# Negroes Rally To Support President Hoover

## The Observer Capital City Bars Negro Grid Stars

Last week the high schools of the city were bitterly scored for having no Negro high school students employed in the project known as "High School Day", when a number of students were chosen to operate certain business houses for a day. Now there are comparatively no Negroes at Lincoln High school nor at Roosevelt, which fact leaves East and North as the high schools that must bear the brunt of the attack. The persons who receive the severest criticism are the two principals of these two high schools, and it just happens that these two principals have over a long period demonstrated more than the usual fairness toward Negroes.

It is with this in mind that I come to their defense. It is a comparatively simple matter to direct scathing criticism at anybody and it is always popular for Negroes to throw bricks at white people, but it has happened too often here of late that the bricks were thrown at the Negroes' best friends, and this is absolutely true in this particular case. It is just not a fair statement to accuse North High and East High of discriminating against Negroes, and I, for one, want to stand up and be counted as objecting to its being done.

Let us go back and check the record and see what it discloses. The charge simmers down to the proposition that the Negroes are not given a fair chance in extra-curricular activities. I, for one, believe that in either of these two schools, or any other high school in Des Moines for that matter, a Negro who distinguishes himself will be given the honor due him and that is the only occasion when he is entitled to receive honor. I have no sympathy with Negro students who half prepare their assignments and then bellow because they receive no distinction. I am willing to concede that there are instances when an individual Negro student did not receive all the honor that plain justice warranted his receiving. That may happen a time or two in high school as well as in other walks of life, but that has not been true in these two high schools as a general proposition.

Today of the seventy-two colored students in North high school more than half of them are in one or the other of the musical organizations—the band, the orchestra, or the glee clubs. Now fifty per cent of the white students are not in these organizations, yet Negroes complain about not being represented in the music department. A few years ago Bernard Mason was the first violinist in the orchestra and was assistant director of the orchestra, directing it in the absence of the director. He is at Oberlin today on the recommendation of Mr. Raymond W. Jones, music director at North high school, upon whom the brunt of this attack is made. Mason was given the honoraria in music at North high by this same director. Bernard Mason's brother Julian was the leading trumpet player at North high and also received an honoraria in music. Jack Smith is only one of the large number of colored students elected to the Honor Society at North high every year. He also participated in dramatics outranking the rest of the students because of his superior ability. In 1928 four of the eleven members of the varsity football team were colored boys and two of the five varsity basketball players were colored. On this year's team the star full-back is Orlando Johnson, a colored boy; and when he goes off the field his brother Leland is substituted for him.

## Solem Keeps Pair on Bench

Washington, D. C.—Wilbur Wallace and Voris Dickerson, Negro members of the University of Iowa football squad, were withheld from the Iowa-George Washington football game last Friday night at the request of James Pixlee, coach of the Colonials. Wallace's home is here and had looked forward all season to playing against the local eleven. Dickerson is from Lincoln, Mo.

It is understood that George Washington officials further requested that the Negro youths be kept off the Iowa players bench and not be permitted in the dressing room or on the field at any time. Coach Ossie Solem said that he would withhold the players from the game but asserted that "there isn't anyone big enough in Washington to keep me from taking all my players into the dressing room or onto the playing field."

Members of the Iowa party were indignant over the entire affair. Coach Solem was silent but admitted that he had been requested not to use the athletes.

Washington newspaper men who interviewed Pixlee said that the Colonial coach denied making the request. Bill Boelter, Iowa scout, met the George Washington coach, in Tulsa recently, Pixlee, through Boelter, asked that Iowa keep its Negro players off the bench during the game. Surprised that there should be any color line in Washington, Ossie Solem of Iowa was in a quandary. But, he took Wallace and Dickerson on the trip.

Arriving in Washington some unidentified party informed newspaper men that Iowa had two Negroes who were not to be permitted to play. Reporters asked Solem if he had been asked to keep the two boys out of the game. He said he had. The reporters called Pixlee who not in so many words but by direct inference denied he had communicated with Solem regarding the use of Negro players. Pixlee's stand put Solem in an embarrassing position but the Iowa coach chattered by taking Dickerson and Wallace with him to the players' bench, where they remained during the game.

Had George Washington university remained firm in its request that the two boys be kept off the bench, serious embarrassment for the school in the national capital might have resulted. The population of Washington includes a large percentage of Negroes.

The three-act musical comedy "Betty Coed", written by Viola P. Jones, will be given Tuesday evening, November 15th, at the Jewish Community Center. Latest song hits will feature the twelve scenes of gorgeous costumes, beautiful scenery, and clever dancing.

Local entertainers will be used with the leading parts taken by Marjorie McCracken, Lena King and James Rhodes, and a dandy chorus of colleagues.

Adventures of the students in a girls' dormitory and on the campus of an eastern college are portrayed with song and dance.

The show is sponsored by the Capital City Progressive club.

Nannie H. Burroughs, of Lincoln Heights, Washington, D. C., will speak, coming to Des Moines under the auspices of the Republican national committee.

## STORE ON EAST SIDE IS DAMAGED BY FIRE

A library station will be opened at the Community Service, 907 Fifteenth St., next Wednesday according to an announcement made by Ruth U. Carson, head of the Des Moines Public Library stations department.

This station will be open each Wednesday from 4 to 9 P. M. and Saturday from 3 to 6 P. M. Lucille Benning, a volunteer assistant will take care of the issuing of books. Several hundred volumes, mostly children's, will make up the collection which will be augmented from time to time by books from the general collection at the main library.

The library system has 13 stations and 10 branches in addition to collections in 65 parochial and public schools and the main library.

## TEXAS DEM. COMMITTEE HAS TO PAY ALL COSTS IN WHITE PRIMARY CASE

El Paso—The Texas State Democratic Executive Committee has had to pay all costs and a nominal judgment of \$1 to Dr. L. A. Nixon who, with the backing of the N. A. A. C. P., for the second time successfully challenged Texas efforts to keep Negroes from voting in the state Democratic primary elections.

## Vets Endorse President Hoover

New York (CNS)—At the Headquarters of the Negro Service League in the Waldorf-Astoria, announcement was today made that a nationwide hookup of colored veterans has been completed. This organization operates on parallel lines to the Republican Service League directed from Chicago by Colonel Hanford McNider, former Minister to Canada. This organization through its state leaders react the feeling of its constituent membership in a statement issued by Colonel West A. Hamilton at National Headquarters embodying the sentiments of the several leaders.

"The reelection of Herbert Hoover is of the utmost for the continued recovery of the economic forces of the nation. We believe that the great overwhelming majority of veterans of all races are primarily interested in America first, last and all the time.

"Anything short of the reelection of the President would be a catastrophe to all the citizens. Negroes cannot afford to vote otherwise. They are and should be more interested in our economic recovery than any other class of citizens.

"Secondly, we should realize that a National Democratic administration would never grant them a 'new deal', nor would it remember 'the forgotten Negro'. It would mean a misdeal for the Negro and a complete oblivion of the Negro forgotten man.

"We therefore, solemnly urge every Negro, veteran and otherwise who is interested in the best interest of America, and therefore his own race to work and vote for the reelection of Herbert Hoover.

## Reds Storm Chi In Hunger March

25,000 Idle Ask Relief in Parade Upwards of 50,000 unemployed men and women, a considerable portion of whom were Communists, marched through the Chicago Loop district Monday afternoon peacefully but effectively protesting against the reduction by 50 per cent the relief for the needy and demanding certain measures which they declare are necessary to safeguard the welfare of destitute citizens.

Ited Flag on Boulevard Loop traffic was tied in a knot during the noon hour as the marchers, along with the nominal 100,000 down town workers and shoppers, pushed surged and milled through the streets, escorted by 1,000 blue-coated policemen and scores of plain clothes men. The marchers carried banners protesting against conditions, while the red flag of Soviet Russia floated in the air along Michigan Blvd.

## REFUSE TO REGISTER N. C. NEGROES; N. A. A. C. P. WRITES U. S. ATTY. GENERAL

Washington—Atty. Gen. William D. Mitchell has received a request from the N. A. A. C. P. that he investigate the refusal of registrars in Nash County, North Carolina, to register properly qualified colored citizens who desire to exercise their citizenship right of voting.

One such colored citizen, according to the report sent the N. A. A. C. P., was flatly refused registration by the registrar who told him to go and tell other Negroes not to come as they would be refused. The N. A. A. C. P. has telegraphed Governor O. Max Gardner asking him to protect the constitutional rights of colored citizens in his state.

## President Orders Peonage Inquiry

Washington (CNS)—The charges that private contractors were mistreating Negro laborers on Federal flood control projects along the lower Mississippi River, President Hoover has appointed a committee consisting of Dr. Robert R. Moton, president of Tuskegee Institute; Judge James A. Cobb, of Washington, and Eugene Knickles Jones, executive secretary of the urban League of New York City, representing the Negro race, and Lt. Col. U. S. Grant 3rd, representing the United States Army.

A White House announcement of the appointment said the Chief Executive had asked this committee "to make a thorough and impartial inquiry as promptly as possible" and report the results of the investigation to him immediately.

## INTELLECTUALS IN SUPPORT OF COMMUNIST TICKET

New York, N. Y.—The League of Professional Groups for Foster and Ford, a national organization of educators, writers, scientists, artists, engineers, and physicians campaigning on behalf of Wm. Z. Foster and James W. Ford, have announced today the formation of various committees in support of the Communist ticket.

## Negroes Should Support the Republican Party

### What Do the Democrats Offer?

It may puzzle some folks to know how to cast their ballot in the approaching election, but it is easy for colored people to decide. Every colored man and woman in the United States should work with might and main to keep the Republican Party in control of national affairs. For no group will lose more if the Republican Party loses and no group will gain more if it wins.

Every right which the colored people of this country enjoy was bestowed upon them by the Republican Party. On the other hand, every law which withholds from colored people the rights to which they are entitled as citizens has been passed which others enjoy has been conceived and sponsored by that same party.

In the section of the country where the Democratic Party wields absolute power the progress of colored citizens has often been blocked, their sensibilities have been wounded and it has been difficult for them to maintain their self-respect. They have been subjected to indignities and humiliations of every conceivable kind.

In the stronghold of the Democratic Party colored people have been practically disfranchised for years. In every state controlled by the Democratic Party Jim Crow Laws have been enacted and are rigidly enforced. While they are obnoxious to the whole race, they work an unspeakable hardship upon colored women who are forced to ride in them. The insults which have been heaped upon them on account of these laws and the horrors which they have endured, no pen can portray and no tongue can tell.

In the section controlled exclusively by the Democratic Party hundreds of colored men, women, and even children have been lynched, while their murderers have not even been called to account for their crimes. In this same section colored people have been the victims of the Convict Leases System which is another form of slavery and which in some respects is more cruel and more crushing than the old system of slavery. Under the Convict Leases System colored people have been cheated and robbed for years.

When a man has the privilege of deciding who shall manage his affairs, he usually selects those who have promoted his welfare in the past and shuns those who have retarded his progress or injured him. Under the circumstances, it is inconceivable that anybody through whose veins one drop of African blood flows and whose brain is hitting on all six votes to give the Democratic Party control of national affairs.

"But let us live in the present and forget the past", somebody suggests. "The Republican Party is no longer the party of Abraham Lincoln; colored people have paid it the debt of gratitude they owe it long ago and the Democratic Party may change". Even though one grants for the sake of argument that the Republican Party might have done more to promote the welfare of colored people than it has done, it cannot be denied that it has always been their friend and has never been their foe. Of whatever sins of omission or commission the Republican Party may be accused, the fact remains that colored people are indebted to it for the only rights and privileges which they enjoy as citizens in the United States today.

When they are urged to change their political affiliations just for the sake of change, one is reminded of that classical little rhyme which runs:

"Change just for the sake of change is like these big hotels  
Which are always changing plates and feed their guests on smells."

The Democratic Party's attitude toward colored people is the same today that it always has been. It is constantly proving in season and out that it has not changed toward them one single bit. Only recently in several states where the Democrats wield absolute power they have barred colored men from the polls and have refused to let them vote in the primaries. Texas, the state in which the Democratic candidate for Vice-President now lives, is one of these states. Thus the Democrats even unto this day are still withholding from colored people the right of citizenship and are still fighting teeth and nail the law that bestowed it upon them through the instrumentality of the Republican Party. Even after the Supreme Court rendered a decision that colored citizens have a right to vote in the Democratic primaries, the men representing that party boasted that they would find a way to circumvent the highest law in the land as they had done in the past.

There are broad-minded, justice-loving Democrats in the North as well as in the South who stand for a square deal and fair play, it is true. But the strength of the Democratic Party lies in the South; in fact, the South is the Democratic Party. The traditions, customs and laws of that section must be respected and observed by the North, so far as colored people are concerned, though the heavens fall. However eager Northern Democrats or their justice-loving brothers in the South may be to change conditions, they lack the power to put their ideas and wishes into effect. They are a helpless minority which the powerful majority rules with an iron hand.

Not only has the Democratic Party assumed an unfriendly attitude toward the colored citizens of this country, but it has perpetrated an unspeakable injustice upon the dark people of a foreign land. Under President Wilson's administration the United States marines seized Haiti in the name of the American Government and occupied it, although Haiti had been an independent government for more than one hundred years, was a member of the League of Nations and signed the Treaty of Versailles as such.

Franklin Roosevelt, the man whom the Democrats want to make President of the United States, was Assistant Secretary of the Navy under Joseph Daniels and wrote the Constitution which snatched from that small and helpless country every right which it had previously enjoyed as a sovereign nation and made the people of Haiti vassals of the United States. President once declared that Franklin Roosevelt's constitution was forced down the throat of the Haitian people at the point of a bayonet.

When Alfred Smith was the Democratic candidate for the presidency in 1923 he expressed himself forcibly against imperialism and promised to renounce it if he were elected. This attitude greatly endeared him to the Haitians. But the Haitian minister here paid a glowing tribute to Herbert Hoover as a man with sound judgment, broad views, and deep sympathy to whom he would prefer to entrust the destiny of his country.

Both on account of its past and its present record there is every reason why colored people should vote to keep the Republican Party in power. Sensible folks do not swap horses in the middle of a stream. There is no group of citizens in this country which would cast their ballots for a party which had been so inconsiderate and so unjust toward them as the Democratic Party has been toward colored people, when it was possible to vote for a party which had done so much to promote their welfare as the Republican Party has done for colored people.

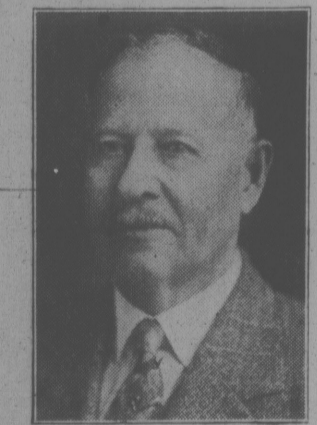

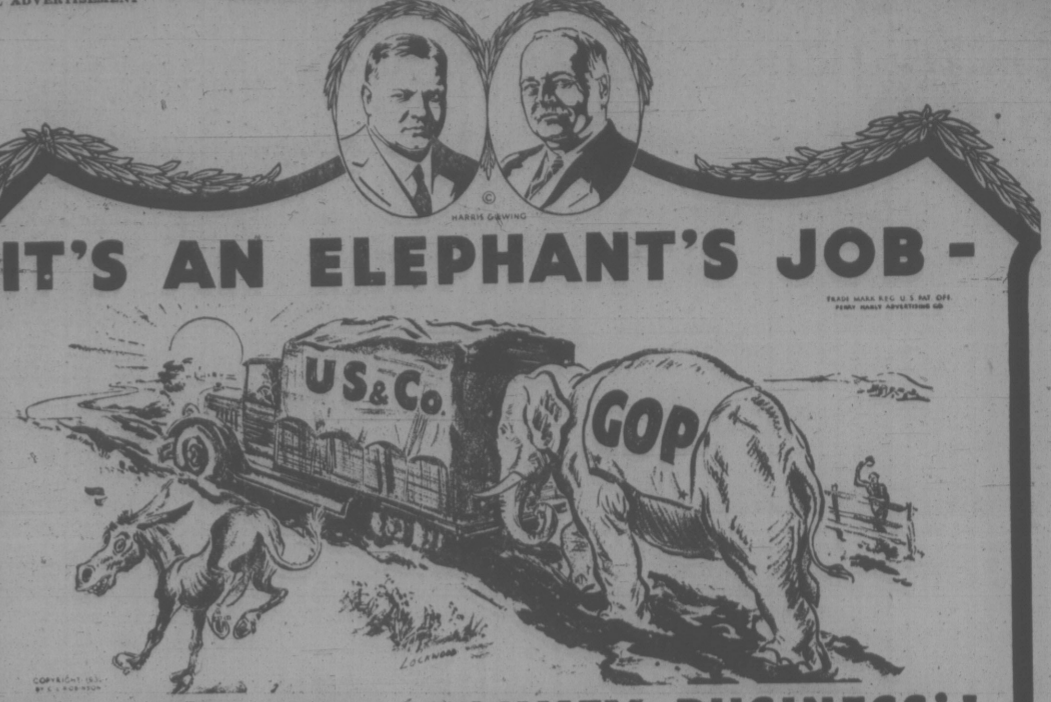
