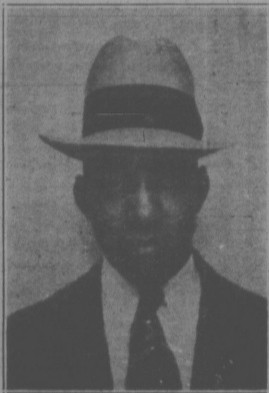

## No Favoritism Shown, Says Civil Service Body

Like a thunderbolt out of a clear sky came the appointment of Ben Rich to the police force by Roscoe Bane this week, following a certification of eligibles from last year's ex-

amination. He was the only Negro in the group and stood third in the rating.

Mr. Rich is a likable chap and seems to fill the requirements in full details, and with enough experience to so minister the proper psychology for a policeman. Rich was born in Fayetteville, Ark., his father being the leading Minister in that community. Upon hearing the call of the west and following the advice of Horace Greeley, "Go west young man," he came to Des Moines some twenty years ago. He is married and has a son, Eugene, 12 years of age, and resides at 1312 Laurel Street.

Mr. Rich's position came through strong perseverance in that he took the examination three times. He assumes his duties Sunday, March 27th.

The Bystander congratulates Mr. Rich and likewise utters a silent gratitude to those other Negroes who had the "guts" to fight and compel his appointment.

Carmel, Cal., Mar. 24.—With all the flourish, pomp and glory that the talented habites of the exclusive artists' colony of Carmel could display, Jean Toomer, psychologist and essayist, and his white bride, Margery Latimer, were impressively feted here Thursday. Toomer and Miss Latimer, both brilliant writers, were married at Portage, Wis., four months ago, and their many friends of both races, upon hearing the news, honored them at a colorful reception.

The marriage followed one of Mr. Toomer's "psychological" experiments, which attracted nation-wide attention, standing novels.

Mr. Toomer's novel, "Cain," published in 1923, first brought him national note, while the former Miss Latimer is credited with several outstanding novels.

In an interview with newspaper men, Mr. Toomer envisioned a new American race without creed or color barriers in the future.

## CAB CALLOWAY'S FORMER BAND TO APPEAR AT THE BILIKEN BALLROOM

The Original Missourians are scheduled to appear at the Biliken Ballroom for an Easter Ball, Monday, March 28. The outstanding feature of the band is the lady director and entertainer.

It is not unusual to see a lady playing an instrument, but it is very unusual to see a lady directing a band. The band as a whole is one of the best that will appear in the city this season; it was formerly the famous Cab Calloway's.

Following charges made by Roscoe P. Bane, Superintendent of Public Safety, at a meeting held in East Des Moines, Friday night, that failure of the Civil Service Commission to certify Negroes for appointment as policemen and firemen was the cause of the small number of colored men on the force, Mayor Vrouch called a meeting in the council chamber Saturday morning to thrash out the question.

Bane called attention to the fact that the Civil Service examinations were held a year ago but no report of the results had been made by the commission. He further stated that a number of Negro men had taken the examination.

Negro representatives were there to learn why their race has been unable to have a Negro on the Des Moines fire department for 20 years and why vacancies in the police department caused by deaths of Negro patrolmen had not been filled by Negro applicants.

They were informed by the commission that failure of Negro applicants to pass either oral, written or physical tests accounted for their absence from lists certified by the commission to the city council.

The commission was there to defend itself and did so.

### Speed Urged

Commission members testified the mayor urged them to complete the grading as soon as possible, so that lists of 10 policemen and as many firemen could be certified.

"You have been given a square deal by me," the mayor said, addressing Charles Howard and S. Joe Brown, Attorney James B. Morris, publisher

### Ordinance

Bane then asked the legal department to prepare an ordinance directing the civil service commission to supply grades within 30 days after any examination. He asked also that the ordinance require the commission to supply the council with a report of its proceedings.

E. T. Thomas, commission chairman, said such an ordinance would conflict with the state law which directs grades to be returned "as soon as possible."

Bane insisted the ordinance is the only means of eliminating delay. He suggested employment of outside help to expedite matters.

### Howard Talks

"Somewhere between the civil service commission and the superintendent of public safety," declared Attorney Howard, "the Negro boys fall by the wayside."

"If in order to give us representation on the police and fire department you must accept a Negro below physical or mental requirements, we don't want any representation."

"And by the same line of reasoning, we don't want a man to be turned down because he is black."

Thomas offered to resign from the commission if statements regarding his unfairness to Negroes can be proved.

### Assurance

D. S. Chamberlain, another commission member, assured the Negro representatives that absolute fairness will be the rule of that body in dealing with all applicants, regardless of race, religion or nationality.

Tom Riley is the other member of the commission.

Bane asked that the commission supply him with grades Monday. The commission did not agree to do so, but promised to supply the demand as soon as possible.

## Race Rights Asserted In Texas Primary Case

Washington, D. C., Mar. 25.—The right of Negroes to vote in primary elections of the Democratic party was asserted in the United States supreme court Tuesday on behalf of Dr. L. A. Nixon of El Paso, Texas. Dr. Nixon claimed that James Condon and another judge of election for the precinct in which he was registered denied him the right to vote in the primary election held in Texas in 1928 for the nomination of candidates of the Democratic party.

The action of the judges of election was based on a resolution adopted by the state Democratic executive committee which provided that only white Democrats shall be allowed to participate in party primaries.

Alexander, S. Joe Brown, James B. Morris, Harry Wilson, J. G. Browne, and Chas. P. Howard, before the committee on delegates at large at the Republican State Convention, Attorney Chas. P. Howard was selected alternate delegate at large to the Republican National Convention which meets in Chicago in June. This is the first time in thirty years that Negroes in Iowa have had any representation on the state delegation.

## YW Drive Plans Ready

The campaign workers of the Blue Triangle team of the Y. W. C. A. financial campaign were guests of the campaign committee at a tea on Monday, March 21. Mrs. J. Burns Kelso was awarded the longest list of new names for the subscription list. Mrs. Mary M. Woodson is captain of the team. Division chairman are Mesdames J. G. Browne, T. E. Martin, G. T. Fant, Agnes Mathews, Sallie Garter, Adell McGuire, Gus Nichols, J. Burns Kelso, Anna B. Simmons, Maude Woods, and Miss Marguerite Esters. Mrs. R. S. Hinsdell is team sponsor.

Solicitations have begun in order that one-half the \$660 quota may be reported at the initial report on Monday, April 4. During 1931, 6,878 people attended activities at the building, 411 were regularly enrolled in clubs, classes and committees. ## Mob Rule Upheld In Md. Verdict

Salisbury, Md., Mar. 24.—Mob violence throughout the country achieved a 100 per cent batting average last Friday when the Wilcomico county grand jury, sitting here to investigate the lynching of Mathew Williams last December, reported "we find that there is absolutely no evidence that can remotely connect anyone with the instigation or perpetration of the murder."

The verdict came as a result of a four-day investigation, during which the grand jury of Salisbury whites heard 130 witnesses. Prior to the hearing of testimony, the state assistants had spent four months investigating the lynching.

## Globe Trotters Defeat Olson Swedes

In their 1932 farewell appearance in Des Moines the Harlem Globe Trotters past masters of cage experts, outplayed and defeated Olson's Terrible Swedes, traveling star quintet, before 2,500 spectators at the Coliseum Monday night to the score of 27-22. The colored boys staged a second half rally to come from behind and win; the Swedes were unable to hold their 13 to 6 lead of the first period.

The winners exhibited a deadly attack, bullet passes and superior skill in floor work which was dazzling. The Swedes depended on long shots with an offense built around Campbell, rangy six foot nine center, but were unable to cope with the fast block plays of the easterners. Washington, of Howard university, pivot man, was successful in guarding the giant Scandinavian to a single field goal.

Oliver, of New York City college; Johnson, of Detroit university, and Dennis, of Wendell Phillips high school of Chicago, were spectacular. Frazier, former all-American guard at New York City college, led the Globe Trotters on the offense with 12 points. His pivot shots were a feature of the game.

## Hearty Response To Political Unity Meeting Held Monday

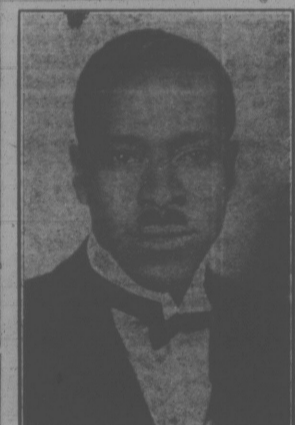
Pursuant to a call to unite issued through these editorial columns last week, the following men met at the Bystander office Monday evening, March 21. A. A. Alexander, president of the N. A. A. C. P.; S. Joe Brown, commander of Lincoln Post, American Legion, James B. Morris, editor of the Bystander, J. G. Browne, and Harry E. Wilson, chairman and secretary respectively of the Iowa Negro Republican Voters' League; Chas. P. Howard. ## Victim Of Second Fall Within Two Years

OF 20 UNIONS ONLY I. W. W. ADMITS NEGROES' MEMBERSHIP

New York, Mar. 25.—Deliberate exclusion of Negroes from membership in American labor unions is illustrated in a list compiled by the U. S. Department of Commerce and sent to the N.A.A.C.P. The list shows that out of twenty important unions in the transportation and communication industries, only the I. W. W. (Industrial Workers of the World) admit Negroes, the others specifically excluding colored workers from membership.

George Hardy, 24, window washer, who plunged nine stories from the Capitol Theatre building, near Fifth and Grand when his safety belt broke last Friday morning, is recovering at the Mercy Hospital.

Miraculously escaping certain death in his wild plunge, 100 feet below, Hardy fell through the glass canopy on the Paramount theatre missing the steel cross beams by inches. After being extricated he was without pulse for two hours; when he regained consciousness his first question was, "will

## NEGRO WOMEN GET "VILE" JOBS IN PACKING INDUSTRY

New York, Mar. 25.—Intense discrimination against colored women in the slaughtering and meat packing industry, is reported by the U. S. Department of Labor in a document just received by the N.A.A.C.P.

The document, "The Employment of Women in Slaughtering and Meat Packing," according to the N.A.A.C.P., not only show that employment of Negroes is restricted to slightly more than one-tenth but that "of the colored women, practically one-half were in off and hog and sheep casings."

## "Green Pastures" Here Friday and Saturday

The 1930 Pulitzer Prize play, "The Green Pastures," will be offered at the Shrine Auditorium on the night of Friday, April 1st, with matinee and night performances Saturday, with the original cast which played it for 800 performances in New York and Chicago.

The leading role, that of "the Lawd", is played by Richard B. Harrison. He had no previous experience in the theatre prior to appearing in "The Green Pastures." He was an itinerant lecturer and dramatic reader on the Chautauqua circuit for forty years, and was 66 years old when he made his stage debut. Since that occasion he has been awarded several honorary university degrees and received the Spingarn Medal, awarded annual-

ly to an outstanding Negro intellectual. Daniel L. Haynes, Salem Tutt Whitney, Alonzo Henderson, and Doc Doe Green play the chief supporting roles. The cast totals about 100, all of whom are Negroes.

The entire production was directed by Marc Connelly, author, himself, Robert Edmond Jones, creator of the sets for "Morning Becomes Electra" and many other outstanding productions, originated the lighting effects and designed the physical setting of "The Green Pastures." The most interesting feature of the latter is the use of the treadmill for various illusions.

No orchestra is used, Hill Johnson's choir singing spirituals throughout the performance in a manner interwoven with the play's action. The personnel and equipment will arrive on a special train via the C. M. & St. Paul on Friday morning, April 1st, at 9:30.

The candidate who has answered these questions favorably should be supported. Otherwise not. By all means we cannot continue to back candidates who have failed in the past.

## HEALTH TALKS "LEXS-O-GRAPHS"

### DIABETES

Many people are suffering from Diabetes in mild or moderate form and do not know it. This is not surprising when the nature of the disease is considered and the structure of the organ controlling the use of sugar is known about.

Allowing for many causative agents or factors in the production of this disease and its symptoms, a mild form without much inconvenience at first is the logical condition. A progressiveness with increase in the symptoms and severity of those already present is to be expected if the disease remains untreated and no precautions are taken in the diet allowing without restriction sugars and starches in abundance, foods which seem to be relished and longed for when they actually do injury.

This is one disease in which Nature deceives by creating a desire for that which is distinctly harmful; being powerless, I suppose to do otherwise for in spite of injury by these articles of food there is a need for them in the body.

The nature of Diabetes is such that sugars and starches are not used by the body even though the desire for them is increased and the eating of them attended with the greatest relish. The use of insulin makes these articles of food usable and perhaps also allows the pancreas (which is the organ affected) to regain some of its power to digest them.

**The Home and That Boy of Yours**

**TRAINING THE INTELLECT NOT SUFFICIENT**

MOST boys get a fairly satisfactory intellectual development. They play more or less vigorously, "monkeying" extensively with everything they can contact, until they go to school. Quickly they learn to read, write and get a rapid experience in the arts and sciences. They must stay in school, with all of its faults and standardization, and mass production, until they are sixteen. They come to know a great deal about many things, which is as it ought to be.

Yet with it all, they so seldom really learn how to live. They make the honor society and bring home a series of splendid academic grades, but they are not humanly efficient, or forceful and co-operative; they have no creative initiative; their personalities are still undeveloped; they cannot and do not make wise decisions. They are not competent to stand alone as independent beings, and why? Why because these are the emotional qualities of personality which are largely ignored, little understood, forgotten, overlooked or ruthlessly cramped.

Yet boys go on and on, getting into one emotional jam after another, because of their prejudices and antagonisms, their strong likes and dislikes, their irritability and astounding intolerance of each other and the home folks. They cannot make friends and keep them; they cannot get jobs and hold them. They do not experience

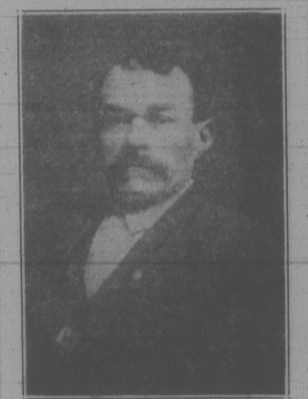

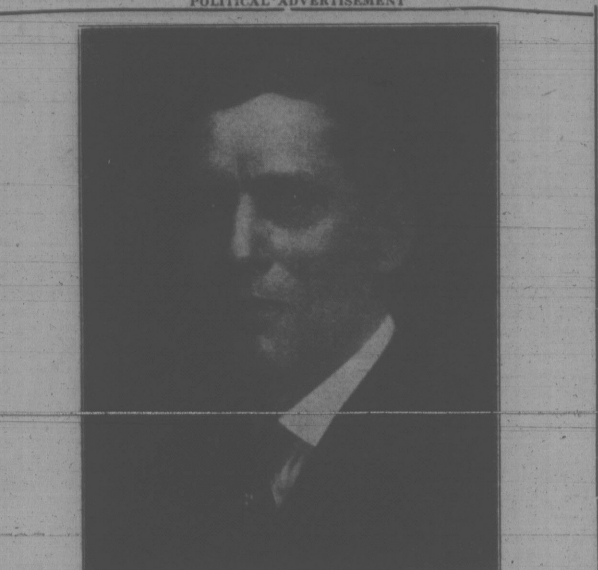
