Heywood Patterson Found Guilty in Fourth Trial

Judge Bond's Opinion Declares Separate Schools Must Be Equal

Annapolis, Jan. 24—Maryland's highest court ruled Wednesday, January 15th, that duly qualified Negroes "must, at present, be admitted" to the one school provided for the study of law—the law school of the University of Maryland. The opinion was written by Chief Judge Carrol T. Bond. The ruling was given in the case of Donald G. Murray, Baltimore Negro graduate of Amherst college. The court of appeals upheld the action of the Baltimore city court in granting a writ of mandamus ordering the university to admit Murray to the law school.

The case was carried to court by the N. A. A. C. P. through Attorneys Thurgood Marshall of Baltimore and Charles H. Houston of New York. The Maryland case victory is expected to speed up the progress in the campaign against educational inequalities now being carried on by the N. A. A. C. P. under the direction of Mr. Houston. The association is continuing its assaults upon the barring of Negroes from professional and graduate study and is likely to initiate court action in Virginia soon. Other states in which surveys are being made are North Carolina and Missouri.

In addition to fighting for graduate and professional opportunities, the association's campaign will be against unequal transportation facilities for rural school pupils, inadequate high school facilities, unequal teachers' salaries and unequal length of school

terms, as well as against the whole range of unequal per capita expenditures.

Graduate of Amherst

Murray was graduated from Amherst in 1934 with the degree of bachelor of arts. He contended that his exclusion from the school was authorized by the laws of the state and was a denial of equal rights, contrary to the fourteenth amendment to the constitution of the United States.

The university contended that the law school is not a governmental agency which would be required by the fourteenth amendment to give equal rights to students of both races. It also contended that, if the law school is an agency of the state, the admission of Negro students is not required, because the amendment permits segregation of races for education.

Substitution Held Inadequate

"No separate school for colored students has been decided upon and only an inadequate substitute has been provided. Compliance with the constitution cannot be deferred at the will of the state. Whatever system it adopts for legal education now must furnish equality of treatment now."

"And as in Maryland now the equal treatment can be furnished only in the one existing law school the petitioner, in our opinion, must be admitted there," says the ruling in part.

G. B. Tucker, a former business man of this city and prominent in Democratic circles of the local organization, has been selected to supervise a project which will employ about forty to forty-five Negro boys and girls.

This project will be under the ten million dollar National Youth Administration program to give employment to persons between the ages of 16 to 25 years. Mr. Tucker's administrative staff will consist of one timekeeper and secretary and two sub-supervisors.

It is understood that the ratio will be fifteen girls and twenty-five boys. Mr. Tucker hopes to get his machinery perfected immediately, so as to start operation the first of next week, January 27.

Tucker is commander of the Lincoln American Legion post, vice chairman of Crocker Y. M. C. A. committee of management, member of St. Paul A. M. E. church choir and active in other civic organizations.

Inmate Kills Guard In a Prison Battle

(Special to the Bystander) Anamosa, Iowa—Richard Renicks, Negro state reformatory convict, who killed a prison officer Sunday, faces a charge of first degree murder, County Attorney Marvin Levson said here Wednesday. The case may be turned over to the grand jury pending an interview with Renicks, Levson said.

The victim of the inmate's attack, Charles Strickel, guard in the prison for eighteen years, was buried Tuesday afternoon. Renicks hurled the guard thirty feet to his death from the fourth cell gallery during a fight within the reformatory.

Charles Hall, 55, another cell captain, suffered head and face bruises when he sought to aid Strickel. Martin Norton, another convict, came to the rescue of Hall, who was about to suffer the same fate of his fellow officer. The colored prisoner was subdued by the two men.

According to Warden W. H. Frazier, Renicks was being reprimanded for misconduct when he attacked the guard. The Negro convict was serving a three year sentence for arson in Dubuque county on November 20, 1935. Norton, who now may be paroled, was imprisoned for ten years from Mt. Pleasant for forgery.

Aksum Recaptured By the Ethiopians

Addis Ababa, Jan. 24—Aksum, the capture of Adowa last October, are said by reliable official sources to be practically recaptured by a force of Ethiopian warriors variously estimated to be 100,000 and 200,000.

The holy city, which was surrounded nearly three days ago by fierce native fighters under the generalship of Ras Ayale, a northern chieftain, is virtually occupied by the Ethiopians. Emperor Haile Selassie's northern chieftain, Ras Ayale, was within striking distance of Aksum a little less than a month ago, but according to Ethiopian tradition he was denied the honor of entering the holy city because he once was a bandit.

POET HUGHES BARRED FROM GARY SCHOOL

Gary, Ind., Jan. 24—Langston Hughes, noted poet and author, was refused permission to appear in the Roosevelt high school auditorium in a lecture scheduled Monday by order of an edict coming from William A. Wirt, head of the Gary school system and prominent throughout the country as an educator.

Wirt, who charged president Roosevelt with being in league with Communistic advocates, based his expulsion order on the grounds that "Hughes was a communist and would be a bad influence over the children."

"SANDERS OF THE RIVER" A BEST FILM

London, Eng., Jan. 24—"Sanders of the River," the British film, starring Paul Robeson and Nina MacKinney, American Negro performers, was awarded the gold medal presented by the amateur cinematographers for 1935. This award is equivalent to America's Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Science.

The announcement has been withheld for several weeks, pending the return of Robeson to Europe, although the voting took place several weeks ago.

White Jury Recommends 75 Years' Imprisonment

DECATUR, ALA.—Receiving the case Wednesday night, the all-white jury of northern Alabamians in the fourth trial of Heywood Patterson 23, one of the nine Scottsboro boys, returned the verdict of guilty Thursday for the fourth time. The jury fixed the penalty at 75 years in prison. The three previous convictions had carried death sentences, but were reversed by the U. S. supreme court.

Patterson denied participation in the crime of assaulting Victoria Price at Paint Rock, Ala., on a freight train in 1931, after a battle with some white hoboes, in his testimony which came after the defense twice had been denied motions for mistrials.

He denied that he had made any confession to Olie Golden, Kilby State Prison guard, as Golden had testified for the Tuesday. Samuel W. Liebowitz, chief defense counsel, in would appeal, although he felt the decision a victory in year-old international case.

Decatur, Ala., Jan. 24—Judge W. W. Callahan halted arguments which threatened to consume several hours of the court's time Monday and ordered attorneys to proceed with the fourth trial of Heywood Patterson, one of the nine Scottsboro boys indicted on charges of rape made by Mrs. Victoria Price, white mill worker and hobo.

Before the trial could get under way the defense intervened with an argument, challenging the right of Lieutenant Governor Thomas E. Knight to conduct the prosecution.

Ineligible Atty. C. L. Watts of Huntsville, who is conducting the defense with Samuel Liebowitz of New York and George W. Chamlee of Chattanooga, Tenn., charged that Knight, who as attorney general prosecuted the case in 1933, was ineligible now because he has since been promoted to lieutenant governor.

Under the laws of the state of Alabama, Watts argued that no man is permitted to hold two offices of profit at the same time and that unless Knight resigns the lieutenant governorship he is legally ineligible for conducting the prosecution.

NATION-WIDE SCOTTSBORO MEETINGS JANUARY 26

New York, Jan. 24—Nation-wide meetings in a score or more cities will be held on National Scottsboro Day, Sunday, January 26, it was announced here today by the Scottsboro defense committee. The meetings will be under the auspices of the committee, which is made up of the N. A. A. P., the International Labor Defense, the American Civil Liberties Union, the Methodist Federation for Social Service, the League for Industrial Democracy, and the Church League for Industrial Democracy. Representatives of branches of these organizations in various cities are co-operating in the holding of the meetings.

The defense committee estimates that at least one of the Scottsboro youths will have been tried for the fourth time before the meetings are held, and it is believed that the public will respond with huge meetings to mobilize new sentiment and financial support for the trials.

The New York City meetings will be held in the Hotel Delano on January 26. Among the several speakers will be Norman Thomas, socialist leader, and Roy Wilkins, editor of the Crisis. Most of the meetings are being arranged for the 26th, but in some communities where this is not a suitable time, the meetings are being held either the 25th or the 27th.

Among the cities which expect to hold joint meetings are Philadelphia, Boston, Milwaukee, New Orleans, Pittsburgh, Washington, D. C., Cleveland, Detroit, Baltimore, Chicago, San Francisco, Los Angeles, Richmond, Newark, N. J.

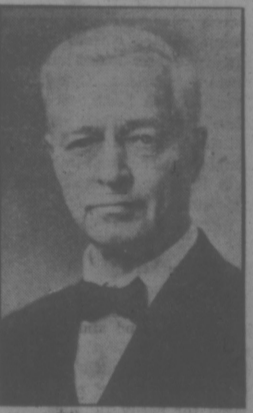

VITAMINS ESSENTIAL FOR CHILDREN

Vitamin A is found in the fats of milk, egg yolk, liver and cod liver oil.

A deficiency of this vitamin will cause stunted growth, retarded development and a dangerous eye disease.

Vitamin B is found in turnips, carrots, potatoes, leafy vegetables, and the seeds of plants. A deficiency of vitamin B causes diseased conditions known as beriberi, malnutrition, loss of appetite and lack of body resistance.

Vitamin C is found in the citrus fruits, tomatoes and milk. Heart partly destroys the strength of this vitamin, orange juice and tomato juice should be given freely.

Vitamin D is found in animal fats, such as cod liver oil and butter fats. Its absence is one of the principal features causing rickets.

Vitamin E is still under study though some believe it has to do with sterility and reproduction. It is found in leafy vegetables, yellow corn and wheat germ.

All of the essential vitamins abundantly supplied by nature, so in selecting food for the young, keep close to nature as possible by using milk, butter, cereals, vegetables, fruits, etc. Do not permit the child to form likes and dislikes for foods but give him the foods necessary for the development of his body.

In winning the outstanding amateur which saw him lift a mediocre Hawkeye eleven to one of the most feared award, announced in last Sunday's Register, Ozzie Simmons climaxed a glorious season of gridiron activity, in the Big Ten conference and himself selected on the All-Big Ten and many All-American teams.

While he gained some renown last year with his flashy running and deft ball handling, Ozzie's work for the season was spotty and marked with inconsistency. It was our privilege to see the Iowa State and the Minnesota games of that year, and while the whole team bogged down, the crowds had their eyes on the "Texas Tornado" and felt disappointed with the showing on those two occasions.

CITY OF MAKALE REPORTED RECAPTURED BY FORCES OF SELASSIE

Addis Ababa, January 17—Rain, malaria and swift attacks under the cover of darkness have brought Italian military operations to a dead stop. The "little rain," which lasts six weeks, already has washed away all of the military roads built by Mussolini's labor battalion for the mechanized army.

Rain has been falling since New Year's eve in the principal areas where the Italians have concentrated their forces for sporadic drives. In the Tigre province, in the north, to Arusi, south of Addis Ababa, the roads are impassable.

Unable to consolidate and retain their positions, the Italians have ordered a general retreat from the Tembien mountain region, north and west of Makale, which they had invaded at the cost of heavy casualties.

An unconfirmed rumor was to the effect that Makale was recaptured by the forces under the command of Ras Seyoum. With their communications dangerously impaired, the Fascist soldiers, who have not been able to advance more than sixty miles on either the southern or the northern front, are now faced with the necessity of withdrawing to Adowa and Adigrat in the north and to Walwal in the south.
