Chas. Anderson Dies of Illness

Former Revenue Collector Under Seven Presidents

NEW YORK, Feb. 2.—Hundreds of persons, including official representatives of the federal, state and city governments, attended funeral services Tuesday, Feb. 1, for Charles William Anderson, collector of internal revenue for the second and third districts of New York from

Roosevelt to Roosevelt, serving under seven presidents of the United States, who died Friday, Jan. 28, at his home, 156 West 132nd street.

Mr. Anderson, for almost 50 years a political factor, was 71 years old and succumbed to a long illness which forced his retirement in 1933, one year after his reappointment by Franklin D. Roosevelt.

A staunch Republican, he was first made collector of internal revenue for the second district of New York under President Theodore Roosevelt in 1905. His work was of such outstanding calibre that party lines were ignored in his reappointment to the post until his retirement.

Sentenced 3 Years Is Fined \$1,000

CLARKSDALE, MISS.— Joseph Shelley Decker, 29-year-old white cotton plantation owner, was found guilty of peonage by a jury in the federal court on Thursday.

Decker was fined \$1,000 and sentenced to serve three years in prison.

CLARKSDALE, MISS., Feb. 3 (CNA)—The trial of J. S. Decker, white cotton planter charged with peonage, opened this week in Federal District Court here. Prosecution witnesses accused him of having chained Negroes and forced them to hoe cotton at gun point.

The government called five witnesses—James W. Wiggins, share cropper, Ethel Lee Davis, his common-law wife, two white officers and Joe Hyde, a white planter—to present its case against the Tallahatchie County farmer.

U. S. Deputy Marshall C. W. Whitehead, who arrested Decker, testified that the planter had admitted having chained the couple and attempted to "sell them for the \$175 they owed me."

NAACP Probes Jamaica Riots

JAMACIA, N. Y.—Homicide charges were lodged against 7 Negroes on Monday night and summons for disorderly conduct were served on 5 white men following a mass altercation early Sunday morning during which one man was stabbed to death and 7 others were injured at 105th avenue and 171 street, Jamaica, N. Y.

Murder charges were brought against the Negroes, but the 5 whites arrested at the same time right on the scene faced charges only of disorderly conduct. Sensing rank discrimination and unfair treatment of the Negroes involved in the case, the Jamaica branch of the N. A. A. C. P., through Dr. John A. Singleton, president, is preparing to investigate and fight the murder charges now pending against the 7 Negroes. Counsel for the Jamaica branch has demanded that murder charges be lodged against the whites involved in the fight also.

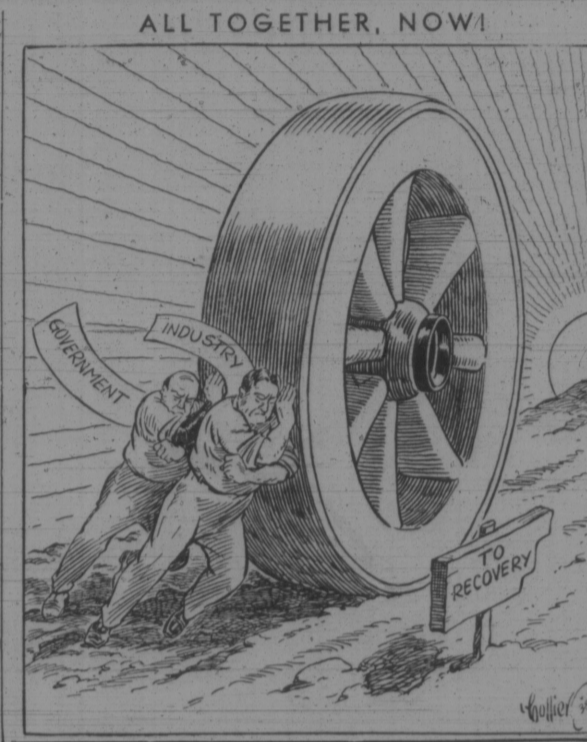

ATLANTA U. TO HONOR 70th BIRTHDAY OF DUBOIS

ATLANTA, GEORGIA, (Special)—Homage will be paid to one of the outstanding leaders of the Negro race on February 23, when Atlanta University and the affiliated colleges, Morehouse and Spelman, will join with friends and associates throughout the nation in celebrating the 70th birthday of the distinguished Dr. W. E. B. DuBois, internationally known scholar, writer, and speaker, who since 1933 has been chairman of the department of sociology at Atlanta University.

Dr. DuBois is a graduate of Fisk and of Harvard universities. From the latter institution he received the degrees of A.B., A.M., and Ph.D. He also has studied at the University of Berlin. From 1896 to 1910—he was professor of economics and history of Atlanta University, and edited the "Atlanta University Studies of Negro Problems." From 1910 until 1934 Dr. DuBois served as director of publications for the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, and was the editor of "The Crisis," the official organ of the Association.

A Fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, Dr. DuBois was the founder of the Pan African Congresses, the recipient of the Sixth Spingarn Award, and in 1924 was Special Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to

Herring, Gillette Help to Defeat Cloture, 51-37

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 3.—In the first voting test on the anti-lynching bill here Friday the Republicans in the Senate joined with the southern Democrats from the worst lynching states and with some northern and western Democrats in defeating the motion for cloture which, if carried, would have shut off the filibuster and brought the Gavagan-Wagner-Van Nuys anti-lynching bill up for a vote in short order.

The vote was 51 against cloture and 37 for it. HERRING AND GILLETTE (DEMOCRATS) OF IOWA, VOTED AGAINST THE CLOTURE.

Second National Youth Demonstration against Lynching on Friday, February 11th.

In mass meetings, parades, forums, rallies and radio broadcasts on that date, the charge will be hurled that the use of the filibuster to prevent the anti-lynching bill from coming up for a vote in the Senate is a flagrant violation of democratic procedure.

Willard S. Townsend of Chicago has been elected president. The union was brought into being through the efforts of Randolph.

Senator Borah

For the first time, the Republicans have been observers in the battle for anti-lynching legislation. Democrats advocated the bill, and if it passed, it would be a blow to vanishing Republican prestige and make more difficult the task of returning defected colored voters to the fold. So many of them sided, either silently or actively, with the filibustering senators, hoping it would not pass. Most of them voted against cloture in order to further embarrass their political opponents and prevent passage of legislation their party was never able to enact.

In fact, it was Sen. William Borah of Idaho, a Republican, who set the stage for the prolonged filibuster by delivering one of his greatest orations in opposition to the measure and inspiring Southerners to follow in his footsteps.

Both Parties Betray Trust Of Followers

Another Blow Torch Affair Might Have Hastened Passage

WASHINGTON, D. C., February 3, (ANP)—Failure of its supporters to force a vote on the Wagne-Van Nuys anti-lynching bill despite an admitted majority in favor of the measure's passage, and inability to invoke cloture or the "gag rule" and thus break the three week filibuster of Southern senators was blamed by observers on the tricks of politics used by both Northern and Southern Democrats and Republicans.

At the same time, these observers said that had a lynching occurred while the filibuster was in progress as was the case in the lower house last spring when the blow torch lynchings at Duck Hill, Miss., took place, it would probably have resulted in overwhelming sentiment favoring the measure and probably forced a vote. Northern Democrats have found support of the measure to their advantage because of Negro voters who hold the balance of power in many states. Their party has decimated Republican ranks and Democrats would like to keep this new support. If these senators could force passage of the measure, they could return to their states and point it as evidence of something no Republican ever obtained for the Negro: Passage of a federal anti-lynching law.

Roosevelt Silent
National Democratic leaders and President Roosevelt maintained complete silence. If they advocated the measure, it would antagonize the Southern stronghold of the party, and indeed some Southern senators who are opposed to the New Deal were privately hoping it would pass and get the signature of Roosevelt so they could tell their constituents the present party heads were pro-Negro and thus staff off added ambitions of New Dealers in 1940.

If national party heads opposed the measure, they would automatically call down on their brows the wrath of Northern-Negro voters who helped put them in office in both 1932 and 1936, and whom they hope to retain. Thus it was ticklish situation either way.

When the voice of labor is not heard it is always because the people who should hear it are removed too far away from it. DISTANCE KILLS SOUND.

When your highest executive is not elected by a direct vote of the people he is not directly responsible to the people. CAN YOU SEE THIS?

Quoting from Bourne and Benton's United States history, which our children are familiar with, page 492, you will find where Staunton, Virginia, adopted this Manager form of government in 1808.

Now the commission form was first launched by the City of Galveston, Texas about 1900. I quote: It was found to be such wonderful form of government that other cities at once began to adopt this form.

I quote: The new government accomplished such wonders that other cities rapidly fell in line.

How many votes does a school election poll—not one-fifth of the general vote; and this is the THING that they are driving at—Control by a minority. CAN YOU SEE THIS? Hear me when I tell you that personal contact is the gateway to the open door of opportunity.

This manager form of government closes this door and nobody wants the door shut in their face. The farther the government moves away from the people the more they are made to suffer.

Questions and Answers about the City Manager Plan

These determine all questions of policy for the whole city. Their combined judgment is brought to bear upon all matters before them.

They employ a chief executive, upon whom rests the sole responsibility for the efficient administration of all departments. They may remove him at will.

The City Manager not only has the power to administer the affairs of the city as a whole. He must do so. He has no incentive to advance one department at the expense of another.

Taxes are too high in Des Moines; the city is spending more than it takes in each year; the buck is being passed continually when we ask relief; the taxpayers are not getting their money's worth; petty policies are choking everybody. Something must be done and we believe the city manager plan of government is the answer.

Commission government represents a distinct advance from the old type of municipal government. The non-partisan primary, the small governing body, the short ballot, have gone far toward the ultimate goal of reducing city administration to a matter of business, efficiently handled.

My interest in the campaign centers around two things: 1—a well governed city, and 2—a fair distribution of the taxpayers' money among all the people who pay it.

Again the heads of the several administrative departments of a city should be men of special training for their respective tasks. Technical and professional qualifications cannot be accurately gauged by popular vote or properly determined at the polls.

The City Manager plan possesses all of the advantages of Commission Government, and, in our judgment, has overcome the defects. Men of the same high type are secured for service in the Commission, the methods of selection being the same.

White And Negro Students In Boycott Move
GREENSBORO, N. C., Jan. 27—(CNA)—More than 1,000 students of Bennett and A. T. colleges in Greensboro have joined a boycott movement against white theatre owners that have gone on record opposing the appearance of Negro in movies "out of character."
On Dec. 7, a convention of "The Theatre Owners of North and South Carolina, Inc." passed a resolution that said in part:
"Resolved: That the convention goes on record in disapproving the appearance of Negroes in scenes with white people on an equal social basis."
The Bennett College Chapter, American Students Union, answered this resolution with a resolution of their own calling for a boycott of all movie houses affiliated with the association. The movement has spread and a united boycott committee has been formed involving student groups at several colleges and local organizations representing over 1,000 people. A. S. U. chapters at Duke, Chapel Hill and Shaw University have joined the movement and are helping to make the boycott state-wide.
The Post, a local paper, has refused to carry ads of the movie houses that are members of the association. Leaders of the boycott movement have expressed determination to continue the boycott until the theatre owners withdraw the opposition to the appearance of Negroes on the screen in any but the traditional stereotypes.
