### Congressman Mitchell Presses Jim Crow Fight

Chicago, June 1.—(ANP)—Congressman Arthur W. Mitchell, through his attorney, Richard E. Westbrooks, this week continued his fight against discrimination in interstate commerce against colored passengers by the Rock Island railroad, and filed before the Interstate Commerce Commission a number of exceptions to the report of the examiner, William S. Disque.

This case is being watched with interest by millions of American colored citizens who are being unjustly discriminated against in interstate commerce in open violation of the 14th amendment to the United States constitution.

### MRS. PAULINE BROWN HEADS BEAUTICIANS ORGANIZATION

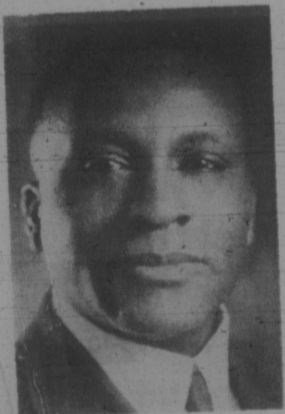

### SEPARATE ARMY UNIT OPPOSED BY NAACP

New York, May 27.—In a letter to Congressman Hamilton Fish, Jr., the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People has pointed out that while it is in favor of hearings before a house committee to place in the record the discrimination against Negroes in the army, it cannot endorse Congressman Fish's bill (H. R. 10166), which provides for the creation of a separate Negro division in the army.

The association also has failed to endorse H. R. 10165, introduced by Congressman Fish, providing for a certain number of Negro candidates in the military academy at West Point.

The association indorses with res-

ervations H. R. 10164, which seems to imply from its language that Negroes should be admitted to all branches of the army. The N. A. A. C. P. reserves the right to withdraw this tentative indorsement if the language of the bill be interpreted to mean Negro units in the various sections of the army.

The letter to Congressman Fish was written May 12th by Roy Wilkins, assistant secretary, and is made public because the N. A. A. C. P. indorsement of hearings on these bills introduced by Mr. Fish was widely interpreted as indorsement of the bills themselves. The association's letter expressed the hope that hearings would be held so that an opportunity would be given to place in the official records the gross discrimination against Negroes in the army.

### Well Known A. M. E. Pastor Dies In Sioux City

Rev. James Joshua Evans was born in Frederick, Md., June 5, 1855. He entered the ministry fifty years ago, was received into the Baltimore conference and traveled throughout the fifty years as pastor and presiding elder.

His first wife, after forty-six years of wedded life, preceded him in death in 1934. There were no children born to this union. Rev. Evans and his wife adopted their niece, Mary

Green, in 1898, who took his name and is known as Mary G. Evans, pastor of the Cosmopolitan Community church of Chicago, Ill.

He was married to Mrs. Emma Mayweather on October 16, 1935. Rev. Evans received his education at Harpers Ferry, West Va., and other eastern schools. He was a gospel preacher, a sweet singer and a friend to his fellowman. He spread sunshine wherever he went.

He pastored some of the leading churches in the connection and served as pastor of the following churches in the Northwest conference: Buxton, St. Peters, Minneapolis; Bethel, A. M. E., Des Moines; Davenport; Bethel, Cedar Rapids, from which place he came to Sioux City to pastor the Malone A. M. E. church. Here he served faithfully until he was called from labor to reward.

He passed away in the Sioux City Methodist hospital, Wednesday evening, May 25, 1938, from complications.

Rev. Evans leaves to mourn his passing his faithful wife, adopted daughter and one sister. A host of friends feel the loss of a brother, minister and friend to humanity.

### Girl Indicted, Threatening Letter To President

Topeka, Kan., June 1.—(ANP)—In jail here since last December on a charge of sending a threatening letter to President Roosevelt, the plight of Miss Lucille Harris, 18 years old, has attracted wide attention among Kansans of both races.

Last Friday the federal grand jury returned an indictment against the girl charging her with sending through the mails a threat to kill the president. She is being represented by Attorney Elisha Scott. Interest in her case has been aroused because of her winning personality and intelligence, and her solicitude for her mother, an invalid living in Virginia. Her father is dead; she is a member of the Roman Catholic church.

Miss Harris found herself stranded here last winter without a job

when the army officer for whose family she had been working was transferred to another city.

She explained, "After being without a job for over a week, applying to welfare authorities, begging for work and being turned down, going without food for five days, knowing of no one else to ask for aid, I thought surely I could write the president of the United States, telling him of my situation as best I could. I wrote him and I received no answer. I grew frantic and wrote again what they call a 'threatening' letter. I don't remember just what I wrote, but I didn't know I had written anything wrong until I was arrested at Junction City on December 22, 1937, and brought to Topeka on Christmas day."

### Senators Asked To Oppose Sectional Measure

New York, May 27.—Senators who were named May 26th on a committee to consider the wages and hours bill were urged today in a telegram from the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People to oppose any attempt in the conference committee to impose geographical wage differentials.

The N. A. A. C. P. feels that the geographical differential is only a thin disguise for a racial differential.

The wages and hours bill, passed by the house by an overwhelming vote, provided for a universal minimum wage (at the beginning) of 25c an hour and a maximum week of forty-four hours. Later the week was to be reduced gradually to forty hours and the minimum hourly wage advanced to 40c.

Claim Living Cost Lower

The southern senators claim wages in the south should be less because living costs are less. The N. A. A. C. P. maintains that there is no evidence to show that living costs are less in the south, but the fact is that the south has a lower standard of living.

In its telegram to Senators Robert M. LaFollette, of Wisconsin, and Albert D. Thomas, of Utah, the N. A. A. C. P. stated that wage differentials would have a serious effect upon the economic status of Negro workers in the south.

As justification for its position, the N. A. A. C. P. cited the wage differentials which prevailed in 1933-4 under NRA. These, while labelled a geographical, were generally racial and the lowest wages were set in the states and in the occupations where Negro workers are in the vast majority.

### White Revenge Slayer Held Without Bail

Birmingham, Ala., May 27.—H. E. Colburn, white, who shot and killed John Lewis Smith, a young Negro, in the corridor of the court house here May 11, just as the colored prisoner had been sentenced to ninety-nine years for carnal knowledge of Colburn's 7-year-old daughter, has been refused bail and will be held in jail pending trial on the charge of first-degree murder.

### University of Missouri Exclusion Case To U. S. Supreme Court

Washington, D. C., May 27.—The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People filed on May 24th a petition for a writ of certiorari and supporting brief in the U. S. supreme court, seeking to reverse the judgment of the supreme court of Missouri, denying Lloyd L. Gaines, a St. Louis Negro student, admission to the law school of the University of Missouri. The petition was based on the 'equal protection'

clause of the fourteenth amendment. Gaines applied to the law school of the University of Missouri in 1935. The university authorities rejected him on the grounds that it was against public policy in Missouri to admit Negro students to the University of Missouri and that the Missouri legislature had provided for professional study by Negroes through the Lincoln university (Mo.) act of 1921.

Ann Arbor, Mich., June 1.—(ANP)—Bill Watson, Michigan's current one-man track team who has designs on the 1940 Olympic decathlon, has been elected captain of the 1938 Wolverine team. He is the first of his race to receive that honor here.

A week ago Saturday he paced Michigan to its sixteenth Big Ten championship by retaining the titles he won in 1937 as a sophomore in the shotput, discus and broad jump and taking third in the high jump.

### MOB VIOLENCE

During the past few months a number of storekeepers have had their windows smashed by violent persons. In each instance the trouble has arisen with grocerymen who have refused to conform to certain rules adopted by an association organized recently.

There are two bad features about this situation that ought not go unnoticed.

First, the tactics constitute a form of mob violence that ought not be tolerated in a civilized community. Second, the police department has not been able to apprehend any of the participants even though their conduct has extended over a considerable period of time.

Mob violence, whether directed against persons or property, is wrong. Des Moines cannot afford to tax a man and at the same time give him no protection in the legitimate conduct of his business. Once we get in the habit of letting these things go unpunished, we open the way for other forms of lawlessness.

Henry Armstrong gave Barney Ross a real licking Tuesday night, and won the welterweight championship of the world. Although fighting a man who is heavier and has a longer reach, Armstrong demonstrated quite thoroughly he can whip big men as well as little men.

### VOTE MONDAY

We will go to the polls June 6th to select candidates of their respective parties to be voted on at the fall election. It is highly important that every citizen votes, for in this manner only will candidates be selected who will best serve should they be elected in the fall.

Many people question the value of primaries, basing their complaint on the mediocre type of candidates which often get on the ticket. And the Bystander believes that the present primary campaign is a good example. Under our theory of government we offer every man a chance for public office. Possibly this helps to keep outstanding candidates from running for office.

All too often we select incompetent men to public office and complain during their whole term about their inability to handle the job.

The time to think of competent public officials is before, rather than after election, and this is why the Bystander urges every voter to go to the polls and select the best candidate available to be voted upon at the fall election.

## South Side Stars Capture "Y" Meet

With Bob Vandever setting the pace with several outstanding sprint performances, track athletes representing the Master Club of Roadside Settlement topped the Doobin A. C. in team scoring to amass a total of 75 points and take the first place in the annual Crocker Y. M. C. A. track and field meet at East High stadium Monday afternoon. The Doobin A. C. composed of present and former East High stars, chalked up 67 points in losing the team title they won last year.

Easily the star of the meet, winner of the Hasbrouck trophy for high scoring with a total of 23 points, Vandever skinned over the cinders in the century in a near record time of 10 seconds. The meet record is 9.9, established in 1929. In addition to winning the 100 yard dash, Vandever also took first in the 220 yard dash, again noosing out Frank Kaiser, East High flash the shotput, anchored the winning 440 yard relay team and placed second in the broad jump.

Harry Sanders and Harold Miller, crack East High performers, repeated in their specialties, taking the high jump and broad jump, respectively, for the second straight year. Miller adding 1 1/4 inches to his 1937 mark by chalking up a distance of 21 feet, 4 1/2 inches, while Sanders tied last year's height of 5 feet, 11 inches, but narrowly missed tying Lawrence Redrick's meet record of 6 feet, 1 inch.

William Wells of the Hawkeye Club, but competing for the Doobin A. C., took a trio of first places in the intermediate section by winning the fifty yard dash, broad jump and the high jump. Bobby Simmons of the Tigers came through with three victories in the junior division before it was detected that he was ineligible for competition in this section. Lonnie Howard, by winning the fifty yard dash, and placing second to Simmons in the seventy-five yard sprint and the broad jump, received the three gold medals in the junior group. Another feature was the splendid running of the Monarchs sprint relay team, composed of Delbert Morrison, Lawrence Carter, Lee Wallace Hill and Lawrence Jackson, all North High dash men. This quartet turned in the fast time of 34.6 seconds to grab the 440 yard event, and but for an unfortunate break at the start of the 880 yard specialty would have undoubtedly added this to their victory string.

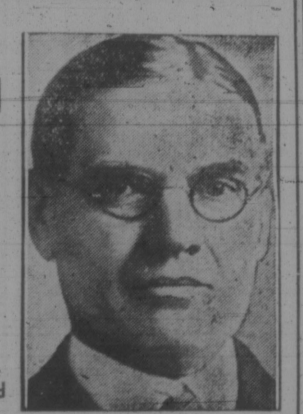

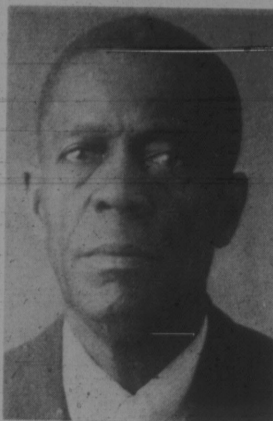

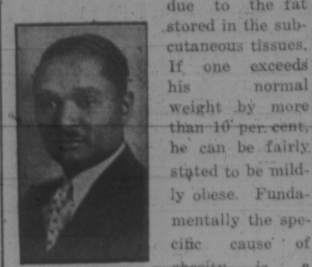

**Health Chats**

**OBESITY**

Obesity is simply a state of being overweight. This excess weight is due to the fat stored in the subcutaneous tissues.



If one exceeds his normal weight by more than 10 per cent, he can be fairly stated to be mildly obese. Fundamentally the specific cause of obesity is a greater intake of caloric yielding food than there is necessity for in the body.

Except in the relatively rare cases of low thyroid activity or low pituitary that may cause obesity (overweight) the only way for a patient to maintain a safe and permanent re-

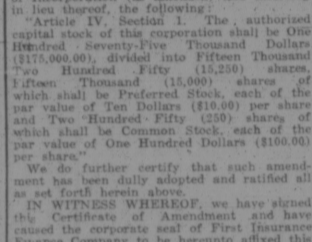
duction in weight is to change his abnormal food habit to a normal one. Overeating goes unrecognized because it is a habit. Most of these people are fat because they eat too much.

Aside from the possibilities of harm inherent in the unnecessary use of drugs or the use of various "fad" diets, all such methods of weight reduction are of no permanent benefit because they do not establish a new and better food habit which the patient can follow indefinitely, unless the abnormal food habit

is changed, the end results of drug or exercise treatment are nil.

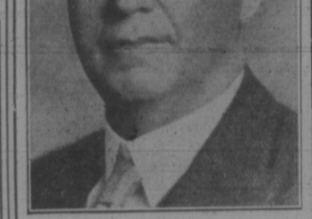

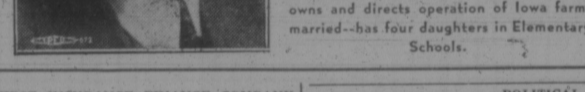
