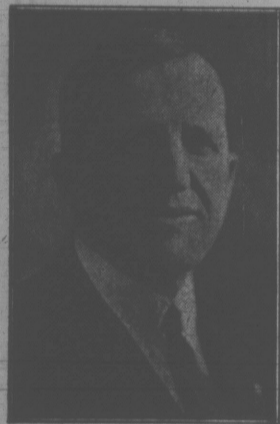

### WELL-FITTED BELT MAKES FOR COMFORT

## Walker Noses Out Garst for Sheriff Job; Attorneys to Confab

The leads gained by Representative L. J. Dickinson of Algona, republican nominee for the United States senate, and Dan W. Turner of Corning, republican nominee for governor, over their respective opponents passed 73,000 and 100,000, respectively, Tuesday afternoon.

With 2,119 of the state's 2,434 precincts reporting, Turner had 62.8 per cent of the total vote for governor. Dickinson had received 54.1 per cent of the total vote from 2,122 precincts.

Turner, with 203,415 votes over Ed M. Smith, who had received a total vote of 101,616. Otto Lage had a total vote of 18,854.

Dickinson carried each of his opponent's home counties. Governor Hammill lives in Hancock county, Frank J. Lund in Hamilton county and W. O. Payne in Polk county.

From the time the first precincts were reported the trend toward Dickinson and Turner continued without interruption. The first Des Moines precincts showed heavy majorities for Turner and Dickinson.

Then came scattered reports from southern and western Iowa counties, corroborating the Des Moines reports. There was still chance that Hammill and Smith through large margins of victory in the east and southeast might upset the victories.

When Muscatine county returns were complete, giving only about 800 votes margin to Smith and Hammill, and complete Scott county reports gave the only similarly narrow margins, the election was practically over.

The Turner and Dickinson victories were not simply a matter of overwhelming majorities in specific sections, however. The majorities were general over the state and counties carried by Smith and Hammill, except in the southeastern part of the state, were scattered.

Other state nominations were: John Fetherell attorney general; Ray Johnson, treasurer; J. W. Long, auditor; Mark Thornburg, secretary of agriculture; Miss Agnes Samuelson, superintendent of public instruction. Neither W. E. G. Saunders of G. C. Greenwald received the 35 per cent requisite. This nomination will be decided at the state convention.

Polk's county attorney for the next term will be selected at the county convention June 28th as a result of the failure of any of the four candidates to obtain thirty-five per cent of the votes cast Monday, complete reports of the ninety-five precincts revealed Tuesday.

County Attorney Carl Missildine led the ticket with 8,435, but failed to obtain the needed 9,018 votes to win the nomination in the primary.

As the final returns came in, Volney Diltz passed John Connolly, Jr., for second place. Final figures gave Diltz 5,905 and Connolly, who had been running in second place until the last few returns, 5,865.

William C. Walker, former superintendent of public safety, won the sheriff's nomination with a plurality of 1,677 over Morrison Garst, his closest competitor.

E. A. Elliott finished third and E. E. Dudley got only 708 for last place. County Treasurer Allen Munn headed the county ticket with 17,538 votes his opponent, Dale J. Shaw, receiving but 5,238. Munn's total was the highest polled by any candidate.

## Hoover Names Judge Hueston Asst. Attorney

The Pittsburgh Courier says that the Hoover administration has made its first major Negro appointment. Judge William C. Hueston of Gary, Ind., admitted in his suite at the Whitelaw hotel Tuesday morning that he had been named assistant solicitor general and would take up the duties of his office in the postoffice department on July 1st.

This climax to Judge Hueston's dramatic career, who rose from a race track boy in Kentucky to be commissioner of education for the Elks, czar of Negro organized baseball and a judge in Indiana, caused the dynamic leader from northern Indiana to be all smiles when he made the announcement exclusively to the Courier before it had been given to the general press. Judge Hueston will be a this office in Gary until July 1, after which he will locate in Washington. He is now working to have another Negro appointed to the position which he has resigned at home. He will return to Gary late this week.

### CHICAGO DEFENDER WINS ADVERTISING SUIT

Chicago, June 3.—The appellate court of this district handed down a decision Tuesday in the long drawn out suit of Tony Langston, former dramatic critic and advertising solicitor of the Chicago Defender and that publication in favor of the Chicago Defender.

The suit, which involved some \$35,000, was brought by Langston to enforce payment on advertising contracts which he had consummated before his separation from the Defender. Langston was employed on the paper from 1922 until 1927.

## White, First Phi Beta at Iowa Since Brown; V. Jones Graduates

Louis B. White has the distinction of being the first race student to receive the Beta Kappa from the University of Iowa since S. Joe Brown, local attorney, received his key more than thirty years ago.

Phi Beta Kappa is a national honorary scholastic fraternity which honors those who not only obtain high scholastic standing during their college career, but who also stand high in campus activities.

Since entering the university in 1926, White, who will receive his A. B. degree this month, has been interested in campus activities. In his first year he was elected to the Students conference, Milwaukee; a member of the Y. M. C. A. cabinet and chairman of the Devotional Committee. He has taken a leading part in interracial work and has been a

speaker on various occasions, covering such subjects as Racial Prejudice, Christianity, Economics, Religion and Social Culture as they relate to the Negro. During the years '27 and '28 he was a member of the university soccer team, being the only Negro player in the "Big Ten" schools during that time. He is a member of the Alpha Phi Alpha fraternity and was president and secretary of the Alpha Theta chapter at one time and has played the leading part in many other campus activities. He majored in religion, devoting much time, however, in sociology and philosophy.

Miss Virginia Jones, formerly of Des Moines, will also receive her A. B. degree from the University of Iowa this June. She was mentioned in honor roll of those graduating with distinction. She is the granddaughter of Mr. Price Alexander of Des Moines.

age. The petitions of the Negro Gold Star mothers have been forwarded to President Hoover by the N. A. A. C. P., which officially called the matter to the president's attention and asked that he overrule the war department in the matter. The letter of the N. A. A. C. ## Preachers Could Stop Lynching Says Group

Official Neglect and Religious Indifference Chiefly Responsible, Says  
Interracial Commission—Renewed  
Vigilance Urged

Atlanta, Ga., June 3.—Official neglect and local religious indifference are charged with major responsibility for the continuance of lynchings in America, in a statement issued today from the headquarters of the Commission on Interracial Co-operation. Based on personal investigation of recent lynchings and a study of the whole situation over a period of years, the statement holds that the preachers and the officers of the law can end lynchings whenever they determine to do so, and in the meantime cannot escape definite responsibility.

"The recent upsurge of mob violence, claiming four victims in the south in as many weeks, is immeasurably depressing to lovers of justice and to patriotic Americans jealous of their country's good name," says the commission's statement. "Upon two groups, we are convinced—upon the officers of the law, and the ministers and other moral leaders in the community—rests the ultimate responsibility for the lynching habit."

DAVENPORT NEWS

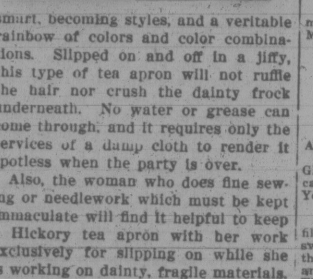
