Illinois Representative First Negro in Congress in Twenty-Eight Years

Nat'l Benefit Shows Business Increase in 1928

Washington, D. C., April 15.—Special.—The annual report of the National Benefit Life Insurance Company, whose Home Office is at Washington, D. Washington, D. C., April 19.—The crowd which packed the gallery Monday for the opening of the 71st congress displayed more than the usual amount of curiosity always attendant upon this most important national event. There was much craning of necks, a hum of questions and answers and an air of expectancy which increased as the time of opening approached. The flurry seemed directed toward the business of getting a good look at the new member-elect, Oscar DePriest, of Illinois, and seeing him take the oath making him the first congressman of his race since 1901.

"There He Is"

"There he is," ran the whisper, and all eyes turned to see the towering form of a ruddy-complexioned man approach. "That's DePriest of Chicago," and there was more craning of necks to see the dignified representative return the greeting of colleagues as he quietly took his seat in the rear of the house with the Illinois delegation. A thick mass of white hair was brushed back from a face stern to the point of grimness. A ruddy face, etched with deep lines of character and a prevailing physical and mental strength, made him easily the most conspicuous person in the house and certainly the focus of attention throughout the session.

Crowd Senses Plot

Congressman DePriest was the center of a group of friends who hurried to congratulate him after the ceremonies, among them Mrs. Ruth Hanna McCormick, newly elected congresswoman-at-large. To the questions of reporters who crowded around him he replied in his short, terse manner that he was first going to "study the methods of procedure of the house."

New York, April 19.—White women of the Southern States have issued statements repudiating lynching and mobism as a "protection to white womanhood," and asking a single standard of morals and protection for all women, white and colored. A pamphlet containing excerpts from these pronouncements, published by the Commission on Interracial Cooperation in Atlanta, has been received by the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

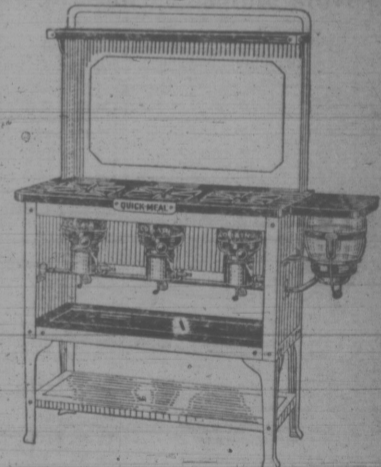

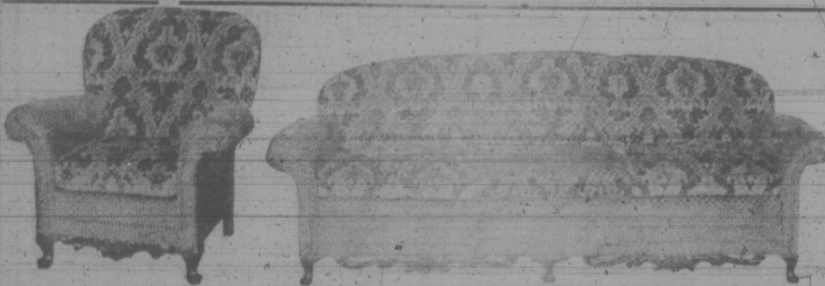

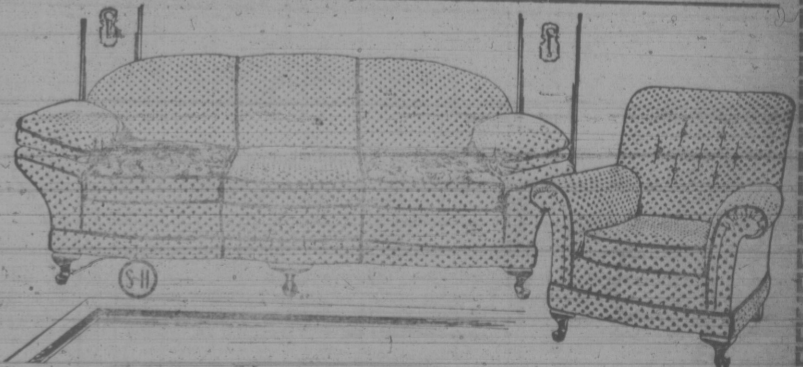
