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PICKING LEADERS

Anyone who reads the roster of Negroes heading the National Republican Planning Board and other activities of the campaign must be impressed with the fact that they constitute the bulk of the Negro leadership in other pursuits.

Among them are the leading business men, newspaper men, lawyers, clergymen and social workers. And while the Democrats have a few of each, the Republicans so far outnumber them that it may easily be counted overwhelming.

NEGRO FARMERS

The Census Bureau has announced that Negro farm operators decreased from 925,708 in 1920 to 882,850 in 1930. This was expected in view of the large number of Negroes who came North for work in industrial centers and for better opportunities following the world war.

The remarkable thing is that the number was not greater; but this proves that in most cases it was not the operating class which left their farms.

PLEASEING

The Editor of the Bystander made a trip over Northwestern Iowa this week. While the mission was political, some observations about Negroes in that section were most encouraging.

We are inclined to feel that Negroes can do themselves and the race a lot of good by settling in small communities. These columns have told of a young colored man who has lived in Rockwell City eighteen years, built up a substantial business and is rated highly in the community.

The more we see of this Iowa white man, the more we are convinced that he wants the Negro to get a fair deal. If the Negro means to go forward himself the white people are willing to help. This attitude should be gotten

HEALTH TALKS

SCARLET FEVER

Scarlet Fever is a disease of the throat, but it is not a tonsillitis. Most people feel that a soreness on the throat means an inflammation of the tonsils, but this is not always so. Soreness in the throat may include the tonsils and it may not. As a rule, when the tonsils are affected in tonsillitis, they are the only part of the throat which is affected.

In Scarlet Fever, as a rule, the tonsils play a very minor part in the throat inflammation, and, if affected at all, it is on the surface only. In tonsillitis, of course, a greater part of the tonsillar tissue is taken up by the infection. Scarlet Fever may gain a running start on the person affected by beginning in a place where soreness would not be felt on the palate, or roof of the mouth.

Scarlet Fever is a very serious disease—somewhat insignificant at first because of its similarity to ordinary sore-throat or tonsillitis. Not serious because of the skin disease which follows the soreness in the throat, but serious because of the late effects on the heart and kidneys.

With the recent introduction and use of the specific serum for Scarlet Fever it is possible to prevent these late disastrous effects on the heart and kidneys. It is, therefore, important to have this disease recognized at its very beginning, so that its course may not be cut short and the late effects to the heart and kidneys precluded.

COP FIRED IN DETROIT SLAYING CASE

Detroit, Mich., Oct. 7.—Officer Otis Davis of the McGraw station was dismissed from the Metropolitan police force Wednesday by the police trial board. The board had heard the charges against Patrolman Davis Monday, but reserved its decision until Wednesday. Commissioner James K. Watkins said that Davis was dismissed from the force because the board felt that the recent shooting in the Swan confectionery store, 4718 Milford, in which one man lost his life and another was severely wounded, would not have happened had Davis performed his duty.

CITIZENS WIN RIGHT TO USE BATHING BEACH

Denver, Colo., Oct. 7.—Colored people here, represented by the N. A. A. C. P., have won the first fight in what is to be a relentless, inexorable battle against discrimination and Jim Crowism of all and any forms. District Judge Charles C. Sackmann has ruled that Negroes have the same legal right to use public bathhouses and bathing beaches that other persons have and granted a group of Negro citizens a writ of mandamus against city officials.

"Our measures have repelled these attacks of fear and panic. We have maintained the financial integrity of our government. We have co-operated to restore and stabilize the situation abroad. As a nation, we have paid every dollar demanded of us.

"We have used the credit of the government to aid and protect our institutions, public and private. We have provided methods and assurances that there shall be none to suffer from hunger and cold. We have instituted measures to assist farmers and home owners. We have created vast agencies for employment.

"Above all, we have maintained the sanctity of the principles upon which this Republic has grown great.

"In a large sense, the test of the success of our program is simple. Our people, while suffering great hardships, have been and will be cared for. In the long view, our institutions have been sustained intact and are now functioning with increased confidence of the future.

"These policies and programs have not been partisan. I gladly give tribute to those members of the Democratic party in congress whose patriotic co-operation against factional and demagogic opposition has assisted in a score of great undertakings. I likewise give credit to Democratic as well as Republican leaders amongst our citizens for their co-operation and help.

"Our interest now is the future. As a government and as a people we still have much to do. We must continue the building of our measures of restoration. And in doing so we must profit by the lessons of this experience."

In his speech of acceptance, so-called, Gov. Roosevelt declared the time had come to abolish "useless traditions" and to enter upon a policy of "bold experimentation." It is to be hoped that in his later and more careful speeches he will take the people into his confidence and tell us just what traditions he regards as useless and what experiments he would like to have us try.

CHECK-UP ON WHEAT PRICES PROVES TARIFF BENEFITS

The extent to which the American farmer has benefited through the Republican tariff on agricultural products and cooperative marketing operations is indicated by a comparison of prices for opposite sides of the United States-Canadian line.

An investigation made simultaneously in towns similarly situated with respect to freight rates and shipping facilities, but on opposite sides of the Canadian line, showed the following: Canadian farmers, for No. 1 wheat, were receiving 44 cents a bushel at Morden, Manitoba; 42 cents at Stirling, Alberta; 46 cents at Gainsboro, Saskatchewan; 45 cents at Stanton, Saskatchewan.

Across the line, on the same day, No. 1 wheat was selling at Bismarck, N. D., at 50 cents; at Ambrose, 58 cents; at Grand Forks, 62 cents; at Fargo, 65 cents and at Roberts, Montana, 68 cents.

What gave the American farmer this advantage in price? Without the American tariff on wheat, Canadian wheat would have poured across the border, breaking our price to a level with theirs. While the American farmer did not realize the full amount of the tariff, as he would if his production were limited to the domestic demand, he did get, on the basis of this comparison, an average benefit of 18 cents a bushel.

A further index of the protection actually enjoyed by the American farmer through the tariff on wheat is the fact that while the week before the tariff became effective foreign grown wheat to the amount of 2,200,000 bushels was sold in this country, the week after the tariff bill became law these sales dropped to 37,000 bushels.

Even more striking is the comparison of prices in American and foreign grain centers. Figures gathered by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics in February, 1931, covering May futures on wheat, showed prices as follows: Chicago, 83 cents a bushel; Winnipeg, 60 cents; Liverpool, 65 cents; Buenos Aires, 40 cents.

Without tariff protection, this situation ordinarily is reversed, the Liverpool price being approximately 15 to 18 cents above the Chicago market, that representing approximately the cost of transporting wheat from Chicago to Liverpool. The differential in this case represents nearly the entire 42 cents protection provided for by the tariff law.

similar organizations obstructing the progressive pathway of the Negro. Lynchings, burnings at the stake, discrimination, injustice and intimidation were the lot of our forefathers under the yoke of bondage and in the reconstruction period.

It is strange how democrats have the temerity to ask Negroes in the North to support their ticket while in the South the democrats deny Negroes the privilege of participating in their local or national politics. In the Houston, Texas, convention of the Democratic National Committee, the few Negro delegates in attendance were fended off by chicken coop wire and were not allowed to take part in the proceedings.

The Republican Party, beginning with the Emancipation Proclamation, issued by Lincoln, followed by the 13th, 14th and 15th amendments, has been the consistent friend of the Negro. The southern democrats have sponsored and countenanced legislative acts and practices against the Negro, including "Grandfather Clause" and other devices to deny him his franchise rights.

NEGRO FARM OPERATORS DECREASE IN PAST TWO DECADES

Washington, D. C., Oct. 12.—(CNS)—There are fewer Negro farm operators in the United States today than there were in 1910, according to statistics just released by the Bureau of the Census. In 1930, of the 6,288,648 farm operators in the United States, 882,850 were classed as "Negro farm operators," as compared with 925,708 in 1920, and 893,370 in 1910.

In 1930 as in 1910 the per cent distribution was 14.0, while in 1920 it was 14.4 per cent; the increase in number from 1910 being 22,338, and the decrease in 1930 below 1920 being 42,858. Thus while the proportion of all farms operated by Negroes rose from 13 per cent in 1900 to 14 per cent in 1910 and 14.4 per cent in 1920, it receded to 14 per cent in 1930.

During the past decade 4 States show marked decreases in the number of farm operators. There was a decrease of 43,389 in Georgia; 31,674 in South Carolina, and 8,092 in Virginia. Partly offsetting these large decreases are increases of 21,577 in Mississippi; 11,998 in Louisiana; 7,343 in Texas and 7,281 in Arkansas. The largest increase outside of the Southern States was 3,020 in Missouri, practically all in cotton growing counties.
