### M. E. Church Faces Race Issue With Alarm, Fears 'Equality'

#### Hitler's Coup May Change U.S. Policy Toward Ethiopia

WASHINGTON. (CNA)—Hitler's seizure of Austria may cause a modification in the American policy of refusing to recognize Mussolini's "Ethiopian empire," it was indicated in official circles here this week.

To date, the United States government has consistently refused to recognize "any territorial aggrandizement" that has been accomplished by the use of force. This policy has been applied in regard to Italy's conquests in Ethiopia and to Japan's seizure of Manchuria from China.

#### Southern Youths To Meet April 1-3

RICHMOND, Va., March 24.—Referring to the plans for the second All-Southern Negro Youth conference, to be held in Chattanooga, Tenn., April 1, 2, 3, Chairman William F. Richardson of the Southern Negro Youth congress, declared, "Everything is in readiness for a historic gathering of young Negro men and women."

#### Director Is Cleared Of Girl's Charges

LOS ANGELES, March 24.—Monday saw the climax of a trial in superior court, that had lasted through four days, finally ending with the freeing and vindication of a member of a prominent Angel City family, of a serious charge involving a 15-year-old school girl.

Charles Early, arrested last January by members of the crime prevention detail of Los Angeles police on charges he had seduced 15-year-old Everly Lee, was freed after a jury of five men and seven women had heard the case.

The case attracted more than passing attention here, because Early is a nephew of Frederick M. Roberts, former state assemblyman and present Republican leader. One of the jurymen hearing the case, Lazarus C. Reed, was a race attorney.

#### BAPTIST INSTITUTE PLANNED FOR CHICAGO

CHICAGO, March 24. (CNA)—Northern-white Baptists are backing Negro Baptists of Chicago in a drive to establish in this city a school for the training of religious leaders and workers, it was learned this week. The institution, to be known as the Chicago Baptist Institute, will be headed by Dean H. M. Smith.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., March 24.—Fear that white Christians may have to worship God side by side with blacks, sent disturbing waves of consternation through the ranks of the Methodist Episcopal church, South, this week, as preparations were being made for the general conference of the denomination at Birmingham on April 28.

With unification of the three main branches of Methodism hanging on a question taken by the southern body, the "Negro question" became a live issue.

The southern church's Bishop Collins Denny, of Virginia, in a recent address, fanned into blazing conflagration a question which has long smoldered in minds of the southern laity since unification was first proposed by northern factions of the denomination, several years ago.

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#### Six Conferences

According to the plan proposed by northern Methodists, six jurisdictional conferences would be established. Five would be set up on a geographical basis, and the sixth, for members of the race only, on a racial basis. The sixth conference would embrace all members of the race regardless of geographical location.

Southern Methodists charge that northerners who will constitute 72 per cent of the united churches, proposed the sixth area merely as bait for the southern church, and that as soon as unification is a fact, the sixth jurisdiction will be eliminated, thereby making it possible for members of the race to co-mingle with whites in the southern churches.

#### Race Makes Brazilian History, Says Teacher

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., Mar. 24.—"Nowhere in the western world," according to Lorenzo J. Greene, assistant professor of history at Lincoln university, "has the Negro exerted such a mighty influence upon the development of a nation as in Brazil."

Although Brazil was the last great nation to free her slaves, the Race, once emancipated, could aspire to every occupation or position open to any other person. Consequently members of the race served in the legislatures, both national and provincial, became the backbone of the army and navy and entered into all the learned professions.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Howard university plans to offer for the academic year, 1938-39, about eighty-three free tuition scholarships to needy students with exceptional scholastic averages. These scholarships will be awarded to applicants on the basis of need and of relative scholastic standing. #### Numbers Queen Is Sentenced 10 Years

NEW YORK, March 24.—Mme. Stephanie St. Claire-Hamid, convicted last Friday for taking a trio of shots at her husband, Sufi Abdul Hamid, January 18, was given two to ten years in States prison at Bedford by Judge James C. Wallace Monday morning.

The sentence was the result of conviction of Mme. St. Claire, known as the numbers queen, on the charge of having fired three shots at her estranged husband during a brief quarrel in an office building at 209 West 125th street, January 19. Neither of the shots took effect, but one went through Hamid's coat and another singed his mustache. Mme. St. Claire has been held in jail since that time.

#### Negroes Sterilized By Nazis, Report

PARIS, France, March 24.—That Nazi Germany, under the rule of Adolf Hitler, has a secret plan to sterilize all of its black subjects and Jews seeking medical care in Berlin hospitals, came to light here last week when several dark-skinned Germans sought treatment for their ailments from Paris surgeons.

Germany has many black citizens who formerly occupied German East Africa, and migrated to Berlin shortly after the World war to engage in business. Hitler's rise to power destroyed their citizenship, as they could not register under his Aryan requirements.

#### Will Offer Legal Aid

NEW YORK, March 24.—The keen interest of Negroes in politics, sharpened still more by the long filibuster against the federal anti-lynching bill, is being reflected in a wide campaign throughout the South for the right to vote. Southern Negroes, far from being frightened by the anti-lynching filibuster, are laying plans, mostly in the open, to register and vote in the spring and fall primaries.

The N. A. A. C. P. announced here that it stands ready to make available the benefit of its experience and give legal advice in fights against the white primary system. Clearcut cases of denial of the right to register and vote will be fought out in the federal courts if the ground work is carefully laid by the parties concerned.

The association cited its victory in Wilkesboro, N. C., following the 1934 congressional election in that state. A white registrar who had refused to register fourteen Negro citizens, eleven of whom were college graduates, on the ground that they had not fulfilled the educational requirements of the North Carolina law, was tried in the federal court, found guilty, fined \$300 and given a suspended sentence of three years. This is the type of legal action the N. A. A. C. P. will undertake in cases where the evidence warrants action.

## CLARENCE DARROW

Clarence Darrow, former lawyer and humanitarian died in Chicago a few days ago. The newspapers and radio announced his history far and wide calling attention to the famous cases in which he had been engaged. But as yet none of these announcements called attention to the famous case he tried involving the Negro and yet Darrow tried this case because he saw in it an effort to punish the defendant because of his race, without exercising his constitutional rights.

Most readers of the Bystander will remember the Sweet case in Detroit. A Negro doctor, Sweet, bought a property in a so-called white neighborhood and when he insisted on living in it a mob attempted to force him to leave. As the mob approached Dr. Sweet's home, where a social event was in progress, as a measure of self protection he fired into the crowd killing one of its members.

Dr. Sweet was charged with murder. Others were indicted for various offenses growing out of the shooting. Recognizing that the case involved the question of whether a Negro could buy property in such neighborhood as he chose and occupy the same, the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People undertook the job of sponsoring the defense and secured the services of Mr. Darrow as chief counsel.

Dr. Sweet was finally acquitted and other cases dismissed. It was at that time that Darrow began
