Caucus Leader E. T. Taylor Fails to Send Notices in Time

WASHINGTON, May 29.—Democratic Congressmen held a caucus Friday night on the anti-lynching bill, but failed to take any action upon the excuse that "no quorum" was present. Sixty-five Congressmen, it is reported, were present and the great majority of this number was in favor of acting favorably upon anti-lynching legislation.

The principal reason for failure of Democrats to attend the caucus is the fact that Caucus Leader Edward T. Taylor failed to give the usual forty-eight hours' notice to all Congressmen. Notices were not sent until late Thursday afternoon, scarcely twenty-four hours before the caucus was scheduled to be held. A sharp letter challenging Mr. Taylor for his failure to send official notices of the caucus was sent Saturday by Walter White, Secretary of the N.A.A.C.P.

A great many Congressmen leave Washington Thursday night or Friday morning and attend to business of pleasure over the week-end. When the caucus was set on Friday night, and, furthermore, when notices were delayed until late Thursday afternoon, it found dozens of Congressmen out of the city.

Mr. Taylor had been urged by Representative Joseph Cavanagh of New York to hold the caucus on Monday or Tuesday night, but he refused. Congressman William P. Connery, Jr., of Connecticut, was one of the most faithful supporters. He has very few colored people in his district and he also had a radio broadcast scheduled, but he canceled the broadcast and was present throughout the caucus. Congressman Arthur W. Mitchell opposed the holding of the caucus from the very beginning. He did not sign the petition asking for it.

Chicago Welcomes Col. John Robinson

CHEERING THROUGH GREETS WAR HERO UPON HIS ARRIVAL
Chicago—Chicago welcomed home its hero of the Ethiopian war Sunday afternoon when more than 20,000 men, women and children joined in a rip-roaring reception for Colonel John C. Robinson, the "Brown Condor" or Emeror Halle Selassie's royal air force.

Not in history has there been such a demonstration as was accorded the 31 year old Chicago aviator who left the United States thirteen months ago and literally covered himself with glory trying to preserve the independence of the last African empire.

Arrival from New York
Anxiously awaiting his arrival from New York, where he had been since his return from Europe a week ago, a crowd of 5,000 persons gathered at the municipal airport and acclaimed their hero as he stepped from the TWA plane.

Police lines were broken by the admiring throng which rushed to the ace war pilot and showered him with flowers, kisses, hand shakes and words of cheer.

Official
The official committee to greet the colonel included officers and members of practically every military, political, social civic and church organization among the race.

Heads Parade
With two motorcycle police as escorts, the colonel headed an automobile procession in the parade, which was climaxed with a mammoth celebration in which Colonel Robinson spoke from the balcony of the Grand hotel to a waiting throng of some ten thousand persons, who filled the square from Fifth to Fifty-first street.

The cars in the line of march numbered at least 500 and extended two miles. Traffic was completely paralyzed as the procession moved along the boulevards.

The "highly seasoned" food was the order for four of the men; the other two were forced to wait quite some time. Finally the cashier, called their attention to the waitress who had donned her hat and coat and was leaving the place, with this statement "Gentlemen, I'm sorry, but we can't serve you because the waitress has walked out on us." The Negro patrons noticed that the other eleven who were present were being waited on.

Charges of violation of the state's civil rights laws and tampering with food, a criminal offense, were filed Monday morning in the municipal court against the establishment.

Negro Democrats Indorse New Deal

MEASE RE-ELECTED STATE CHAIRMAN

The third annual convention of the Iowa Negro Democratic League was brought to a successful close at the dinner and rally held at St. Paul A. M. E. church Saturday night. W. F. Reden of Sioux Falls, S. D., a member of the South Dakota department of Justice, headed an imposing group of speakers following the banquet that included a number of state officials. Mr. Reden addressed the large group on the subject: "Why the Negro should support the New Deal."

Other speakers included Mrs. Alex Miller, Secretary of State; Ray Murray, secretary of agriculture, who represented Governor Clyde L. Herring; Congressman Hubert Utterback; Leo Wegman, state treasurer, and Henry Mease, chairman of the league.

Morning and afternoon sessions of the organization were held at the Blue Triangle Y. W. C. A. and registrations of delegates showed an increase of fifty percent over the 1935 convention total, representatives from all of the stronger clubs in the state being present.

The following state officers were re-elected: H. U. Mease, chairman; Lawrence Chapman, corresponding secretary; Gertrude North, recording secretary; all of Des Moines, and Peter Russell, Fort Dodge, organizer. Those elected were: W. L. Bell, Des Moines, vice chairman; Chas. Roberts, Waterloo, treasurer; and John Crayton, Ottumwa, sergeant-at-arms.

Regional chairmen are: First district, Manson L. James, Council Bluffs; second district, J. E. Mills, Waterloo; third district, Montrose Beckley, Burlington; fourth district, W. Lawrence Oliver, Des Moines; and Margaret Carson, Des Moines, chairwoman; fifth district, Leroy Edwards, chairman, and Helen Wilson, chairwoman, both of Ottumwa.

Generous applause greeted the report of J. E. Mills, chairman of the resolutions committee that "the league indorses the New Deal in its entirety," and the organization went on record as adopting same.

BOULDER DAM SAYS PICKENS "MADE DISTURBANCE"

BOULDER DAM SAYS PICKENS "MADE DISTURBANCE"

WASHINGTON, May 29.—William Pickens, director of branches of the N.A.A.C.P. made a "loud disturbance" and "spoke disparagingly of government employees" at Boulder dam on April 22 according to reports sent to the Secretary of the Interior here.

At the request of the national office of the N.A.A.C.P., the office of the Secretary of the Interior asked for complete reports from Boulder City, Nevada on the arrest of Mr. Pickens at the dam on April 22. Mr. Pickens and a party of four presented themselves at the elevator to be taken down to the dam.

A party of white signifiers came up behind them and the elevator started to rise. Pickens said it would have to "stand back and wait" while the white people used the elevator. Dean Pickens objected vigorously to this treatment, whereupon a ranger was called and he and Walter H. Hamilton were taken eight miles to the Boulder City police station. Nevertheless the police chief insisted that Pickens was not under arrest, but had only been "invited to talk things over."

The Department of the Interior has been advised here by the New York office of the N.A.A.C.P. that the association is not satisfied with the explanation of the officials of Boulder City and that the charge that Mr. Pickens created a disturbance is preposterous.

Lynch Escaper Goes to Chair

E. K. HARRIS, SAVED FROM MOB, IS EXECUTED

NASHVILLE, Tenn., May 29.—E. K. Harris, a feeble-minded lad, who was saved from a mob at Shelbyville, Tennessee, in December, 1934, by state troops ordered to the scene by Governor Hill McAllister, was executed at five o'clock Friday morning in the state penitentiary.

The mob which sought to lynch Harris was so infuriated that it burned down the court house at Shelbyville and destroyed federal property. Harris was charged with raping a white girl, but in the trial a white doctor testified that he had examined the girl two hours after the assault and her body gave no evidence of having been raped.

Race for Congress to Be Headliner, Republicans Unite for a Comeback

12,000 NEGROES TO CAST VOTES THROUGHOUT IOWA

Lacking the usual noise, fan fare and enthusiasm of former election years, more than a million Iowa voters including about 12,000 registered Negroes, will go to the polls Monday to quietly cast their votes for candidates seeking nomination for congressional, state, legislative and county offices in the Democratic, Republican and Farm Labor primaries. The congressional race from the sixth district looms as the headliner in the campaign. Gov. Clyde Herring cast aside his gubernatorial chances to vie with U. S. Representative Hubert R. Utterback, both of Des Moines, for U. S. Senator, both from the ranks of the Democrats. Representative Utterback upset C. C. Dowell, veteran of 20 years, in 1934 as the only Democrat in history to represent this district.

Chances that a Republican senator will go from Iowa to Washington for the next four years have lined five formidable opponents against L. J. Dickinson, of Algonia, incumbent. Dickinson, termed the "Harding of 1936" by prognosticators may upset the dope at Cleveland, Smith W. Brookhart of Washington, the stormy petrel from the Hawkeye state, who, after a brief retirement from politics in 1932, is running again and Edwin Manning, twice mayor of Ottumwa and political leader in southern Iowa, are expected to provide fierce opposition followed by Guy Linville, Cedar Rapids, Norman Baker, Muscatine and George Chaney of Des Moines.

Battle Cry

"Nominate a candidate who can win November" is the battle cry of Frank B. Hallagan's forces who are backing him for republican nomination to congress. The former municipal court judge will race with former Representative Dowell and Dwight N. Lewis, former Des Moines mayor. The hopes of the Townsend forces lie in Otto E. Neal, district organizer. The Rev. M. G. Wilkifson, Adel minister, and Col. W. W. Klein, perennial office seeker and "50 at 50" advocate are also listed. Democrat leaders are pinning their hopes on W. O. Chatterton, John R. Gould of Des Moines, and Harry B. Dunlap of Ames.

Senator George A. Wilson of Des Moines, and J. M. Grimes of Osceola, leading Republican aspirants for governor, are wending up strenuous campaigns this week with Wilson as a sure certainty to sweep Polk County. George R. Call of Sioux City is also seeking the state's highest position. Lieut. Gov. N. G. Kraeschel is backed by Herring's former adherents for the Democratic nomination with the strongest opposition from Justice Richard F. Mitchell of Fort Dodge. Interest is decidedly lacking in the bally-hoo for the other state offices.

Polk County

169 Polk County candidates will be at the mercy of the voters Monday. The wide open race for recorder, left vacant by the death of Mrs. Agnes Lee Hermansen last December, has attracted five Republicans, two Democrats and a Farmer Laborite, numbering among them four women.

Dr. William Carpenter and District Clerk Charles A. Horner are not asking re-election. Dr. A. E. Shaw, Dr. G. S. DeBeck and Ray McAndrews may tie up the coroner vote. The issue is "a doctor should have the

job." Fred Barkalow, former deputy, and E. L. Brookins, former municipal clerk defeated in the March city election, will fight it out for district clerk. E. S. Olmsted, incumbent, is in for a tough scrap with Sam K. Miller for auditor.

Carl Burkman

Carl Burkman, Republican county attorney, is the only unopposed party incumbent. Sol. Glick is the hope of the Democrats. Pete Welsh, former city parks head, Fred Hird, former U. S. deputy marshal, and E. A. Stout, who was defeated in 1934, will attempt to topple Sheriff C. F. Keeling. Roscoe Bane, former safety commissioner, is blocking Allen Munn's aspirations for fifth term as treasurer. Ten candidates from four districts besides the incumbents are filed for places on the board of supervisors.

A close finish may mark the picking of representatives to the Iowa legislature. Prominent contenders from the republican strongholds are Ed R. Brown, incumbent for three terms, Milton R. Strickler and Joseph J. Petosa. Mark C. Reno and John T. Chaney are doped to struggle for the Democratic cause.

First Negro Voter Revealed by WPA

THOMAS PETERSON PUSHED BALLOT MARCH 31, 1870

PERTH AMBOY, N. J.—The fact that Thomas Peterson of this city was the first colored man to cast a vote in the United States was unearthed by an investigator for the WPA—sponsored Federal Writers' Project last week. The investigator, compiling data for "The New Jersey State Guide Book," discovered a fading portrait of Peterson in a Perth Amboy home, and from its owner, a white woman, extracted the story of Old Tom, and of how he won a medal offered by former Magistrate Harold E. Pickersgill for casting America's first Negro ballot.

Fifteenth Amendment

Peterson voted on March 31, 1870— one day after the Fifteenth Amendment to the Constitution had been ratified. The issue was a city charter referendum. The one-time slave sauntering across to lawn in front of a polling place at 7 o'clock that morning when one of a group of white men sitting on the porch called out:

"Hey, Tom, don't you want to vote?"

"Sure do," Tom replied. "And I'm goin' to, too, soon's that amendment gets passed."

"Well," said the white man, "you'd better get started. A herald just got in town with news of the ratification." Joyously, Tom stepped into the booth and pushed the first ballot ever propelled through the slot by a colored man's hand.

Medal Protested

Magistrate Pickersgill immediately made plans to strike off the promised medal for the ex-slave, but a delegation from Princeton, N. J., objected, saying that one of their colored citizens deserved the medal because he had voted at 2 p. m. the same day for a township committeeman. The magistrate considered the case, decided that a vote was a vote, whether for a charter or a man and gave Tom the medal, a heavy gold medallion.

Only Picture
"Presented by the citizens of Perth Amboy, N. J., to Thomas Peterson, the first colored voter in the United States under the provision of the 15th Amendment, at an election held in that city March 31, 1879."
In his later years, Tom made capital of his fame, selling his photograph wherever crowds gathered—at fairs, picnics, and parades. The copy of the picture uncovered by the WPA worker, however, is the only one known to exist at present.

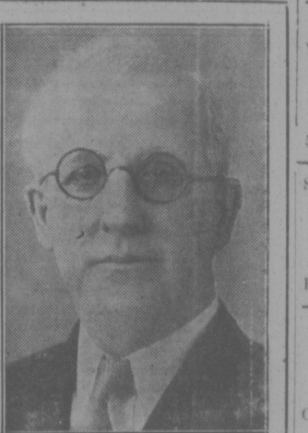

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VOTE MONDAY

Monday, voters go to the polls to nominate party candidates for national, state, county, and township offices. First it is highly important that every citizen exercise his franchise; second that the right party as the standard bearer of his party should be chosen for under our system of government individuals lose their identity under the party label.

Many candidates are running for the nomination for each office. Among the candidates are some who have given Negroes representation in their offices and have used their influence that others might do likewise. These candidates should be supported; appreciation for what has been done should be shown. On the other hand there are candidates who have never done anything for the Negro group even though some former and present office holders have had ample jobs at their disposal.

Even though the Negro vote in Iowa is not large there is a bigger opportunity this year than ever before to make that vote count. Negro Republicans and Democrats should go out for big things. They have had crumbs from the table long enough. The Bystander is hopeful that everybody votes; that candidates be supported who offer Negroes decent consideration; that Negroes, while at times may be on opposing sides, will not fall out among themselves, for after all they are all Negroes.

TEXAS DEMOCRATS AGAIN

The attorney general of Texas has assured the Democratic Central Committee of that state that the resolution barring Negroes from the Democratic primaries in 1934 holds good. In short he says, "go ahead, you need not fear any participation on the part of Negro voters."

Several years ago the legislature of Texas passed a law barring Negroes from the Democratic primaries but it was declared unconstitutional. Later the party passed a resolution barring Negroes from the Democratic primaries. A lawsuit followed and the United States Supreme Court held that a party had the right to prescribe the qualifications of its members.

The Bystander has felt that the Supreme Court was wrong on this question failing to look at the matter from a practical standpoint. The practical application of the decision is that it excludes Negroes from participation in the government. Eventually this ruling is going to be changed just as was the one when they held in the famous Leo Frank case that as long as the lower court went through the motion the Supreme Court could not go back of the trial to determine whether the due process clause of the constitution had been violated. However in the Arkansas Riot cases the court took the opposite view from that in the Frank case.

However, the attitude of Texas Democrats remains that they want no Negro votes even though they would aid in keeping them in power. It might be interesting to note that Vice President Garner comes from Texas and is Democratic National Committeeman from that state. Whether he is in accord with his state, central committee on the Negro vote or not The Bystander is unable to say.

OWENS GIVES MONEY'S WORTH IN EVENT

Ohio University Stadium, Columbus, Ohio, May 29—(Special)—Fifteen thousand track enthusiasts who attended the thirty-sixth annual Big Ten track and field championship meet here Saturday expressly to see Jesse Owens duplicate his phenomenal Ann Arbor performance of last year, left the stadium fully satisfied. Not only did the bronze pilot of the Buckeye horde take the four events in which he was establishing new records in two, but it was his scoring alone which enabled Ohio State to tie with Michigan for second place in the meet.

And as Owens figured in the placement of his team, so did Jimmy Smith, septa middle distance runner, contribute heavily to the point total which made Indiana track and field champions for the first time in Big Ten history.

Melvin Walker, lanky teammate of Owens, broke one record and equalled another with a 6 feet, 6 inches leap over the bar in the high jump, thus giving Ohio five first places. Only one other Ohioan, Charles Beetham (white), in the half mile placed first in the events of the day.

Altogether three Negro athletes, Owens, Walker and Dave Albritton, who garnered a second place in the high jump, made twenty-nine of Ohio's thirty points.

PAIR DIE AS COTTAGE IS FIRED BY VA. STATE MACHINE GUNNERS

GORDONSVILLE, Va., May 22—William Wales, 65, and his sister, Cora, perished in the flames of their cottage here Friday night after holding off a lynch mob of 1,500 persons for six hours.

During the six-hour gun battle in which the Orange Fire department and state police were called in to aid the lynchers, Sheriff William B. King was killed and six other officers injured. Five members of the mob were also killed and nine others injured.

The siege was broken when a state trooper ignited the cottage with his gasoline soaked shirt and others mowed the man and his sister down with machine guns as they attempted to flee the building. The bodies of both fell into the flames and were consumed.

Fight Under Floodlights
Officer Oscar Munday was killed by rifle fire from the house when he attempted to drive a heavy truck used in road construction into the cottage. The battle which began at 4 p. m. Friday was continued after sunset under the glare of floodlights supplied by the Orange Fire department.

Hostilities opened when Sheriff King of Orange county went to the home of Wales to arrest him on charges made by Mrs. George Zinn. Mrs. Zinn, a wealthy landowner, in this section, told police that Wales had accosted her in the Maplewood cemetery near his home and threatened her life with a revolver.

Wales instead of peacefully submitting to arrest on the trumped up charges of Mrs. Zinn, elected to fight it out with the officer. Beating him to the draw, Wales shot the officer, killing him instantly.

Health Talks

By Dr. C. R. Bradford

RAW FOOD

There are many reasons why one should hesitate or use extreme care in eating raw foods.

The chief reason is the great danger of infection with poisonous bacteria residing in dirty urban areas and the necessity of eating food from unhygienically controlled markets, fruits and vegetable stores all make for grave risks to the person who eats raw fruits, cabbage, lettuce and other foods that cannot when used raw have their surfaces completely removed by peeling before they are eaten.

In one large European city for economy the water from a nearby river was pumped into the city mains to wash fruits and vegetables in the markets, diseases such as typhoid became common.

Poisoning with lead and arsenic which is used in spraying—fruit to make it mature earlier is another danger of eating raw fruit that cannot be peeled. Pin worm infections frequently seen in children is thought by some to be on the increase by eating raw food.

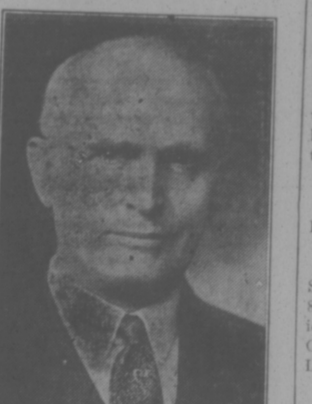
Amebic infections are most likely to occur in individuals eating raw fruits and vegetables poorly prepared. Bulletins and articles recommending the use of raw foods are as numerous as they are unscientific. Raw fruits and vegetables when grown in a natural state of nature and away from cities and sewage are usually as free from dangers of infection as any food man may eat. But in our present civilization unless one knows the conditions under which it was raised and sees it harvested, transported, and handled thereafter up to the moment it is brought to the table for consumption he may safely assume it unfit to eat.

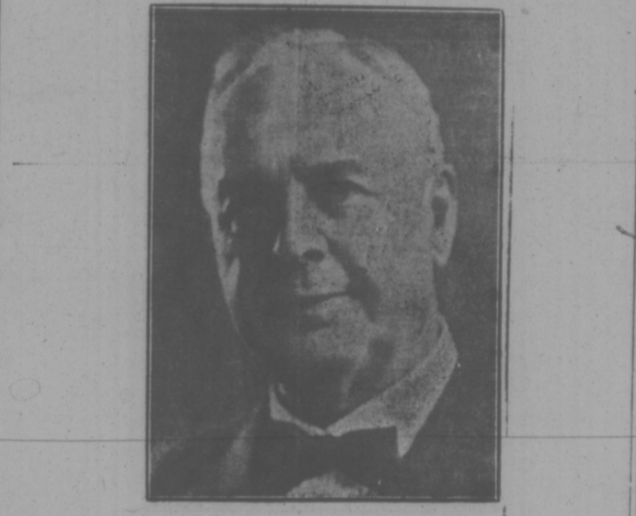
