## Jesse Owens, Ohio Flash, Leads Parade of Track Stars With Trio of Wins

TEN SEPIA ATHLETES MAKE UNITED STATES OLYMPIC SQUAD

When the giant liner, Manhattan, sailed for Berlin Wednesday, ten Negroes were among the 66 track athletes representing the United States who waved fond goodbyes to their cheering friends on the New York docks, as they embarked to gather new conquests in the uppermost heights of a track and field world, the eleventh Olympic games. The parade of stars at the beautiful Randall's Island last Saturday and Sunday was led in a blaze of glory by the redoubtable Jesse Owens of Ohio State, who scored a trio of firsts in the 200 meters dash with time of 1:22.100 meters dash in 1:04.4, broad jump, distance 25 ft. 10 1/2 inches; veteran Ralph Metcalfe of Marquette Club, second in 100 meters and fifth in the 200 meters dashes.

Cornelius Johnson (Compton Junior College, Los Angeles) first in high jump, 6 ft. 9 1/2 in., and fourth in 32 Olympics while in high school; Dave Albritton (Ohio) high jumper, tied for first; John Woodruff (Pittsburgh) first in 800 meters, 1:51; Archie Williams (California) in 400 meters, 46.6; James LuValle (U. C. L. A.) third; Mack Robinson (Pasadena Junior College) second in 200 meters; Fred Pollard, Jr., (North Dakota) second in 110 meters hurdles and John Brooks (Chicago) second in broad jump.

Drake Relays Metcalfe, Owens and LuValle may count among their laurels, victories won at the annual Drake relays in Des Moines the past few years. The Marquette speedster was the first to

## Roxborough Calls Recent Rumor New Publicity Stunt of Detective

Detroit, Mich., July 17—On the heels of a report that Mrs. Eulalie Gaines, sister of Joe Louis, had issued a statement that her brother was given a hypodermic shot just before entering the ring to fight Max Schmeling, John Roxborough, co-manager of the Bomber, had this to say:

Chicago Tribune "The Chicago Tribune has not retained Sheridan A. Bruseaux to investigate the dope angle in the defeat of Joe Louis."

Calls were made by Roxborough following stories spread about Detroit by Bruseaux that Arch Ward, Damon Runyon, Grantland Rice and other noted sports writers were in Detroit to get information Bruseaux had gathered relative to the dope angle of Joe's defeat.

In Detroit Mr. Bruseaux arrived in Detroit on Saturday and immediately let it be known that he was here to investigate the Louis-Schmeling fight for the Chicago Tribune.

He also informed those who would lend an ear that sport celebrities were domiciled in a downtown hotel, waiting for him to unravel the skein of damaging evidence which he had gathered in his self-launched investigation.

Maniac In commenting on Bruseaux's investigation of the Louis-Schmeling fight, Roxborough said: "As a detective, Bruseaux's capabilities are too well known to us to take him seriously. If you give him two guesses he will tell you which way an elevator runs."

## Col. Ward Must Face U. S. Jury

INDICTMENT CHARGES HE CONVERTED U. S. SUPPLIES FOR HIS OWN USE

Tuskegee Institute, Ala., July 17—Coming several months after his dismissal as head of the U. S. Veterans hospital here, Col. Joseph H. Ward of Indianapolis was indicted Thursday along with thirteen others by a federal grand jury on charges of conspiracy to defraud the government through the diversion of hospital supplies. He is free on bond of \$3,000.

Others indicted along with Col. Ward were Willie Reid, Walker S. Burke, George Williams, Nellie Frazier, William and Geneva B. Peterson, Dr. H. O. Matthews, P. H. Roney, Esther Bullock, Amelia Gears, all of Tuskegee, and H. F. Mason of Armstrong. The trials will be held in Opelika, probably in November.

For a period of nine years during his administration of the institution, Col. Ward is alleged by the government to have conducted wholesale raids on the hospital larder with the assistance of those indicted with him. The provisions taken from the hospital pantry are said by the government to have been used by Col. Ward for his own use.

Until the time of his dismissal, Col. Ward had an enviable record and had been commended on several occasions for his proficiency in handling the institution. He had been in charge of the hospital since July, 1924. He was succeeded by Dr. Eugene Dibble, director of John M. Andrews hospital.

Col. Ward was stationed at the Officers Training Camp in Fort Des Moines in 1917.

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## Brother of Local Contractor Dies in 14 Feet of Water

Russell Alexander, 34, brother of A. A. Alexander, prominent contractor and engineer, was drowned at Rhodes, Iowa, Wednesday night at 10 o'clock while swimming with a party near the reservoir. According to word received here, he was with a crowd of friends who were on a picnic, when a swim was suggested, Alexander, although an expert swimmer, was reluctant to go in, but was persuaded to join the party.

An improvised raft was constructed and when it was under way, Alexander lost his balance, falling in fourteen feet of water where he went down four times. One of the women members of the party frantically reached for him but the swirling waters carried him beyond their depth.

The body was recovered several minutes later. Efforts at resuscitation, by doctors and pulmonator rushed from Marshalltown, failed. The body was brought to the Wilson Funeral Home in Des Moines. Tentative funeral arrangements plan for services to be held Saturday at 10 a. m. Archie Alexander, accompanied by his partner, M. A. Repass, and Dr. C. R. Bradford drove to Rhodes immediately following news of the tragedy.

Alexander, who was born in Des Moines, attended North High school, and was well-known in the sport circles as a professional boxer in the heavy-weight division of Iowa. At present, he was working at Milburn on a bridge project where he had been employed by the Alexander and Repass company, contractors, for the past fifteen years. He had completed work there and was preparing to come to Des Moines to start on the East 14th street viaduct.

He was married to Beatrice Daniels but they were divorced two years ago. Alexander is survived by his father, Price, and brothers, Archie of Des Moines, Leonard of Chicago, and Harold of St. Louis, and sisters, Colleen Alexander Jones, Harriet Vine, and Doris Alexander all of Chicago, Helen Hadian, who is traveling at the present time, and Edna Pinkard of New York. His mother died a similar death in the Des Moines river about twenty years ago.

## NAACP Official is Cleared of Blame

WILLIAM PICKENS COMPLETELY EXONERATED IN AUTO DEATH

Bakersfield, Calif., July 17—William Pickens, director of branches of the N. A. A. C. P., was completely exonerated of any criminal negligence in an automobile accident May 20th near here, in which a young hitch-hiker, riding with Mr. Pickens, was fatally injured and Mr. Pickens suffered a broken right arm.

At the hearing here, Mr. Pickens was represented by Thomas L. Griffith, Jr., of Los Angeles, and Walter A. Gordon of Berkeley, California. They were able to prove that the testimony of highway patrolmen was not credible.

Mr. Pickens is winding up his work on the coast with a state conference of N. A. A. C. P. branches this week, after which he plans to take a short vacation in Hawaii. He will return to New York about the middle of August.

## Haile Selassie May Visit in U.S. Soon

London, England, July 17—Emperor Haile Selassie of Ethiopia may go to America on a lecture tour, it is rumored here. The emperor has been offered \$500,000 for such a trip, it is claimed. Whether this proposition is designed to keep Selassie from returning to Ethiopia to lead his armies in the west, as he announced at Geneva he would do, is a matter for speculation. If the emperor tours America, it is likely that his daughter, Princess Tsahai, will be with him. It is said such fashionable resorts as Newport and Southampton would see the emperor first.

## Arguments Heard in Education Fight

SCHOOL EQUALITY BEFORE COURTS IN TWO STATES

New York, July 17—Arguments in two cases in which Negroes are seeking equality in educational facilities were being heard today in Columbia, Missouri, and Baltimore, Maryland. In Missouri the court is hearing the suit of Lloyd Gaines, young colored college graduate, who wishes to study law at the University of Missouri. Gaines is being represented by Sidney R. Redmond of St. Louis and Charles H. Houston, special counsel of the N. A. A. C. P. in New York. In Baltimore argument is being heard this week on a demurrer filed by attorneys for Baltimore county to the suit being pressed against the county to force it to provide high school facilities for colored children. There are now eleven white night schools for white children in Baltimore county and none for Negroes. The attorney for the colored parents is Thurgood Marshall of Baltimore, a member of the legal redress committee of the Baltimore N. A. A. C. P. branch. Mr. Marshall was the attorney in the famous University of Maryland case last June and was successful in securing a court order forcing the University of Maryland to admit Donald Gaines Murray to its law school.

## NAACP Leaders Ask for United Stand for Justice

SENATOR WAGNER PLEDGES NEW FIGHT AGAINST MOBS

Baltimore, July 17—Pledging his continuing efforts to secure the enactment of a federal anti-lynching law, Senator Robert F. Wagner of New York delivered a dramatic address to a huge crowd attending the closing mass meeting of the twenty-seventh annual conference of the N. A. A. C. P. here Sunday, July 15th.

Beginning his address with a reference to the Fourth of July as a commemoration of man's struggle for true liberty, Senator Wagner scored the forces in America which are denying liberty, nullifying government and reverting to barbarity. "Every thinking American," he declared, "regardless of creed, color, station or section, must be terrified by the tide of mob violence rising from the wells of prejudice and discrimination. There is no single expression that will cover the extravagance and variety of all these horrible crimes; but there is one word that sums them up dramatically and vividly—and that is the word 'lynching.'"

VOTERS AWAKE TO POWER OF BALLOT—WARNS WHITE

Baltimore, July 17—Negro voters in northern and middle western states have awakened to the power of their ballots and may be expected to play an important part in determining the 1936 election, declared Walter White, executive secretary of the N. A. A. C. P. here Sunday, July 15th, in his annual address to the closing mass meeting of the 1936 conference of the association.

Mr. White cited the action of Negro voters in the Ohio and Illinois primaries this spring against Senator William E. Borah as an example of the independent voting which the Negro citizen is doing. "More than ever before," the speaker declared, "Negro Americans are determined to ignore party labels and vote for their friends and against their enemies."

## Dixie Justice Gets Another Victim

ARKANSAS POSSE SLAYS MINISTER

Fort Smith, Ark., July 17—The Rev. Charles Evans, preacher-farmer here, was shot to death by a mob of thirty armed officers and citizens Wednesday after he had created a two-hour "reign of terror" and had wounded two members of the Fort Smith police force.

The country preacher was described as suffering from "a spell of unbalanced religious zeal." He is reported to have run amuck at the home of his employer, Mat Maser, and later fled to the home of an aged woman and barricaded himself in, determined not to be taken alive.

Surrounding the house, members of the posse fired nearly a hundred rounds of ammunition into the dwelling before Evans fell mortally wounded with six bullets in his body.

## Brazil to Destroy Coffee to Keep Prices Up

Rio Janeiro, Brazil, July 17—(CNA)—The national coffee department, a division of the state department of agriculture, has ruled that 22,000,000 bags of the 1936 coffee crop must be destroyed. This is about 30 per cent of the total amount of coffee produced for the year.

This is being done to keep the price of coffee high. The method is similar to that of the recent AAA and other American farm measures that have destroyed cotton, grain and live stock while more than ten million workers and their families are unemployed and facing starvation.

## Popular Orchestra Leader Is on Tour

LOUIS ARMSTRONG BREAKS THREE RECORDS IN ONE WEEK

New York City, July 17—(INP)—Louis "Satchmo" Armstrong, who is now on tour playing theatres for Paramount and a series of dance engagements for the Rockwell O'Keefe office, is evidently out to break all the records possible during the summer months. When he played the Michigan theatre in Detroit, he broke the record held there by Ted Lewis.

He took a slump the following week at Shea's Hippodrome in Toronto, but came back strong to smash dance attendance records in Pittsburgh on last Friday night, surpassing the ones held by Cab Calloway and Duke Ellington. Saturday night he played to an overflow crowd in Columbus, shattering the attendance mark set by Fred Waring. In Cincinnati last Sunday, Louis Armstrong equaled the one night attendance records of Jack Benny, Wayne King and Guy Lombardo.

## Track

Well, sir, we called the number in the final Olympic tryouts. We guessed ten, and there were ten of our boys who won free boat rides to Germany. Jesse Owens led the procession, winning three firsts, while Cornelius Johnson and Dave Albritton



busted the world's high jump record. Most surprising of all to us was Metcalfe's failure to finish in the money in the 200 meters. That probably proves that nothing but actual competition keeps a man ready for any race over one hundred yards or less than a mile. For one day Metcalfe and the rest of the dash veterans were at their peak, but they couldn't relax and call on that extra form again. Veterans, as we have said, can outlast youngsters, but when they do go, there is no recuperation such as young bodies possess.

Herr Hitler, fresh from celebrating one Nordic victory, must have jumped out of his skin when he heard about our Negroes. Probably thought they were coming over en masse to even matters for a little incident of June 19th. They won't all win over there, but every one there will know the boys were among those present.

## Tennis

The Olympic tryout results affected the boys here also. A gang of us got in the city playground tennis meet, and did we raise Cain? Paul Williams crashed through to become the first Negro to ever win a singles crown in that meet. Paul, one of the smoothest stroking Negroes who ever grew up in the city, has a promising tennis future if he doesn't forget that he has a lot to learn about the game and that we only improve through constant practice and study. Earl Newcomb and Paul Woods played Chet Williamson and your illustrious scribe for the men's doubles title, the first time Negroes ever staged an all sepi final for a white tennis crown. Earl and Paul were the better doubles team Sunday morning and they trimmed us after a lively three act scramble. Woods' net play was by far the best exhibition we ever played against. You gotta give the boys credit. They went out to win or tie trying and went after every shot just like that fellow doesn't mind losing matches of that sort. We have staged four of these battles before, and no one has ever seen any of them. One of them lasted over three hours or continuous play and the only spectator was the referee. It seems a rotten shame that with our advantages here we should have so few Negroes interested in tennis. There hasn't been a decent girl player since the old gang of Agnes Mathews, Adelaide Bowman and Octavia Rhone, who hung up their rackets a few years ago.

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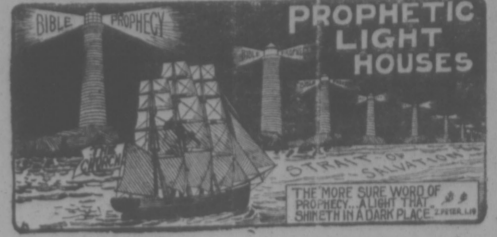

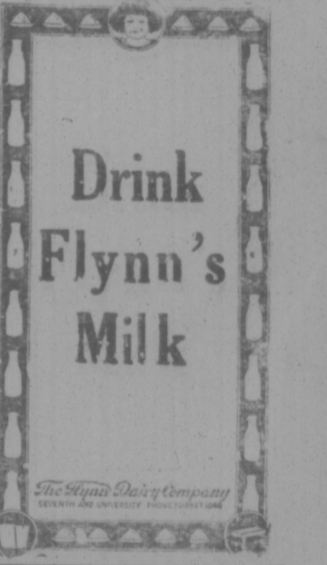

### THE SWIMMING POOL

The swimming pool at Good Park is in operation. It has come as the result of years of work by committees, boards and individuals. The work of some of those who fought the thing through has not always been pleasant but they kept in mind their mission and have accomplished some things. The Bystander will say that the pool itself is fine as far as it goes but the surroundings are miserable. Every thing other than the pool is makeshift. The work was done with WPA labor and anyone who looks at the layout most conclude that the efficiency of the WPA as far as this job goes is nil.

However the job has gone thus far; it should be completed as rapidly as possible and those who have been interested in the project should not stop until the surroundings, locker rooms, shelter and concession houses are made to look like a decent recreational center rather than a run down farm yard as is the case at present.

The people are enjoying the pool tremendously all of whom are grateful to the Park Board for what has been done so far. They will be pleased when the job is completed.

### FORTUNATE TO THE NEGRO

Fortunately Gov. Landon's state has been unusually fair to the Negro in the distribution of patronage and otherwise giving the race political recognition. With such a back ground he will not be appealing to Negroes on what Abraham Lincoln and the Republican party did sixty years ago but what the Republican party under Gov. Landon is doing and what is proposed to become in the future.

Here in Polk County we have officeholders who say the Negro should be Republicans for historical reasons and are too shortsighted or ignorant to realize that this is not a sufficient reason today to claim his vote. Such office holders are a detriment to the Republican party and are doing much to drive votes away from it.

As far as the Negro is concerned, this campaign is not going to be fought over Abraham Lincoln or the Civil War only in so far as the historical background indicates that the Republican party started on a theory of justice to the Negro. What the Negro wants to know is how he can make a living, own his home, educate his children and enjoy the comforts of life as any other group does. If Republican candidates make their appeal on this basis alright. If not, they are not going to find the votes in the bag as easily as in years gone by.

### GOOD NEWS

Last week the daily press carried a story about a Negro, Ben Williams, a bricklayer of Kenosha, Illinois, who established a record for himself when he laid 36,519 bricks in 7 1/2 hours as the thermometer hovered around 90 degrees plus. This feat is equivalent to a quarter-mile of 20-foot paving. He kept a dozen workers busy bringing him bricks, each weighing seven pounds.

Negroes are making fine records on the stage, in the professions, the sciences and in business. Much is being written about them in these fields. But not enough is known about his ability as skilled laborers. And possibly in this latter field more is being

done to keep him out than any other. A race may be ever so smart in the higher educational circles, but it takes a large group of well paid wage earners to support it. The story tells the public that a man with this unusual ability should not be kept out of a bricklayers union because he happens to be black. Ability to meet the requirements should be the only test.

He was a member of the Methodist church in Hastings, Nebraska, and also a graduate of the University of Nebraska. He leaves to mourn his loss, two brothers of Hastings, Nebraska, and two sisters of Omaha, Nebraska. Funeral services were held Tuesday at L. Fowler & Son Funeral home with Rev. Smith officiating. Burial was in Laurel Hill Cemetery.

## Health Talks

By Dr. C. R. Bradford

### TEETH

The development of the teeth begins at least six months before birth. It is probable that the proper foods in the diet of the prospective mother help to lay the proper teeth in the baby and that lack of proper food will deprive both her own and the baby's teeth of some part of their normal vigor. After the baby is born it is very important that he himself receive the best diet possible, namely his mother's milk and necessary adjuncts.

The child's first set of teeth are called the deciduous, or milk teeth. Most of them appear during the first two years, and are replaced by permanent teeth beginning about the sixth year during which time the child should from time to time be under the care of a dentist.

During the latter half of the first year the baby should be given dry hard foods on which to chew. Exercise in biting and chewing helps to develop strong, healthy teeth and jaws.
