Lynch Party Now Threatens Scottsboro Boys

\$460,000 Appropriation Voted for Institution

Washington, D. C., Feb. 24.—Efforts of Congressman Oscar Depriest of Illinois to help secure an appropriation of \$460,000 for a new heating, light and power plant at Howard university successfully culminated in legislation on Saturday when President Hoover signed the department of the interior bill.

The original bill as presented to the house of representatives did not include this particular item, whereupon Mr. Depriest offered an amendment from the floor, which was passed Dec. 28, 1932, by a vote of 136 to 106, with 110 Republicans and 26 Democrats supporting the measure. Technical data in the case presented by Mr. Depriest was prepared by Albert I. Cassell, Howard university architect.

Woman Fails To Identify Victim

Ringgold, La.—Less than 14 hours after J. P. Batchelor, 51 cashier of the Ringgold bank, was beaten to death by a Negro near here, Nelson Nash, 24, who officers said, confessed to the slaying, was lynched by several score men who hanged him from a tree.

Fifty Bullets Fired in Body
Nash was captured shortly before noon by a citizen posse. Officers said Mrs. Batchelor failed to identify him definitely as the Negro who killed her husband and attempted to attack her. After Nash was hanged, about 50 bullets were fired through his body.

Press Briefs of the Week

BAYSIDE, L. I.—James J. Corbett, "Gentleman Jim" of the prize ring and the stage, who died at his home Saturday afternoon, was the most idolized of all heavyweight champions from 1892 to 1897. This was the period between his famous victory over the great John L. Sullivan at New Orleans and his defeat by Robert Fitzsimmons at Carson, Nev.

ROSELAND, N. J.—Miss Katherine Schaub, one of the five women who obtained judgments against the United States Radium Corp. of Orange, N. J., in 1928, in a suit claiming their death was merely a matter of a few years as a result of radium poisoning, died Sunday night. She is the second of the five to die.

NEW YORK, N. Y.—Murder and kidnaping threats have driven the mother of 7-year-old Lucy Cotton Thomas, \$36,000-a-year heiress, to hide the child upstairs. Cranks and criminals have deluged her home with demands for \$100,000 and \$50,000, her mother, now Mrs. Lucy Cotton Thomas Magraw, said Monday.

DES MOINES, IOWA.—The Iowa senate Tuesday killed the Frailey resolution leading to state prohibition modification. The vote was 27 to 23.

HYDE PARK, N. Y.—Two veterans in the fields of politics and business were announced Tuesday night by President-elect Roosevelt for his premier cabinet posts—Senator Hull of Tennessee for Secretary of State and William H. Woodin of New York for secretary of treasury. Thursday, he named Geo. H. Dern of Utah as secretary of war.

DAYTONA BEACH, FLA.—Sir Malcolm Campbell, British speed king, drove his mighty Bluebird racing car through a dangerous haze, to average 272.108 miles an hour at Daytona Beach Wednesday to break his own world speed record of last year of 253.968 miles per hour.

PEIPING CHINA.—Heavy fighting along the eastern border of Jehol broke out Thursday between Chinese and Japanese forces in the first serious battle for possession of the province. Fierce hand-to-hand encounters were reported in dispatches from the Nanking sector, on the border near Peipiao, where the main Chinese forces in Jehol are concentrated, with over 300 casualties. China refused, Friday, to withdraw their troops.

LOS ANGELES, CALIF.—District Atty. Buron Fitts said Thursday a new investigation into the death of Paul Bern, film executive and husband of Jean Harlow, screen star, has been completed, and he was convinced it was a case of suicide. Bern's death from a gunshot wound last Sept. 5 was ascribed officially to suicide caused by despondency over his married life with the lovely platinum-haired screen siren.

Doctor Charged with Girl's Death

Los Angeles, Calif., Feb. 24.—Dr. M. J. Marmillion, 3315 Central Ave., prominent physician and former president of the state medical association, was charged with murder following the death last week of Margaret Scott, 18-year-old high school senior, an alleged victim of an illegal operation.

Archie Harrison, the girl's lover, and a medical student at Loma Linda, testified before the coroner's jury Thursday that he hired the doctor to perform the operation.

Shock Kills Girl
Three days after arranging for the operation Harrison took the girl to the doctor's office and an attempt was made to treat her, but the shock was too great. She died on the operating table. Further testimony was to the effect that the physician then performed a tonsillitis operation and certified death on that ground.

Dr. Marmillion refused to accept \$25 for the operation, it was revealed. The money, his fee, was offered after the girl's death.

N. A. A. C. P. Fights Birth of Nation

New York, Feb. 24.—Announcement in the film gossip column of a New York daily paper that Thomas Dixon, author of "The Clansman," from which the silent picture, "The Birth of a Nation" was made, was seeking to have a talking picture version of the film produced, caused Roy Wilkins, assistant secretary of the N. A. A. C. P. to write the Motion Picture Producers and Distributors of America, Inc., urging that no consideration be given such proposal.

The association's letter declared the silent version of the picture depicted Negroes as bestial creatures and that these scenes were presented as historically accurate pictures of the Negro's place in this country's development. It asked that no effort be made to produce a talking picture version because racial strife would be stirred. The producer's association, through Carl E. Milliken, secretary, replied that it had no information indicating interest on the part of any of its companies in a talking version of "The Birth of a Nation."

Alabamans Plan to 'Get' The Negroes If They Are Acquitted In Marco Trial

New York (CNA) Feb. 24.—Plans for the lynching of the Scottsboro boys in Alabama are under way in an organized manner in Alabama, the International Labor Defense says it learned today. A "vigilance" organization with ramifications through several states, according to information which has been received from reliable sources, William L. Patterson, national secretary of the International Labor Defense, announced.

This organization, according to the information received by Mr. Patterson stems directly from an editorial printed in the Huntsville Times, immediately following the Nov. 7 decision of the United States supreme court, which granted the innocent boys a new trial, and reprinted in the Jackson County Sentinel. The editorial called for the immediate organization of a vigilance committee in Huntsville for two announced purposes.

Washington, D. C.—The senate Wednesday adopted the Wagner resolution proposing a senatorial inquiry into labor conditions on the Mississippi flood control project. The resolution, sponsored by Senator Wagner (Dem., N. Y.) provides \$1,000 out of the senate's contingent fund for the investigation.

Negro Seeks to Enter No. Carolina Law School

Durham, N. C., Feb. 24.—A legal battle to secure the entrance of Negro students to the law school of the University of North Carolina will be launched here soon, awaiting only the refusal of the university to accept an application from a qualified Negro student who already has an application blank to be filled out and returned to the dean of admissions.

The attorneys who are handling the case are basing their claim on the United States Constitution and upon the fact that the North Carolina laws do not forbid education of both races at colleges and universities, but only at elementary and high schools.

Gold Chest Campaign On Sunday

The churches of the city will sponsor an Old Gold Chest Campaign, Sunday, February 26, at each of their congregations, where a committee designated by the minister will be in charge to receive gold contributions.

Old gold will be solicited and each member will be asked to bring it to the church on that day. There are many pieces of discarded jewelry or fragments of silver and gold in every home—watches, rings, pins, chains, dental work, collar buttons, links, bracelets, ear rings and other pieces that have no monetary value but collectively will mean a large contribution to the church.

The fund created from the sale of these old pieces will be used to give financial assistance and aid in the current expenses of the various churches.

Question of Soup Kitchen Causes Fight in Los Angeles

ROBERTS FIGHTS PROPOSAL FOR RELIEF POST

LOS ANGELES.—(WS)—The hearing for the establishment of a soup kitchen on the East Side of the city got under way at the offices of the Social Service Commission here last week and from the facts presented it was concluded that there was a horde of homeless men in the densely populated colored section and there were also facilities which had not been used to their fullest capacities by these colored men.

This hearing grew out of a request of John Fowler and the political organization which he heads when they made known their desire for \$3,000 for the operation of a soup kitchen for six months. They proposed to feed and have some kind of shelter for 4,000 men which they claim walk the streets of the city every day and hide in all kind of places at night. According to reports, Mayor John C. Porter was in favor of the proposition and the City Council passed it to the Social Service Commission with a recommendation to O.K. it. The latter organization sent letters to local white and colored leaders in the city asking them to be present at the meeting.

Fowler stated that there were men not being cared for and gave as his reasons inadequate facilities and discriminatory practices of the persons in charge of the relief stations. He could give only one example of refusal on account of color and that was denied by Miss Mabel Eldridge, a colored girl employed by this accused organization as a case worker.

The first definite step toward the solution of the problem was made by Frederick M. Roberts, Greely. For 14 years they have

who is in this city during the legislative recess. He suggested that a check be made of the existing agencies and find if they fail to meet the need. If they are inadequate he suggested further that the money that would be spent on this problem should be given to the already existing agencies instead of setting up new ones which would necessarily have a large overhead.

Mr. Roberts stated, "I am a member of the Assembly Council of Social Welfare and a member of several social agencies of this city. I am doing all I can for this condition but I think we should stop thinking of the problem along racial lines. The problem is one of human misery and should not be discussed along any other lines."

"We know some of the customs in the giving of aid, but we should not say fair thinking cannot be gotten. The city, county and state should work together and present that cooperative front so

much needed in this work. "There is a feeling in the state legislature that there is too much tape in the social welfare departments. This is probably due to the shortage of funds, I don't know. But I do know that there is too much red tape and there is a need of an investigation of these departments soon."

"It is a fact that we must deal with the problem methodically. But I am pleading with you to use a common sense approach and in the meantime do something for these men who are in great need."

A report of the Municipal Bureau showed that out of over 6,000 people who were served by this organization, only 81 of them were Negroes. Other reports showed the failure of colored men to use the accommodations already provided for them. The Midnite Mission representative present at the meeting stated that that social agency would prepare a place for the colored if they wanted it, but it would not care to start a segregated place

Mr. Fowler asserted, "Probably next summer this commission will deem it fitting and proper to make a recommendation for the soup kitchen and in the meantime we sit and fiddle while Rome burns. We make no charges against the Municipal Service Bureau. We do not say that Negroes are discriminated against in this place, but we do say that Negroes do not feel welcome around white folks. Would a white man want to come down Central avenue and sleep with 99 Negroes? No! And no Negro would want to come on Main street and sleep with 99 whites! Large numbers of these people come from the south and from years of oppression from their white citizens they are timid around the whites. I am appealing to you to use your common sense and do something for these poor devils who walk the streets of our fair city by day and sleep in box cars, garages and hovels by night."

"We are not asking you for this consideration, but as taxpayers of the City of Los Angeles we are demanding that you give us some aid for these poor and indigent Negroes who walk the streets of this district daily." Glaring looks passed between Assemblyman Roberts and John Fowler when the former took the floor to answer the challenge of the latter. He asserted, "In times like these we cannot be wasteful and must think of relief of all groups." These remarks were interspersed by sarcastic utterances on the part of the two

men and Mr. Roberts finally ended by saying, "We must face the issue of human misery and not the issue of misery along racial lines."

New York, Feb. 24.—That Negro applicants for snow removal jobs in some instances were tricked out of line by policemen and thus lost their chance to be taken on during the recent heavy snowstorm here was charged by the N. A. A. C. P. in a letter to Dr. Wm. Schroeder, jr., commissioner of sanitation. The association also charges that the gangs of extra men taken on showed a small proportion of Negroes.

Dr. Schroeder issued a bulletin ordering all subordinates to show "absolutely no favoritism as to race, color or creed" in hiring extra snow shovelers. He said the men must be hired strictly according to their place in line at the various offices. The city hired 18,000 extra men to remove the snow.

CORBETT SAYS PETER JACKSON WAS GREATEST

Chicago, Feb. 24 (By the ANP)—Americans may remember longest the fight which the late James J. Corbett had with John L. Sullivan and thereby destroyed the legend that Sullivan was unbeatable, but the fight which stands out in Corbett's mind was the 61-round no contest with Peter Jackson, according to Grantland Rice, writing for the North American Newspaper Alliance. Rice quotes from an interview with Corbett several years ago: "Peter Jackson was a great fighter in every way. At his best, he had everything that a champion needs—boxing skill, punching power, stamina, speed, courage and coolness. I almost had him out in the twenty-eighth round—at least I had him groggy—and yet he was still there thirty-three rounds later on."

This alleged "identification", together with the fake confession, form the sole grounds for Price's imprisonment.

The brazen and avowed attempt to set a speed record in sending the youth to the electric chair has been halted by Price's repudiation of his confession and by the action taken by the International Labor Defense of New York in protesting against the arrest of Price on such flimsy evidence and against the lynch-terror being whipped up as a result of this case.

BLACKHEADS AND THEIR TREATMENT

The Child Reader

One afternoon many years ago a wharf rat on San Francisco Bay wandered into the Oakland Public Library. There, opening a bound volume of a children's magazine, he stumbled upon a story. It was a story about a boy like himself—a funnaway, a gang leader of wharf rats, who had certain semi-practical adventures, but who, after a hard lesson, learned of better ways of living his life.

Making of Jack London. The dramatic, exciting story awoke to the young reader the uneasy consciousness of his own wrong actions. He walked out of that library resolving to lead just as adventurous a life but one that carried with it a clear conscience. So he joined the "fish" patrol, cruised about the bay, fought poachers, and before long began to write stories about his adventures.

That boy was Jack London. The experience of this famous writer occurs, in a rather less dramatic fashion, in the life of every boy or girl. Careful investigators have discovered that next to persons, nothing has more influence on children than what they read. If a hero they admire acts under certain circumstances as they themselves would like to act, they'll remember it.

They imitate the hero. And when the time comes, they'll unconsciously be influenced by that hero's action and try to do likewise. The hero's kindness, ambition, resourcefulness, quick-wittedness, painstaking qualities, courage, magnanimity, modesty—all these examples "sink in" and are emulated both now and later.

One story with hidden character-building values is worth a dozen sermons from parents or teachers. Let us try to see that this sort of a story, full of plenty of adventure for the boy, full of interesting plots and characters for the girl, is convenient for them to pick up.

Jack London isn't the only one to be tremendously influenced by the printed word.

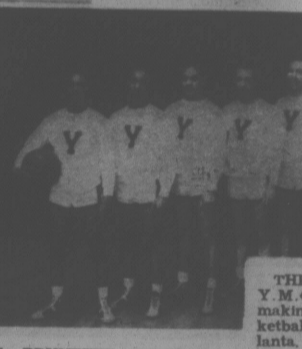

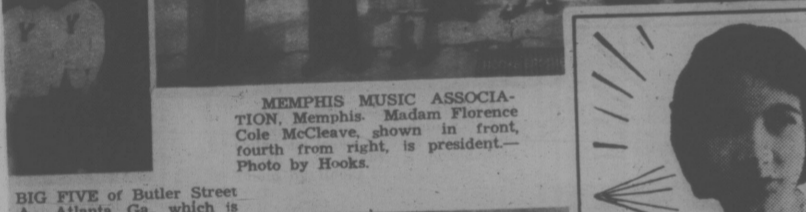

Kilby's Prisoners Have Their Fun, Says Mitchell

No matter how drab the surroundings in which prisoners are placed, nor how severe the punishment or restraints, prisoners will always manage to have their moments of fun and laughter, and especially was this true at Kilby. Particularly among the colored prisoners, it seems impossible to encounter any group of colored folks without finding them partaking of hilarity in some form, or being made the butt of a good many jokes by the whites. In other words if the Negro is not actually producing the fun he is at least the cause of it.

Quite a few of the colored prisoners with whom I came in contact while at Kilby were conscious of the fact that they were expected to create fun and laughter, especially for the whites, and quite a few of them played their roles to perfection, not only providing the necessary comedy but also dodging a lot of tedious work for themselves. In the shirt factory, where I worked, practically each new colored arrival, especially those who

had not yet discarded all of the evidence of having been raised on a "backwoods" plantation, was a likely prospect, the first day or two, of becoming a first-class fun provoker. Even some of these new candidates, despite their "new mown hay" or "cotton blossom" appearance, were wise that they were about to be initiated into the privileged ranks of shirt sewers by the way of the "tick" or laughter route, and while we detected their consciousness they easily fooled the whites, providing for them much amusement, and thus making their future tasks just that much lighter, for strange to say, it was not amenable to these playful whims of the whites one was considered at least a very dangerous Negro and one to bear much watching—in this respect I am afraid that I had not been able to buy about half of my daily task that I would have made a very desirable candidate not only to be constantly watched but to receive considerable punishment by way of the strap and stripes. As things were I dare say that I was watched much closer than their seeming indifference signified.

Whenever I read of these so-called Uncle Toms I think of some of those poor colored prisoners at Kilby who possessed nothing except their mother wit to use as a means of defense in making their tasks lighter. I am not at all sure but what under the circumstances Uncle Toms or not they did the best that their circumstances permitted.

Any white person prisoner or official, seemingly was privileged to try out their jokes on a new colored fun candidate. These jokes consisted of several phony errands such as sending the candidate to some one for a needle-stretcher, or some other equally as absurd or unheard of implement. To each person that the fun-maker would approach he would be directed to some other person and the greater number of persons to whom the candidate approached, the greater became the joke. I remember one candidate who, if he was not wise at the start he soon got wise, and he spent the whole of the first two days just looking for the supposed needle-stretcher. Finally I guess, the white folks got wise to the fact that instead of playing a joke on the colored fellow, that he was really playing a joke on them, anyway they put him to work and told him to never mind the needle-stretcher.

One ingenious colored chap saved himself a whipping and consequent stripes by taking the white captain literally at his word. Some of the boys were huddled together indulging in a forbidden crap game on the yard. The captain came up and almost caught the boys. He did retrieve the dice, and one colored chap who didn't get away. The colored boy naturally dis-

which would be hidden in a pre-arranged spot. As the chap would enter the colored dining room all that was necessary was for some one to even look at him and he would start running, invariably running towards and into the kitchen where he would lose his fright as he would secret in his bosom the package that was waiting for him there. A good many times my hunger was appeased by buying these cleverly secured packages from him who was so easily frightened, especially around meal times. I know that the chap has been released long before now or I wouldn't be revealing his assumed fright that so tickled the whites and so conveniently aided his digestion or pocketbook.

Not all of the fun was staged for the benefit of the whites however. Sometimes friends would plot against each other. A good way to get a fellow sore and bring laughter to others would be to switch articles of clothing or perfume to hide entirely the clothing of fellow-bathers. Imagine leaving a fellow stranded in the bathroom making him stay there, perhaps for hours because someone walked out with his clothes? Another good joke perpetrated with clothes would be to catch a new-comer, particularly if he was a tall man, and while he was sleeping exchange his pants with some that belonged to a real short fellow. Imagine the fun that would be had the next morning when dressing time came. boy wasn't at work, for he was not in the hospital. The chap was finally rounded up and escorted to the punishment room where corporal punishment was about to be inflicted when in his defense the colored chap explained to the prison court-martial jury that the captain himself had told him not to come near him until he had found the owner of the dice, and although he had been constantly looking for the owner he had not yet found him and consequently did not show up for work. That brought such a peal of laughter from the trial board that they dismissed the case with a great deal of hilarity. The joke personally was on the whites, for the dice belonged to the colored chap himself. He had been so busy trying to make his profit that he didn't notice the red of the shooters fleeing from the scene and just did straighten up, preparatory to running, when the white captain appeared on the scene.

Quite a number of the colored boys were afraid of a snake or anything that looked like or wigged like a snake. Almost anything that resembled a snake, especially in the hands of a white person, could start some of the colored boys running, and having started they found it much easier to run and dodge, assuming a continued fright than to remain working. JOB'S ARE ASKED BY MISSOURIANS

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo.—(ANP)—The house lounge at the State Capitol, was crowded last Thursday night with members of our race proselytes of the Democratic party who appeared before a special committee appointed by Gov. Park to consider the question of patronage.

One spokesman said: "The Negroes cast at least 5 per cent of the 7,300 available jobs, or 350." Joseph L. McLeone of St. Louis, who was the Democratic nominee for Congress in the Twelfth District of St. Louis two years ago, and David M. Grant of St. Louis, both attorneys, presented the claims of Democrats of their race for state jobs.

The special committee appointed by the governor held an open session in the Capitol last Thursday night, and representatives of our group from every section of the State were present with pleas for public employment and for legislation which our people have been demanding for years.

The Committee on Negro Legislation and Patronage is the first of its kind ever appointed by any governor of the State of Missouri, and is the direct outcome of a conference held in the Executive Chamber with Gov. Park, the day following his inauguration.

Among the St. Louisians on the committee were Atty. Joseph L. McLeone, Atty. David M. Grant, Mrs. Ruby P. Perdue, Dr. W. R. Williams, and Thos. J. E. Wilson, secretary of the Steering Committee, was chairman of the meeting.

Kelly Miller is 'Uncle Tom' to Dr. Woodson

I see that the Uncle Tom type of Negro is trying to discredit me by connecting my efforts with the so-called radical element of the race. My advocacy of equality and justice for the Negro and of united efforts of Negroes to obtain such blessings may seem radical to the mentally enslaved Negro; but it should not be considered any thing unusual for a man to demand what naturally belongs to him. The American Negro has become so accustomed to his present slavery that he has begun to defend it as just portion of the "joys" intended for him.

I am not surprised to learn that Kelly Miller is trying to discredit me and my work. The people of our day have long ceased to take his comments seriously, for after reading his so-called analysis of things you cannot actually understand what he is trying to say. He never takes a position on anything. His mind shifts; and such a mind is evidence of the lack of information. Kelly Miller just does not know. Why, then, should we give him credit for having thought?

In the case of G. David Houston, I am delighted to see him come out to fight in the open. As a rule he proceeds by clandestine methods. He has rendered fine service as a correspondent helping to unhorse the good-for-nothing J. Stanley Durkee, once president of Howard University. Several colored persons say that they would prefer to have Houston fight now in the open than his attack also the present administration of that institution, especially since his political co-workers, now trying to carry everything by roof and branch, assert that he is a candidate for the presidency of Howard University. Inasmuch as that institution is now getting most of its support from the Federal Government it would not surprise me to see some president's agent of Jim-crowism made the head of it. Houston could do this job admirably. With the matchless mind already at work, he would develop an invincible team.

Such Uncle Tom Negroes and agents of the Jim Crow may misunderstand me, and they may not. One thing they do know, however, is that they represent the antithesis of what I stand for. They will do almost any thing for a docteur or cheap honor, but I fight on principle, regardless of immediate consequences. They compromise and thus yield the only standing ground available for the battle of the Negro for freedom. I insist that we must fight on for equality and justice even if some of us must thereby suffer any and all indignities.

They would feast upon the profits of segregation as a patient gulps down the opiates which facilitate his dying. I with the spirit of free Africa would endure the torture of the oppressor and maneuver for a better chance, since "a day, even an hour of freedom is worth a whole eternity of bondage."

In taking this position one merely conforms to the teachings of history. The records of the progressive people of the world show that no race has ever advanced under the leadership of genuflecting and compromising men. On the contrary, we find that races in their struggle upward have even found it necessary to assassinate such leaders that the wheels of progress might move on. At present, however, the Negroes of the United States are hankering after awarding medals to their chief agents of the Jim Crow.

Now, if people choose to go downward rather than upward it is their own business; but unless they are an individual, they must go down with them. For this reason, if for no other, I have the right to protest. White men who thus object to the downward trend to stagnation and decay are not considered radical.
