GIRLS HELP NEGROES; JAILED FOR PICKETING

RED CHARGES
HURLED AT STUDENTS

Chicago—Accused of being "reds" because they joined in with inmates of the closed relief shelter at 4949 Indiana avenue, two white University of Chicago girls were arrested along with four Negro boys and held before Judge Thomas A. Green in municipal court this week. Virginia Miller and Margaret Hayward and Tony Morton, George Jones, Luther Watson and Nathan Dixon were held. Protest picketing by the six was against the sending of the 370 young inmates to alleged "convict camps" at Danville and Cairo, Ill., to work for fifty cents a week. To force the youths to accept, officials of the transient bureau in Illinois closed down the shelter at 4949 Indiana avenue, the picketers claim.

WOMAN HELD AS
FRATERNAL LEADER DIES

Refusal to Keep Promise of Marriage Believed Cause of Trouble
Denver, Colo., Aug. 30.—Dr. E. W. D. Abner, 67 ear old physician and surgeon and former supreme commander of the Woodmen of the World, died in a local hospital Tuesday night of bullet wounds of the stomach.

In the county jail languishes the doctor's 31 year old sweetheart, Miss Eleanor Smith, who would make no statement to reporters, but it was learned authoritatively the trouble which climaxed in Dr. Abner's bedroom resulted from a quarrel over his refusal to carry out a promise to marry Miss Smith.

Physicians Tells of Southern Farm Life

DR. JEFFERSON ATTENDS
MEDICAL CONVENTION

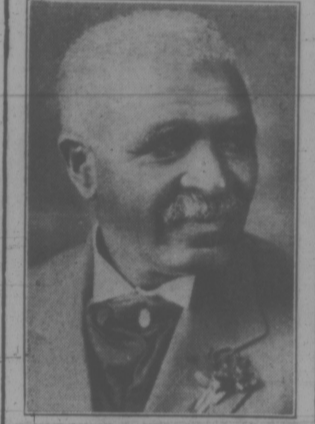

"Farm life in Alabama, Arkansas, Mississippi and Louisiana is not very favorable, and in my opinion not much is being done to make life worth while." Dr. J. Alvir Jefferson said in a statement to the press Wednesday. He returned Saturday from a vacation trip and attending the National Medical association held August 11-18 in New Orleans, La. Piney Woods school and Tuskegee Institute were visited. He was much impressed with the \$3,000 power and light plant on the campus of the Alabama school.

Shacks, unfit for even their live stock, are the homes of most of the Negro tenant farmers, the physician said. "Something should be done to enhance the health of these people and systematic aid should be given as an incentive to better living conditions." In the entire journey by motor through the south the doctor encountered but one unpleasant incident in service at gas stations. All other attendants were courteous and gave excellent attention to the Negro motorist.

At the convention in New Orleans, which met at Dillard university and was attended by dentists and pharmacists, Dr. Jefferson responded to the welcome address extended by the St. James A. M. E. church, the oldest in the denomination, being organized in 1848. Dr. Jefferson's paper, "Irradiated Milk," and the showing of films on "Technique of Breast Feeding" were features of the meeting. He told of the interest displayed in the pediatrics section, which he has tried for many years to emphasize, as Dr. Jefferson is national pediatrics chairman. Roscoe Giles of Chicago was elected president. The 1936 meeting will be in Philadelphia.

Two Cars
"We left the Central Christian church Monday morning, August 12, in two cars, arriving at Mt. Beulah college in Edwards, Miss., Wednesday evening. En route we also visited the "Crystal Cave" in Springfield, Mo. Mt. Beulah college is a very lovely place, consisting of 1,285 acres, part of which is farmed, some in woodland and remainder is rented

During the school year there are around two hundred students, but during the summer only fifty stay and work to help pay for their education. Saturday morning we went to Tougaloo college, a beautiful place, but summer school was over and no students remain in the summer to work, so we continued to Piney Woods school, arriving late Saturday evening. We stayed there until Wednesday morning.

Piney Woods
Piney Woods has about the same number of students and 1,520 acres of land divided among the campus, from the plantation. The social life of Piney Woods is very interesting. They have evening socials, where they march and play games, which are very enjoyable. We all had heard so much about the southern hospitality, but paid little attention to it, but after being in the south our selves for a day or so we changed

Lynch Filibuster Causes Word Battle

SENATOR BAILEY
LIED, SAYS WHITE

Washington, Aug. 30.—Senator Josiah W. Bailey, of North Carolina, one of the leaders in the filibuster against the Costigan-Wagner anti-lynching bill, clashed verbally this week with Walter White, secretary of the N. A. A. C. P., when the latter charged the southern senator of deliberate distortion of facts regarding the lynching of Govan Ward, Lottsburg, N. C., on July 30th.

The wordy battle was started as a result of a telegram sent Senator Bailey by the association following the successful filibuster against the Costigan-Wagner anti-lynching bill in which the North Carolinian was a leader. The N. A. A. C. P. secretary charges Senator Bailey with lying unless North Carolina can and does apprehend and punish Ward's lynchers.

Italian Plane is Shot Down In Ethiopia as War Nears

EVACUATION OF ADDIS ABABA
REPORTED UNDER WAY AS
V. & R. CLOUDS GATHER

Addis Ababa—Rumblings of war clouds, reminiscent of an August 21 years ago, grew louder here Monday when it was reported that an Italian airplane, said to have been disguised as an Ethiopian craft, was shot down on Ethiopian soil by troops of Haile Selassie and the two aviators taken prisoners. Although definite information could not, as yet, be obtained, it was generally believed that the craft, bearing Ethiopian colors, had been brought down by gunfire from the Abyssinian soldiers. The prisoners were said to have been taken to Harrar.

War is momentarily expected here and evacuation of the city has already begun. Italian residents and the Italian legation are reported to have departed and requests for pro-

Louise Beavers Appears On Program Directed by George Garner

San Diego, Cal., Aug. 30—In a brilliant program featuring spirituals, camp meeting songs and folk songs of the race as interpreted through choral, instrumental and solo numbers, Negro Day was observed at the California-Pacific International Exposition here last week.

George Garner, nationally known Chicago vocalist, was in charge of the program on which appeared such artists as the Exposition Negro Festival Chorus, Netta Paulyn Garner, Maxine Edwards and chorus, the official exhibition band under the direction of Joseph De Luca and others.

One of the outstanding features of the program, which was attended by thousands of the visitors and delegates representing the Race in practically every state of the union, was

the presentation of Miss Louise Beavers, screen celebrity, in excerpts from "Imitation of Life," the vehicle in which she achieved cinematic heights heretofore unknown to members of the Race. She was accompanied by the chorus, under the direction of Mr. Garner.

To "Turn State's Evidence?"

State's evidence is the evidence produced by the government in criminal prosecution. The term also applies to a person who gives such evidence. When a person implicated in a crime voluntarily confesses his share and voluntarily testifies against the other participants in the crime, he is said to "turn state's evidence," namely, he becomes a witness for the state. Prosecutors do not usually promise such immunity unless there is sufficient evidence to convict the defendant without the testimony in question.—Pathfinder Magazine.

rain to fight nobler battles than we have ever witnessed. God has accomplished His purpose; sent out rain-javelins of warfare, beat the enemies back because the oldest civilization in the world sits pleading for peace; therefore God's going to her to stand because Italy is wrong. If Italy jumps on Ethiopia, Japan will jump on Italy, and if Japan jumps on Italy the colored races of the world will engage in a warfare with the white races. AND WIN.

I am against war! Every Christian ought to be for peace. But if you try for peace and can't get it—if you have to fight, FIGHT LIKE HELL! (Prolonged applause.) I think Ethiopia is like the sinner who was asked by the Minister: "What you going to do when the world's on fire?" He answered, "I'm going to run like hell and holler like the devil."

Some of the largest funds, including Slater's and others, are trying to stir up world-wide consciousness that will protect Africa in this warfare. Jail Fugitive On Charges Of Murder

LOUISVILLE, Ky.— Dubois Pearson, 22, of North Chicago, Ill., charged with murder, in connection with the killing of Richard Kelley, a special agent of the Illinois Central Railroad in the Paducah yards about three months ago was brought to Louisville, Saturday morning from Chicago by U. S. Marshal William H. McDonald and was turned over to the local authorities, awaiting word of the Paducah authorities where he will be taken back to answer federal charges placed against him there. Besides the murder charge, the federal charges are breaking box car seals and entering a common carrier used in interstate commerce and being a fugitive from justice.

Pearson was interviewed at the county jail by our reporter. He was reported making a statement that he was afraid to go back to Paducah for fear of foul play. Pearson is accused along with Edward Simpson, 22, who is also being held in the Eddyville penitentiary.

WHERE TO BUY

"When you buy anything you have just two things to consider—what you pay and what you get" reads a letter from a prominent company seeking business of the Bystander this week. In most cases this would be sufficient, but to the Negro market there is another angle that ought to be considered by those who have something to sell.

Generally, a customer is not desirable if he has no job. A merchant is not worthy of support if he is not willing to return to the group some of the money it spends with him.

Here in Des Moines we have hundreds of Negroes regularly employed. Some of the establishments seeking their trade hire some Negro help and advertise in the Negro paper. Some do neither. As between the two, the former merchant should be chosen every time for in this way only can we use our buying power to get some of the things we want.

So when you buy you should have an additional thing in view, namely, what does this firm offer to our group?

THE WRONG ANGLE

An article appearing in a popular magazine recently said Joe Louis was entitled to a chance to win the heavyweight title from the white race. The Bystander objects strenuously to any such statement not only because it is not correct but has a tendency to create race friction.

A championship fight is not between the black and white fighter, but the two topnotchers in the ring and the fact that in this case one happens to be black and the other white is merely incidental.

After all the winner will be the champion of the world and not of a restricted group.

COOPERATION NEEDED

The attitude of Italy in its dispute with Ethiopia is a striking illustration of a country which considers solemn treaties as mere scraps of paper when they interfere with their program.

The concrete illustration raises a question of how forceful any combination of nations can ever be which has nothing but moral suasion to enforce its decisions.

Of course, if the League of Nations or any other group insists on sidestepping issues brought to them for decision rather than face the situation squarely for fear of stepping on some nation's toes, we are not going to get very far in our system of voluntary cooperation for peace by nations. The masses of people want peace. But the masses must learn eventually that it cannot have peace unless their neighbors are at peace.

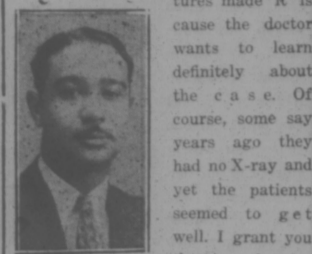

Dental Health Education Hints

By Dr. Millard R. Dean

THE VALUE OF X-RAY PICTURES

When your doctor or physician urges you to have X-ray pictures made it is cause the doctor wants to learn definitely about the case. Of course, some say years ago they had no X-ray and yet the patients seemed to get well. I grant you that in a few instances such was the case but in the majority of others the correct diagnosis was not made nor the right treatment given.



The X-ray picture shows the dentist the conditions of the bones of the body and especially if there is any destruction or infections of the bones. Also objects such as teeth, bullets, or abscess sacs are visible. Then, too, X-ray of the remainder of the body along with fluoroscopic views can determine the conditions of other organs and tissues such as liver, stomach, lungs, intestines, etc.

Supposing that your dental X-ray or taken and show no abscesses, pyorrhea pockets or small pieces of tooth, even then the cost of the picture was not wanted. By not finding any trouble in the mouth tissues and teeth the dentist can eliminate these areas as a possible cause of infection of pain and the patient is assured that the region is in good condition. If however as is so often the case small roots or cysts or pyorrhea pockets are discovered so that they can be taken care of before the condition gets worse and the infection spreads.

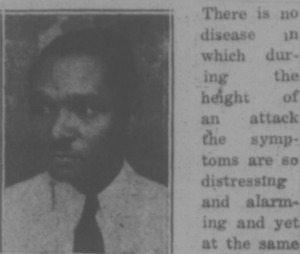

Health Talks

By Dr. C. R. Bradford

BRONCHIAL ASTHMA

One of the most alarming and distressing of all conditions is bronchial asthma.



There is no disease in which during the height of an attack the symptoms are so distressing and alarming and yet at the same time are so free from danger. The disease may manifest itself at any age, but is most often seen in earlier life, male being more subject to the disease than females.

The attack may occur suddenly or it may be preceded by some of the following symptoms: Drowsiness, neuralgia, itching, irritability or sneezing. The first evidence of the attack itself is a feeling of tightness or oppression in the chest. The attack may occur at any time, but usually occurs in the night. The patient goes to bed feeling perfectly well, when he is suddenly awakened by a feeling of suffocation or constriction about the chest.

The difficulty in breathing rapidly increases, with the patient's face becoming pale and anxious and covered with cold perspiration. During the height of the attack cough is inconspicuous, but as the attack subsides, expectoration usually occurs, which finally becomes white and frothy. The duration of an attack may last from ten to fifteen minutes to several days.

The exciting causes of asthma are many. Some individuals who are sensitive to the pollen of various weeds suffer frequent attacks during the hay fever seasons. The inhalation of various dusts or odors frequently bring on attacks and sometimes the indigestion of certain foods. Treatment for these attacks are varied and many. The treatment is directed at giving immediate relief.

If the attack is severe enough, a physician should be called, who will usually give immediate relief by giving the patient a hypodermic or adrenalin, which causes a relaxation of the bronchioles of the lungs (air sac), which are in a spasm of contraction. Further treatment will be given when necessary. Hope of cure from medicine is impossible.
