### Mrs. Mickles Retires from Post Office Service

Mrs. Mary Mickles, 813 14th street, who has been employed at the local postoffice for thirty years will retire May 31st. She is the first colored person to retire from government service in Des Moines.

She entered the custodian service, U. S. Treasury Department, in October, 1900 and was first assigned to the U. S. Post Office in the old Federal building at 5th and Court ave., and transferred to the new post office building in 1910.

Mrs. Mickles served under seven postmasters: Schooler, McKay, Myerly, Kurtz, Huffman, Thornburg and Frisk. Edwin J. Frisk, present postmaster states: "She has rendered honest and faithful service and leaves with an excellent record of conscientious, loyal service to the government."

### AME's Elect 3 New Bishops

Noah H. Williams, D. H. Sims and H. Y. Tookes, Elected to Highest Positions in A. M. E. Church

Cleveland O., May 19.—After 28 hours of balloting, the delegates to the quadrennial conference of the A. M. E. church elected Rev. Noah W. Williams of St. Louis, Rev. D. H. Sims, of South Carolina, and Rev. H. Y. Tookes, of Florida, to the Bishopric. The balloting began Friday morning at 11 o'clock and at three o'clock Saturday afternoon, the third bishop was elected. Seven ballots were cast. Bishop R. A. Grant, of Alabama, presided.

Bishops and general officers of the A. M. E. church will continue to receive the same salaries. The committee on Temporal Economy reported that the bishops receive \$4,800 a year and the general officers \$3,600, which means no cut for those discharging official duties. The measure was adopted a few moments before adjournment Monday.

The number of bishops, however, has been reduced to 15 and the office of historian has been abolished. This means a saving of \$74,400 a quadrennium.

Albia, Iowa, May 13.—Hugh W. Lundy, Secretary of the Iowa Coal Institute, said, "The action of Governor Turner in proclaiming a 'Know Iowa Week', for the week of May 8th is to be highly commended. The favorable reception to such a movement as endorsed by the Iowa Press, Commercial and Service organizations is evidence of the merit in calling to the attention of Iowans the many advantages that are ours as citizens of our great commonwealth."

"Recognized as the garden spot of the world, with a ranking of first in production of live stock and farm products, too many of our own citizens fail to appreciate how important our industrial advantages are. With the wealth of raw materials and abundance of cheap power available from our vast deposits of coal, we should develop into the 'New England' of the Middle West."

Hopewell, N. J., May 20.—Determined to combat any attempts to prevent him from collecting rewards offered by the state of New Jersey and eastern daily newspapers, William Allen, truck driver, who last Thursday afternoon found the slain kidnaped baby of Col. and Mrs. Charles Lindbergh, has retained the services of Attorney J. Austin Norris of Philadelphia.

Attorney Norris hopes to get at least \$50,000 in rewards for his client. He will represent Mr. Allen in all negotiations concerning rewards offered by state officials and newspapers for the finding of the body.

### NEGROES WILL FIGHT TEXAS ATTEMPT TO EVADE SUPREME COURT DECISION

New York, May 20.—Warning that attempts by the Democratic party in Texas to evade the two sweeping decisions by the U. S. Supreme Court, holding that Negroes may not be barred from primary elections, would be vigorously contested by the N. A. A. C. P., whose attorneys won the two cases involving the white primary, was issued from the national offices of the Association at 69 Fifth Ave., today.

### SALARIES OF 11 ZION BISHOPS CUT \$1,400

Pittsburgh, May 20.—The closing sessions of the 29th quadrennial general conference of the A. M. E. Zion church were filled with bitter wrangling over the various bits of new legislation calling for the reduction of salaries of bishops and general officers. The bitterest contest came on Tuesday morning when an attempt was made to re-franchise the bishops and general officers. The motion was lost by an overwhelming majority. The age limit of bishops also created a heated discussion, but resulted unchanged.

The salaries of the eleven bishops of the A. M. E. Zion church were cut from \$5,000 per year to \$3,600 as delegates continued their "economy drive."

### Y Track Meet Decoration Day

CROCKER Y. M. C. A. TO HOLD ANNUAL TRACK MEET

East High Stadium will afford the setting for the tenth annual Crocker Y. M. C. A. track and field meet to be held on Memorial Day at 2:00 p. m. Approximately two hundred athletes will toe the mark in the three divisions and the special events. The Divisions are classified as follows: Lightweights—up to 110 lbs. Middleweights—111 to 135 lbs. Heavyweights—136 lbs. up.

Heavyweights will participate in the following events—mile run, 100 yd. dash, pole vault, 440 yd. dash, broad jump, low hurdles, high jump, shot put, 880 yd. run, 440 yd. relay, 220 yd. dash, one mile relay.

Middleweights—100 yd. dash, high jump, low hurdles, 220 yd. dash, pole vault, broad jump, shot put, 880 yd. relay.

Lightweights—50 yd. dash, 440 yd. relay, shuttle race, broad jump, high jump, 100yd. dash, pole vault, low hurdles.

### Spingarn and Sen. Capper, Speakers

Race Superiority Theories Have Heralded Doom of Nations Ancient and Modern

Washington, May 20.—Equality of races as an ideal and a fact, is the prime need of the American nation today, declared Col. J. E. Spingarn, president of the N. A. A. C. P., in the keynote address Tuesday night opening the Association's 23rd Annual conference which is to continue in Washington through Sunday, May 22.

Theories of the "superiority" of race and national groups in the ancient and modern worlds have heralded the doom of nations, Col. Spingarn warned his audience, citing the poison of the slave population of Rome which nooded ancient Italy; the dispersion of the Hebrews who considered themselves the chosen people; the destruction of the south in the Civil war; and the crushing of modern Germanic or Nordic race.

### SENATOR CAPPER URGES NEGRO TO BE POLITICAL INDEPENDENT

Washington, May 20.—Political independence was urged upon the Negroes of the United States, in an address Tuesday night by Senator Arthur Capper of Kansas, opening the 23rd annual conference of the N. A. A. C. P. which commenced in Washington through Sunday, May 22.

"The Negro does not 'belong' to any party," said Senator Capper, "but will wisely give his support to the party which in fact defends him in his right of equality under the law. . . . I would say, let the Negro citizen hold to an independent mind politically making his decisions and choices in politics according to the circumstances."

Denounces Howard Budget Cut "Such things are continually happening as recently occurred in Congress where Howard university was threatened with an entirely disproportionate cut in its appropriations as its contribution to Federal economies."

97 Negroes in Who's Who "In Who's Who in America, for 1930," said Senator Capper, "no less than 97 Negroes are listed, including educators, authors, scientists, clergymen, musicians, army officers, doctors, lawyers, diplomats, artists and editors."

### Legion Sponsors Minstrel Show

Lincoln Post of the American Legion, composed of local Negro World War veterans, is sponsoring an up to date tent minstrel show, the "Hot Chocolate Minstrels", May 23-28, which will be directed by J. P. Bragg of the Shrine Temple Staff. He will use all Negro talent, some of them local former service men and others imported from Kansas City and other large Negro centers.

It will be held on the northwest corner of 9th and Center streets, on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday, and they will move to the show grounds at East 19th and University for the remaining three days of the week.

Safety Supt. Roscoe Bane of the city council has remitted the license fee and the owners of the lots have donated the use of the ground as the proceeds of the entertainment will go to assist the Post in paying the expenses of their delegates to the state convention and paying up some expenses incurred in the unemployment relief campaign of last fall and winter.

The patronage of the public will be greatly appreciated as the price of admission has been reduced, on account of the depression, to twenty-five cents for adults and fifteen cents for children.

### Troops Guard Supreme Court In Alabama Case

Washington May 19.—with Armed officers standing as sentinels, the stately building housing the United States Supreme Court was fortified Monday against a possible demonstration by Communists, who are urging the supreme tribunal to intervene in the case of the doomed Scottsboro (Ala.) youths. Nothing occurred to mar the calmness of the judicial atmosphere, however, and the distinguished looking justices took their places. In addition to the policemen assigned to the court to preserve order, two others in uniform watched closely as the usual line formed at the doors to await admittance to the court. No one among the spectators was questioned, however.

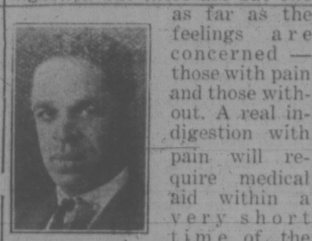

## HEALTH TALKS

### INDIGESTION

There are many forms of indigestion but there are but two



as far as the feelings are concerned—those with pain and those without. A real indigestion with pain will require medical aid within a very short time of the condition is not corrected by Mother Nature. This pain in the pit of the stomach is serious as anyone who has gone through it will tell you. Vomiting at such a time will prove of much benefit and if this does not occur something should be done to produce it.

This will indeed help much until proper treatment is procured. 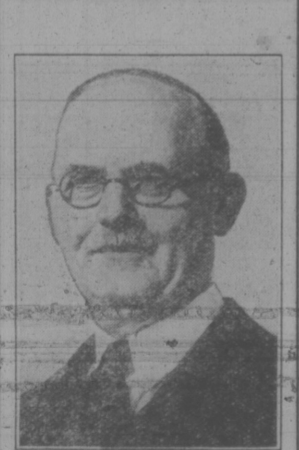

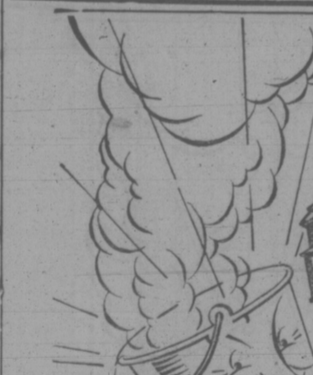

### State-Wide Interracial Conference Planned

The Des Moines Interracial Commission received a communication from Dr. Geo. E. Haynes of New York City, Director of the work of Interracial Commissions throughout the North and East, offering to send one or more of his staff workers to Des Moines to direct a State-wide Interracial Conference at a date to be agreed upon next Fall or winter.

The chairman appointed a committee consisting of Dr. Stoddard Lane, Mrs. S. Joe Brown, Atty. Jas. B. Morris, Mr. J. C. Lewis and Dr. Geo. W. Robinson, to get into communication with representative citizens in each city and town in the State having a population of five hundred or more Negroes, with a view to having them represented in this interracial conference.

### SUPREME COURT'S 5 TO 4 DECISION ON TEXAS CASE. PARKER FIGHT RESULT

New York, May 13—The victory won in the second Texas White Primary case, by 5 to 4 decision of the United States Supreme Court handed down last Monday, is a direct consequence of the successful fight the N. A. A. C. P. made to prevent appointment to that tribunal of the anti-Negro Judge, John J. Parker of North Carolina.

Both of the Justices appointed after the Parker defeat, Justice Owen J. Roberts and Justice Benjamin N. Cardozo, voted with the majority, Justice Cardozo handing down the decision.

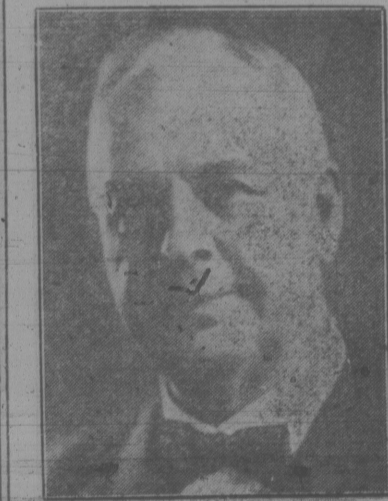

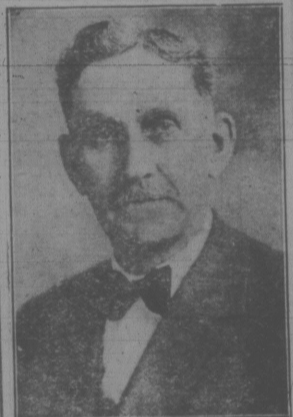
Cleveland, O., May 12—Rt. Rev. William Tecumseh Vernon, presiding bishop of the Twelfth Episcopal District of the African Methodist Episcopal Church, was found guilty of misappropriating \$17,360, Monday afternoon, and suspended for 48 months without salary. The trial took place at the quadrennial conference in session here this week.

Bishop Vernon was first tried before the Judiciary Committee, a sub-committee of the Episcopal Committee. He and his council were present. He was defended by Rev. J. D. Dennis. The Rev. C. E. Brooks represented the church. The judiciary committee, composed of one man from each annual conference, found him guilty. The verdict was unanimous.

Washington, May 12—Unless their petition for review is presented to the Supreme Court of the United States not later than May 23, the six youths condemned to death at Scottsboro, Ala., may suffer an experience similar to that of Sacco-Vanzetti, who were executed during a summer recess of the highest court and before it could consider their case.

Recently the Alabama Supreme Court, after it had refused to set aside the death penalty, postponed the execution of the boys from May 13 to June 24, to enable them to apply to the highest court for a review.

Under an order recently issued, the United States Supreme Court will receive no motions during its present term after May 23, and will end the term May 31.

Should the petition for review be received too late for presentation to the court at the present term, its filing would not act as a stay. According to Attorney General Knight, the Alabama courts would be powerless to further delay the execution, to enable the Supreme Court on reassembling in October to consider the matter.
