### OUR TAXES

The Iowa Senate has killed the income tax bill after a stiff fight waged by Senator Patterson of Kossuth County, one of its sponsors. Iowa farmers contend that they are paying too much taxes and are making no money besides, while many city dwellers who make good salaries are investing most of their savings in intangible securities while they pay practically nothing for the upkeep of the state.

True, a great many city people are being taxed heavily and yet the bill could have been drawn so as to eliminate this hardship.

There is no question but that our taxes are too high, and this applies to automobiles as well. It is also true that too many people are escaping their share of the burden. Something ought to be done. We have outgrown our system taxation. Most people admit that it should be remedied, but are unwilling to try anything different.

The legislature cannot justify its work by simply defeating this bill but should do something definite—give the people relief from a system full of abuses.

A colored man, Roe Cunningham, down in Appanoose county stood before the board of supervisors and chided them for discontinuing to foot his coal bill. He said that he understood the reason was his refusal to scratch his ticket at the last election.

To quote the old man's story as we won't believe the language is accurate however, he said: "I'll go to the poh house of you all says so, but I've goin' vote the republican ticket. I was bawn in slavery in '61 and I was freed from slavery in '65 and I reckon as to how I've going to receipt that republican ticket as long as I live, even if I goes to the poh house for it."

The chairman of the republican state central committee, Mr. Willis L. Stern of Logan, Iowa, wrote Mr. Cunningham a letter, enclosed a check for ten dollars and congratulated him on his stand. Because of his action, Mr. Stern has received some criticism—all of it unfair to be sure.

Mr. Cunningham is to be congratulated for his willingness to defy a board which had the power to cut off his support, by denouncing a thing he felt to be wrong. We congratulate him on his desire to stick to the party which has meant most to our group. Fasten responsibility on a party and stick by it. This has always been our theory.

Mr. Stern leads his party organization in Iowa. As such he feels that the republican party should function between as well as during elections. Mr. Cunningham needs the money and there was no better time to help him than then. The trouble is we have too few politicians like Mr. Stern; they seek the Negro's vote at election time, pay out very little money and pass out no jobs at all.

Social snobbery has always set in motion the venom of its spleen to humiliate and embarrass him, but to intelligent Negroes that is nourishment.

There is too much at stake for him to be chagrined by any attempts on the part of social pinheads to cause him any loss of poise or dignity. He is a seasoned campaigner for he was Chicago's first Negro Alderman and since he survived that, we have no fear for his ability to survive in Washington. His service to the city was so efficient that he was able to go to those same citizens and say this is my record and the answer was: "Well done, thou hast been faithful over few things, we will make thee ruler over greater things".

The hopes and prayers and tears and fears of a maligned and persecuted race are all with you, Oscar, as you go forth. Stand by your convictions, fight for the right and put your trust in God.

1. Following Jesus (John 1:40). As a result of the testimony of John the Baptist, that Jesus was the Lamb of God (v. 36), Andrew followed Jesus. The proof that he really believed is that he followed Jesus. This is the first essential in the Christian life.

2. Leading others to Christ (v. 41). As soon as Andrew had found and become acquainted with Christ, he brought his brother Peter to Christ. Christian growth can only be truly realized in the giving of oneself to the winning of souls. The one who has received the gospel, the good news, cannot help but proclaim it.

3. Confessing Jesus as the Messiah, the Son of God (Matt. 16:15-18). The disciples had been with the Lord for several years. They had heard His wonderful words and seen His mighty works. Various opinions were extant about Him. It was now necessary for them to have a definite conception of Him. Examination came after the period of school life. As the Master Teacher Jesus knew what it meant to the disciples to have a right conception of Himself. He knew the trying ordeal through which they would be called upon to pass as the time of his crucifixion drew near. Only as they perceived His deity would they be strong in the hour of trial. In answer to Jesus' pointed personal question, Peter confessed to the absolute deity and Messiahship of Jesus. This confession of Christ is essential to salvation (John 20:31).

No one lacking it will ever be interested in the winning of souls. Besides, the denial of His deity is the supreme lie (1 John 2:22).

4. What Peter confessed (v. 16). "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God." It therefore involved His Messiahship and deity. This is the burning question of today. Those who have a right conception of Christ's person and mission have no trouble in the realm of science, philosophy or ethics.

5. Christ's commendation (v. 17). He pronounced him blessed. The evidence that Peter was blessed was that he was in spiritual touch with the heavenly Father. His conception of Christ was not revealed by flesh and blood.

6. Peter's blessing (v. 18). Christ declared that he should be come a foundation stone in His church. Christ Himself is the chief cornerstone on which the church is built. Christ's person and Messiahship were confessed by Peter, and on this rock is laid the foundation of apostles and prophets (Eph. 2:20). All believers are living stones of this house (1 Peter 2:5).

7. Peter's Restoration (John 21:15-19). Peter grievously sinned in denying the Lord, but he made confession, shedding bitter tears over his sin and folly. ## RACE INVITED TO ANTI-FASCIST CONGRESS

New York, Feb. 14 (CNS)—Believing that the Negro race which suffers continuously at the hands of such fascist organizations as the Ku Klux Klan, the American Legion, etc., will be willing to participate in a world Congress called for the purpose of organizing the fight on Fascism, the Anti-Fascist League of America has issued an invitation to all Negro organizations to send delegates to the National Conference to be held in New York on February 22. This conference is preparatory to the International Anti-Fascist Congress to be held in Berlin in the middle of March.

Among the Negro organizations which have accepted invitations so far is the American Negro Labor Congress, one of whose leaders, Otto E. Huiswoud, spoke last Sunday at a meeting held at Stuyvesant Casino for the purpose of preparing for the national conference on February 22, which will be held at Labor Temple, 14th Street and Second Avenue. Chicago, Feb. 22 (INN) — The Reverend Samuel Lawrence Birt died at Providence hospital at 4:30 P. M. Sunday.

The Rev. Mr. Birt, one of the foremost ministers of the African Methodist Episcopal connection, had pastored in several of the largest churches in the country. At the time of his death, he was the presiding elder over the third Chicago district.

### Built \$100,000 Church

One of the most important achievements that Dr. Birt accomplished was the building of a \$100,000 church at Des Moines, Iowa. Coming to this Iowa city in 1913 and beginning with a small church down on the Des Moines river, in less than five years time, he had moved his congregation to a magnificent structure on the corner of Twelfth and Crocker streets, near the Negro residential section. The first year of his pastorage in Des Moines, he raised more than \$25,000, a record which is still unbeaten by any minister in this city.

In 1918, Mr. Birt was called to Greater Bethel A. M. E. church of this city to succeed the Rev. H. Tanner. It was here that the great builder attained the title and was crowned "dollar money king" for bringing in the largest amount of annual assessments that had ever been turned in by any minister in the entire A. M. E. connection. He was awarded a gold medal by A. J. Copping, now deceased, who was then bishop of the fourth Episcopal district.

During his pastorage at Greater Bethel, Rev. Birt was the victim of an eye disease, which rendered him almost entirely blind.

It is believed by friends that his eye affliction coupled with the unfriendly attitude of Bishop Carey in giving him a minor charge, resulted in a constant grief which brought on an early death.

He was buried from Quinn Chapel A. M. E. church Friday at 2 P. M. He is survived by two sons, Samuel, Jr., and Ross Birt and his wife, Mrs. Maude Ross Birt.

Many friends from Des Moines, members of the church that he built here, were present at his funeral.

HOWARD UNIVERSITY FINANCING PLAN

United States Officials and University Representatives Talk Over Program—More Buildings Likely.

Washington, D. C., February 18.—President Mordecai W. Johnson of Howard University made announcement today of a recent conference looking forward toward a plan of financing the institution as a result of the law enacted by Congress authorizing Federal aid.

The conference was held in the office of the Honorable Roy O. West, secretary of the Department of Interior and was attended by government officials, trustees, and administrative officers of the university and a representative of the Julius Rosenwald fund.

The outcome of the conference was a general agreement concerning the desirability of establishing a plan for a systematic program of support for the university through a considerable period of years. Inspections by the bureau of education are to be comprehensive in scope, including every phase of activity of the institution.

The reports of the bureau to congress may contain recommendations for a ten or twenty-year program of federal support and for the development of the various educational services offered by the university. A building program for the improvement of the physical plant may also be included in the bureau's recommendations.

U. S. SAILORS CONTINUE ATTACKS ON NEW YORK NEGROES

New York, Feb. 14 (CNS)—The United States Navy seems to be determined to keep the Negro "in his place," in the United States as in Haiti. Yesterday, two daughty members of the crew of the U. S. S. Wyoming, very much under the influence of "Willie brandWater," and angered by the sight of a Negro having a seat on a 14th St. Canarsie local, while they were forced to stand, attacked the Negro as the train pulled into the Grand St. station.

By the time the train had arrived at the Lorimer St. station, the more pugnacious of the two members of the navy had used a half dozen handkerchiefs to stem the flow of blood from an extremely sore nose, and had the entire floor of the car spattered with blood. When the train arrived at its destination, Bedford Avenue, the comrade of the injured sailor, who up to this point had not taken part in the major portion of the battle, attempted to eject the Negro, James Lee, of St. Albans, Long Island, from the train.

NEGRO FURRIER BEATEN BY THUGS AND POLICE

New York, Feb. 14 (CNS)—Nearly killed by police and thugs, Henry Rosemond, one of the strike leaders and a member of the Joint Board of the new Needle Trades Industrial Union, was the first victim of Tammany police brutality in the dressmaker's great struggle which began yesterday morning.

Rosemond, who is especially popular among the Negro workers, himself a Negro and a fur worker, was beaten unconscious by police and thugs at the shop of Berman and Weneit, 199 West 23d St., where he had just succeeded in bringing out on strike six of the eight workers employed in the Berman shop, among whom were two women workers.

SIX-MONTH-TERM FOR MARRYING PASTOR, 54, TO GIRL, 11

Marion, Ill., Feb. 14—(CNS)—Despite his plea that he was acting under divine inspiration when he married Selinda Clendenin, 11, to the Rev. Joseph Benton, 54-year-old blind Pentecostal pastor, Edward Hayes today was sentenced to six months on the state penal farm and fined \$100 for violating the Illinois marriage laws.

Benton is tried on a charge of bigamy. His marriage to the 11-year-old tot—had been led to believe the ceremony would sanctify her—has been annulled. For the first time in the history of trade union organization among the needle trades workers of this city, a determined drive is being made to draw the Negro workers in the industry into the union on a basis of full equality for employment and participation on governing committees.

Political maneuvering that set the stage for the conviction of Fleming is believed to be the natural result of the chagrin and bewilderment evidenced in certain anti-race quarters after the last municipal election, when local members of our group, under intricate voting plan of proportional representation, furnished an interesting paradox by electing three race councilmen out of a total of 25.
