## Seventeen Graduate from Des Moines High Schools

### Two College Students Receive Master of Arts Degrees at Drake

The Bystander Staff Congratulates the Members of the June Graduating Class of 1932

Over nine hundred sixteen graduates, the largest class in history, received their diplomas at the commencement exercises of the Des Moines high schools held Thursday evening, at the Shrine auditorium. Seventeen colored students completed their four year careers from North and East high schools; there were no colored graduates in the classes of Roosevelt and Lincoln high schools.

Charles McClain, graduated from Valley Junction high and is the first Negro student in the history of the school to finish there.

Among its 225 graduates, Drake University conferred eight Master of Arts degrees at the 51st annual commencement exercises held at the University Church of Christ auditorium last Monday morning. Miss Marguerite Esters, graduate of Roosevelt high in 1926, and Miss Lucille Simmons, 1923 graduate of West high, received these honors. Miss Simmons was also elected to the Kappa Delta Pi, education society.

Most of the students were exceptional in scholarship attainments, outstanding in athletics and prominent in extra-curricular activities. ## Baltimore School Wont Use Negroes

Baltimore, June 9.—Henry Iddins, business manager of the General Athletic Association at Johns Hopkins University, in an effort to bar Negro athletes from competing in the Olympic tryout at Homewood on Saturday, gave out a false statement, in which he claimed the existence of a rule at the university barring Negroes from using the athletic field. Later he reversed his stand when Daniel Willard, president of the board of trustees, said he knew of no rule prohibiting Negroes from participating in sport activities at Homewood.

Iddins went so far as to notify William L. Hartung, chairman of the games committee of the South Atlantic Association, that four Negro athletes—Russell Sterling and Alphonso Sotman of Morgan College, Baltimore, and Calvin Johnson and Roland Butler of St. Paul's School, Lawrenceville, Va.—would not be permitted to compete at Homewood, and their entrance fees had been returned to them, through their respective school officials.

Jacksonville, Fla., June 10.—With 3,000 delegates already on the scene and thousands more on the way, with banners waving and bands playing, little of Jacksonville is surpassing all previous records in the magnitude and warmth of its welcome to the delegates and visitors attending the 27th annual session of the National Baptist Sunday School congress.

Not in its history have the delegates received a welcome such as has been accorded them by the members of both races. The streets are bedecked in gay attire and every restaurant, business house and hotel lobby is echoing the greetings being exchanged by prominent clergymen from all sections of the country.

## Tennessee Vote Ban Rejected

Nashville, Tenn., June 9.—The Democratic State Primary Board failed to take action on a resolution signed by five of the six candidates for the Governorship which was designed to bar Negroes from the primary August 4.

It also was the design of those sponsoring the resolution that the Democratic party in Tennessee be officially designated as "the white man's party."

Miss Marguerite Esters, juvenile officer of Polk County, popular society girl and prominent musician, received her Master of Arts degree at Drake University, Monday morning.

She was the first colored student to graduate from Roosevelt high in the class of 1926. She played first violin in the school orchestra. Miss Esters was high in scholastic attainments, dramatics, music, and forensic. When at Drake, she won many honors in athletics, and was letter member of the W. A. A. She belonged to the Cosmopolitan club, and was a member of the debating team.

Miss Esters is a member of many social and civic organizations, including the N. A. A. C. P., Interracial Commission, director Campfire girls, and holds many offices in young people's organizations in St. Paul church. She belongs to the Delta Sigma Theta sorority.

She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Esters, 1423 Center, owner of the Marguerite hotel.

## Ex-Service Men March on Capitol

Washington, June 9, (ANP)—Thousands of doughboys, once members of Uncle Sam's famous American Expeditionary Forces, two out of every seven to whom are colored, made their way here last week to fight for bonus legislation. It is the strangest congressional lobby that has been seen here in decades.

In contrast with the smart khaki uniforms and Sam Brown belts they wore when a grateful nation bade them farewell some 15 years ago the men who struggled into the Capital last week were tattered and weary. Gone was the snappy gait and soldier-like appearance of 1917. In its place the soldiers of the World War struggled along wearily, only the column-like formation being reminiscent of their past glory.

In many of the companies Negroes and whites marched side by side. A banner in one company was carried by one white and one Negro soldier. Negro soldiers with army coats and blue serge pants carried the flag at the head of nondescript divisions.

## Many Offices Slated for Fight At Convention

Henry Field, of Shenandoah, defeated Senator Smith W. Brookhart, for the Republican nomination for United States senator in Monday's primary election.

When all 526 33 of the state's 2,435 precincts had reported Wednesday night, Field's majority over Brookhart stood above 49,000 votes, and his share of the total vote for six candidates was 47 per cent. This is 12 per cent more than is necessary to nominate.

Louis Murphy, Dubuque, received the Democratic nomination for United States senator by polling 41 per cent of the total senatorial vote cast.

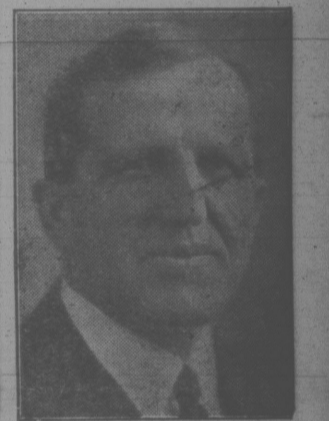
Dowell Sweeps Field

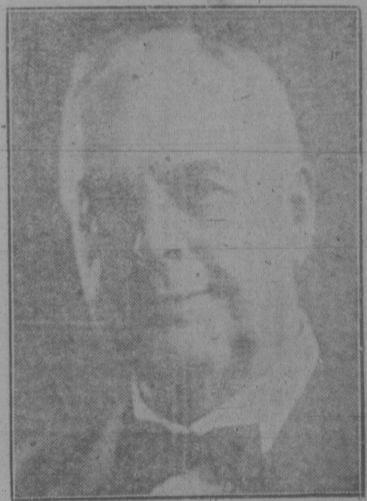

# Editorials

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### BY EXAMPLE

The Capital News Service sent out the following dispatch which should be of interest to everyone.

"Three years ago, Miss Margaret Slocer, a Negro teacher, was engaged to teach in the Daily Vacation Bible School at Christ Presbyterian church, 324 W. 26th street, under an experiment of teaching white children in an effort to break down racial prejudice. Miss Slocer became very popular and the experiment has proved a great success. Of 125 children who will start to school on July 5, 20 are colored. So successful has the experiment been, that a blind teacher will be employed this summer to further the project of understanding and good will."

This is a unique method of giving them who have had no contact with Negroes first hand practical knowledge that Negroes can teach mixed schools successfully. It is remarkable that a church has been willing and has the backbone to use the experiment.

Some years ago, two Negro girls in the School of Education at Drake University did practice teaching in our schools here. Their work was highly successful. Unfortunately the matter was not followed up for the opportunity then was open for securing a Negro teacher in our schools here.

For the benefit of those people who "just can't imagine a Negro teaching my child" we call this article to their particular attention. If it works well in other places it ought to work well here.

### CHANGES

John D. Rockefeller, Jr., a former advocate of the prohibition amendment, has come out for repeal. Naturally the prohibition forces call him all kinds of profane names before this announcement he was alright. That is nothing strange, however.

Mr. Rockefeller's action is typical of what is going on daily in the minds of many people less prominent than he. They are realizing more and more that prohibition not only does not prohibit, that the law not only is not being and cannot be enforced but that its operation is demoralizing. The Bystander hopes that the two political parties will eliminate prohibition from politics and that later the matter can be submitted to the people free from party influence.

### THE PRIMARIES

The recent primaries brought some outstanding surprises, chief of which was the defeat of Senator Brookhart for nomination. With Governor Turner and Henry Field heading the ticket the Republicans of Iowa will put up a solid front this fall.

On the other hand Democrats cast a fairly good vote. Some of their leading candidates made strong bids for the Negro support. This of course means they will do the same thing in the fall. Times change candidates and people's minds too.

## HEALTH TALKS

### TUBERCULOSIS

Tuberculosis of the lungs develops sometimes so very slowly that its existence may not be known until much damage is done to one or both lungs. This is true because its first symptoms are no different from those

present in anyone who has overworked mentally or physically. Being extremely tired may be the first indication that such a condition exists. This may be the only symptom in the beginning even without the cough which is usually present and which will develop eventually and become worse if the lung condition is not controlled.

In one who has inherited a constitution in which this disease might develop mental and physical fatigue is sometimes responsible for its beginning by lowering the normal defense of the body. If this disease has occurred at any time in a family in the ancestors too much care cannot be taken to keep the body in good order.

Tuberculosis is no longer a hopeless disease and many cases are cured by proper rest and treatment but the time necessary to receive a cure is so long in comparison to some other serious diseases that much consideration of its prevention is indeed worthwhile.

The germ of Tuberculosis is not a dangerous one if the body defenses are properly working for its presence everywhere has been demonstrated. If this were not so a plague due to this germ would be always present. If the possibility of this disease is kept in mind many long illnesses may be prevented and the death rate from it reduced to a much lower level than it now is.

### THREE INDICTED IN NATIONAL BENEFIT FAILURE

Washington, D. C., June 3.—Criminal machinery of the government was set in motion last Tuesday in the case of the defunct National Benefit Life Insurance Company when the grand jury returned an indictment to Justice James M. Proctor in the district supreme court charging John T. Risher and Mortimer P. Smith, former officers of the company, and Daniel M. Garry, a broker, with embezzling \$450,000 of its funds and diverting it to the completion of the Masonic temple at Tenth and U. Streets N. W.

Chicago, Ill., June 3.—A platform calling for the granting of unemployment and social insurance at the expense of the state and employers was adopted unanimously by the delegates to the national nominating convention of the Communist Party, on the second and final day of its sessions in the Peoples Auditorium here on Sunday.

"Equal rights for the Negroes and self-determination for the black belt" and emergency relief for the impoverished farmers, constitute other important points in the platform. The program, stresses also the need for a struggle against imperialist war and for the defense of the Chinese people and of the Soviet Union.

N. A. A. C. P. CALLS A. F. OF L. BLUFF ON NEGRO MUSICIAN SEGREGATION

New York, June 3.—An attempted justification to William Green, President of the American Federation of Labor by the American Federation of Musicians of the formation of separate local unions for colored musicians, on the ground that such separate unions are only "temporary" and formed for disciplinary purposes, has drawn a prompt challenge from the N. A. A. C. P.

The N. A. A. C. P. in its letter to the A. F. of L. President, inquires whether such "discipline" of separate local unions is invoked against other groups, such as the Jewish, German, or Italian musicians.

"The N. A. A. C. P. is not concerned with disciplinary action against any musicians who are members of the American Federation of Musicians," says the letter. "I think you will agree with us, however, that when musicians are guilty of violations of rules to which they have pledged obedience they should be disciplined not as 'colored' or as 'white' musicians."

## SUPREME COURT HALTS SCOTTSBORO LYNCHINGS

Washington, D. C., June 3.—Before recessing for the summer, the United States supreme court last Tuesday, granted petitions for writs of certiorari in the so-called Scottsboro case, directing the supreme court of the state of Alabama to certify and send to it the record of the trial and conviction of seven youths on a charge of raping two white women.

The seven youths—Ozie Powell, Willie Roberson, Andy Wright, Olen Montgomery, Haywood Patterson, Charles Weems and Clarence Norris—ignorant and illiterate, are in the state prison at Montgomery, Ala., where they were to be hanged on June 24. The action of the supreme court stays their execution until it has had an opportunity to review their convictions.

### JOE LILLARD JOINS GIANTS

Joe Lillard, brilliant grid and cage star and termed by no less an authority than David Malarcher as one of the best baseball players in the game, joined the American Giants Sunday and will finish the season with the locals. Lillard came here from the Coast where he has been sojourning since the University of Southern California had him kicked out of Oregon for incorrigibility. Lillard was a sensation in the first few games Oregon played last season.

Iowa fans will remember Lillard, former all-state star quarterback of Mason City high school, during the years 1924 to 1927.
