"Sunset and Evening Star and One Clear Call for Me"

Thus ended the life of another of the few remaining civil war veterans Wednesday evening, when Col. William Henry Singleton was stricken fatally with a heart attack at the home of Mrs. Alice McDowell, 1211 Center street.

One of Oldest Civil War Vets

It is little short of amazing that this venerable old gentleman of 103 years, along with the other five centenarians, would have attempted the 2,500 mile round trip. But who can stay the fighting spirit that is so thoroughly revived at the first sound of the bugle and the martial strains of the military band? The desire for reunion and the rehearsal of the experiences of more than seventy-five years is as commanding as the military order of "ATTENTION."

Glorious, awe-inspiring and most engaging must be the reminiscences in the evening hours of a life a century old. No thought of death, but a glorious sunset for the birth of a more glorious and magnificent tomorrow. Col. Singleton bade his wife an endearing farewell and retired this mortal life to an eternal dawn.

Spoke at St. Paul Church

He retired from the ministry some time ago and was the chaplain of the Connecticut department. Mrs. Singleton was a very lovely woman and showed a fine culture and courage in the sad experience that was hers as we interviewed her in the compartment for the Connecticut veterans and wives who were returning to New Haven with Mrs. Singleton. After his arrival earlier in the day, the retired minister and colonel addressed the St. Paul congregation. Soon after his enlistment with the union forces at the age of 25 in South Carolina, President Lincoln commissioned him as a colonel and he took command of a Negro regiment, Company G of the 35th United States infantry.

Military Escort From Lincoln Post

A military escort from Lincoln post No. 126, American Legion, stood at attention as the encasement, draped with the American flag, containing the remains of the venerable old gentleman of the civil war, was put aboard the special train which left for New Haven, a distance of 1,250 miles.

Prospects Must Apply At Company Offices

Agents Not Permitted to Seek New Policies Because of Existence of Previous Law

New York, Sept. 21—The Metropolitan Life Insurance company, which has written millions upon millions of dollars of insurance upon Negroes in this country, is not soliciting any business from Negroes in New York state.

Charles G. Taylor, Jr., second vice president of the company, has written the N. A. A. C. P.:

"We do not solicit applications for insurance from colored persons in the state of New York, but such persons may apply at any one of our district offices, where they will receive fair and courteous treatment when they so apply. . . . This practice has been made necessary in New York because of a law passed at the instance of Assemblyman Stephens. This law was calculated to, and did in fact, make it impracticable for us to conduct our business as formerly in the state of New York. This situation pertains only to this state."

In a previous letter, later clarified, Mr. Taylor had written the N. A. A. C. P. stating his change of policy was "due to a law passed at the instance of one of your own race."

The law to which the Metropolitan refers is one passed in 1935 making it unlawful for any insurance company to discriminate against colored people in the type of policy offered for sale, or in the rates or premiums charged therefor. A second section of the law forbids a life insurance corporation rejecting "any application for a policy of life insurance issued or sold by it."

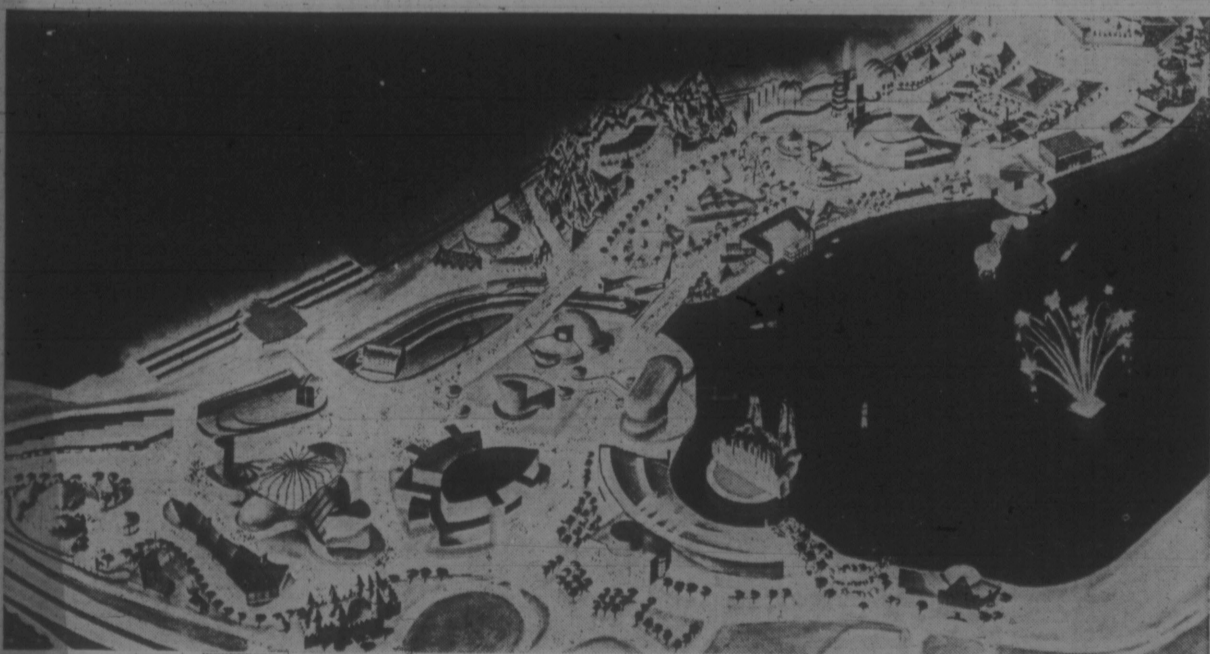

IOWA POLITICIANS DORMANT

In spite of the unusual publicity about Negroes in the Democratic party and the great influence they have gained as the result of their vote during the past three elections, apparently neither the Republican or Democratic organizations in Iowa has done anything definite toward a program among them for the fall election.

We often complain that in years gone by all the planning has been done before the Negro is invited to take an active part and the only service for which the Negro was called was just before election day. Vigorous complaint relieved this situation in recent years, but both parties seem to have fallen back in a state of do nothing.

Just what the trouble is we cannot say. Possibly party leaders do not care. But the Bystander knows that the Negro vote is as important in Iowa these days as it is in some of the more thickly populated states and the smart politician would do well to encourage it by selecting efficient leaders to head it up.

TIME TO DO SOMETHING TANGIBLE

Economic conditions are getting no better, jobs no more plentiful, and the Negro is finding it more difficult each day to get sufficient work to hold body and soul together.

Upon scanning newspapers from other communities, it appears that business and professional groups finding the same situation in their towns are doing something about it - are organizing to help their fellow townsmen get a square break. Not only is this important in order for the Negro to get the jobs to which he is entitled, but as a self-defense measure for their depending upon Negroes for support.

Beside the lack of consideration offered by public utility interests, authorities are planning to build a new general hospital in Des Moines. While Negro patients are given fair consideration, the chance for employment is poor; nurse training nil. Now is the time to begin to do something about these things and do them in an intelligent organized fashion.

True, we have had organized groups which functioned and got things done, but they have fallen apart. Press of personal affairs and criticism from outsiders seem to have caused the break. But that break should not be allowed to remain permanent.

The masses of the people are looking to somebody for leadership. They ought to have it. And the Bystander hopes that forward looking citizens in the community with capacity to do things will furnish a much needed leadership to better economic conditions in Des Moines.

PERFUME—PROPER AND IMPROPER USE

Perfume clings to it—and to furs—long after it has become stale. According to popular theory, scent rises and for this reason many people like to put a touch on their ankles and on the hems of their dresses. I can't stress too much, however, the importance of moderation. Perfume should be a subtle, glamorous and remote fragrance that lingers about your person, not a scent that noisily announces your arrival and is more displeasing than compelling to those around you.
