SPORTSMANSHIP

It is pleasant to turn from unsatisfactory introspection and circumspection to a pleasant discovery. Such was my experience this week. There is a billiard tournament being conducted on Center street, at Scott's pool hall. Here every night are assembled more than a hundred spectators watching a contest that will ultimately decide the city Negro billiard championship of Des Moines.

I have seen Willie Hoppe and Jake Shaeffer expose their wares, but never have I been so proud as I was to see this championship tournament in progress. The contestants, immaculately attired, came in amidst thunderous applause, were called to the table and instructed by a Negro referee, equally appropriately attired, fully conversant with the game, and whose decision was never contested. From these spectators the contestants received the most courteous treatment, partisan of course at times, but always fair. The finest of sportsmanship was exhibited by the contestants, and this sportsmanship always drew thunderous applause from the audience. I have known many contests to be held in my group in this city. I know of none that contributed more to good sportsmanship, fair play, and following our own leadership than this tournament is contributing. The management and the contestants are to be highly commended.

Sometimes I become skeptical as to whether or not we are developing leadership, followers, and respect for authority of our own. Experiences of this kind drive me on to greater faith and hope.

ASK U. S. ROADS CHIEF TO PREVENT COLOR BAR ON HIGHWAY PROJECTS

Jamaica, N. Y., Dec. 2.—Thomas H. MacDonald, chief of the Bureau of Public Roads of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, has been asked by the Jamaica branch, N. A. A. C. P. to issue a statement warning against the exclusion of or discrimination against Negro workers on emergency highway projects.

Dr. Charles M. Reid, president of the Jamaica N. A. A. C. P., first wrote the U. S. Secretary of Agriculture asking opportunity for colored workers to get their share of employment. To this Mr. MacDonald replied that the labor lists were supplied by county or other local employment agencies designated by the State, preference being given to ex-service men and persons in great need.

Atlanta, Ga.—(CNS)—Pointing out that they want it made plain that they do not subscribe, in any sense to the theory of some that lynching is sometimes necessary for the protection of womanhood, women representing 12 Southern States met here last week and started a campaign they hope will bring the South through 1933 without a single lynching.

The delegates agreed to campaign for extending the membership into all of the 1,282 counties of the Southern States during the forthcoming year. Another goal is the indorsement and co-operation of all types of organized women's groups and a membership of at least 13,000 or 1,000 in each Southern State.

They met as delegates to the annual convention of the Central Council of the Association of Southern Women for the Prevention of Lynching and adopted this motto: "A lynchless South in 1933."

Thirteen hundred towns and 575 counties are represented in the association's membership.

FINNS CANNOT SEE PASTURES AS STAGE HIT

Helsingfors, Finland, Dec. 2.—Four conservative women members of the parliament demanded Saturday that the cabinet take measures to prohibit production of Marc Connelly's play, "The Green Pastures", because, they

"The Green Pastures", which won the Pulitzer prize in 1929, was banned from the English stage by Lord Chamberlain in 1930 because of the representation of the Deity on the stage. It was later published in England, and many prominent persons protest against Lord Chamberlain's action.

When the play was staged in Stockholm, Sweden, last month 12 clergymen protested against it as holding up to ridicule the religious ideas of an oppressed people.

Prison Chiefs Incensed At Spivak

MAY INDICT AUTHOR OF "GEORGIA NIGGER"

New York City, (CNA)—A federal indictment against John L. Spivak, author of the much-discussed book "Georgia Nigger", will be asked by State Prison Commissioner Vivian E. Stanley of Georgia, according to a news dispatch from Atlanta. The dispatch indicated that the indictment would charge that Spivak had impersonated a federal officer in order to photograph the torture of Negro prisoners and obtain official records from the Prison Commission. Commissioner Stanley also charges that Spivak bribed a life-term prisoner in Seminole County to pose for a picture showing the infliction of torture.

The book "Georgia Nigger" was published this fall by Brewer, Warren and Putnam of New York. It is a startling expose of the system of forced labor in the South, on the cotton plantations and the chain gangs. By the unique technique of fiction based on documentary evidence and illustrations, the story of a young Negro boy is unfolded. This lad, once caught in the web of the law, finds himself more and more deeply entangled in its mesh and is indefinitely bound to forced labor.

NORDIC EAR MIXES "NIGGER" AND "NEGRO" IN HEBREW DIALECT, N. B. C. EXPLAINS

New York, Dec. 2.—The National Broadcasting Company has done a little explaining to the N. A. A. C. P. about an alleged use of the word "nigger" in a radio broadcast from station WJZ. In the "Mystery Hour" broadcast, the N. A. A. C. P. complained, the offensive word occurred.

Anti-Discrimination Bills Prepared for Congress Session

New York, Dec. 2.—Disclosure that no funds have yet been made available for the committee appointed by President Hoover to investigate the peonage conditions of the Mississippi flood control project, has brought about intensified activity by the N. A. A. C. P. to procure a sweeping Senate investigation under the resolution to be introduced by Senator Robert F. Wagner of New York.

Calloway Speaks To Service Club

"Any race who boasts of its past achievements, without continuing to advance faces the same end as the American Indian", said Nathaniel Calloway, of Iowa State College, in an address at a mass meeting sponsored by the Young Men's Service Club at St. Paul A. M. E. Church, Sunday afternoon.

The speaker declared that stick-itiveness must be within the young Negro to insure happiness. "The Civil Rights Bill means nothing to the Negro as a law, unless we rebel against its miscarriage," he declared. Mr. Calloway told his listeners that the young Negro cannot stay in the same old rut and succeed. He must discard old customs and superstitions.

Abbott Case Postponed Till Spring

Wife Is Awarded \$300 Temporary Alimony

Chicago—After hearing by counsel for Robert S. Abbott, editor and publisher of The Chicago Defender and Abbott's Monthly, and Mrs. Helen T. Abbott, his estranged wife, in her plea for separate maintenance, Judge Philip J. Finnegan of the Superior court entered an order Saturday allowing Mrs. Abbott \$300 a month temporary alimony. The case will probably come to trial some time during the spring.

Negro Pageant Well Received

LARGE CROWDS ENJOY TOM-TOM TO SYNCOPATION

A capacity audience greeted the initial performance of the musical pageant, "Tom-Tom To Syncopation", Negro revue of song and dance, given Wednesday evening at the Jewish Community Center. The most striking scenes were the jungle dances and the soldiers parade in uniform of the different wars.

From 1619 in the African jungles throughout the southlands in 1865 and 1866, through the War with Spain in '98 to 1918 periods of time were vividly portrayed. The climax of the elaborate staging and gorgeous costume and scenery was a lavish setting done in up-to-date Harlem style.

Interpretive dances by Cecelia Williams and Irvin White were effectively executed. The routine tap dancing of the three girls, Georgia Edmunds, Jean Morris and Eleanor Powell was the feature of the production. E. W. Perkins was great in his portrayal of the slave buyer. The quintette featured Duke Ellington's "Mood Indigo" and was enthusiastically endorsed. Vocal soloists included Charles Woods, George Brewer, Mildred Page and C. Tyree Jackson.

Jazz, classics and spirituals came in for their share of the honors, by composers as Ellington, Burleigh, and Johnson. The production was directed by Mrs. C. Tyree Jackson and the costumes were designed by Mrs. Georgine Morris. The show was sponsored by St. Simon's Episcopal Mission.

Formerly President Of Methodist School

Xenia, O.—(CNS)—Bishop Joshua H. Jones, former president of Wilberforce University, and one of the bishops deposed at the General Conference of the A. M. E. Church in Cleveland, last May, died at his home in Wilberforce, near here, Thanksgiving Day. He was 76 years old.

He was head of Wilberforce University from 1900 to 1908, but retired from active service in the church last May. His son, Gilbert Jones, was president of Wilberforce from 1924 until last May, when he resigned.

Gordon Kitchen Builds Great Football Team At Talladega

ONE OF THE GREAT COACHES IN THE SOUTH (Special to the Bystander)

Talladega, Ala., Dec. 2.—By hard work and great leadership, Gordon H. Kitchen places his Talladega College Crimson Tornados out among the leading great teams of the country. Kitchen himself was a star back both at Tuskegee and Grinnell college. To make himself more proficient and conversant with all systems and types of play he attended the Northwestern University Summer coaching school under Dick Hanley two successive summers, 1931 and 1932.

In two years Talladega has been brought from the bottom of the Southern Conference of sixteenth place to a tie for second place. She is recognized now as one of the Big Five of the South.

Kitchen uses a modified Rockne and Warner system combined. It is one of the most original and trickiest in the country. It is hard to diagnose by the defense and brought good results.

This year Talladega met some of the strongest teams and only once was her goal crossed. The 'Dega ran up a total of some 80 odd scores to 6 against her. The best defensive record of any Negro college.

Last year, Kitchen's first at the popular A. M. A. college, one All-American birth was given Talladega, this year at least two will undoubtedly get the call. Coach Kitchen has brought out the best in such brilliant stars as "Dizzy" Pigrom, who consistently passes 50 and 60 yards with bullet-like passes. He is admittedly the longest and surest passer since Brick Muller of California some years ago; Cuz Wright, a Kansas City boy, who kicks constantly 65 and 70 yards in dry or wet weather; "Rip" Speed, who might put a game on ice in second in one of his sensational sprints of 50 or 75 yards through an entire team; and "Sod" White, a strapping lad from Indianapolis, who is beyond a doubt the first college football year White has been in and has three more years of competition.

Kitchen stresses the fundamentals of football, viz, blocking, tackling and each man carrying out his assignment to the fullest extent.

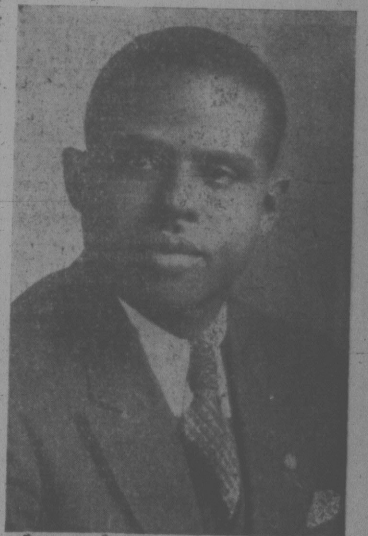

Boley, Okla.—(CNS)—A trio of bank bandits, one a Negro, were wiped out before the blazing weapons of residents of this all-Negro village when they frustrated the attempted robbery of the Farmers and Merchants State Bank.

Enraged by the reckless killing of D. J. Turner, the Negro bank president, who was shot for pulling a hidden alarm in the presence of the robbers, a sharp-shooting bookkeeper dropped one of the holdup men, and townsmen finished the job. In the words of W. W. Riley, cashier of the bank, "there was a regular war" after the first shot was fired by the white man who killed the nervy bank president.

Until the first annual stockholders' meeting, the following named person shall constitute the Board of Directors: Ruth Maxson and the following person shall be the President, Secretary and Treasurer, to-wit: Ruth Maxson. Private property of stockholders shall be exempt from corporate debts. The corporation reserves the right to alter, amend, change or repeal any provision in the Articles of Incorporation as by law made and provided, except the provision exempting the private property of stockholders from liability for corporate debts.
