal toothed mouth would afford. The function of teeth is to prepare food so that the stomach which in some respects is a delicate organ may receive it without harm to itself and transfer it in proper consistency—for reception and absorption into the intestines. Missing teeth give the stomach a harder job by causing to be improperly chewed. Pyorrhoea sent into it food which has been acted as a constant source of infection to the person so affected—a boil, so to speak, constantly present in the mouth of the individual and so far as we know at present possessing no limiting wall to keep the infection

within the confines of the place of its origin.

Notice is hereby given that a corporation to be known as the Consolidated Securities Corporation has been organized under the laws of the State of Iowa with its principal place of business at Des Moines, Iowa. The corporate nature of the business to be transacted by the corporation is to purchase, lease, own, sell and exchange property, real, personal and mixed and to generally deal in the same; to purchase, own, lease and control other firm land or city property in the State of Iowa or in the United States; to issue bonds and debentures; to make personal contracts of any kind any other state or foreign countries; to act as Agent or representative of others in the execution of all of the powers granted; and the corporation is to have all of the powers in connection with the conducting of its business as may be granted to corporations of a similar character under the laws of the State of Iowa.

The authorized capital stock of this corporation is Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) and will be fully paid for when issued and shall thereafter be non-assessable. The corporation is to commence business on the 1st day of May, 1928, and will continue for a period of twenty years unless sooner dissolved by a three-fourth vote of its stockholders. Fifty per cent of the male employees of my office are ex-service men, which will indicate my attitude toward those who served our country best.

For the above reasons I am asking the suffrage of the people of my county at the primaries, June 4th.

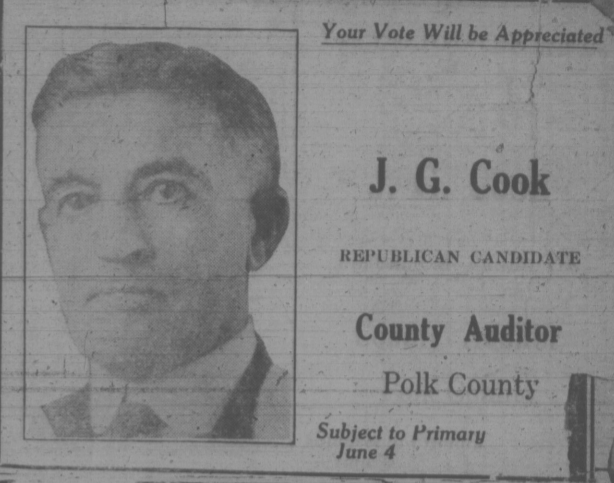

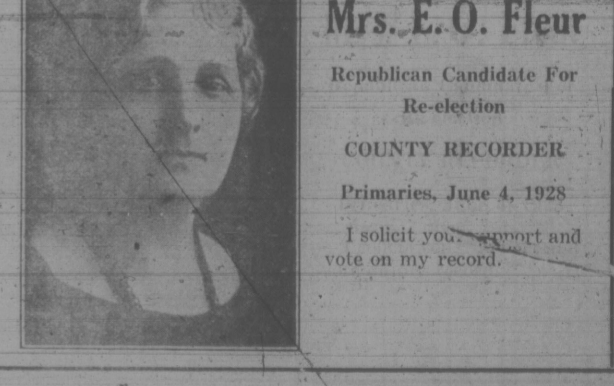
