Dr. W. E. B. DuBois to Speak Here Monday Night

Congressman DePriest To Put Senate Cafe Jim Crow Protests Before House Charles Abernathy, Busch Heir Kidnaped, Asks For Pardon Noted Lecturer to Talk

Petitions Urge Quick Action of Congress

Washington.—(ANP)—Opportunity for sheep congressmen to be separated from goat congressmen was provided Monday morning when Congressman Oscar DePriest filed a petition, with the clerk of the House to order from the Committee of Rules his resolution concerning the barring of Negroes from the public restaurant of the House.

The Committee on Rules, which has had the resolution for 30 days, refused to vote it out for consideration on the floor of the house, thus attempting to choke it. It will therefore be necessary for DePriest to find 145 signatures to a petition to force it out.

Unless Mr. DePriest can find 145 sheep among the congressional horde, his resolution will die and the way will be paved to permanently bar Negroes from the public restaurant in the House. It is necessary that congressmen be informed by wire or letter that colored Americans are opposed to such an American discrimination.

Burns M. E. Church in Special Services Sunday

To celebrate final Property Settlement By Everett Wadsworth (Staff writer)

According to an announcement made this week by the Rev. H. L. Overton, pastor Burns M. E. church, 915

Crocker street, special services will be held Sunday, March 11, celebrating the final property settlement on their church. The sixth anniversary of the new church home was observed January 14. Plans are now being made to honor the 60th anniversary of the

oldest Negro congregation in Des Moines, early in May, according to the pastor.

Guest Speaker. Rev. Overton will deliver a special sermon at the Sunday morning services at 11 a. m. The Rev. J. A. Alexander, pastor of St. Paul A. M. E. church will be the guest speaker at the afternoon services at 3 o'clock. Bishop Mathew W. Clair of Covington, Ky., was invited to attend but business affairs will prevent his appearance here. The final report of the settlement will be given at the evening services. A musical program will be given.

Eighth Year Pastorate. The church properties, including edifice and parsonage, were bought at the cost of \$1,350; the church was purchased four years for \$8,000 and the parsonage is expected to be paid for soon, according to the pastor. Rev. Overton will close his eighth year pastorate here when he attends the Central West conference, on April 29, at Denver, Colo.

Burns, one of the city's leading churches, now includes over two hundred members; the membership, which worshipped at 10th and Park streets, in 1928, numbered forty. James Bush is the only active member of the five trustees who signed the second articles of incorporation in 1900. Rev. T. S. Wells was its first pastor in 1865.

Jefferson City, Mo.—Charles Abernathy, St. Louis, who has served three years of a 15-year term for robbing and kidnaping August Busch, Orthwein, was given a hearing Tuesday by the state parole board.

No action was taken on the parole application, which recalled the abduction of the heir to the Busch brewery fortunes. Although there were 32 requests that Abernathy be paroled, the circuit judge, prosecuting attorney and St. Louis county sheriff all opposed it.

JOE BROWN ENDORSES JOE ALLEN

Editor Bystander: I was very much pleased to note in last Saturday's Tribune the announcement of former Senator Joe Allen as a candidate for Mayor of Des Moines; for of all those who have announced themselves for this particular office, he has the longest and most favorable record in his attitude toward our particular racial group.

When I entered Iowa University, many years ago, Allen was about to graduate from that institution; but even though he was a proud senior and his superior freshman and the only Negro in the institution, he even there proved himself friendly to me.

Later, in the year 1913, when he had become a member of the State Senate and a committee composed of the late Geo. H. Woodson, the late R. N. Hyde and myself, as representatives of the old Afro-American Council, the race organization which preceded the N. A. A. C. P., were exerting every effort to kill the pernicious Jim Crow Marriage Bill, that had already passed the lower House, it was largely through his assistance, that we were able to kill this Bill in the Senate.

After having served for fourteen years as State Senator, from a district in Northwestern Iowa, Senator Allen came to Des Moines in 1918, since which time I have been associated with him both in the legal profession and in a business corporation of which he and I are members; and notwithstanding the fact that I happen to be the only Negro member of this corporation, it is largely through his efforts that I am today serving as one of the seven members of the Board of Directors of this one hundred fifty thousand dollar corporation; and, I am sure that if elected Mayor of Des Moines, in addition to furthering his program of the reduction of rates of the public utilities, he will also use his influence to see to it that these public utilities, especially those owned by the City, shall give to Negro citizens their proportionate share of the employment they have to distribute.

Crisis Editor at East High School

Dr. W. E. B. Du Bois, who will address the last city-wide forum meeting of the year Monday, March 12, at East High School, is an outstanding author and lecturer. His subject is "Problems of Race and Color." Who has this to say concerning him: A. B. degrees from Fisk University and Harvard University, A. M. Harvard University, Ph. D. Harvard University, studied at the University of Berlin. Married a Cedar Rapids, Iowa, girl. Has been professor of Economics and History at Atlanta University, Director of publicity for the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People and editor of "The Crisis" magazine since 1910. Has written numerous books, some of the better known of which are "The Souls of Black Folk," "Dark Water," "The Negro."

During the last 30 years Dr. Du Bois has lectured at nearly all the larger American universities and colleges, at international gatherings in London, Paris, Brussels, Geneva, Lisbon, before scores of Women's Clubs, Young Men's and Women's Associations, City Clubs, Social Centers, Churches, High Schools and Public Forums. He has traveled in Germany, Russia, Turkey, Greece, Asia Minor, Austria, Italy, France, Spain, England, Scotland, West Africa and the West Indies, in Canada and Mexico and in every American state.

Arthur J. Esters addressed the Berwick Unity League Sunday evening, March 4, on the "Evils of Lynching." The league is composed of young white men and women who live in and near the town of Berwick, Iowa. The meetings are held in the Methodist church there although the group is non-sectarian.

The proposed law against the crime of lynching were discussed and the unfairness to the Negro economically were related by the speaker. Mr. Esters is the owner of the La Marguerite Hotel and the father of Marguerite Esters, profession officer who is now in Baltimore employed in government social work.

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Woman Says She Has Letter Written by the Saviour

FIND LETTER WRITTEN BY CHRIST?

REACHES 100th BIRTHDAY

Virginia Family Kept Copy for Many Years Prior to Its Discovery

LETTER PRINTED HERE

CAMPBELL, S. C.—A letter, which according to popular belief was written by the Saviour while He was on earth ministering to men, at last has found its way into a newspaper.

Mrs. E. F. Johnson, Campbell, route 3 has a copy of the following clipping from a newspaper telling of the letter supposed to have been written by the Saviour. This interesting article, over 200 years ago, fell into the hands of a family living in Stafford County, Virginia, who during all this lapse of time kept it in their possession. It was handed down from one member to another until it reached O. I. Never passed out of the family until 1870, when one of them upon her death had given a copy to Mrs. M. F. Towson, a neighbor. Mrs. Towson gave a copy to her niece, Mrs. T. E. Fletcher, who is a first cousin to ex-Governor William Smith, of Virginia, and she gave a copy to the Rev. P. C. Fletcher, her son, who is now living in Rome and from whom The Tribune procured a copy.

This is the first time during the 1700 years of its existence that it has ever been in print. Those who have a copy of this wonderful letter written by the blessed Saviour's own hands, prize it very highly and believe in its genuineness. When it was copied, written for Mrs. M. F. Towson, August 21, 1870, and given to P. C. Fletcher with her blessing February 15, 1890.

History of the Finding. Glory be to God, peace on earth and good will to all men. Being a letter written by our blessed Saviour, Jesus Christ, and found eighteen miles from Iconium, 65 years after our blessed Saviour's crucifixion, translated from the Holy City by a converted Jew, faithfully translated from the original of the Lady Cabasses family at Mesopotamia.

This letter was written by Jesus and found under a rock stone both round and long, at the foot of the cross, eighteen miles from Iconium, near the village called Mesopotamia. Upon the stone was written and engraved: "Blessed is

NEGRO TOLD BY BISHOP TO THINK

Tells Scribe He Will Live 'Until Nature Says 'Stop' in Special Interview

JACKSON, Tenn., Mar. 2—As all others are, this writer was welcomed to the home of Bishop Isaac Lane which stands overlooking the site of the college that bears his name, at Lane avenue at Landon street. I was met by his daughter, who is the daughter of a family of seven children the other daughter, Mrs. Jennie Cleaves, is a resident of St. Louis, Mo. The two living sons are president E. E. Lane of Lane college and Mr. Josh Lane, retired letter carrier of this city.

Health Vigorous. The Bishop, a personage of good proportions, was at rest on a comfortable lounge in a most spacious room and to my surprise was up and ready with his wit, with the assistance of his daughter, of course, much faster than middle aged or younger men. In answer to a question as to how he accounted for his long span of life he stated: "I observe the laws of health and the desire to amount to something. In life I tried to fill my life because I did not wish a blank life." "The Bishop said that my life span is one hundred and twenty years. I am going to live until nature says stop. I do not have any hatred for anyone, not even the owners that let me feel the lash."

Tells Us To Think. In discussing the pitfalls of our people the speaker, said that reading causes men to think and since thought must have some source he advised us to get our thoughts from a good source for the origination of thought.

I learned that the Bishop has lived at 410 LaCrosse street since 1898, that he eats three meals a day at nine and retires at eleven, has had a Bible on the corner of his table every day throughout the years, reads several chapters of it each day and also without the use of eyeglasses, reads the daily papers. He is also proud of a radio which was recently purchased at a reduction, courtesy, Whitelaw's Furniture Co.

\$60 Down, Lane College. He paid sixty dollars down on the land where Lane college is now situated, the land which was four acres and was selling for \$100 per acre. This land was purchased from Mr. Wyatt Taylor, father of the Mayor and Chief of Police of the city, and he is now selling it for a balance of \$360.00 on the property and many of his friends said that he would never be able to pay it. A Mr. Duke Williams, then interested in the Second National Bank, advised him early on the corner of the college. Establish Self Respect. Turning to the younger generation in answer to a question, he stated that all young men and women should see to it that they establish respect. People should establish confidence in people with whom they deal.

Named For Baptist Preacher. The late Lane college, he was named had a somewhat of an administration for a Baptist preacher, and because of the life of the preacher, he was named Lane.

Intending to burn only the woman who had spurned his love, John Allen was himself burned to death Monday morning in a fire at 1063 Lamar. The woman, Evelyn B. Allen, was also a victim of the flames.

It was learned by The World that Allen had gone to the residence on Lamar, owned by the woman's father, in an effort to get her to come back to him and continue her relationship as his common-law wife. When efforts at reconciliation failed, he grew angry. Seizing a can of kerosene, he drenched the woman with the fluid and set her afire.

But before he could get away the flames engulfed him. A hand Langston ambulance, driven by Adolph Yollenstein, rushed a couple to the hospital within a few minutes but it was too late to save the life of either.

Sergeant Caldwell investigated the case. Firemen were able to prevent a great amount of damage to the house.

After the attack, Mrs. Green was brought to the hospital by friends. In the excitement following the attack, Mrs. Green was unable to give a full account of the incident. Police are investigating the affair.

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
