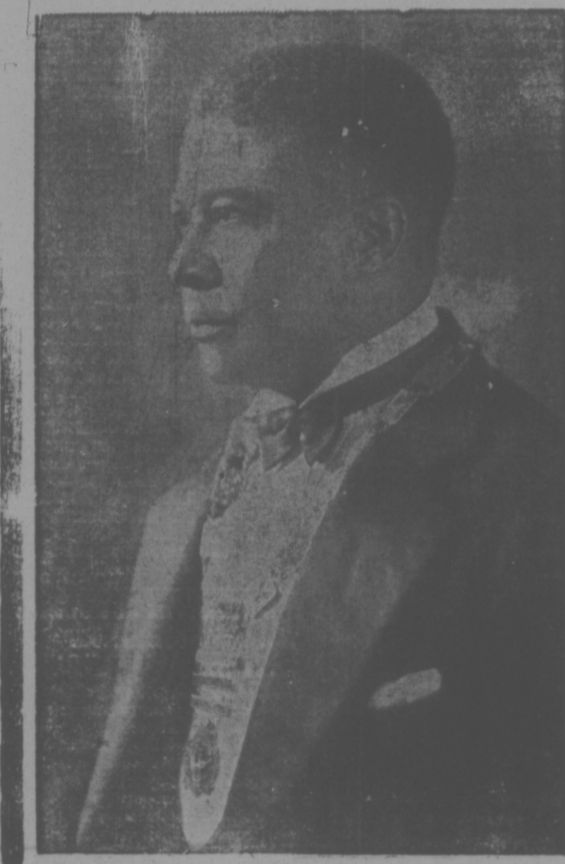

J. Finley Wilson Speaker For Negro G.O.P. Rally

J. Finley Wilson of Washington, D. C., grand exalted ruler of Elks, will give the main address at the Labor Day celebration of the Negro Republican Voters League of Iowa at the E. T. Meredith Jersey farm on Beaver avenue September 7th, J. G. Browne, state chairman, announced this week.

"Little Napoleon," for fourteen years czar of the fraternal organization, will be accompanied by Des Moines by Perry W. Howard, national committeeman of Mississippi. National, state and county Republican officers will be presented, horseshoe pitching, tennis, softball tournament, track meets and music by the Community band, directed by Morris DeSleet, will be featured.

CROCKER "Y" TO OPEN BIG PERIOD

One of the largest in recent years, and what may prove to be a record group, will be in the eighteenth annual Crocker "Y" period at the Des Moines "Y" camp, opening Monday, August 17th, and continuing through August 24th. Last year's enrollment has already been exceeded, and with the usual late signers, well over a hundred and twenty-five campers and leaders are expected in camp.

Situated six miles northwest of Boone, Iowa, on the Des Moines river, this camp, ranked as one of the five finest boys' camps in America, has splendid athletic equipment covering a wide range of sports, thirty-three permanent buildings house every form of indoor activity, including the recently built lodge, dining hall, shower house, eighteen cabins that serve as homes for the boys; first aid

directors, nature lore, and the various craft rooms. Yea ho, headquarters and other buildings and cabins.

The usual large number of out of town boys are expected. Omaha, Perry, Valley Junction, Oralabor, Chicago and other cities will be represented in the registrations. All campers, old and new, are urged to sign up now to be sure of having a place reserved in their favorite cabin. The special interurban will leave the station at 1:30 p. m. sharp. Campers are urged to be on hand at 12:30 o'clock at the latest.

Buckeye Bullet Sees Chance to Cash in on Olympic Greatness

Berlin—Weighed down with gold medals, four of them, which in itself is one of the greatest accomplishments an athlete can achieve in Olympic competition, Jesse Owens of Ohio State university was deliberating seriously whether to take up offers totaling \$100,000 to turn professional, or to return to Ohio State and to competition against its rivals for another year.

The world famous athlete is believed decidedly in favor of the bag of gold.

Beaten by Metcalfe

At Cologne, Monday night, in an international track meet, Owens was defeated in the 100 meters by Ralph Metcalfe of Chicago, who equalled the world's record to do so.

A contract for \$25,000 has already been offered the Alabama born hero and a flood of other offers show what possibilities his athletic prowess and fame can bring him.

Snyder Says O K

Larry Snyder, Owens' coach at Ohio State, has okayed Jesse for a professional career.

The \$25,000 contract calls for a ten weeks' appearance with a California orchestra. Others are for vaudeville, exhibition races and theatre tours.

ATHLETE TO BE ACCORDED GREATEST WELCOME IN CITY'S HISTORY

Cleveland, Ohio, Aug. 14—(Special.)—Jesse Owens, hailed as the world's greatest all around athlete, whose sensational victories at the Olympics gave him four gold medals, will return home to receive a hero's welcome some time in mid-September, it was announced by a member of the Chamber of Commerce.

It will be the greatest civic reception ever accorded an athlete in the history of this city. A mammoth parade along principal streets, a testimonial banquet and the awarding of a plaque to the four times Olympic champion are all a part of the program planned for the youthful athlete's return to the scene of his early track contests.

TO PLANT JESSE OWENS OAKS

Berlin, Aug. 14—(C)—Jesse Owens has ordered three oak trees to be shipped to three schools where he studied—a junior and a senior high school in Cleveland, and Ohio State university. The trees will symbolize Owens' Olympic victories.

Negro Democrats Promoting Plans

The state executive committee of the Iowa Negro Democratic league met Thursday, August 6th, to formulate plans for promoting the campaign. Several policies were shaped and will be announced later. Henry U. Mease, state chairman, was named as national committeeman from Iowa.

A publicity committee was named, which consists of Arthur Taylor, Cedar Rapids, chairman; Lawrence Chapman and Mrs. Hazel Oliver of Des Moines. Montrose Johnson of Cedar Rapids and W. Good Swim Pool in Excellent Condition

DAILY CHEMICAL TESTS SHOW IMPROVEMENT IN TWO WEEKS

"The daily bacteriological results, together with the daily chemical tests and sanitary inspections show that the water in the Good park swimming pool is in excellent sanitary condition for bathing purposes," reported Howard C. Maffitt, city consulting chemist, today, after a careful three weeks' study. Clean, fresh water is changed regularly to insure pureness.

Following an investigation by Dr. J. Alvin Jefferson, physician, recently in which he revealed in a signed statement the high bacterial count and water contamination, making the pool unfit for use, attendance took a sharp decline and dropped to almost nothing, causing a great loss to operators, officials said.

Samples of fifty millimeters of water were analyzed in the city laboratory. An average of 71 degrees has been maintained daily. Dr. Jefferson, after a conference with the state board of health, said: "There has been a vast improvement in the sanitary conditions of Good's pool during the past two weeks. The citizens of Des Moines must see to it that it stays that way."

Officials operating or working at the pool were not blamed, the doctor said, but it was necessary to bring pressure to prevent spread of disease and to keep down complaints.

FRANK BURKS ATTEMPTS SUICIDE—IS REVIVED

Frank Burks, 54, of 123 Jefferson avenue, was found unconscious, hanging in a shed at the rear of 125 Jefferson by the fire department emergency crew Tuesday at 8:30 p. m.

Police said that Burks had hanged himself in an effort to commit suicide. He was revived after fifteen minutes' work of the inhalator by the firemen.

Guards Prevent Murder in Court

WHITE FARMER DRAWS GUN ON PRISONER

Anniston, Ala., August 14—(CNA)—Quick action on the part of national guardsmen saved Roosevelt Collins, farm laborer, from a lyncher's bullet in the court room where he was being tried on a charge of "rape."

When Collins testified that the relations with the white woman he is accused of "raping" were purely voluntary, the woman's husband drew a gun and angrily advanced on the defendant. Guardsmen wrested the gun from him.

The charge against Collins was brought not by the supposed victim of "rape," but by her husband, Joel Hill. The woman took no part in the prosecution. Collins was sentenced to die in the electric chair on September 4th. The jury "deliberated" only twenty minutes. Motion for the defense for a mistrial was denied by Judge K. B. Carr.

Communist Leader Assails Two Parties

FORD CHARGES REPUBLICANS BETRAY LINCOLN TRADITIONS

(Crusader News Agency)

Scranton, Pa., August 14—In a radio broadcast delivered before a cheering audience of white and Negro miners last Wednesday night at the Argento hall here James W. Ford, Negro communist, vice presidential candidate, assailed Governor Alf M. Landon, republican presidential candidate, as "tied up with the enemies" of the Negro people and of all that is decent and progressive in America.

It was Ford's first speaking engagement in a national tour in which he will cover scores of northern and several southern cities in the next few weeks, traveling by fast train and airplane. He is running on a ticket headed by Earl Browder, national secretary of the communist party and its presidential candidate. Ford was also the party's vice presidential candidate in 1932, when he was teamed up with William Z. Foster, leader of the 1919 steel strike and now national chairman of the communist party.

The Harlem communist leader also attacked President Roosevelt for what he termed his constant retreats "before the pressure of the republican people," but his heaviest artillery was reserved for the republican candidate, who he declared "symbolizes all that is viciously reactionary, un-American and anti-labor" in the country.

Twenty-six outstanding laymen and preachers will be on the program of the fifty-eighth annual session of the Iowa-Nebraska-South Dakota association and auxiliaries, which convenes at Corinthian Baptist church August 17th and 21st, with Rev. G. W. Robinson, D. D., moderator, in charge.

Heading the auxiliaries are: Mrs. J. W. Tut, Des Moines, president Women's Home and Foreign Mission convention, which meets in fifty-fourth session; Rev. L. G. Barrett, Des Moines, president of the Ministers and Deacons union; Mrs. A. M. Smith, Cedar Rapids, president of the Ministers and Deacons Wives and Mothers union. All these dignitaries will deliver annual addresses to their respective bodies.

Novel features of the convention are: A minister and deacons' institute conducted by Rev. J. W. Tut of Des Moines; a school of methods in the women's home and foreign mission; a mother and daughter conference conducted by Mrs. C. B. Wheeler and Mrs. Susie Bryant in the same session.

The theme of the convention is, "Seek Ye First His Kingdom and His Righteousness" and this will be worked out in appropriate addresses. The annual sermons will be delivered by Revs. P. J. Price of Omaha, R. H. of Omaha. The closing sermon will be delivered by Rev. Robinson, pastor of the Corinthian church.

Left Home Sunday, Body Is Found Two Days Later

Funeral services for McGilvery Wilson, 25, popularly known to his friends as "Mack," of 942 Sixteenth street, whose body was found Tuesday afternoon in the shallow water of the Raccoon river near the S. W. Fifth street bridge, were held Thursday morning at the Wilson Funeral Home, with the Rev. G. W. Robinson officiating. Interment was at Grandview cemetery, in charge of the Wilson Funeral Home, managed by V. L. Jones. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joe Wilson; two sisters, Aue-yne Wilson and Mrs. Frances Campbell and a brother, Kermit, all of Des Moines survive. Mr. Wilson is a watchman at the Iowa-Des Moines National Bank and Trust Co.

Alarmed at Absence

Wilson left home at almost three o'clock Sunday, members of the family said. Mrs. Rosa Wilson, his mother, told the Bystander reporter that she became alarmed at his absence and phoned Henry Hasbrouck, commissioner of public safety, for assistance, who immediately got in touch with Quentin R. Mease, Crocker Y. M. C. A. executive secretary, and went in search of him. While they were at the police station Tuesday, a radio call came in reporting the finding of the body by a fisherman about 150 yards upstream from the bridge. Coroner William Carpenter and Police Captain L. W. Hardenbrook investigated the possibility of foul play.

Members of his family said that he was discouraged because he was out of work and despondent since the death of his sister, Anna, social service worker, in 1934. Friends said that Wilson brooded over the fact that he was unable to return to school. Mrs. Wilson related a pathetic scene at home last week when he expressed a desire to go to Detroit, Chicago or some big city to make good. "Tearfully she pleaded with him not to go. Reluctantly he stayed, but appeared more melancholy than ever. Upon hearing of her son's death, Mrs. Wilson collapsed in Mr. Hasbrouck's arms.

North High Graduate

Graduating from North High in 1927 with high honors, Wilson was one of the first Negro students to receive the Alexander scholarship award prize, which was given annually by A. A. Alexander, contractor, for the senior making the highest average. While there he played in the band and orchestra and played football. Entering the State University of Iowa in 1929 to study medicine, he was heavyweight boxing champion for two years and was president of the local chapter of the Alpha Phi Alpha fraternity. Resuming his studies at Drake university in 1935, Wilson joined the College Keys, club of Negro college students.

Born in Dora, Alabama, Wilson came to Des Moines when a youngster and became prominent in civic activities and church affairs of Maple Street and Corinthian Baptist churches here. Belonging to Boy Scout troop 59, several years ago, he was also one of the pioneer campers of the Crocker Street Y. M. C. A. and was a well known athlete and musician. He was a pitcher for the Corinthian softball team and played his last game against St. Paul at the

Italian Armies Are Losing Near Capital

ETHIOPIAN ARMIES ENCIRCLE ADDIS ABABA

Port Said, Egypt, August 14—(CNA)—The fascist grip on occupied Ethiopian territory was severely shaken last week as Ras Imru, Ethiopian commander in the northwest, hurled an army of 40,000 troops against the Italian forces occupying Addis Ababa, former Ethiopian capital. The Ethiopian forces are authoritatively reported to have wiped out several Italian outposts in their advance on Addis Ababa.

(A London dispatch reported that Emperor Haile Selassie was seeking British assurance of safe passage through the Anglo-Egyptian Sudan in order to join the Ethiopian defense forces and the Ethiopian government which is functioning in western Ethiopia. The emperor was quoted as indicating that he had received assurances from private sources of a loan for purchase of munitions for his troops.)

Judge Apologizes For Lynch Speech

IMPEACHMENT OF JURIST REJECTED

Harrisburg, Pa., Aug. 14—Admonished to "go and sin no more," Judge Benjamin C. Atlee last week was permitted to retain his seat as Lancaster county judge when the judiciary committee of the house of representatives voted 16-14 to accept the minority report of the sub-committee demanding an apology in preference to the majority report calling for impeachment.

Judge Atlee appeared before the judiciary committee in person on Thursday and delivered his apology behind closed doors. Following the apology the committee issued a set of four conclusions which severely reprimanded the jurist for his statements condoning lynching.

According to testimony presented before the committee, the judge made the pro-lynch statements July 18th while sentencing Samuel Watson, charged with having enticed two white girls.

The committee's action was assailed by Representative Walker K. Jackson, Richard A. Cooper and Marshall Shepard of Philadelphia and Homer S. Brown of Pittsburgh, who had contended for Judge Atlee's impeachment. They were supported by a petition of 25,000 signatures sponsored by the National Negro Congress and many civic and professional organizations.

HOW YOU CAN HELP

A salesman for a local concern was soliciting customers at a Negro home this week. After demonstrating that his product was a high grade article he finally said, "You know madam, that my company employs several Negroes and also advertises in your paper. Not only do we seek to sell you our products but we give back to your group some of our income both in employment and advertisement."

The Bystander has never gone out for a program of boycotting any institution but it does believe in and urges its readers to trade where the merchant is willing to show substantial appreciation. And by substantial appreciation is not meant giving a Negro church or other charitable organization a little donation occasionally, but employment which will enable Negroes to become more independent.

One of the difficulties experienced in selling advertisement in Negro newspapers is the unwillingness of many of the readers to admit that they were directed to stores by ads placed in Negro papers. Here in Des Moines many establishments use The Bystander columns for advertising. We could get much further if the readers told the merchants that they saw their ad in The Bystander and that they came at least partly on that account.

After all business concerns are looking for trade and it makes little difference from which it comes. If Negroes will get in the habit of sticking with these merchants who are willing to "play ball," the race and incidentally individuals will get along much better.

AMERICA TO CAN REFORM

Everybody is talking about the fine record made by Negroes at the Olympics in Germany; most people are chiding Hitler for his snobbishness toward these Negro athletes. They are saying that these boys excel in their chosen sports and are entitled to all that goes with them. And happy to say that the head track coach of the American team is seeing that they get it.

But we forget that in one great American sport—organized baseball—as much snobbishness exists as is displayed by Hitler. On many occasions an effort has been made to break this color line but to date little progress has resulted. However, while the ridiculous attitude of Hitler is being assailed and the favorable attitude of the public toward Negro athletes sung it ought to be a good time to make a strenuous effort to break this barrier against Negro baseball players. The folly of the rule could be brought out better now than at any other time.

While the American attitude far surpasses that of the Fascist governments, this country is not fooling those fellows when it attempts to chide them for their display of racial ill feeling toward darker races.

WHY THE FLOT?

When the four billion dollar work relief bill was before the senate an effort was made to attach an amendment to it providing for the payment of the prevailing wage scale to WPA

employees. The debate lasted several days, President Roosevelt standing against it and for what Mr. Hopkins termed a security wage. Now Mr. Roosevelt comes within three months of the election and declares for prevailing wage scale to be paid out of the same funds which when they were being appropriated by Congress he fought with all the strength of his office. No doubt this is the price Green and Lewis of the A. F. & L. extracted from him in return for their promise of support in the election. President Roosevelt is known to possess a roving mind and one need not be surprised to find him favoring one thing today and just the opposite tomorrow.

A DANGEROUS CONDITION

The following announcement was made in a news release from Tuskegee Institute: "The Placement Office at Tuskegee Institute, Alphonse Henningburg, director, is making a countrywide search for Tuskegee trained men in carpentry, brickmasonry and other phases of industrial arts to be placed in profitable employment. The demand for men trained at Tuskegee Institute has been so great, said the Personnel Director, that it is becoming very difficult to find available teachers who are competent and qualified to fill the places for which there are constant requests."

Thus it becomes evident that our vocational schools are not turning out a sufficient number of mechanics to meet the teacher demand much less enough to go into communities where they are needed in their trade fields. Vocational guidance teachers ought to know that in many communities Negroes have no opportunity to learn trades other than in schools. Most communities will support several tradesmen; a community can support but a limited number of professional men. Evidently our schools are not putting enough stress or the proper guidance for our youth on this field of education.

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Health Talks

THYROTOXICOSIS

Exophthalmic Goiter Thyrotoxicosis is the name given to a peculiar complex of symptoms of which the chief are enlargement of the thyroid gland, loss of weight and strength, nervousness. The average age of the patient is 37 years.

There are three types of treatment available: medical, surgical, and roentgenological (x-ray).

Nervousness, inability, sleeplessness, loss of weight, palpitation, weakness, easily tired, protrusion of the eyeballs, increased appetite in spite of loss in weight, occasional nausea and vomiting, increased pulse rate, great emotionalism, either of the depressed or exhilarated type, considerable thyroid enlargement is the rule.
