Brown Bomber's Victory Gives New Hope to Race

30,000 FANS PAY TO SEE
NEGRO DROP FORMER CHAMP YANKEE STADIUM, NEW YORK, N. Y.—Thirty thousand spectators cheered Brown Bomber Joe Louis on Tuesday night as he smashed back into the heavyweight challenger's circle by knocking out the faded former heavyweight champion, Jack Sharkey, in the third round, after battering him to the floor four times.
In his first return to the ring after being tagged by Max Schmeling on June 19th, the young Detroit Negro regained his former glory in flooring the hood-smearing Boston tavernkeeper for the full count of 1:02 of the session of a scheduled ten round bout.
The aged Sharkey, who stopped the uphill climb of Harry Wills and George Godfrey, and who had never before been defeated by a Negro, will go into permanent retirement. In view of the fact that Champion Jimmy Braddock's hand is "indisposed," a September return match with Schmeling looms as a possibility.

Family Defends Home, Is Arrested

UNEXPECTED GUNFIRE BALKS POSSIBLE LYNCHINGS
Anniston, Ala., Aug. 21—Exercise of the alienable right of self-defense by Calhoun county Negro citizens brought two companies of national guardsmen into the county last week and landed Art Bush and his wife and their five children in "protective custody," ala Hitler, in Germany.
The trouble began when local authorities deputized some 20 white men for a man hunt following the report that an unidentified Negro man had attempted to kidnap the two months old child of Mrs. Geneva Williamson, a white woman. The huge posse quickly turned the hunt for the alleged kidnapper into a general pogrom on a Negro community about five miles from here.
They were met with shotgun fire and four of the possemen were wounded, two of them critically.
Bush is charged with firing into a group that invaded his home and threatened his wife with death unless she told the names of several men thought by her questioners to have been in her home the previous night. Mrs. Bush told authorities the possemen threatened to burn his house "with me and my children in it." The Bush barn was set afire by the possemen to give emphasis to their threat.
Mrs. Bush and her children have been thrown into Anniston jail. Her husband has been sent to Birmingham for "safe keeping." None of the white marauders have been arrested.

HALL BOY HELD IN CO-ED'S MURDER

Asheville, N. C., Aug. 21—(CNA)—Declaring that "the sex angle is out altogether," Solicitor Zeb V. Nettie disputed the theory of Sheriff Laurence E. Brown that Martin Moore, Negro hall boy charged with the murder of Helen Clevenger, had entered the room of the New York university co-ed with the intention of attacking her.

New York, Aug. 21—(Calvin Service)—In a quickwitted move to match Republican strategy in naming minister to head the Landon-Knox drive among colored citizens, the Democrats came back this week with the announcement that they have gone the Republicans one better by giving real "Brain Trust" recognition to the Negro in naming a holder of the Ph. D. degree to Roosevelt campaign leadership—Bishop R. R. Wright, Jr., who is co-chairman with Dr. A. Clayton Powell, pastor of Abyssinian Baptist church in Harlem, of the Good Neighbor League drive among Negroes.
Bishop Wright, whose recent elevation to the highest office in the A. M. E. church was hailed as ushering in a new era in the growth and development of Negro business, education and fraternal co-operation, is noted for his learning, high scholarship and his actual achievements as an educational and business administrator.
As editor, author, college president, minister and banker, and as an advocate for many years of the Negro developing his own latent and inherent business and educational abilities, his coming into the political arena in defense of the Roosevelt new deal is regarded by observers as ushering in a new day when "double-crossing" bosses will be relegated to the rear, and the real interests of the race will get a hearing before the bar of highest authority.

WHITE WOMAN CONVICTED IN DEATH PLOT
Milton, Fla., Aug. 21—(C)—Mrs. L. W. Vann, 40 year old grandmother, was convicted Friday by a jury of conspiracy to wreck the train of which her husband was engineer. Two colored men have been convicted of actually trying to wreck the train, but they testified that Mrs. Vann offered them \$500 for the job.
The woman's husband had declared he did not believe his wife was a party to the plot. Earl Travis, 35, is to go on trial later, charged with plotting with Mrs. Vann. It is claimed Mrs. Vann and Travis had plotted to get rid of Mrs. Vann's elderly husband so they could collect the insurance.

Comptroller Job Protest Is Heard

NORTH CAROLINA DAILIES RESENT FIGHT ON WARREN
Raleigh, N. C., Aug. 21—Daily papers of this state are giving considerable space to the protest being made by the N. A. A. C. P. and other organizations and individuals against the possible appointment of Representative Lindsay C. Warren of this state as comptroller general of the United States.
The comptroller generalship is a fifteen year appointment and carries a greater degree of independence from any kind of control than any other office.
Representative Warren is being opposed by the N. A. A. C. P. and others because as chairman of the house committee on accounts Mr. Warren has supervision over the restaurant in the capitol and in this capacity he has refused to permit colored people to be served in the restaurant, although the white public is admitted freely.
The most sensational incident connected with Representative Warren's Jim Crow regulations occurred in February, 1934, when Miss Mabel Byrd was forcibly ejected from the restaurant by a house detective. Miss Byrd was in company with Miss Amelia Sears, well known white social worker of Chicago.
The incident occurred during the senate committee hearings on the Costigna-Wagner anti-lynching bill. Many colored and white people interested in the bill were present at the hearing and at the noon recess they scattered to various places for luncheon. Congressman DePriest led the nation-wide protest and carried the matter to the floor of the house, where he had one of his debates with Representative Tom Blanton of Texas.

Noted Orchestra Leader Honored

LOUIS ARMSTRONG GUEST OF BING CROSBY PROGRAM
Los Angeles, Cal., Aug. 21—(INF)—As a final honorary gesture before the departure of the celebrated trumpeter, who has been here making a picture with him for Paramount, Bing Crosby, the noted crooner of rock fame, offered Louis "Satchmo" Armstrong to his coast-to-coast audience as guest star via the NBC str-lane slast Thursday night, August 13. Maestro Armstrong, following the grand introduction by Bing Crosby, was enthusiastically received and was accorded a generous round of applause after he had performed on his golden trumpet.
Armstrong finished in the Paramount picture, "Pennies From Heaven," on August 18th. He will take a plane, with his manager, for New Orleans, where the "King of Swing" will join his orchestra and fill an engagement in New Orleans on the night of August 21. It will be a gala homecoming celebration for Louis, who was born in that city thirty-five years ago.

ANNUAL TUSKEGEE-WILBERFORCE GAME AT CHICAGO, OCTOBER 17TH

Tuskegee Institute, Alabama, August 1—Officials representing three railway systems were at the Institute today conferring with Capt. Alvin J. Neely, chairman of the committee on the regulation of athletics, and other athletic officials, in connection with competing transportation arrangements of the Tuskegee Institute Golden Tiger football team and a large number of Tiger supporters to Chicago for the annual football game with Wilberforce university. The game will be played at Soldier Field on Saturday afternoon, October 17th. This brilliant battle has been played in Chicago annually since 1929 and is regarded by the citizens of that city as one of Chicago's most outstanding sports attractions. The period, October 12-17, has been designated as Game week.

FORD CHARGES REPUBLICANS BETRAY LINCOLN TRADITIONS

Scranton, Pa., August 14—In a radio broadcast delivered before a cheering audience of white and Negro miners last Wednesday night at the Argento hall here James W. Ford, Negro communist, vice presidential candidate, assailed Governor Art M. Lamon, republican presidential candidate, as "tied up with the enemies" of the Negro people and of all that is decent and progressive in America.

It was Ford's first speaking engagement in a national tour in which he will cover scores of northern and several southern cities in the next few weeks, traveling by fast train and airplane. He is running on a ticket headed by Earl Browder, national secretary of the communist party and its presidential candidate. Ford was with William Z. Foster, leader of the 1919 steel strike and now national chairman of the communist party.

The Harlem communist leader also attacked President Roosevelt for what he termed his constant retreats "before the pressure of the Hearst republican enemies of the American people," but his heaviest artillery was reserved for the republican candidate, who he declared "symbolizes all that is viciously reactionary, un-American and anti-labor" in the country.

ATHLETE TO BE ACCORDED GREATEST WELCOME IN CITY'S HISTORY

Cleveland, Ohio, Aug. 14—(Special)—Jesse Owens, hailed as the world's greatest all around athlete, whose sensational victories at the Olympics gave him four gold medals, will return home to receive a hero's welcome some time in mid-September, it was announced by a member of the Chamber of Commerce. It will be the greatest civic reception ever accorded an athlete in the history of this city. A mammoth parade along principal streets, a testimonial banquet and the awarding of a plaque to the four times Olympic champion are all a part of the program planned for the youthful athlete's return to the scene of his early track contests.

IMPEACHMENT OF JURIST REJECTED

Harrisburg, Pa., Aug. 14—Admonished to "go and sin no more," Judge Benjamin C. Atlee last week was permitted to retain his seat as Lancaster county judge when the judiciary committee of the house of representatives voted 16-14 to accept the minority report of the sub-committee demanding an apology in preference to the majority report calling for impeachment. Judge Atlee appeared before the judiciary committee in person on Thursday and delivered his apology behind closed doors. Following the apology the committee issued a set of four conclusions which severely reprimanded the jurist for his statements condoning lynching. According to testimony presented before the committee, the judge made the pro-lynch statements July 18th while sentencing Samuel Watson, charged with having enticed two white girls.

The committee's action was assailed by Representative Walker K. Jackson, Richard A. Cooper and Marshall Shepard of Philadelphia and Homer S. Brown of Pittsburgh, who had contended for Judge Atlee's impeachment. They were supported by



a petition of 25,000 signatures sponsored by the National Negro Congress and many civic and professional organizations.

WHITE FARMER DRAWS GUN ON PRISONER

Anniston, Ala., August 14—(CNA)—Quick action on the part of national guardsmen saved Roosevelt Collins, farm laborer, from a lyncher's bullet in the court room where he was being tried on a charge of "rape." When Collins testified that the relations with the white woman he is accused of "raping" were purely voluntary, the woman's husband drew a gun and angrily advanced on the defendant. Guardsmen wrested the gun from him.

The charge against Collins was brought not by the supposed victim of "rape," but by her husband, Joel Hill. The woman took no part in the prosecution. Collins was sentenced to die in the electric chair on September 4th. The jury "deliberated" only twenty minutes. Motion by the defense for a mistrial was denied by Judge R. B. Carr.

ETHIOPIAN ARMIES ENCIRCLE ADDIS ABABA

Port Said, Egypt, August 14—(CNA)—The fascist grip on occupied Ethiopian territory was severely shaken last week as Ras Imru, Ethiopian commander in the northwest, hurled an army of 40,000 troops against the Italian forces occupying Addis Ababa, former Ethiopian capital. The Ethiopian forces are authoritatively reported to have wiped out several Italian outposts in their advance on Addis Ababa.

(A London dispatch reported that Emperor Haile Selassie was seeking British assurance of safe passage through the Anglo-Egyptian Sudan in order to join the Ethiopian defense forces and the Ethiopian government which is functioning in western Ethiopia. The emperor was quoted as indicating that he had received assurances from private sources of a loan for purchase of munitions for his troops.)

THOSE SELFISH UNIONS

The Bystander has never had any sympathy for labor unions which exclude Negroes from membership. The principle is entirely wrong, it is a group fight for consideration for a favored few; to heck with everybody else.

Last week the Pittsburgh Courier, a Democratic paper, carried an article about Negro trainman which we assume to be true. In the south a great many railway firemen, brakemen and flagmen are Negroes; at one time most of them were. The federal government has reorganized the Brotherhood of the A. & L. as the bargaining group to act as spokesman when complaints are made to the railway labor board. Negroes are not admitted into the Brotherhood.

As a result Negro firemen and brakemen have no method of appealing to the labor board except through the Brotherhood, a group which is doing everything possible to eliminate Negroes from those branches of the service. So desperate has the situation become that the Negroes have appealed directly to President Roosevelt for help.

As a matter of fact the Federal government should recognize no unit which excludes a group from membership on the basis of color for it puts the United States in the position of aiding and abetting unfair discrimination. Constantly these groups are charging everybody else with every crime under the sun while their own hands are unclean.

Now that the Federal Government is taking the unions into partnership it ought at least require that they not discriminate against a portion of its citizens.

NOT THE RIGHT THING

Bishop R. R. Wright, Jr., has been chosen to head the drive for the Democrats in New York. The Republicans selected Rev. L. K. Williams to head the Western group with headquarters in Chicago. Thus both parties are relying heavily upon me of "the cloth" to make votes among Negroes.

The Bystander has great respect for both of these men and numbers among its friends bishops and ministers. But it does feel that it is a mistake to have our leading clergymen heading political organizations. They are supposed to provide leadership in religious, moral and social fields and the chances are too great to risk their futures as leading politicians.

One of the most embarrassing things that ever happened to the great A. M. E. church was the act of one of its bishops presiding over the souls of his district with an indictment pending against him for graft. Maybe the Bishop was not guilty but the chances are too risky.

Of course this ministerial leadership is a relic of reconstruction days following the Civil war and the days of the supremacy of the Roman Catholic in Europe. They were the only ones who had the education. However this is not true today. But the Negro is the only group where the hangover exists.

Our ministers have enough religious and social problems before them when they look after their chosen work. And they ought to be interested in good government and this calls for interest in civic affairs—but the jobs of Bishop Wright and Rev. L. K. Williams belong to laymen.

A TERRIBLE EXAMPLE

The state of Kentucky hung a Negro who was found guilty of a criminal attack upon a 71 year old

white woman. The offense provides for capital punishment and of course if the prisoner was guilty beyond a reasonable doubt under the evidence he should have been. There is no argument about that.

The state law permits hanging in public, so the officials provided a most gruesome show for the occasion. The affair was highly advertised. Fifteen thousand men, women and children witnessed the execution. The crowd worked itself into a frenzy, made all sorts of jeering and threatening remarks and when the dead man was cut down a grand rush was made to secure pieces of the rope, scaffold and other paraphernalia used in the execution for souvenirs.

The whole thing was calculated to serve notice on Negroes what might be expected in like cases. But it does more than that. It keeps alive the fallacious theory that in most cases Negroes are lynched for crimes against white women—the predominant theory upon which the white man of the south fights his battle against the Negro.

The action of the authorities was legal but it does great damage to any state which permits such practices.

Recently the editor of The Bystander had occasion to talk with a white man who comes from a town where no Negroes live. He spoke of having met a Negro the day before and was agreeably surprised that he was a fine intelligent gentleman. In other words his experience had not brought him in contact with such people before and about the most he had read in a casual way was the streamlining headlines of the newspaper telling of some gruesome crime like the Kentucky lynching.

And where the newspapers do the Negro so much damage is the use of the word Negro is the description of every act of the whole story. Instead of using the man's name occasionally and such word as the prisoner or the defendant its always the Negro this and the Negro that. And its hurts. What chance would white men living in small northern communities have forming good opinions of Negroes? Very little.

Health Talks

HEMORRHOIDS

(How Best Treated)

Hemorrhoids are dilated blood vessels that cause trouble because they bleed, become ulcerated, or prolapsed. While a few sufferers keep comfortable by the use of proper diet and mineral oil to keep the bowels regular, yet there is no medical treatment that gives results.

By using pain killing ointments and suppositories one can get relief during an acute attack.

Treatment
Those who suffer with protruding piles that come out when the bowels move, or those whose piles are right on the oval margin partly in and partly out have to undergo a careful operation to have them removed.

When the piles are high up inside of the rectum away from the opening, the injection method of treatment is usually most successful and convenient for the patient since it does not require the patient to quit his job, as the work can be done at the physicians office with little or no inconvenience to the patient. There is no necessity for an anesthetic and five or six trips to the doctor's office completes the job.

Instead of using the man's name occasionally and such word as the prisoner or the defendant its always the Negro this and the Negro that.

What chance would white men living in small northern communities have forming good opinions of Negroes? Very little.

As a result Negro firemen and brakemen have no method of appealing to the labor board except through the Brotherhood, a group which is doing everything possible to eliminate Negroes from those branches of the service.

As a matter of fact the Federal government should recognize no unit which excludes a group from membership on the basis of color for it puts the United States in the position of aiding and abetting unfair discrimination.

Constantly these groups are charging everybody else with every crime under the sun while their own hands are unclean.

Now that the Federal Government is taking the unions into partnership it ought at least require that they not discriminate against a portion of its citizens.

NOT THE RIGHT THING

Bishop R. R. Wright, Jr., has been chosen to head the drive for the Democrats in New York. The Republicans selected Rev. L. K. Williams to head the Western group with headquarters in Chicago. Thus both parties are relying heavily upon me of "the cloth" to make votes among Negroes.

The Bystander has great respect for both of these men and numbers among its friends bishops and ministers. But it does feel that it is a mistake to have our leading clergymen heading political organizations. They are supposed to provide leadership in religious, moral and social fields and the chances are too great to risk their futures as leading politicians.

One of the most embarrassing things that ever happened to the great A. M. E. church was the act of one of its bishops presiding over the souls of his district with an indictment pending against him for graft. Maybe the Bishop was not guilty but the chances are too risky.

Of course this ministerial leadership is a relic of reconstruction days following the Civil war and the days of the supremacy of the Roman Catholic in Europe. They were the only ones who had the education. However this is not true today. But the Negro is the only group where the hangover exists.

Our ministers have enough religious and social problems before them when they look after their chosen work. And they ought to be interested in good government and this calls for interest in civic affairs—but the jobs of Bishop Wright and Rev. L. K. Williams belong to laymen.
