Resets Court Hearings April 19 for Six-Year Old Scottsboro Cases Force Gavagan Measure Before House Committee

NAACP Protests Inhuman Policy of Discrimination

MRS. W. C. HANDY KEPT WAITING HOUR IN AMBULANCE

New York, April 1—In a vigorous protest against the treatment accorded the late Mrs. W. C. Handy by Knickerbocker hospital of this city, the N. A. A. C. P. has written Mayor Fiorello H. La Guardia demanding that all city funds and services now extended to Knickerbocker hospital be withdrawn because the institution refuses to accept Negro patients.

The incident which stirred all Harlem to anger was the refusal of Knickerbocker hospital on March 11th to admit Mrs. W. C. Handy for treatment. Mrs. Handy, 76, wife of the composer of the world famous "St. Louis Blues," was visited by her physician at 2 a. m. March 11th and immediate hospitalization was ordered. A reservation was made for her at Knickerbocker hospital and a private ambulance engaged to take her there.

Diplomatic Policy Is Noted in Africa

Monrovia, Liberia, April 1—(ANP)—Recent developments in Liberia over a period of the past year seem to point to a new diplomatic policy on the part of this, the last independent black nation in the world. Overtures have been made quietly, it was learned from unofficial sources this week, to Russia, Japan, Turkey and Poland.

It is reported that the extensive brief L. Dennis, secretary of the treasury, Liberia, when he traveled around the world ostensibly on a pleasure jaunt, was in reality a secret diplomatic mission, sponsored by U. S. Minister Lester A. Walton.

MURDER DR. MARTIN'S SONS IN ADDIS ABABA MASSACRE

London, April 1—(ANP)—Two English trained sons of Dr. Wamneh C. Martin, Ethiopian minister to London, were among the nearly 7,000 natives massacred at Addis Ababa in reprisals conducted by the Italians for the attempted assassination of the viceroy, Marshal Rodolfo Graziani.

SCHEDULED FOR APPEAL OF HEYWOOD PATTERSON, ONE OF NINE DEFENDANTS

Montgomery, Ala.—(SNS)—Action on the appeal from a seventy-five year sentence of Heywood Patterson, one of the nine defendants of the internationally famous Scottsboro case, was delayed by the supreme court of Alabama on Friday and the appeal hearing reset for the week of April 19th. The action came on the sixth anniversary of the beginning of the case, March 25, 1931, the day the boys were taken from a freight train at Paint Rock, Ala. and accused of the assault of Mrs. Victoria Price and Ruby Bates, white women, one of whom later denied the attack.

Patterson has been sentenced four times. Three times he was condemned to the electric chair. Twice the United States supreme court reversed the verdict and one death sentence was set aside by the trial judge.

Birmingham, Ala., April 1—Easter cheer in the form of cigarettes, candy, fruit, stationery and stamps was taken to the nine Scottsboro defendants in jail here Sunday by Mrs. Daisy E. Lampkin, national field secretary of the N. A. A. C. P., and Mesdames H. C. Bryant and E. A. Bradford, of the Birmingham branch of the N. A. A. C. P. The committee reports all the boys are in good health and hopeful that the next trial will bring their release.

Nat'l Negro Health Week April 4-11

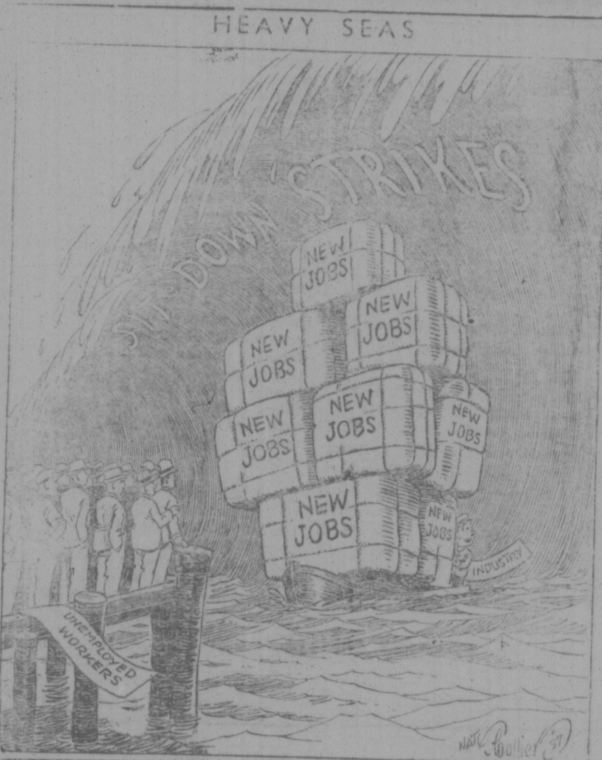
The 23rd Annual observance of the National Negro Health Week is designated for April 4th to continue for one week. The colored ministers are asked to give part of their sermon to "Health."

In addition to the drama activities, the Art Festival will include the Lower Mississippi Valley Music Festival, featuring "Heritage," a folk-song pageant by the author-director, Frederick Hall, and a two hundred voice community chorus which will sing Samuel Coleridge Taylor's "Death of Minnehaha."



Redmond's Fight On Tennessee U Is Nearing End

Memphis, April 1—A ruling on whether the University of Tennessee should admit William B. Redmond, 2d, to its school of pharmacy will be handed down probably on April 5 by Chancellor L. D. Bejach. Redmond was represented by Charles H. Houston, special counsel of the N. A. A. C. P. in New York; Z. Alexander Looby of Nashville, and Leon A. Ransom, of Washington. Counsel for the university was Edwin F. Hunt and W. C. Cook, assistant attorneys general.

U. S. HEALTH SERVICE APPOINTS PHYSICIAN FOR SPECIAL TRAINING

Washington, April 1—(ANP)—An announcement of great interest to the medical profession and to colored people in general was made by the United States Public Health Service this week when news was given out of the appointment of Dr. Charles Lee, Negro physician, who will begin training in preparation for an appointment as a specialist in venereal disease control. Later he will assist state departments.

Ira Bryant Upheld By Supreme Court In Church Dispute

Nashville, Tenn., April 2—(Special)—Ira T. Bryant, the stormy petrel of the A. M. E. church and secretary-treasurer of the Sunday School Union, does not have to turn over the keys of the plant to Prof. E. A. Selby of Normal, Ala., who was elected to the post during the last general conference.

Gains to Appeal School Inequality

The Tennessee supreme court granted every claim in Bryant's brief and therein affirmed the decision of Chancellor Jas. Newman of the lower court, who had ruled that the board, and not the general conference has the power to elect the secretary, hence Bryant is officially the secretary-treasurer of the A. M. E. Sunday School Union.

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Maryland Jurist Raps Jim-Crow In School System

Annapolis, Md., April 1—It would be "silly" for the state of Maryland to build separate colleges for Negro and white professional and graduate students, Judge Morris A. Soper, of the United States circuit court of appeals for the Fourth district, told the house ways and means committee here March 24th.

Judge Soper declared it was "up to the legislature to decide" if Negro students should be admitted to graduate schools of the University of Maryland.

MUSSOLINI SENDS 2,400 ETHIOPIANS TO FIGHT IN SPAIN

London, April 1—(C.)—The news that two shiploads of Ethiopian natives are en route to Spain to aid the rebels created a sensation here Friday. A dispatch from the Spanish loyalists said the vessel Domine had cleared Port Said for Ceuta, a rebel port in Spanish morocco, with 400 Ethiopians aboard, and a second dispatch said the Italian ship Casari Batiati passed through the Suez canal with 2,000 Ethiopians, who had been taken aboard at Massawa, Eritrea.

Warm Springs, Ga., April 1—(ANP)—Singers from Piney Woods, Miss., school rendered a special program for the benefit of Franklin D. Roosevelt last week while the president was here at the Warm Springs foundation for white victims of infantile paralysis.

Negro Workers Promised Fair Play in New Set-Up

Detroit, Mich., April 1—In response to an inquiry from the N. A. A. C. P., John L. Lewis, head of the Committee for Industrial Organization, states in a letter: "The policy of the United Mine Workers of America and the Committee for Industrial Organization has always been that colored persons should be treated on an absolute equality with white persons."

Great Year Seen for Negro Stars In 28th Drake Relays, April 23-24

Despite the brief letdown after an Olympic year, interest in track still maintains its high place. When the twenty-eighth annual Drake relays, mid-west's own blue ribbon classic, swing into action in Des Moines, April 23-24, 10,000 athletes, the cream of the nation's track and field stars, will be seen here in a panorama flash of bravn and speed.

Included in the several hundreds of athletes hailing from the western coast reaching from Seattle, Washington, across to Jacksonville, Fla., will be usual galaxy of Negro record performers. From the early founding back in 1909 by John L. Griffith, Big Ten commissioner, the septa lads have brought home glory and fame to their various schools.

Washington, D. C., April 2—The 218 signatures to the motion of Rep. Joseph A. Gavagan, necessary to discharge the house judiciary committee were announced this week by Rep. Hamilton Fish of New York.

Under the house rules this makes debate and vote on the bill mandatory on April 12th. However, Chairman Hattin W. Summers of Texas recently promised to begin hearings on the bill immediately if the petition, then being circulated, was called in.

Through letters from congressmen to the N. A. A. C. P. and through personal visits by a half dozen volunteer workers here the congressmen signed the Gavagan petition, which included Edward C. Eicher, Cassius C. Dowell, Fred C. Gilchrist and Vincent F. Harrington of Iowa. Lloyd Thurston also promised to sign. Crowds are here to testify before the hearings.

NEW YORK ASSEMBLY OK. ON ANTI-LYNCHING BILL

Albany, N. Y., April 1—The assembly of the state of New York passed a resolution here March 24th memorializing the New York congressmen and senators to vote for the Wagner-Van Nuys federal anti-lynching bill. The assembly resolution was introduced by William T. Andrews of Iowa. The twenty-first assembly district. Senator Fels has introduced a similar resolution in the New York senate.

IMPROVED UNIFORM INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Lesson for April 4

GOD THE CREATOR

LESSON TEXT—Genesis 1:1-5, 26-31. GOLDEN TEXT—In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. Gen. 1:1. PRIMARY TOPIC—When God Made the World. JUNIOR TOPIC—In the Beginning—God. INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—God the Maker of Man and the World. YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—God in Creation.

From the completion of the great Gospel of John, which took us back to that time "in the beginning" when the Living Word "was" and "was with God" and "was God," we turn to the first book of the Bible, which is, as indicated by its title, a book of "beginnings." We find in it not only the record of the creation of the heavens and earth, but of man, and the beginnings of his history, the entrance of sin into the world, the beginning of God's revelation of Himself to man, and of the most important book, fundamental to an understanding of the rest of the Bible.

Genesis has been the special object of attack on the part of critics, and especially by those who saw in its account of the creation statements which apparently did not square with the announced findings of science. Fortunately, as men make advances in scientific discovery, as well as in the understanding of the Bible, they are beginning to realize that there is no real conflict between the established facts of science and a proper interpretation of Scripture. When there is an apparent clash it will be found that either the Bible has been misinterpreted by men or they have mistaken a hypothesis of science for a fact.

We are in error when we talk about the Bible's being confirmed by archaeology or by science. If the United States naval observatory should find that its master clock does not agree with the observation of the stars, it would not assume that the universe had gotten out of order. It would know that the clock is wrong, and would make correction. Science does not confirm the Bible; the Bible confirms true science.

The account of creation may be considered in two great divisions. I. The Creation of Heaven and Earth (1:1-5).

"In the beginning God"—what awe-inspiring words! How fully and satisfactorily they state the origin of all things.

Men ask us to believe their theories, but there is no cosmogony offered which does not call for a measure of credulity. Man cannot explain the origin of matter, the origin of life, these three great gaps and many smaller ones his theories cannot bridge. Man asks us to take his word for them. But we prefer to take God's Word.

Study the entire account of creation. Space here forbids more than the briefest reference to its perfect order and symmetry, its complete, the self-evident fact that it is a true account of the working of God. It is so received by thoughtful men and women of our day. Even speakers have long since ceased to speak foolish words about "the mistakes of Moses."

II. The Creation of Man (vv. 16-23).

"Let us" is an indication that the Holy Trinity was active in creation. God the Father is mentioned (v. 1), the Holy Spirit (v. 2), and without the Son was nothing made (John 1:3).

Man was created in "the likeness and image of God." This undoubtedly refers to a moral and spiritual likeness. Man is a moral being, possessed of all the characteristics of true personality. He is a living spirit, with intelligence, feeling, willpower. This image, no matter how it may have been defaced by sin, is that in man which makes it possible for us to seek him in his sin, and beseech him "to be reconciled to God." "Down in the human heart, crushed by the tempter, feelings lie buried that grace can restore."

Notice that God gave man "a helpmeet unto him," that he established the family as the center of life on this earth. He gave man dominion over the entire creation, and his restless pioneering spirit still carries him on to the complete realization of that promise. He provided not only for man's spiritual and social needs, but also for his every physical need. Surely we may say with Moses that "everything that he (God) had made . . . was very good" (v. 31).

A Man of Sorrow

One reason why Jesus was a man of sorrow was that He saw as none other the pain and sin and woe of the world.

A Hard Road

The hard road of sin is always so crowded that it gives little room for turning around and going back.

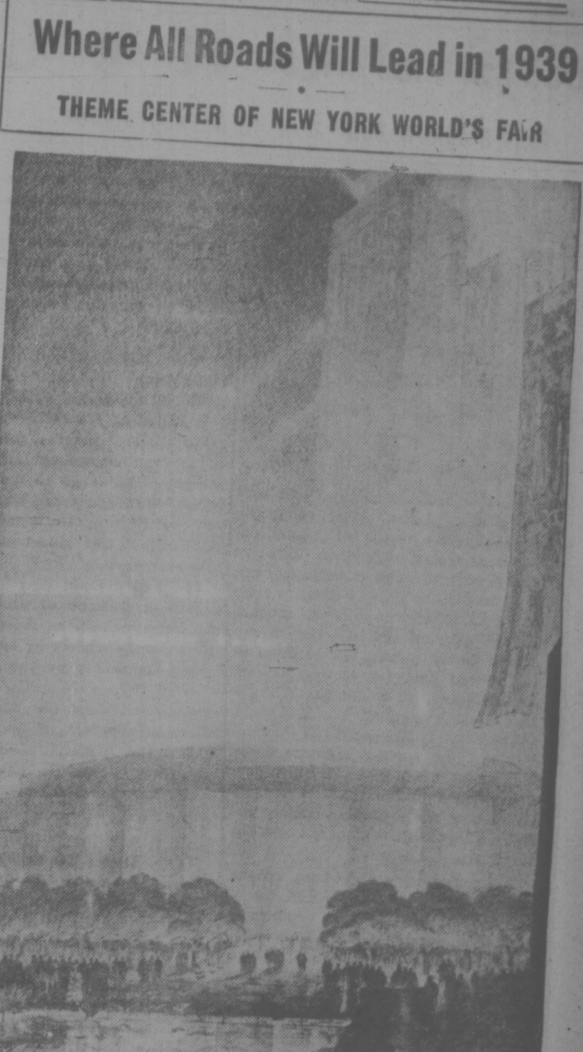

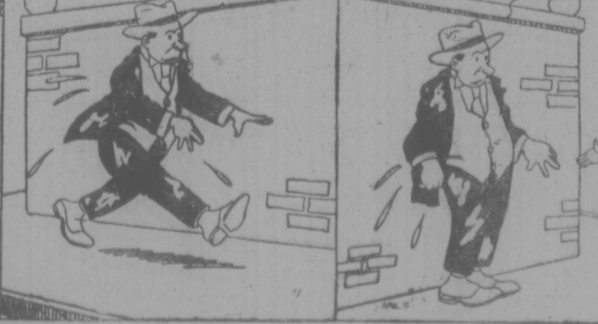

McReynolds of the United States supreme court in a speech March 16th to a fraternity banquet here drew a prompt telegram of protest from Walter White, N. A. A. C. P. secretary, in the city this week in the interest of federal anti-lynching legislation.

In using the word, Justice McReynolds said that he had tried "to protect the poorest darker in the Georgia backwoods as well as the man in the mansion on Fifth avenue."

TUSKEGEE INSTITUTE ADDS SOIL CONSERVATION COURSE

Tuskegee Institute, Ala., March 18—(ANP)—In order to co-operate with the government's program of agricultural conservation, Tuskegee Institute will offer a new special course in soil conservation at the beginning of the next school year.

HULL PROTESTS GERMAN SLURS ON JEWS BUT NOT NEGROES

Washington, March 25—(Calvin Service Flash)—Secretary of State Cordell Hull on Thursday ordered Ambassador William E. Dodd at Berlin to make "emphatic comment" on the slurs of the German press on the women's division of the American Jewish Congress as a result of Mayor LaGuardia of New York's attack on Hitler regime in an address before the congress on March 3rd. It was revealed that many of the slurs by the Germans were "unprintable," the Nazi press referring to the women as "prostitutes," who were addressed by a "pimp."

The state department's protest, however, has caused considerable comment among Negro citizens, who were recently scored by the Nazi press and no protest was made by the American government. Just three weeks ago the Nazi press said of Negroes: "Negroes simply cannot be civilized. In America all men are equal. They go about elegantly clothed. If outraged farmers did not occasionally hang one of them this picture of complete equality would be undisturbed."

NEGRO FIREMAN SHOULD BE IN THE SERVICE

Des Moines has no Negro firemen. There has been a reason. Shortly a new chief will be named and here the Bystander wishes that Negroes call Henry Hasbrouck, commissioner of public safety, and tell him that when the list of eligibles has been certified to him for appointment that he name no man who is opposed to using Negro firemen in the department.

The fire department is under Civil Service. An examination is to be held Tuesday night and we understand some Negro applicants have filed. Once some pass the examination every effort should be made to see that we get representation.

NEGRO HEALTH WEEK

April 4 to 11 has been designated National Negro Health Week. Started several years ago by the late Booker T. Washington, the movement has grown to such an extent that most organizations and institutions touching the Negro in any field are co-operating.

Since the beginning of the movement the death rate among Negroes has decreased materially because the unfortunate have been taught how to live better, to take care of themselves properly and at the proper time; facilities have been established which offer health service that many could not afford.

The health clinics at the West and East Side Community centers in Des Moines are splendid examples. Here prospective mothers are given advice and care free of charge; mothers are taught how to keep their babies well and help them grow and develop.

If Senator Glass of Virginia and Senator Robinson of Arkansas could be induced to engage in a dialogue over the radio, they would be mistaken easily for Amos and Andy.

The Life Story of Negroes of Note
