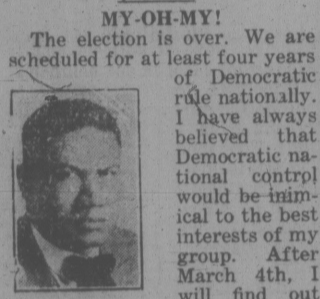

Roosevelt Victory Greatest Landslide of All Times

Riding upon a wave of Democratic votes that engulfed nearly every Republican aspirant throughout the nation, Governor Franklin Delano Roosevelt, governor of New York and his partner, John Garner of Texas, swept into the White House Tuesday in a record vote which is unparalleled in all history of United States elections.

For the first time since Woodrow Wilson laid aside the duties of the highest office in 1920, a Democrat will become the nation's chief magistrate.

The Republican reverse, one of the greatest in this generation for any party, apparently has put both senate and house into the hands of the Democrats by wide majorities.

Republican leaders ascribed the terrible defeat to several causes, some of them being:

"The depression, which directly or indirectly, has affected every home in America.

"The ruinous prices of such great basic commodities as wheat, corn and livestock in the West.

"Prohibition. While not such an acute issue in the West, prohibition was an important factor in the wet states of the eastern seaboard.

Another cause which contributed to the repudiation of the Republican party was "general unrest, born of the hard times and general desire for a change."

Hoover's refusal to have his picture made with a colored group during his four years in office; his attempt to seat Judge Parker of North Carolina, a rabid lily-white on the supreme court bench, and the activities of his postmaster general to formulate a lily-white party in the South, were some of the many attitudes on the Race question that made him distasteful to many voters.

In addition to these criticisms, Hoover made no outstanding appointments of colored men or women since he has been in office, said many voters who went into the Democratic ranks.

The mistake that paved the way for his nation-wide unpopularity with members of both races was his dealing with the bonus army in Washington, which resulted in tear gas being used to drive these lobbyists off government property.

Iowa Democrats March to Victory

The upheaval which swept the nation, like a swift hurricane that carried Roosevelt and Garner into the White House, the third Democrat to sit there since the Civil War, invaded Iowa, old Republican rock, for the second time in its history and elected Louis Murphy to the United States senate; placed Clyde L. Herring in the governor's chair; carried all other Democratic candidates into state offices; elected five supreme court justices; and sent seven Democrats to congress.

Democrats held nearly two-thirds of the house seats in the forty-fifth general assembly and are within three seats of control of the senate.

Polk County Republicans Survive

C. C. THE ELECTION

HEALTH TALKS

ULCER OF THE STOMACH

Very severe pain in the abdomen is very likely to be due to some ulceration in the stomach; but there are so many conditions in this region that give rise to severe pain that it would be unsafe to say that any severe pain in this region is due to a certain cause without proving it definitely.

If ulceration in the stomach gives rise to severe pain suddenly for the first time, it has been present for some time previous to this sign of its further destructive progress.

Ulcerations in the linings of stomachs begin as small, pin point things and increase in size over long periods of time and extend deeper and deeper into the layers of the organ, and, therefore, become very painful at a certain stage in their development.

The symptoms preceding this stage of provoking discomfort are sometimes not sufficient to make one know that a serious condition of the stomach is impending. But there soon comes a time when relief must be sought and the character of the discomfort soon becomes something like that in severe toothache; consequently ulcerations of this organ are usually seen at this time or somewhat later in their development. The seriousness of these requires an earlier attention.

suggested that the cases had been forced to trial without proper preparation by counsel. All other grounds for seeking to have the conviction set aside were passed over by the Justice as of no material weight.

Washington, D. C.—Wilbur Wallace and Voris Dickerson, Negro members of the University of Iowa football squad, were withheld from the Iowa-George Washington football game last Friday night at the request of James Pixlee, coach of the Colonials. Wallace's home is here and had looked forward all season to playing against the local eleven. Dickerson is from Lincoln, Mo.

It is understood that George Washington officials further requested that the Negro youths be kept off the Iowa players bench and not be permitted in the dressing room or on the field at any time. Coach Ossie Solem said that he would withhold the players from the game but asserted that "there isn't anyone big enough in Washington to keep me from taking all my players into the dressing room or onto the playing field."

Members of the Iowa party were indignant over the entire affair. Coach Solem was silent but admitted that he had been requested not to use the athletes.

Washington newspaper men who interviewed Pixlee said that the Colonial coach denied making the request.

Bill Boelter, Iowa scout, met the George Washington coach, in Tulsa recently. Pixlee, through Boelter, asked that Iowa keep its Negro players off the bench during the game. Surprised that there should be any color line in Washington, Ossie Solem of Iowa was in a quandary. But, he took Wallace and Dickerson on the trip.

Arriving in Washington some unidentified party informed newspaper men that Iowa had two Negroes who were not to be permitted to play. Reporters asked Solem if he had been asked to keep the two boys out of the game. He said he had. The reporters called Pixlee who not in so many words but by direct inference denied he had communicated with Solem regarding the use of Negro players. Pixlee's stand put Solem in an embarrassing position but the Iowa coach countered by taking Dickerson and Wallace with him to the players' bench, where they remained during the game.

Had George Washington university remained firm in its request that the two boys be kept off the bench, serious embarrassment for the school in the national capital might have resulted. The population of Washington includes a large percentage of Negroes.

25,000 Idle Ask Relief in Parade
Upwards of 50,000 unemployed men and women, a considerable portion of whom were Communists, marched through the Chicago Loop district Monday afternoon peacefully but effectively protesting against the reduction by 50 per cent the relief for the needy and demanding certain measures which they declare are necessary to safeguard the welfare of destitute citizens.

Red Flag on Boulevard
Loop traffic was tied in a knot during the noon hour as the marchers, along with the nominal 100,000 down town workers and shoppers, pushed surged and milled through the streets, escorted by 1,000 blue-coated policemen and scores of plain clothes men.

The marchers carried banners protesting against conditions, while the red flag of Soviet Russia floated in the air along Michigan Blvd.

All his days, unless he happens to be a "revolutionist" in spirit, he will be afraid to step out and take the lead and assume responsibility and leadership. Constantly and forever he will be a weak, timid "follower"—the son of an essentially ignorant bombastic father who, nine chances to ten, is but covering up his own conscious inferiority by his noisy attitude. Just what good is a fine body and generous schooling to that boy, when the very heart of things has been ignored?
