RESIDENT HITS LYNCH EVIL

President Roosevelt in his message to Congress Wednesday recognized the unusual cognizance of the unusual of lynching and stated that it is sure punishment is necessary to put a stop to this form lawlessness. These are fine words. We are pleased with his utterance. Other presidents have spoken equally on the subject. However, this question has gone beyond words. Action is needed now. Senator Tamm is scheduled to introduce an anti-lynching bill in Congress this week. There is much to be hoped for such legislation. The fact that the federal government is so deep in financial and has had its control over so many states, the states rights doctrine will not be successfully defended as has been the case in the past.

Bystander believes that federal powers only can put a stop to lynching. There is no reason why an anti-lynching bill should not become a law this session of Congress.

VANISHING ILLITERACY

This week Dean Kelly Miller toward University writes an article "Vanishing Illiteracy." Statistics are so valuable a portion of it is quoted in worth preserving for future information: The Census Office is issuing a series of interesting and valuable bulletins on various topics concerning the Negro race. Recently two such bulletins have been issued on Negro illiteracy. An illiterate person is defined as one over ten years of age who can neither read nor write in any other language. Of 232,556 Negroes over ten years of age, 1,513,892 were reported as illiterate. This constituted 16.5 percent compared with 22.9 percent in 1929, and 24 percent in 1910. The bulk of illiterates fell in the South as has been expected. North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Mississippi and Louisiana had a hundred thousand illiterate each, ranging from 177,695 in Mississippi to 139,105 in North Carolina. The North Negro illiteracy is negligible quantity, amounting to .7 percent, while in the West it is still only 3.3 percent. The bulletin released Dec. 12 contains statistics covering fifty-three states containing over 15,000 Negroes in New Orleans and Birmingham and at the foot of the list with the largest absolute number of illiterate, New Orleans, 14,107 and Birmingham 11,875. The highest rates of illiteracy are found by Charleston, Columbia, South Carolina, Montgomery, and Beaumont, ranging from 23.1 to 19.4 percent. Boston, New York, Chicago, the Negroes show a lower illiteracy than the whites as follows for the two races. Negro illiterates 1.9 percent, 2.2; New York, Negro 2.1, 2.6; Chicago, Negro 2.2, white 3.2; Gary, Negro 3.3, white 3.2. Several important points from analysis of these reports on illiteracy is a rapidly decreasing quantity and will disappear in the next two or three decades. Illiteracy is limited to adults especially in the West and in the cities. It is a surprising fact that the Negro has a higher rate of illiteracy than the whites in such northern cities as New York, and Boston. In the South, however, the Negro is more than twice as illiterate as the white.

RESIDENT HITS LYNCH EVIL

President Roosevelt in his message to Congress Wednesday gave cognizance of the unusual nature of lynching and stated that a sure punishment is necessary to put a stop to this form lawlessness. These are fine words. We are pleased with their utterance. Other presidents have spoken equally strongly on the subject.

However, this question has gone beyond words. Action is needed now. Senator Clegg is scheduled to introduce an anti-lynching bill in Congress this week. There is much sentiment for such legislation.

The view of the fact that the federal government is so deep in debt financially and has handed its control over so many things that we have called state powers, the states rights doctrine will not be successfully defended as has been the case in the past.

The Bystander believes that federal powers only can put a stop to lynching. There is no other reason why an anti-lynching bill should not become a law this session of Congress.
