GANDHI'S DEATH FAST

Mahatma Gandhi, for many years, has been dedicated to the proposition of improving conditions under which the Indians of the lower social strata exist. It is needless to reiterate the various steps in his long career, but during the last 10 days he has conducted a "Fast Unto Death", the time of the actual fast being 6 days and 5 hours. The particular project over which he is fasting is his protest against the electoral system which discriminated against the untouchables having appropriate representation in the electorates, a condition somewhat similar to the matter of the south refusing Negroes the right to vote.

While the fast was going on, Prime Minister McDonald and other leaders of the British government, feverishly worked to effect a compromise satisfactory to Gandhi. It is difficult for us at this distance and under our type of civilization to get the psychology of this "Fast Unto Death" that we hear of so often. Suffice it to say that English political leaders realize that if Gandhi died as a result of this fast, the life of no single Englishman in India would be safe, hence, compromise.

Sometimes I wonder if Negroes don't need a patron saint, not that will "Fast Unto Death", because fasting unto death isn't the way we do it in this country, but we need a leader amongst ourselves, whose leadership would be followed, whom the world would hear when he spoke, for they would know he spoke with our approval. Such a leadership has a possibility amongst us in spite of the disbelievers. This type of leadership in reality would be a tremendous improvement on our present state of affairs. They say that a drop of water constantly falling on a stone will eventually whittle its way through. I wonder if experiences of other races will ever awaken us to the proper program.

Ford Assails Present Regime

Five hundred farm workers, colored and white packed the Jewish Community Center Tuesday night to hear James W. Ford, Communist candidate for Vice-President.

Ford spoke of the promises made to the workers of the United States four years ago by the Hoover vote catching machine that poverty and misery would be abolished and that we were on the road to "Perpetual Prosperity". Ford also scored the "socialistic" statements recently made by Roosevelt, in stating that the railroad of America were owned by the "people".

Ford told the Negro workers present that their only hope of complete economic, political and social emancipation is through the combined united front of all workers, white and Negro, under the leadership of Communist party. He also scored the re-

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Noted Case To Highest Tribunal October 10

Washington (CNS)—The fate of the seven Alabama youths sentenced to die following their conviction in the so-called Scottsboro case, will be decided by the Supreme Court which reconvened for its fall term October 3rd.

The high court, in three separate briefs has been asked to render an opinion upon the fairness of the trial given the Alabama boys based upon the claim that the inflamed condition of public mind and the presence of the State Militia so prejudiced the case that it was impossible for them to get a fair trial. The case is among the eight set for review by the Supreme Court October 10.

The seven youths, two of them under eighteen, were convicted of criminal assault upon white girls growing out of an alleged attack upon them in the gravel car of a freight train upon which the girls were burning their way to the Alabama town.

Conflicting testimony at the trial as to the characters of the girls and the reliability of their testimony, the repeated protestations of innocence by the colored boys, supported by expert professional testimony and their counter charges that the girls were attacked by white men, failed to convince the Alabama jury of their innocence although it was sufficient to produce grave doubts as to their guilt in the minds of many and stir up a wave of protest from all over the country.

The case is being fought by the International Labor Defense.

Hoover Welcomes Negro Leaders

Washington, Oct. 6 (CNS)—Over three hundred Negro leaders, representing every field of endeavor, coming from every nook and corner of these United States, young and old, stood last Saturday on the magnificent lawn of the White House and listened with rapt attention to a warm, cordial and sincere message of President Hoover, to whom their brilliant spokesman had pledged an unwavering loyalty in the presidential campaign. The affair was strikingly colorful and exceeded the largest expectation of even those who knew that the President's message would be a master stroke in the campaign.

The pilgrimage to the White House arranged by the Negro "high command" of the Republican National Committee, in cooperation with Raymond Benjamin, close liaison agent of President Hoover, was planned as a part of a national conference held here of Negro Republican leaders and advisors from all over the country. The conference was a meeting of the national Planning Board, composed of the joint membership of the Eastern and Western Planning Board, and National Advisory Committee for Colored Voters.

FULL TEXT OF HOOVER MESSAGE

The full text of the Hoover message was as follows: "I wish to thank you for your coming and for the presentation to me of so touching a statement.

"The platform of the Republican Party speaks with justifiable pride of the friendship of our party for the American Negro that has endured unchanged for 70 years. It pledges itself to the continued insistence upon his rights. That the friendship and consideration of the party for the American Negro has borne fruit is evident in business, in the arts and sciences, in the professions—and recently we have seen a great achievement of two splendid youths, Tolan and Metcalfe, in world supremacy in the Olympiad.

"It has been gratifying to me to have participated in many measures for advancement of education and welfare amongst the Negroes of our nation. I have had the cooperation of the ablest of leadership from the Negroes themselves in these institutions and movements. No better example exists than the contributions made to the recent White House Conference on Child Health and upon Home Building. I recall with great pleasure this cooperation in the relief of the Mississippi floods, and more recently of drought, and in the sound advice and assistance I have had in relief from

the present distress and unemployment.

"You may be assured that our Party will not abandon or depart from its traditional duty toward the American Negro. I shall sustain this pledge given in the first instance by the immortal Lincoln and transmitted by him to those who followed as a sacred trust. The right of liberty, justice and equal opportunity is yours. The President of the United States is ever obligated to the maintenance of those sacred trusts to the full extent of his authority. I appreciate your presence here today as an evidence of your friendship.

The message of the President was delivered by him in clear and unequivocal language. He was preceded by Dr. John R. Hawkins, chairman of the local arrangements committee and vice chairman of the Western Planning Board for Colored Voters, who acted as master of ceremonies. Dr. Hawkins presented Rev. L. K. Williams, 1st vice-chairman of the Western Planning Board, who introduced Colonel Roscoe Conkling Simmons, the spokesman of the delegation. With masterful oratory Colonel Simmons whose speech seconding the Hoover nomination at the Republican National Convention in Chicago last June electrified the nation, urged upon the

Negro Republicans Aid In Grand Homecoming

President and Mrs. Herbert Hoover returned to their native state Tuesday afternoon to receive the greatest ovation in the history of Des Moines.

A crowd estimated at between 120,000 and 130,000 persons lined the parade route to cheer the president of the United States as he led the mammoth homecoming pageant assembled in his honor.

Three Appearances

The parade was the first of a series of public appearances by the president.

After dining at Governor Turner's home, he delivered his major campaign address at the Coliseum before 9,500 persons; greeted 3,000 assembled in Shrine Temple who heard his speech through loudspeakers and also the overflow crowd of 3,000 at the statehouse plaza.

Prejudiced Police Officer Discharged

Washington (CNS)—Inspector O. T. Davis, former head of the crime prevention bureau and an alleged Negro-hater was ordered transferred from that body by Brigadier General Pelham D. Republicans Launch Vigorous Campaign

Following practice of the Republican National Committee at the Chicago and New York offices the Republican state organization of Iowa through its National Committeeman, H. E. Spangler and State Chairman, Homer Stephens have set up the Negro Voters Division as a part of the campaign force with offices in the Insurance Exchange Building.

A. A. Alexander, Des Moines contractor, is chairman; Mrs. S. Joe Brown, prominent Des Moines club woman, vice chairman; James B. Morris, attorney and editor of the Iowa Bystander, secretary and publicity director; Rev. Ben H. Lucas of Cedar Rapids, field representative for the Republican National Committee. The office also includes a force of clerical help and a speakers Bureau made up of men and women located throughout the state.

The purpose of this organization is to contact leading Negro men and women in each county where there is a fair Negro population, organize Hoover clubs in these communities and arrange meetings for speakers to follow later. Already the organization is well on its way.

This same arrangement was followed in 1928. "This year we have more Negro Democrats than ever before," Mr. Alexander stated "but the committee is confident that with thorough organization of the workers and a good educational campaign among the Negroes, Hoover will get most of their votes. It's a bigger job keeping Negroes in Republican ranks than heretofore but we are going to win because our cause is safer in the hands of the Republican party."

To date a number of county workers have been approved and as fast as county chairmen forward them to the office appointments will be made from the Negro Voters Division. The full list of speakers and the county workers will be announced later.

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PRESIDENTS VISIT

President Hoover came to Des Moines Tuesday. He made an impression which nobody doubts gained thousands of votes. Two things stand out boldly in this campaign. Mr. Hoover emphasized them. First: The Republican party has a sound definite program for the reconstruction of our country based upon the principles upon which the government was founded. Second, the Democrats have no definite policy; they are trying to win on the discontent of the people; by an appeal to ignorance and prejudice. In other words, not on its own merit, but the pretended weakness of the Republicans.

Thousands of voters for the first time came to the conclusion that Mr. Hoover is sincere; interested in economic recovery of all people; that he is on the right track.

The Bystander is fully convinced that if the Republicans take their cue from the President's address and put on a real educational campaign from now on, the voters will decide for President Hoover in the fight.

A GOOD INVESTMENT

Last week the N. A. A. C. P. sent out an appeal to friends for a fund of ten thousand dollars to carry on its fight for the economic rights of the Negro. The fund is calculated to bring to the Negro millions of dollars in labor from projects upon which the Government, both Federal and local, are spending the taxpayers' money.

Like all other organizations run in part by voluntary donations the N. A. A. C. P. is having a hard time raising its budget. With this added work which is to be sure is very necessary, the burden becomes increasingly heavy with no new sources of revenue from which to draw. It simply means that every branch must redouble its efforts to supply the demands.

It seems incredible that when Congress passes these reconstruction measures to provide employment and credit to American citizens that Negroes find it necessary to make a battle to share in these benefits. Yet that is just what happens. The Bystander rejoices that the Negro has an organization which sees the necessity of making the fight and does not hesitate to wade in no matter how deep the water. Such courage commands the support of us all.

SPEND YOUR MONEY WHERE IT HELPS

It is nothing unusual for any business to be in financial difficulties at this time. But these institutions which weather the storm which is sweeping so many away today will be much stronger as a result of this unusual experience. We have about as much Negro business in Des Moines to-

HEALTH TALKS

DIABETES

Diabetes is defined as a disease of the pancreas but it is in reality a disease of practically the whole body because the activities of almost all the organs are affected when this organ ceases to function properly.

The pancreas is located just behind the stomach in such close relationship that it might be considered a part of the stomach. Inspection of its structure and connections nevertheless shows it to be a separate organ with a distinct and very important function. It is indeed a delicate organ and this delicacy is no doubt responsible for injury to it observed or unobserved. Diabetes is present in a majority of the cases for some time before it is discovered and it is not strange that this is so because the pancreas is an organ with quite an area and since no change in efficiency until quite an area becomes destroyed. It is true also that Diabetes does not demonstrate itself with pain as a symptom—a very definite hint that some disease process (temporary or permanent) is present. Lack of energy is usually the first sign of the presence of this disease and this is indeed a fact because those materials which give energy are not available due to a lack of ability in this organ to transform them into usefulness. Lack of energy then is always cause enough for concern as to whether or not this organ is damaged and this disease present. At such a time it can be stopped in its progress and this energy completely restored.

PRESIDENT HOOVER REVIEWS REPUBLICAN PLEDGE OF SQUARE DEAL FOR NEGRO CITIZENS BEFORE 300 NEGRO LEADERS

President Hoover's need for reaffirmation of Republican principles of friendship, tolerance and fair-play toward America's Negro citizenry. Following Colonel Simmons, Mrs. Wilda R. Townsend of New Jersey, introduced by Attorney Francis E. Ribers, Eastern advisor for Colored Voters, spoke in equally stirring fashion for Negro women of the nation. All speakers pledged themselves and the group to work unceasingly for a Republican victory in November.

Flanked by Postmaster General Walter Brown and Lawrence Richel, his confidential secretary, the nation's Chief Executive made a stirring declaration of the principles of equal citizenship rights for Negroes upon which he personally and his party stood.

ROSCOE SIMMONS' SPEECH

We shall do our part to help the Negro. We shall do our part to help the Great Republic in power—believing that much of the injustice which pervades the land will be eliminated. This group before you today, represents the highest type of American citizenship; and we want it known that we cannot and will not trust the destinies of the nation in the hands of the Democratic Party. Your wise leadership in times like these will be the daybreak and light of hope to a distressed nation and a distressed world.

As usual, partly because some people who have lost their jobs find it the only means of keeping occupied. Negroes should realize that in order for Negro business to succeed they must support it. While we have few Negro business institutions which do not have some trade among white people primarily, the responsibility is with us. Two things ought to be kept in mind by Negroes when spending their money; namely, support Negro business; support white business firms which hire or otherwise spend with Negroes. There are institutions in Des Moines which hire no Negro help, do not advertise with Negroes or otherwise support race institutions. They are not entitled to any consideration. Certainly Negroes should see that they do not get any.

TO OUR SUBSCRIBERS:

The Bystander is making a special effort to get its subscribers to pay up, effort to pay it. "Your great pronouncements on child welfare, your efforts to help bring about world peace; your efforts along all lines for home and moral uplift are the elements which will save the world and keep it saved for generations yet to come. The home, the church and the school, all for which your declaration stand, are the things which make the world honor you.

"We go back to the days of one of America's greatest citizens, and join with him in saying, 'The Republican Party is the ship (for the Negro) and all else is the sea.' Thus spoke Frederick Douglass. A storm is approaching, yes; it is here, and that charmed name, 'Roosevelt', is being used to mislead us and have us cast overboard."

"But we will not be led astray. We shall stay on the ship 'The Republican Party. One reason why we are Republicans—there is not a voting place in this great country where a white Democrat voter can't cast his vote. In fact, there is not a place in this country where any and every white man can't vote. But, in many states of the country, the Democratic Party which is pleading for the Negro vote will not let him vote even for that Party. Mr. President, we do not, as citizens, ask for any special favors; but we will not be satisfied with anything less than that which is granted to all other citizens. We shall plan and work and pray for your reelection! and then hope that we will get a square deal along all lines as American citizens.

Uncle Sam's progress in leading the way out of the world depression is strikingly emphasized by the report of the Federal Reserve Board on September 20, that the United States gold stock has increased to a total on that date of \$4,086,000,000. This is about the same level as of the second half of 1928 and the first half of 1929 before either the recent financial crisis or the subsequent depression had begun to show itself. This perhaps means little to the average citizen, other than an apparent assurance that the nation's monetary structure is on a more stable basis than a few months ago or a year ago. The added security to the country and the insurance of a firm basis on which to build back to prosperity, is not, perhaps, commonly recognized or appreciated.

Hoover Tells of Battle.

Back of this achievement, however, at a time when other nations were slipping off the gold standard or facing revolution and disaster, is the story of a determined battle by President Hoover, against seemingly insurmountable odds. In grim drama and in the complexity of forces involved, this battle was not surpassed by any of those of war time.

Something of the threat that faced the country, however, and the manner in which it was met, may be sensed from what President Hoover himself has said of this situation.

"If we look back over the disasters of the past three years," he said, "we find that three-quarters of the population of the globe has suffered from the flames of revolution. Many nations have been subject to constant change and vacillation of government. Others have resorted to dictatorship or tyranny in desperate efforts to preserve some sort of social order.

How Credit Shrinkage Began. "One illustration of the character of one single destructive force arising from these causes was its effect on our financial structure. Foreign countries, in the face of their own failures, not believing that we had the courage or ability to meet this crisis, withdrew from the United States over \$2,400,000,000, including a billion in gold. Our own alarmed citizens withdrew over \$1,600,000,000 of currency from our banks into hoarding."

"These actions, combined with the fears they generated, caused a shrinkage of credit available for the conduct of industry and commerce by several times even these vast sums. Its visible expression was bank and business failures, demoralization of security and real property values, commodity prices and employment. This was but one of the invading forces of destruction.

Counter-Attack Launched.

"Two courses were open. We might have done nothing. That would have been utter futility.

"Instead we met the situation with proposals to private business and the congress of the most gigantic program of economic defense and counter-attack ever evolved in the history of the Republic and we put it into action.

WHY I SHALL VOTE FOR HOOVER

I shall vote for Herbert Hoover for President because, in the greatest crisis this country has known since Lincoln's day, he has stood the gaff.

I do not like the idea of having the next four years used by the occupant of the White House as a springboard from which to leap at renomination in 1936. I prefer to take my chance on the man who has stood the battle for four years and who can say to himself: "I have only four years more and nothing to think of except to do what I believe to be right."

There is plenty that can honestly be said in Mr. Hoover's praise without attempting to paint him as a Superman. More important, in my estimation, is the fact that he is human and that he has been through the fire. Instead of having been broken by the depression, he has been strengthened. By his experience he is enabled to face the future in terms of facts and not of theories.

"Don't swap horses while crossing a stream" has usually proved good logic. I believe it is especially good logic in our present political crisis. It appeals to me, also, because I see nothing in Franklin Roosevelt to prove that he is a better horse than Herbert Hoover. Nor a better man, either intellectually or spiritually. I do not like his appeal to discontent and class prejudice. My vote is for Hoover.

ROOSEVELT SHOULD PRACTICE WHAT HE IS NOW PREACHING

A challenge to Franklin D. Roosevelt to practice, as governor of New York, what he preaches as Democratic candidate for President of the United States, has been hurled at the Democratic standard-bearer by Secretary of War Patrick J. Hurley. Roosevelt has particularly sought to impress the Mid-West and West. Hurley declares, with what he would do to regulate and reform the New York Stock exchange in event he is elected President.

"Fine," says Hurley. "But why wait? Why not do it now?"

"The governor favors the reform of the stock exchange," Hurley explains. "The stock exchange is an institution existing under the laws of the state of New York.

"There is no doubt but what abuses have existed in the operation of that exchange. There is no doubt but that there were organized bear raids detrimental to the welfare of the public.

"But what has the governor of New York done to remedy this situation during the long period in which he has had the power to act?"

"Governor Roosevelt now suggests federal control and publicity for the sale of securities. Why has not the governor inaugurated these reforms during his incumbency as chief executive of the state of New York? The control of the sale of these securities and the conditions under which they may be sold or not sold is now in the state of New York.

"The governor did not suggest reforms until he became a candidate for the Presidency. New York has the laws, but as governor he has not enforced them. Why hasn't he acted?"

Farm Credit Corporations Will Benefit the Farmers

Farmers of the Middle West and the West will be the first to benefit from the operation of the new Agricultural Credit corporations which are being organized as a part of the far-famed activities of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation. These corporations now being organized in ten land bank districts, are to finance farm operations of all kinds with special reference at first to putting the live-stock industry on a sound basis. Later, attention will be given to the farmer who raises wheat, corn and other crops, the plan being to aid agriculture on the broadest possible basis. When one hears, as he does now any day, that the farmers of the country are dissatisfied with the present administration, one wonders if they realize that more has been done for them and more is continuing to be done for them, than ever before in any administration of any party since the Republic was founded.

The benefits to be derived, and which are just beginning to be felt in many sections, might have been in operation several months earlier had it not been for the opposition of a Democratic House, led by Democratic vice-presidential candidate, Garner.

Tariff Lies

Democratic spokesmen, from the heads of the ticket down, continue to repeat the state motto that the Hawley-Smoot law is the highest tariff law ever enacted in the history of the country. The Tariff Commission, made up of three Republicans and three Democrats, has officially declared that four preceding tariff laws were higher than this one, one of them being the Mills bill, a Democratic measure.

What confidence can be put in the arguments of political leaders who persist in repeating statements they must know to be false?

Two courses were open. We might have done nothing. That would have been utter futility. Instead we met the situation with proposals to private business and the congress of the most gigantic program of economic defense and counter-attack ever evolved in the history of the Republic and we put it into action.

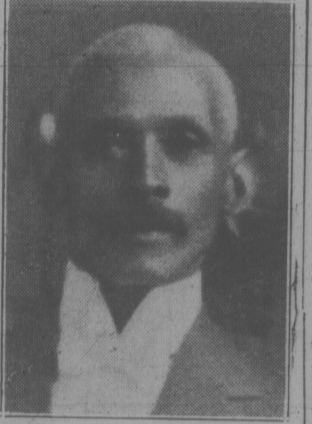
OBITUARY

Denver, Colo., Oct. 7.—Colored people here, represented by the N. A. A. C. P. have won the first fight in what is to be a relentless, inexorable battle against discrimination and Jim Crowism of all and any forms. District Judge Charles C. Sackmann has ruled that Negroes have the same legal right to use public bathhouses and bathing beaches that other persons have and granted a group of Negro citizens a writ of mandamus against city officials.

COP FIRED IN DETROIT SLAYING CASE

Detroit, Mich., Oct. 7.—Officer Otis Davis of the McGraw station was dismissed from the Metropolitan police force Wednesday by the police trial board. The board had heard the charges against Patrolman Davis Monday, but reserved its decision until Wednesday. Commissioner James K. Watkins said that Davis was dismissed from the force because the board felt that the recent shooting in the Swan confectionery store, 4718 Milford, in which one man lost his life and another was severely wounded, would not have happened had Davis performed his duty.

VETERAN WHITE HOUSE EMPLOYEE PASSES—HOOVER SENDS MESSAGE

Washington (CNS)—Charles C. Brown, 60 for fifteen years an employee at the White House died as the result of a heart attack which overtook him while at work last week. When stricken he was rushed to the Naval Hospital where he died shortly after. Mr. Brown was a native of Washington and a product of the Washington Schools. His father was the late Robert Ellen Brown. The veteran employee was appointed to his position at the White House in 1917 under the Wilson administration. Following he served successively under Harding, Coolidge and Hoover. The President and Mrs. Hoover sent a message of condolence to the bereaved family.

(Continued from Page 1) important part of Mr. Hoover's address. He told of capital provided to relieve the situation through the federal land banks and the Reconstruction Finance Corp. He condemned activities of some joint stock land banks.

He told of obtaining cooperation of both federal and private agencies. He promised to recommend reorganization of federal land banks to permit expansion in refinancing farm mortgages.

Farm Improvements Other agricultural improvement will be gained through expansion of foreign markets to absorb products of American labor and agriculture, rather than payment of war debts to the United States in cheap foreign goods, through halting and reversal of general deflation, through keeping banks open, through tax equalization, through completion of the water works system and through better use of land, the president said.

Many Negro visitors attended, among them was an Omaha delegation, headed by Dr. R. A. Singleton.

Colored Women at Reception Mrs. Hoover was guest of honor at a reception in Hotel Savery attended by 2,400 precinct committeewomen.

The following colored women were among the invited guests: Mrs. S. Joe Brown, vice chairman of the Negro Division of the Republican State Central Committee; Mrs. Elbert R. Hall, chairman of the Polk County organization; Mrs. Gertrude E. Rush, member of Speakers' Bureau; Mrs. A. A. Alexander, Treasurer of the State League of Republican Colored Women and Mrs. Chas. P. Howard, member of the county organization.

Negro Editors at Conference President Hoover spoke for 15 minutes to 500 Iowa newspapermen at a press conference in Hotel Fort Des Moines.

Attorney J. B. Morris, publicity director of Iowa Negro Republicans and editor of Iowa Bystander, and Everett Wadsworth, staff writer and news editor, were in attendance.

Davenport Man in Charge President Hoover was introduced at the press conference by E. P. Adler, publisher of the Davenport Times.

Mr. Adler presented him as a man who had not indulged in "glittering generalities."

The president described as a "mystery" the hardships that can come in a state where year after year "God grants us every favor."

"And yet," he said, "a man-made mess defies Providence."

Early Life in Iowa "In the presence of great natural resources we have proven ourselves unable to administer," he declared.

His talk before the newspaper men was largely one of anecdotes.

Explaining that the "thought within the last two hours" his listeners had "heard enough" about the more serious affairs of the country, he launched into a sketch of his boyhood in West Branch.

Leaves for Washington The president described the old-fashioned Quaker meeting house, and told a favorite anecdote of the conversion of a church into a movie theater, thereby realizing the direst predictions of the more pessimistically minded of the Quaker community.

He went directly from the hotel to his special train and began the return journey at 11:05 p. m.

JAMES FORD IS HEARD BY FIVE HUNDRED

(Continued from page 1) actionary note displayed by the N. A. A. C. P. in the Scottsboro case.

Ford went the plaudits of the crowd when he stated that his party was the only party that was for the immediate payment of the Veterans Bonus and also for the immediate Federal cash relief to the impoverished farmers and relief from taxes and forced collection of rent and debts.

In answer to the statement given by Atty. Mitchell that over three-fourths of the men in the Bonus Army were criminals, Mr. Ford said that the only criminals in Washington at that time was the President and his cabinet.

"Every communist vote is a protest challenge to capitalism. It shows that the workers are not satisfied with the present conditions of unemployment, hunger and misery," stated Ford. "I was born in the South," continued Ford, "and I know that the ruling class has built up the system of Jim Crowism, race prejudice, and lynch terror particularly to keep Negro and white workers separated and to maintain the exploitation of both."

"But the day comes when, under the leadership of the Communist party, Negro and white workers will smash the lynch gangs organized by the ruling class." Loud applause greeted this declaration by the Communist candidate.

Ford then went on to show the capitalist nature of this exists and its impossibility under a Soviet system. He told of the ruin of the hundreds of

thousands of farmers, of the 15,000,000 unemployed workers of the more than 50 per cent wage cutting and of the donations of millions of dollars by the Hoover government to the rich.

After the meeting a number of workers both white and colored made applications to join the Communist party.

BOOK REVEALS GEORGIA HORRORS

New York—Evidence that Georgia officially tortures its chain gang convicts with devices similar to the Spanish Inquisition, is offered in the form of photographs and official documents in the appendix to John L. Spivak's novel, "Georgia Nigger" published Friday, September 30th by Brewer, Warren and Putnam of New York.

The startling photographic record of inhuman punishment inflicted by this state, was personally made by the author during his investigations in 1930-31 of peonage and convict camps in Georgia. The documents are "a few of the many gathering dust in the State Capitol in Atlanta," says Spivak in his foreword to the appendix.

These official records reveal an amazing group of tortures, heart-breaking scrawled pleas from convicts for "mercy as you would ask on the judgment day" death certificates showing "peculiar deaths, such as tubercular convict who should have been in a hospital but who died in camp, "heart-failure", "Apoplexies", etc.

It is with reference to these shocking tortures that Mr. Spivak states in his foreword to the appendix, "Georgia does not stand alone as a state lost to fundamental justice and humanity. It was chosen because it is fairly representative of the Carolinas, Florida, Alabama—the whole far-flung Black Belt. Nor is the whole south as pictured here. There are many counties where conditions are infinitely better, and too many counties where they are infinitely worse."

NEGRO DEMOCRATS IN MEETING

New York.—Four Negroes of prominence have been appointed zone directors by James A. Farley, Chairman of the Democratic National Committee, to act under him in an advisory and cooperative capacity. They will carry on the work of organization among Negroes in their respective territories, which will be as follows: New England, Julian D. Rainey, Assistant Corporation Counsel, Boston, Mass.; Pennsylvania and West Virginia, Robert L. Vann, editor of the Pittsburgh Courier, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania; Ohio, Indiana, Illinois and Michigan, Dr. Joseph L. Johnson, Physician and former U. S. Minister to Liberia, Columbus, Ohio; and States west of the Mississippi River, Dr. William J. Thompkins, editor of the Kansas City American, Kansas City, Missouri.

They will constitute an Executive Committee and are vested with equal authority each of whom alternately will be in charge of the New York headquarters. Another of their important duties will be the coordination of clubs already organized and supporting Roosevelt and Garner.
