Hon. Oscar DePriest To Speak Here, Aug. 6

Negroes Selected on Both Petit and Grand Juries

La Plata, Md., July 21.—Page Jupiter, charged with the murder of Mrs. Evelyn Reifschneider, white, was today removed to Baltimore for safekeeping. Charles H. Houston of Washington, member of the N. A. A. C. P. National Legal Committee who with Edward P. Lovett, Washington attorney, associated with Mr. Houston in the Crawford extradition case, and J. G. LuValle, editor of the Washington Tribune, today made a thorough investigation here of the case and of the attempt to lynch Jupiter.

The revelations to date in the Reifschneider murder are of a most sensational nature. Jupiter stoutly maintains that he had had intimate relations with Mrs. Reifschneider at her request while he was working on the Reifschneider farm to pay off a debt of \$20 for vegetables purchased from the woman's husband. He denies he criminally assaulted her and declares that he killed Mrs. Reifschneider, according to newspaper reports, at her request when he planned to leave the farm after working out his debt.

New York.—(ANP)—Realizing the ambition of a life time and blazing the trail for future opera singers, Miss Catherine Yarborough will sing the title role of "Aida" in the opera of the same name to be performed here Saturday, July 22, by the Chicago Opera company.

Scottsboro Case To Klan Judge

New York, July 21.—If Judge Jas. E. Horton refuses to further consider the Scottsboro case, as his friends report him prepared to do, the retrial of Heywood Patterson will be thrown into the court of Judge W. W. Callahan of Morgan county, one of the most notorious "Negro-baiters" and Ku Klux Klansmen in Alabama, it was learned by the International Labor Defense.

This development was seen by William L. Patterson, national secretary of the I. L. D., as a maneuver to turn the victory of the I. L. D. and the Negro and white workers of America in forcing Horton to grant a new retrial to Heywood Patterson into a means to accomplish more skillfully the lynch purposes of the white land-lords of Alabama, led by ex-Senator Tom Hefflin and Attorney General Thomas E. Knight.

Press Briefs of the Week

CHICAGO, ILL.—Italy's intrepid flyers gave thanks Sunday for their safe crossing of land and sea—6,100 miles from Orbetello to Chicago. Festivities, crowded upon Gen. Italo Balbo, youthful Italian air minister, and his 96 companions, were suspended for interlude of solemnity.

BIRMINGHAM, ALA.—Returns from Tuesday elections in Alabama and Arkansas on repeal of the eighteenth amendment showed repealists leading in Alabama by a majority of 3 to 2 and in Arkansas by 5 to 3. First in the traditionally dry south to consider prohibition repeal, the states were regarded as the repeal forces' most decisive test.

CHICAGO, ILL.—Wheat futures dropped terrifically in closing minutes Wednesday on the Chicago board of trade. At the close prices were down 9 1/2 to 12 cents. Negroes Excluded From Textile Code

Claims to be Considered by January 1

Washington, July 21.—Action must be taken by January 1, 1934, on the status of cleaners and outside workers in the cotton textile industry in relation to a minimum wage and maximum hours, according to the cotton textile code signed by President Franklin D. Roosevelt. The N. A. A. C. P. wired President Roosevelt urging that workers in these two branches of the industry in which some 14,000 Negroes are employed be included in the provisions for regulation of wages and hours of work.

Judge Stays Crawford Extradition

Boston.—Pending a review of the case by the United States Supreme court, the extradition of George Crawford, who was to have been removed to Virginia Monday, July 17, to face charges of murder, was stayed on that day by Judge George H. Bingham of the United States circuit court of appeals.

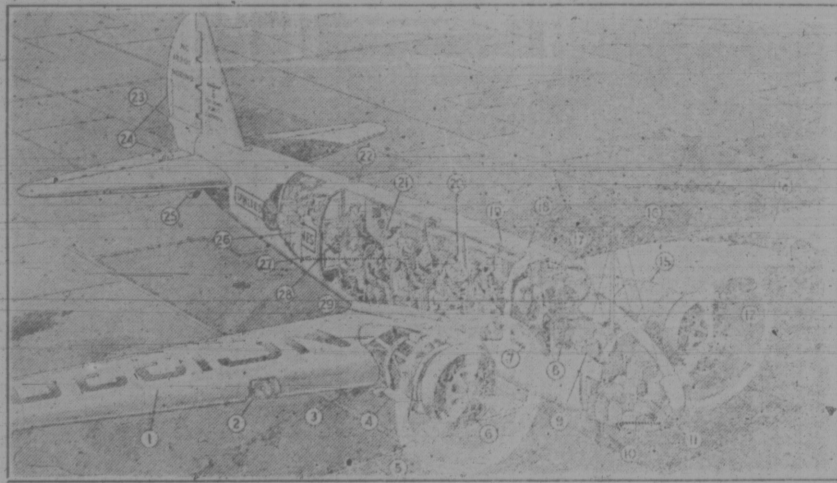

HEALTH TALKS Society and Clubs

TONSILLITIS

The tonsils are located in the throat on each side and are very important structures because of their composition which is lymphoid. Lymphoid tissue has a certain property of protecting against infection and does this very effectively as long as it does not become diseased itself. When once it becomes diseased this infection must be removed or it will travel to other lymphoid structures reducing their capacity to resist infection and limiting the protective forces of the body by reducing the amount of healthy lymphoid tissue. That is why when the tonsils become infected they should be removed. The removal of the tonsils will not keep the throat from becoming sore but any sore throat which occurs after the removal of the tonsils may be expected to remain localized in the throat and not spread to other parts of the body.

Their removal does not guarantee, however, that the throat will not be attacked by Scarlet Fever or Diphtheria or any other throat disease. These are guarded against, of course, by specific prophylaxis which is known to be logical and proper vaccination. Tonsils which have become infected should be removed because of the possibility of infection in them traveling to the lymph nodes in the hilus of the lung and it is not unlikely that tuberculosis sometimes gains entrance from this source in the throat.
