FIVE WOUNDED; DINING ROOM IS BATTLE SCENE OF TRAGEDY

Charleston, W. Va. (CNS)—The State-school for Negro deaf and blind was the scene of a double killing on Friday, April 13, when the superintendent, James L. Hill, drew a revolver and killed on faculty member, wounded five others and shot himself. The shooting occurred at the close of a talk by Hill while 42 students and the school employes were at breakfast.

After the shooting in the dining room, Hill left the scene and later was found dead in a private office across from the dining room, he having shot himself. The man he killed was W. B. Ellison, Jr., instructor in tailoring. The shooting brought disclosure by the state board of control that accounts of tailor and barber shops operated by the school have been under investigation.

BROOKS EXPECTS TO SHATTER BROAD JUMP MARK

More than 2,000 athletes will strive for athletic honors in the "Midwestern Olympiad" as the twenty-fifth annual Drake Relays get in full swing, Friday and Saturday, April 27-28. A mammoth band of 3,000 pieces, probably the largest ever assembled under one director, will play at the stadium during the two athletic carnival. The expected crowd of 20,000, will witness a grand parade of athletes, pageantry of relay queens, judges' award stand, and Ivan Fuqua and Charles Hornbostel, Indiana's crack middle distance stars, Glen Cunningham, Kansas' world record miler, and other familiar names in track fame at the silver anniversary relays.

Three individual Negro champions will return to defend their laurels. John Brooks, Chicago, winner of the broad jump the past two years, will try to further establish the Negro's supremacy in this event by attempting a new meet record. Eddie Gordon, Iowa's Olympic ace, won this event previously three years in succession. In 1932 Brooks shattered the 8-year record of 24 feet 2 1/2 inches established in 1924 by DeHart Hubbard, Michigan Negro luminary, with a leap of 24 feet, 8 1/2 inches. On the heavy runway, Brooks' best mark last year was 24 feet 3 inches, made in the preliminaries.

Nation's Best

Ralph Metcalfe, the Marquette flash who is competing his third time here, will attempt to set a world mark of 29.2 in the century Saturday in this special attraction. He will compete against the cream of the nation's dash men; Coach Conrad Jennings and his crew will leave Milwaukee Wednesday for the relays.

Willis Ward, all-round marvel of Des Moines, in his second year's appearance in the relays, will enter the century and boys from other schools couldn't get much hope on.

Prof. Davis in Recital Monday

Hundreds have attended the revival services conducted at Corinthian Baptist Church this week by Prof. E. C. Davis of Chicago, gospel song writer and composer of Negro spirituals. He will be heard in a song recital Monday evening at the church assisted by chorus of fifty. This will probably be his final appearance in Des Moines this spring. He will return to Chicago immediately following the concert.

Returns in Fall

Prof. Davis, who has travelled from coast-to-coast organizing gospel choirs and jubilee choruses, is the music director at the Greater Union Baptist Church in Chicago. His singing groups number over one hundred fifty voices. He has charge of the music department of the National Baptist convention and Baptist Sunday School congress. The composer expects to return to Des Moines in the fall to sponsor a city-wide chorus and symphonic group of one thousand people to be presented at the leading churches here. Tentative plans will be made Sunday at a meeting of local ministers.

Large Congregation

Three thousand persons attended the three services at Corinthian last Sunday, according to Rev. G. W. Robinson, pastor, in a statement to the press this week. "Over four hundred attended my Sunday School and the congregations are increasing each week," he said. Records show that sixty-six members have been added to the church roll since Christmas.

MEASURE SLATED FOR ARGUMENT ON FLOOR ABOUT MAY 1

New York, April 20—The Costigan-Wagner federal antilynching bill likely to be passed by the senate if it can be got on the floor for a vote" says Walter White, N. A. C. P. secretary, who returned here from conferences in Washington with Senators Costigan, Wagner and Van Nuys. Senators Wagner and Costigan have pledged to take the measure to the floor of the senate about May 1 after three important bills, now before the senate, have been acted upon. The sugar, tax, and air mail bills will probably have the right of way for the present and that no bill can make any headway until they are disposed of.

The anti-lynching bill was reported out favorably to the senate April 12, by the full judiciary committee. Senator Van Nuys of Indiana, and Senator Henry F. Ashurst of Arizona stood firmly against any attempts in the committee to sidetrack the bill or smother it in committee. Unofficially it is reported that Senator Ashurst, chairman of the judiciary committee, has received 5,000 telegrams and letters urging passage of the bill. Hundreds of messages have been received by other senators, but more are needed to insure passage of this important measure.

Scottsboro Boys Being Tricked, Report Officials

N. A. A. C. P. LAWYERS ARE NOT TRYING TO GET SCOTTSBORO CASE

New York, April 20—In a letter to Samuel S. Lebowitz, chief attorney for the Scottsboro boys, Walter White, secretary of the N. A. A. C. P., denied a statement in a New York daily alleging that the prison warden at Birmingham, Ala., is threatening certain Scottsboro defendants "with dire consequences if they should not dispend with the services of the International Labor Defense, a Communist organization, and accept counsel, offered by the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People."

"We sincerely trust, wrote Mr. White, "that in this you are not being made the victim of propaganda. . . . We wish to state unequivocally that the N. A. A. C. P. has since our withdrawal from the case in January, 1932, when the defendants chose to be defended by counsel retained by the International Labor Defense. This Association has had no communication of any nature whatever with the defendants since that date." The only connection which this Association has had with the case" has been that of fulfilling to the letter a written agreement with the I. L. D. made on April 2, 1932. This agreement provided that those persons who prefer contributing to the legal defense of the defendants through the N. A. A. C. P. could do so."

National Broadcast on May 11

Washington, D. C.—Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt will address the National Conference on Fundamental Problems in the Education of Negroes in Washington on May 11 at 10:30 a. m. E. S. T. Dr. George R. Zook, United States Commissioner of Education announced this week. The address will be broadcast over the Red and Blue networks of the National Broadcasting Company.

The Conference, sponsored by the Office of Education of the U. S. Department of the Interior, has been called by Secretary of the Interior Harold L. Ickes. The conference of Education Zook is general chairman, and Dr. Ambrose Calver, Federal Specialist in Negro Education, is director. The general purpose of the Conference is to study how education may be made more vital and effective in the life of the colored race.

NO LOSSES

KEEP THE FIGHT UP

While no Iowa senators are up for election this year, the Bystander thinks that Iowans should know that Senator L. J. Dickinson states that he will vote for the bill while Senator Louis Murphy has not shown the Des Moines branch of the N. A. A. C. P. the courtesy of a reply.

ABOUT TAKING MEDICINES

Medicines should be taken exactly as prescribed. The directions on a bottle of medicine, or on a box of pills, or powders, or in whatever way the dispensing is done, will usually read: "one teaspoonful three times daily" or "one tablespoonful morning and evening" or "one or two pills, three times daily, after meals" or "two pills at night on retiring" or "one powder in three fourths of a glass of cold water" or one tablet dissolved in half a glass of cold water, until effervescence ceases" or "one powder in a glass of cold water, to be stirred with a spoon until completely dissolved" or the prescription may read, "two capsules, when received, followed by one capsule every three hours until relief is obtained." Taking this last instruction as an example: many patients take two capsules when received, and two capsules every three hours, and even continue the dosage long after relief is obtained, with the idea, I suppose, of completely eliminating the condition.

In many cases this will do no harm, and in other cases, conditions resulting from an excessive taking of the medicine, show themselves. For instance: one medicine is taken as follows—"begin with one drop, three times daily after meals, and increase one drop each day until ten drops are taken three times daily." This medicine should not be increased beyond this maximum dosage of ten drops and should not be continued longer than the physician directs. There are so many varieties of medicines and so many ways of giving them for typical and atypical forms of diseases, that best results are obtained by taking them exactly as specified on the labels. Aside from cures, within a reasonable limited time, accomplished by following directions to the word, there are certain dangers incurred by taking more than the stated dosage and at more frequent intervals than specified.
