Alabama Clears Officials Of Blame for Lynchings

Tuscaloosa, Ala., October 13.—Complete whitewash of all concerned in the lynching of Dan Phippen Jr. and A. T. Harden here last August was the net result of the secret, lily-white grand jury investigation which closed last week.

Although direct proof of the guilt of Judge Henry B. Foster, Sheriff R. L. Shamblin, Deputies Murray Pate and Harley W. Holeman and Private Detective W. L. Huff in preparing and carrying out this infraction of the law was presented to the grand jury by the International Labor Defense, the only reference made to these men by the grand jury in its report was to praise them for their actions.

"We find no evidence to warrant any indictment," the grand jury said, officially—they imagine—closing the matter.

15 Negroes Die In California Blaze

Los Angeles, (Special)—At least 53 county job relief workers are known to have been burned to death when they were trapped in the cone-shaped canyon in Griffith park last Tuesday, but Coroner Frank Nance has declared that the total may reach as high as 80. Of this number at least 15 are believed to have been Negroes, although this has not been accurately verified.

The fire was started in the canyon when a worked carelessly cast away a cigarette, which started the holocaust that left the bottom and sides of the box-like area strewn with horribly burned bodies.

Tuskegee Again Hit by Mystery Fire

Tuskegee Institute.—(ANI)—Fire of unknown origin, the second to visit the Tuskegee campus in one day, completely destroyed Douglass hall, one of the important girls' dormitories, early Saturday evening, October 7.

No one was injured, the building having been unoccupied at the time with the exception of one teacher and two students on duty. The fire occurred about 6 p. m. the hour of vesper services when Tuskegeans were assembled in the institute chapel.

Douglass hall, named in honor of Frederick Douglass, was erected in 1903 and was the most pretentious building on the campus at the time it was built. The loss was estimated by Principal R. R. Moton at \$60,000. The building, completely covered by insurance, will be rebuilt immediately and will be made absolutely fireproof.

Knight Ready for Scottsboro Case

New York, Oct. 13.—That he will insist within the next two weeks on calling formally for beginning of a new lynch trial for the Scottsboro boys is the latest announcement of Attorney General Thomas E. Knight of Alabama, the International Labor Defense said this week. Knight, it was said, is making moves to bring the innocent boys to trial before the court of Decatur once more.

In these moves, the I. L. D. said, Knight is being supported fully by Judge James E. Horton, who presided at the retrial of Heywood Patterson, and who has refused so far to set a date for hearing on writs of habeas corpus filed by the organization to force setting of bail for the boys. Under Alabama laws it is mandatory to permit bail in the case following Judge Horton's ruling that the "evidence preponderates in favor of the defendant." "Every effort is being made by the I. L. D. to force Judge Horton to set a date for the hearing," William L. Patterson, national secretary of the I. L. D., said.

New York, Oct. 13.—The thousands of unskilled workers in the levee camps along the lower Mississippi river will have their pay raised and their hours shortened by recent regulations of the Public Works Administration and the War Department, according to Secretary George H. Dern of the War Department. The assurance from the Secretary of War comes as a victorious climax to the long campaign of the N. A. A. C. P. to improve the conditions of the levee workers.

"According to the regulations of the Public Works Administration, the unskilled workers on contracts financed by the P. W. A. in the South will receive 40 cents an hour and will work a 30-hour week. A minimum wage of 30 cents an hour and a 48-hour week if the levee workers are included under the code of the general contractors division of the construction industry, now being prepared for the President's signature. This wage and these hours will go into effect on contract work after the P. W. A. funds are no longer appropriated for food control work.

"Every effort is being made by the I. L. D. to force Judge Horton to set a date for the hearing," William L. Patterson, national secretary of the I. L. D., said.

Company Wants White P.O. Clerks

New York, Oct. 13.—Warner Brothers Theatres, Inc., here, has asked the New York post office officials for 150 substitute clerks to work as checkers on attendance at each box office of Warner Bros. in New York, but the request was for WHITE men only.

R. A. Blake, personnel manager for Warner Bros., told a delegation of white and colored clerks that Warner Bros. hired colored people "in their proper places as porters."

The substitute post office clerks association officially turned down the offer on account of the discrimination. Individual white clerks are applying, but the organization turned thumbs down. Protest has been made by the N. A. A. C. P., which declared a score of theatres in New York have colored patronage and these patrons would resent the action of Warner Bros. Protest was also lodged with Postmaster J. J. Kieley against the department issuing any such scheme of discrimination, because all the substitute clerks have passed the same examination and their government treats them all alike.

Charged With Mishandling Funds of Co.

NEW YORK—Oscar Micheaux, creator of colored photoplays, was arrested and jailed under \$2500 bond last Wednesday on a charge of jumping his bail bond of \$500 on complaint of his bondsman John W. Mitchell, 217 West 130th street. Micheaux is scheduled to be tried in special sessions court next Monday.

The original bond obtained his release pending trial on a charge of misappropriating funds on complaint of Frank Schiffman, white manager of the Lafayette theatre, 31st street and Seventh avenue.

When Micheaux left the state, the warrant officer of the local courts could not arrest him, so Mitchell secured his arrest through a state detective. During the past month, Micheaux has been living in Montclair, N. J., but was arrested at Fort Lee Ferry where he was engaged in filming one of his photoplays.

Micheaux claims that he owes Schiffman only \$80, while the latter contends that he owes him a few thousand dollars.

California Negroes Win According to the California Eagle last week the supreme court of the state held recently that property owners cannot segregate Negroes in the sale and the occupation of property.

Possibly this case will find its way to the United States Supreme Court since that body has never passed on the question.

In Des Moines are some properties with this restriction but as yet no case has arisen in Iowa over the question.

Recent reports show that more than 3,000,000 have seen the exhibit at a cost of nineteen cents a cent per person.

It may be compared with trying to send a letter to each of 3,000,000 persons. Postage would be three cents.

There are economies; there are false economies. The withholding of the money for this exhibit would certainly have fallen in the latter class.

An investigation by a local committee showed that the local federal employment committee here sent all Negroes making application for work to Alexander & Repass Bros. Co., who are to commence the construction of a power, while all white applicants were sent to white contractors.

OF course, no objection was made by this firm to hiring Negro workers but two dangerous problems were involved; first, should this firm be out of a job no Negroes would be employed elsewhere; second, should they hire all Negroes it would be a good reason why other contractors should hire all whites.

As stated in an editorial in last week's issue, in order to keep this system fair, someone must stay on the job and watch these clerks who, in spite of the fine spirit exhibited by the heads, use their prejudiced minds to injure the Negro.

CRETINISM

Crebinism is a condition which may be present in babies at the time of birth but is usually never discovered before the third month and usually not before the baby is one year or eighteen months old. It is very important, too, that this condition be discovered before the baby is eighteen months of age because the chances of its growing into normal physical and mental health becomes doubtful if treatment is begun after this time.

The features are coarse, expression dull and listless and the hair is dry and coarse. The neck is short and thick. These symptoms will become evident at about the third or sixth month, and it is at this time they should be taken for examination and treatment.

Treated at this time they become in a reasonably short time healthy, normal babies, physically and mentally.
