Des Moines Gives Governor Alf M. Landon Royal Welcome Suvich, Italian Diplomat, Due in Washington Soon

Prelate Defends His Support Of Roosevelt's Administration

Wilberforce, O., Sept. 24—(C)—Bishop Reverdy C. Ransom of the A. M. E. church has taken his (type-writer) in hand and made a hot and searching reply to Editor J. G. Robinson of the A. M. E. Church Review of Philadelphia, who recently sent out an open letter to the bishop demanding that he "desist" from his support of President Roosevelt and the Democratic administration, and return to the "Faith of His Fathers"—the Republican party.

Bishop Ransom, in his own inimitable style, with logic that is both lucid and piercing, makes the following classic retort: "Dr. J. G. Robinson has released an apostolical jeremiad in the form of an open letter to me, in which he rebukes me for my apostasy to the Republican party and pleads for me to embrace his form of political orthodoxy. His open letter to me would avail little in accomplishing the purpose for which it is intended unless it received wide publicity among the voters whom it is intended to reach. No doubt the Republican national or state committee will attend to the business of circulating his archaic form of political propaganda.

"Dr. Robinson calls upon me to leave the Democratic party and help to elect Governor Alf M. Landon president, and once more put the Republican party in command of the United States."

Jailed for Houston Riot, Prisoner Free

WAR DEPARTMENT RELEASES 24TH INFANTRY "MARTYR"

New York, Sept. 24—Roy Tyler, who has been confined in the federal penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas, for his part in the so-called Houston riot involving members of the Twenty-fourth infantry, has had the rest of his sentence remitted, it was announced by the war department this week. The warden of the penitentiary has been advised of the action of the department and it is expected that Tyler will be released at once.

Tyler is one of the last of the former Twenty-fourth infantry men for whose release the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People has been carrying on a battle for so many years. There still remains in prison Stewart W. Phillips. All the other men have been paroled or pardoned. The N. A. A. C. P. is still at work on Phillips' case and is hoping that he may be released soon.

20,000 Hear Farm Address Tuesday

Family Type Farmer Must Be Protected, Nominee Declares

Protection and preservation of the family type farmer is a philosophy which runs like a thread through the Republican platform, Gov. Alf M. Landon of Kansas, appearing before 20,000 Iowans who filed into the state fair grandstand and paddock and one of the largest crowds of his presidential campaign, revealed in Des Moines on Tuesday night, in his opening drive for the midwestern states. Two thousand Negroes from over the state were in the enthusiastic throng.

"If I'm Elected"

Under glare of keig lights, twelve Nyon towers focused on the platform and as flashlight cameras boomed, the Republican nominee continued. "It is in keeping with the American tradition which is based on preserving individual opportunity." "If I'm elected I shall fulfill all outstanding obligations with the American farmer" he stated. More than fifty-five times he was forced to pause, during his speech, by tremendous applause and wild demonstration.

The G. O. P. program provides for cash benefits, drought relief payments, conservation and a surplus storage plan. Landon also pledged adequate credit at reasonable rates for purchase or refinancing of homes. "The cards have been stacked against the farmer through foreign commercial policies and lack of tariff effectively on surplus products. We must not let them be driven to the wall!" he thundered in conclusion, making a grand exit amid a deafening demonstration while the band struck up "Oh Sussanah," the 1936 Republican's war song.

Radio Hookup

The Landon farm address, which was broadcast over the Columbia and National broadcasting systems, was preceded by introductory speeches by Carl H. Cook, chairman of the Republican state central committee, and Miss Agnes Samuelson, state superintendent of public instruction. Paraphrasing Lincoln's Gettysburg address, she asserted that a neighboring prairie state there had sent a leader who believes in upholding the American institution, a standard bearer—Alf M. Landon.

As Miss Samuelson spoke those words, a searchlight played upon the race track course to reveal the automobile of Governor Landon rushing rapidly toward the rostrum added a dramatic touch to the occasion. Fully ten minutes of cheering, whistling, hand waving was staged before the governor could begin his speech.

Negro Leaders

Senator L. J. Dickinson of Iowa was loudly acclaimed as he mounted the platform preceding the speaking program, as were Berry Halden of Charlton, candidate for U. S. senator, and George Wilson, candidate for governor. Other candidates were introduced. Among the Republican leaders, officials and party dignitaries seated on the platform were Mr. and Mrs. J. G. Browne of Des Moines and J. R. A. Crossland, colored voters advisor of St. Joseph, Missouri. Dr. Crossland is also a physician there. Mr. Browne is the president and

Carry Jim-Crow Fight to South

Browder Visits Scottsboro Boys

Birmingham, Ala., Sept. 27—(CNA)

The nine Scottsboro boys, held in solitary confinement in Jefferson prison here since last April, had a presidential candidate as a visitor last week.

The visitor was Earl Browder, presidential candidate of the party which has written into its 1936 platform the freedom of the nine persecuted lads. The Communist candidate went to the jail almost directly from a rally in this city, at which he called on Negro and white workers in the south to unite to beat back the attacks of the Liberty League, Hearst and the "big mill owners and landlords."

During his talk with the boys, Browder assured them that the Communist party would raise the issue of their freedom throughout the election campaign and would continue its efforts to mobilize every possible support for them.

The Communist leader was accompanied on his visit to the prison by Joseph Gelders, southern representative of the National Committee for the Defense of Political Prisoners and a party of newspaper men.

Founder of the Negro Republican Voters League of Iowa

More than 300 newspaper correspondents from all corners of the United States, augmented by camera, motion picture, news reel and radio men, swarmed the special press section to cover the high spots of the agricultural phase of the "Landon campaign for President." The Iowa Bystander was represented and was the only colored newspaper to cover the event. At the Landon press conference luncheon at the Hotel Every on Wednesday for 300 Iowa editors and publishers, Atty. J. B. Morris was in attendance.

WAYLON DENIES GUILT ON MURDER CHARGE

Rufus Waylon, 32, roomer at the home of Jerry Griffin, 49, of 1370 E. Nineteenth street, pleaded not guilty to a charge of murdering Griffin when arraigned before Municipal Judge Charles Coater on Wednesday.

Waylon, accused of striking Griffin on the head with a club during a fight at Griffin's home Tuesday night, was ordered held in jail without bond pending a hearing October 5th. When arrested he claimed self-defense.

This is the third murder involving Negroes in recent weeks. James Comadore is held in jail for the slaying of his wife last month; Layman Tatum is charged with the knife murder of Earl Hughes on September 1.

STEEL TRUST TURNS DOWN WAGE INCREASE

Pittsburgh, Sept. 24—(CNA)—The Carnegie Illinois Steel Corporation turned thumbs down on wage increases for its 90,000 employees. A spokesman for the United States Steel Corporation, of which the Carnegie-Ilinois is a subsidiary, said that this refusal also held good for its other subsidiaries which employ 200,000 workers.

N. A. A. C. P. IS TOLD FLAG AGAINST LYNCHING IS "WRONG"

Washington, D. C., Sept. 24—Although he refused to lend moral aid or encouragement to poor, invaded, gas-poisoned Ethiopia when the legions of Benito Mussolini ravished that nation, President Roosevelt is on the verge of officially recognizing King Victor Emmanuel of Italy, Mussolini's puppet monarch as "Emperor of Ethiopia," it was indicated at the State Department last Thursday.

Such recognition would be tantamount to United States' approval through the Roosevelt administration of Italian conquest of Ethiopia.

League of Nations

While Emperor Selassie waits in London the result of the League of Nations' expected refusal to seat his delegates at Saturday's session of the League Council, Baron Suvich, newly appointed Ambassador to the United States from the Kingdom of Italy, prepares to leave for Washington carrying credentials not only from the King of Italy but from the same king whom Mussolini has made the new "Emperor of Ethiopia."

The State Department denied reports in high circles here that Baron Suvich's credentials had already been received.

Baron Suvich

All Italy's ambassadors to other nations carry credentials both from the King of Italy and the "Emperor of Ethiopia." Recognition of Baron Suvich here is tantamount to definite approval by the administration at Washington of Selassie's defeat.

Sentiment in the United States has been generally sympathetic to Selassie. Much opposition may be expressed against President Roosevelt's receiving Mussolini's representative with credentials from Selassie's successor.

Negroes Refuse

American Negroes refuse to admit that Emperor Haile Selassie is no longer "King of Kings." The administration recognition of Baron Suvich, however, will admit just this. Diplomatically, the State Department reports unofficially there is absolutely no hitch in plans for reception of the Baron.

Acceptable

The term, "Emperor of Ethiopia," on the Baron's credentials is perfectly acceptable here. Widespread protest against President Roosevelt's recognition of the verbiage "Emperor of Ethiopia" on Baron Suvich's credentials is expected to sweep the nation.

Ethiopian Capital Scene of Fighting

WHITE GIRL REPORTS FASCIST REIGN OF TERROR IN ADDIS

London, Sept. 24—(CNA)—A murderous reign of terror is being conducted by the Italian forces of Addis Ababa and other Ethiopian towns within the sphere of the Italian occupation, Miss Freda Collier, a Canadian girl who arrived here last week from Ethiopia, reports.

"All Abyssinians suspected of intrigues are put against a wall and shot," Miss Collier told reporters. "Fighting still goes on. Before the collapse of Addis Ababa many Abyssinians buried arms and ammunition outside the town. These they dig up and use to attack."

N. A. A. C. P. IS TOLD FLAG AGAINST LYNCHING IS "WRONG"

New York, Sept. 24—The flying of a black flag reminding the public that another lynching has taken place is "wrong," the N. A. A. C. P. was advised this week by Horatio A. Smith of Boston, Mass. Mr. Smith wrote a letter to Irwin T. Dorch, president of the Boston branch of the N. A. A. C. P., objecting to the flag and asking Mr. Dorch to pass it on to the national headquarters in New York.

In a reply to Mr. Smith, Walter White, N. A. A. C. P. secretary, thanked him for his frank opinion and for his obvious hatred of lynching, but pointed out that it has been the experience of the association that the American people do need to have lynching emphasized by every possible method. Mr. White also points out that for twenty-seven years the N. A. A. C. P. has been appealing to the leading journals and the influential men of affairs to lend their influence to wipe out lynching.

Olympic Track Ace Slated for Speeches

JESSE OWENS TO TOUR EAST—REASON UNKNOWN

New York City, Sept. 24—Jesse Owens, Olympic track star, will make a public appearance in ten eastern cities during the week of September 28th, it was learned from the athlete himself Monday when he was interviewed here by reporters.

Asked if his visit would be political in nature, he would not say; but he did make clear his stand in the national election: "I am for Governor Landon and will vote for him," Owens declared. "And have made no statements to the contrary."

Francis E. Rivers, director of the eastern colored division, Republican national committee, said Jesse would probably talk briefly about the relief issue in his ten speeches. Mr. Rivers also stated that Owens would appear next week in Boston, Providence, New Haven, Brooklyn, Newark, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Pittsburgh and Buffalo.

empire building program by Italy in Ethiopia at the end of the rainy season in October has been disclosed to the department of commerce here. A twelve hour air service between Rome and Addis Ababa is announced, and plans for a new flying field at the Ethiopian capital are being made. Construction of 2,500 miles of modern highways will be the first step in the new program.

About 1,000 technicians, 10,000 Italian laborers and 70,000 natives will be used in the new development. Engineers are already in Addis Ababa mapping roads. Several companies have been formed to produce coffee, milk, cotton, cocoa, hides and meat. Several commissions have gone to Ethiopia to study the possibilities of producing lead, gold, iron and oil.

Names of Streets in Brussels

The names of the streets in Brussels speak of everyday life and everyday things. There are Fish street, Poultry street, Butter street and the Street of the Lost Bread. Another of Brussels' streets, that of the Six Young Men, tells of tragedy--of six youths who were out playing jokes one night and by accident smeared the face of an agent of the country's foreign ruler with tar. They were caught and hanged, and later the street in which they lived was named the Street of the Six Young Men in their memory.

Heresy in 1635

Atger Williams, founder of the Baptist Church in America, went on trial for heresy in Massachusetts Bay Colony in 1635 because he opposed persecution of Quakers. Four years before, Massachusetts had decreed that suffrage should be limited to church members. He was found guilty and banished, and the hanging or whipping of Quakers continued.

Twenty Years, Average Reign

A study of the lives of several hundred kings, emperors, czars and other monarchs who have ruled during the past 800 years reveals that their average reign was 29 years, an astonishingly long period considering the fact that the majority lived in constant danger and that about one third met violent deaths--Cotton's Weekly.

Century Plant Believed to Be Oddest Ice House

The maguoy or century plant is used in making ice at Durango City, Mexico, and is said to be the only icehouse of the kind in the world, notes a writer in the Indianapolis News.

When the century plant is about eight years old the leaves, from which the pith has been taken, are spread out on straw in the plaza, in the public gardens and other open spaces, with the concave sides of the leaves uppermost. Then about two quarts of water is poured into each leaf and while freezing is unknown in the city, under any other natural conditions, the water freezes in the maguoy leaves and in the morning hundreds of chunks of ice are gathered and put into ice boxes, each about 20 feet deep and 30 feet square. The supply usually lasts until the middle of July or the first of August and is large enough to be a commercial factor in the ice market of the region of more than 30,000 persons. Durango City is about 6,000 feet above sea level and at this altitude there is rapid cooling, after evaporation, to which the water is exposed by the broad, shallow surface of the leaves. This is believed to be the scientific explanation of the odd ice plant. There is a legend that the method was learned in the Seventeenth century by Father Jose Lopez, an elderly priest, who also was a scientist.

Measurement of Time Is as Old as Time Itself

Time's measurement goes back to the beginning of time itself. As for modern time measurement, its beginnings are considered to be tangled up in the mysticism, superstition and sun worship of the Chaldeans, says the Philadelphia Inquirer. This ancient people originated the week of seven days from the sun and moon and the five planets: Venus, Mars, Mercury, Jupiter and Saturn. These were their gods and they worshipped them. So they set aside one day each week for the worship of the sun, another for the moon and so on. The sun was their most important god and its day of worship was called sun day from which we get Sunday. The moon was the next important god and its worship day was called moon day or Monday. The Chaldeans divided the time required for the sun to traverse its path through the belt of the zodiac, in the 12 constellations of the Zodiac. In the year they evolved the 12 months of the year. They also divided the day into 12 hours and then the hour into smaller units.

The Junior League

The Junior League originated among a small group of young women in New York city who in 1900 sent a large number of roses from a party to a hospital. Later they and others banded together "for mutual benefit and the good of the community." From giving entertainments for the benefit of a college settlement they extended their activities to many other forms of social aid. Similar organizations of young women were formed in other cities out of which grew a national association of leagues, each interested in its particular ways in the educational, cultural and civic conditions of its community and in volunteer-charitable and service.

A notary public is a public officer who takes acknowledgment of, or otherwise attests or certifies, deeds and other writings, or copies of them, usually under his official seal, to make them authentic, and takes affidavits, depositions, and protests of negotiable paper. In the United States appointments are made by the governors of the states. The oath is as follows: "I do solemnly swear that I will support the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of the state of --, and that I will faithfully and impartially discharge the duty of notary public for -- county, according to the best of my skill and ability; so help me God."

New York City, Sept. 24—A widespread revolt flared here last week among the city's most prominent ministers against the unauthorized inclusion of their names in a purported list of members of the Good Neighbor League, a Democratic campaign organization whose efforts are directed to re-election of President Roosevelt.

The revolt was expressed among all denominations, while A. M. E. church prelates not only resented use of their names, but declared their general opposition against Bishop R. R. Wright, of the A. M. E. church, and co-chairman of the Good Neighbor League.

Two weeks ago New York newspapers published a list of eighty some leading Harlem and Brooklyn clergymen and several professional men in a story describing a meeting at the Harlem Y. M. C. A., September 10th, of the Good Neighbor League. The article indicated that these men had enrolled as League members under the leadership of Bishop Wright and were definitely interested in campaigning for President Roosevelt.

MINISTERS INCENSED OVER CHURCH POLITICS

New York City, Sept. 24—Incensed over flagrant charges that the Negro half of Negroes in relation to the churches in general had joined forces with the Roosevelt-backed Good Neighbor League, more than one hundred fifty Negro ministers will gather at St. Mark's M. disfranchisement of Negro voters in the south. If this be true, why did not President Taft do something about it when he and the Republican administration were in control of the government? The same holds true of former Presidents Harding, Coolidge and Hoover. These men were at the head of our government and had full control of our governmental machine. I challenge Dr. Robinson to point out a single instance where these Republican presidents ever did or attempted to do, anything on behalf of Negroes in relation to the things against which he complains.

"He gives his whole-hearted support to the Roosevelt-backed Good Neighbor League, more than one hundred fifty Negro ministers will gather at St. Mark's M. 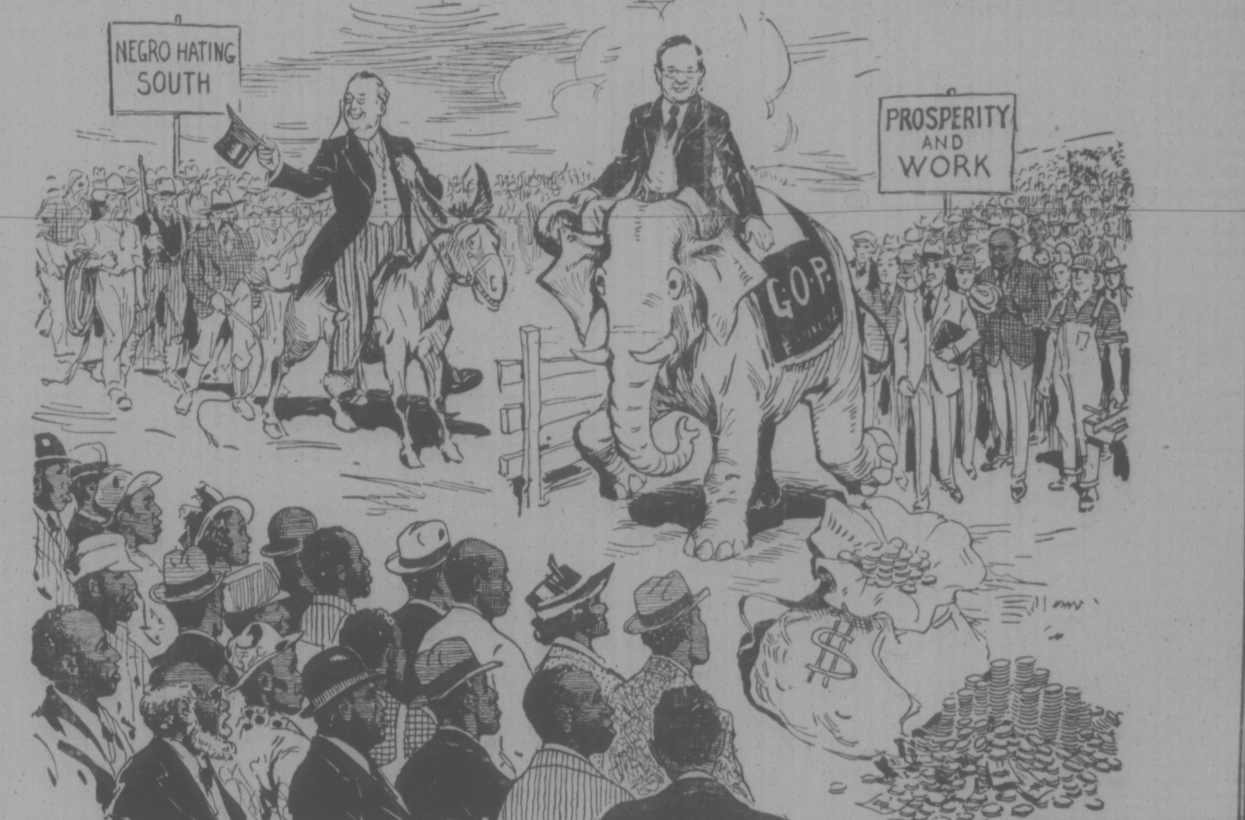

TALMADGE SILENT AS USUAL ON GEORGIA LYNCHING

Atlanta, Sept. 17—Gov. Eugene (Chain Gang) Talmadge made no reply to a telegram from the N. A. A. C. P. this week asking him to make good his boast that Georgia could take care of its own affairs without federal aid. The telegram referred to the lynching on September 6th of A. L. McCamy at Dalton, Georgia.

In closing his campaign for a seat in the United States senate with a speech at Dalton, a few hundred feet from where McCamy was lynched, Talmadge said nothing about the lynching or about the four lynchings that have taken place in Georgia in 1936. Talmadge, who has been dubbed "His Chain Gang Excellency" by Secretary Harold L. Ickes, and his whole ticket, from his candidate for governor on down, was defeated.

New York, Sept. 17—A huge black flag bearing the inscription, "A Man Was Lynched Yesterday," in white block letters floated above Fifth avenue Tuesday of this week from the offices of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

The flag, which is the latest method adopted by the association in its campaign against lynching, was hung out following the lynching of A. L. McCamy at Dalton, Georgia, on September 6th. The association offices were closed Labor Day, so the flag was The N. A. A. C. P. announced that the anti-lynching flag would be flown after each lynching. Several informal suggestions have been made to the association that individuals over the country follow its example and hang cut smaller flags after each lynching, but no official action has been taken on the suggestions.

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SHAMEFUL

The Negro Democrats in the east held a political rally in Madison Square Garden, New York, Tuesday night. They named it a celebration calling attention to the progress made by Negroes during the past seventy years. Bishop R. R. Wright, Jr., head of the eastern department of Negro Division, Democratic National Committee, was the leading figure at the meeting. It was also a setting for the receipt of a telegram from President Roosevelt felicitating the Negro on his achievements.

It is funny to see a so-called celebration commemorating the progress of the Negro being put on by Democrats when as a matter of fact, the Democrats have done more to impede the progress of the Negro than any other organization.

Everybody knows that Bishop Wright did not rent Madison Square Garden for a Negro celebration; but Jim Farley did rent it for a Democratic rally.

Missionary Societies are studying the Negro question in their 1936 fall and winter program. It is a fine undertaking calculated to do a great service both for the Negro and the nation as a whole.

One short coming to an intelligent approach of the race problem is the lack of knowledge on the part of the masses of the white people of the Negro. In most instances their knowledge has been limited to a few complimentary articles in the newspapers, or a casual inquiry about some that call for no answer which might enlighten one on the true value of the race. The result has been a breeder of too much suspicion, distrust and antagonism between the races.

The Bystander hopes this study will center on what is going on in the respective communities so that the study may be real; that up to date periodicals will be used that the Negro of today rather than fifty years ago may be studied in the light of a modern world. Negro church people will do a big service if they help give such information to their white friends.

Health Talks

IS THE COMMON COLD PREVENTABLE

To draw a sharp distinction between common colds, grippe, and influenza is almost futile; they are different manifestations of one and the same thing, and successful treatment of all three is prevention and the successful prophylaxis of their complications.

Cold and grippe occur with greatest frequency during the winter and spring, while influenza shows no predilection for season and may occur at any time causing the well known symptoms of "cold in the head," headache, chilliness, pains all over the body especially in back and legs, loss of appetite, fever and malaise. The variability of these symptoms largely determine the diagnosis; if the attack is mild with the symptoms confined chiefly to the head and eyes it is a cold, if symptoms are severe, the grippe; if very severe and occurring during an epidemic, it is influenza.

Prophylaxis—chilling of any portion of the body and excessive fatigue both lower the resistance to the infection and should be avoided especially during inclement months. The crowding together of large numbers of people in closed spaces help to facilitate the spread of the disease. It has been estimated that over 10,000,000 working days are lost annually because of colds, grippe, and flu involving loss in wages and salaries of at least \$120,000,000. This enormous yearly loss has caused anxiety on the part of science, employers and employees.

Intramuscular injections of vaccines building up a patient's resistance to the common cold is being used to a decided advantage in many cases by causing a decrease in the number and severity of colds. This immunization is given to the patient from the daily routine. These immunizations should begin during late summer or early fall.

Tuskegee Inst., Ala., Sept. 17—Coming direct from a visit to the drought area, Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace turned his attention today to the problems of soil conservation and rehabilitation as it affects the south and the Negro.
