## No Guarantee Posted for Fletcher Henderson Band Here - Johnson

## G-Men's Brunette Capture Arouses '34 Lynch Inquiry

### "NOT HIDING FROM THOMPSON," SAYS DANCE PROMOTER

Fletcher Henderson and his orchestra did not play for a dance scheduled at the Armory on Thanksgiving eve, because no money was paid to back up the guarantee, according to Jesse Johnson of St. Louis, promoter, whose name appeared on the contract for the band's appearance. "I am not hiding," was the statement elicited from Johnson following a report that Atty. J. Nelson Thompson, Des Moines lawyer, had sworn out a warrant against him and was seeking his arrest. "I have no fear of what Thompson will do to me," said Johnson. "I just told him if he could raise the \$200 the band would play; if not, I would get on back to St. Louis. He can find me at my office at 2 N. Jefferson avenue." Johnson conducts a chain of business enterprises occupying a half block on Jefferson avenue.

"Thirty Dollars"  
Johnson said that Tity Thompson, president of the El Producto club, who was sponsoring the holiday dance, could not post his half of the \$500 guarantee, due on the day of the dance. After a twenty-four hours' wait, thirty dollars were offered, he stated. When the amount was not forthcoming, the engagement was called off.

In his first statement, in which he estimated 2,000 dance patrons were disappointed, Atty. Thompson said he had turned the contract over to the American Federation of Musicians for action. "No stone will be left unturned to punish the guilty party, whether it be Fletcher Henderson, Jesse Johnson, Ed Fox of Chicago, owner of the Terrace Garden, or the Consolidated Radio Artists, Incorporated," he declared.

Cleveland, Dec. 24—(ANP)—Jesse Owens, Olympic star, will make his debut as a professional runner in Havana on December 28th, the day after Christmas, according to an announcement last week by Marty Forkins, his manager. Owens will run 100 meters against time between halves of the football game between the Cuban Athletic club and the Miami university freshman team.

## Mrs. James Roosevelt Will Seek To Raise \$500,000 Endowment

New York, Dec. 24—(ANP)—Mrs. James Roosevelt, mother of the U. S. president, will serve as honorary chairman of a campaign to raise a \$500,000 endowment fund for Bethune-Cookman college of Daytona Beach, Fla., it was announced Wednesday following a tea at Mrs. Roosevelt's home.

More than fifty persons prominent in social and charitable work attended the tea. Mrs. Mary McLeod Bethune, president of the college and national NYA official, explained how she founded Bethune-Cookman in 1904 on \$1.50 cash, a log cabin and five students, and explained that the half million would go toward student loan funds and scholarships, a new library and reserve fund, which is expected to lift the institution to an "A" rating by the Southern Association of Colleges and Universities. It now has 450 students and fifteen buildings.

Mrs. Estelle M. Sternberger, white, vice president of the National Council of Women of the United States and trustee of the college, will be active chairman of the campaign. First contribution came from Frederick C. Walcott, former United States senator from Connecticut and trustee of the school, who gave his check for \$500.

Cleveland, Ohio, Dec. 24—(ANP)—State Senator Keith Lawrence pledged himself as being in support of the program of the N. A. A. C. P. in their fight to have the Ohio civil rights statute amended during the next session of the state legislature. In a letter addressed to President Gillespie of the N. A. A. C. P., Senator Lawrence expressed his desire to co-operate and give any assistance requested in furthering their fight for absolute civil justice for Negroes of Ohio.

## Hooded Order Is Threatening City

KU KLUX KLAN IN POWER IN MIAMI  
Miami, Fla., Dec. 24—(ANP)—Ku Klux Klan government in Miami came out into the open this week. Former suspicions and allegations that the dread Ku Klux Klan had a hand deep into the city government of Miami and surrounding Dade county became a certainty Wednesday when the Miami Tribune, tabloid daily newspaper, printed a three column article stating that unless the city commission fired its safety director immediately the Klan would forthwith "take over the policing of the Negro district."

The article was prompted by a letter which it stated would be delivered before the commission at its next meeting. The communication was signed by Dade County No. 26, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan.

A direct link between the present Klan conduct and the general lawlessness in the wealthy Miami Beach section was seen in the new move, since the safety director has been engaged in a campaign to close swanky gambling joints and drive out millionaire gangsters, instead of victimizing shoeing "numbers" operators in Negro sections, as has been the usual practice.

## Blind Negro Boy Gets CYO Award

HOSPITAL AIDS HANDICAPPED YOUTH IN GETTING EDUCATION  
Chicago, Dec. 24—(ANP)—One of the most commendable fellowship awards made in this city in recent years was the one given last week to Gordon Walker, age a totally blind boy, the award being made by the Catholic Youth Organization and enabling him to complete his high school and college education at the famous Braille school in Jacksonville, Ill. Three other blind youths—one Catholic, one Jewish and one a white Protestant—were given similar fellowships, which will amount to approximately \$5,000 to each youth. All will be educated at the Braille school, which is one of the best schools in the country for the totally blind.

# IMPROVED UNIFORM INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL Lesson

**Lesson for December 27**  
THE SPREAD OF CHRISTIANITY IN SOUTHERN EUROPE  
LESSON TEXT—Hebrews 2:14, 11:32-12:2  
GOLDEN TEXT—"The kingdoms of this world are become the kingdoms of our Lord, and of His Christ; and he shall reign for ever and ever. Revelation 11:15."  
PRIMARY AND ADULT TOPIC—The Spread of the Gospel in Southern Europe.

History has marveled at the spread of the Christian faith in a wicked and hostile world. Dark were the days upon the earth when the handful of believers in Jesus Christ set out to preach the gospel. Why did the Christian faith spread so rapidly and build so soundly the future? The answer is found in our lesson for today. It is threefold. They declared

**I. A Great Salvation (2:1-4).**

We need to learn of God how to regard our fellow men lest we follow the crowd in giving the wrong sequence of thought. We have noted the apostolic message concerning God's great salvation. We have seen that the gospel is indeed the power of God which not only saves but which produces heroic living.

The picture in the writer's mind is the great Olympic arena. All around are the spectators. A race is to be run. What a striking picture of Christian life. For it, too, is a race. It has a prize, both here and in the hereafter. It calls for intense activity. It brings us before those who either jeer at us or cheer us on our way.

Many are the things which may hinder a runner. One thing he cannot do is carry weights. These may not be sinful things but those which may be a hindrance to spiritual progress. Let us put them away.

And then there is sin—that treacherous enemy that so subtly "begets us" and entangles us. By God's grace let us cast it aside.

Greater than all the hindrances is the One in whose name we run and to whom we look for victory. Looking past the difficulties, the spectators, and even the course itself, we see him who is "the author and perfecter of our faith." The secret of victory is to

Turn your eyes upon Jesus, Look full in His wonderful face.

If there is a man on earth to be envied it is he who, amidst the sharpest assaults from his own passions, from fortune, from society, never falters in his allegiance to God and the inward monitor.

MORE POWER TO THE BOY-SCOUTS

Last week, the Tall Corn Council, Boy Scouts of America, held its last Court of Honor for 1935 at Lincoln High school. More than two hundred scouts and scouters were promoted or received honors signifying their elevation to higher grades. Among them were several Negro scouts thus demonstrating that Troop 59 is keeping step with other troops in the council.

Preceding the awards, the scout officials presented a group of scouts in a skit demonstrating the scout program: interesting boys in the work and their development both in scouting and learning to become better citizens. It was interesting to watch.

In each act Negro boys were included—in fact the program demonstrated that there is no color line in scouting. And this is not the only instance where that is true for the Tall Corn Council has made it a practice to take the Negro scouts and scouters in on everything and let them progress as far as they like.

The Tall Corn Council is to be congratulated on their program of fair play. And they make just as much progress and do even more good than those organizations that attempt to hedge the Negro off to himself whenever and wherever the opportunity presents itself.

IT'S UP TO THE POLITICIANS

January first is near and along with many other changes will come new public officials at the State house and the court house. It is at this time that plans are made for the conduct of various offices including the personal in the departments for the year.

In the State house Democrats are in control and, of course, Negro Democrats have the responsibility of seeing that some of the fine things promised during the campaign are fulfilled. In the Polk county court house Republicans are in control and naturally Negro Republicans have the responsibility there.

Health Talks

ACUTE ALCOHOLISM

Alcohol has been used as a stimulant or a narcotic since earliest historical records. Symptoms of poisoning usually appear when the blood contains 0.1 per cent, and if the concentration be increased 0.5 per cent the result may be fatal. Pure alcoholic drinks when taken in sufficient quantities can just as easily cause poisoning as imure ones.

Alcohol when imbibed in small quantities, whether in the form of spirits, wines or brewed liquors, produces exhilaration and a general feeling of well being; it decreases the sense of fatigue, and gives to the individual an increased jollity and the idea of enhanced capacity for accomplishment and coincident importance; but with larger quantities, this stage is rapidly passed and the individual becomes obnoxious, he develops a mental confusion, loss of memory, change of personality, some individuals becoming noisy and boisterous, and others morose and sullen. If sufficient alcohol is taken, these symptoms may progress to somnolence, unconsciousness, coma and sometimes death.

Chronic drinkers of alcohol sometimes develop a form of insanity known as delirium tremens, with signs of excitement and restlessness.
