Building and service employees of the Younker department store, composed of about twenty or more Negro janitors, porters and workmen, and twenty or more white elevator operators Wednesday morning, Aug. 2, by the A. F. of L. Union No. 103.

All day Wednesday and Thursday men picketed the Younker store and picketing spread Wednesday afternoon to Sears, Roebuck & Co., the S. S. Kresge and the New Utica store. "The union is insisting on a contract which requires all people in this group (building service employees) to join the union," a spokesman for the group revealed.

Philadelphia Prepares for 10,000 Baptists Next Month

Philadelphia, (ANP)—The National Baptist convention, the largest religious body among Negroes, will hold its annual session here for two weeks beginning Sept. 5. The Rev. C. A. Adams, president of the Pennsylvania State Baptist Association, said 10,000 Baptists will attend the September meeting, a record attendance for the convention during the past 10 years.

The sessions, which will be held in Convention hall, will consist of both

closed and open meetings. The passage of sectional legislation, which will affect the Southern wings of the congregation, is also predicted.

Sessions of the women's auxiliary which is under the leadership of Mrs. S. Willie Layton of Philadelphia will be held simultaneously in the mirror room of Convention hall. Women will comprise more than 2,500 of the delegates to the convention, which is headed by Dr. Lacey Kirk Williams of Chicago.

Iowa Clubs to Chicago

Delegates of the Iowa club to the third annual convention which will convene in Chicago, August 11 to 12 will leave Des Moines August 10. Plans are being made for the group to go by special train.

The national meeting will be held at Fifty-third street and Michigan avenue.

Hundreds of A. M. E. Leaders Attend Missionary Conference in Florida

Jacksonville, Fla. (ANP)—The ninth quadrennial convention of the American Home and Foreign Missionary Society of the African Methodist Episcopal church convened here at Mount Zion A. M. E. church, Rev. W. P. Mitchell, pastor; and at Edward Waters college, C. S. Long, Jr., president, last week.

Mrs. L. M. Hughes of Cameron, Texas, is the connectional president of this body which meets every four years and carries on in America, Africa and the West Indies, a far reaching work of Christian helpfulness with remarkable efficiency.

Hundreds of delegates and visitors from all parts of the United States, Canada, the West Indies, South and West Africa, were in attendance. Both men, ministers and members of the church Episcopacy were present, swelling the gathering into the

largest church meeting which Jacksonville has ever entertained and one of the most impressive to be held in America this year. The session lasted eight days.

Episcopal Districts represented by their bishops included North Carolina, Rt. Rev. M. H. Davis; South Carolina, Rt. Rev. J. S. Flipper; Georgia, Rt. Rev. W. A. Fountain; Florida, Rt. Rev. H. Y. Tookes; Alabama, Rt. Rev. D. H. Sims; Mississippi and Louisiana, Rt. Rev. S. L. Greene; Arkansas, Rt. Rev. J. A. Gregg; Texas, Rt. Rev. George B. Young; Oklahoma and Tennessee, Rt. Rev. E. J. Howard. This roster does not, however, include bishops and visitors from northern states who are visiting but who comprise a different organization within the same denomination, the Mite Missionary Soc-

ety headed by Mrs. Christine Smith of Detroit.

EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETS

Jacksonville, Fla. (ANP)—The executive Board of the Hope and Foreign Missionary Society of the A. M. E. church met in a pre-convention panel at Edward Waters college here Monday, with Mrs. Lucy M. Hughes, president of the National organization, presiding. Important matters pertaining to the functioning of local, state and national missionary affairs as well as those pertaining to the activities of women at the coming General Conference of the A. M. E. church in Detroit in 1940, were discussed.

'Vote; Buy Stocks' Says Noted Ohio Physician

"The Negro is in a period of evolution," Dr. H. S. Manuel of Copturus, Ohio, told a group of business and professional men and women, Monday, July 31, at the noon luncheon meeting of the Negro Chamber of Commerce, which met at the Blue Triangle Y. W. C. A.

"We are being put on our own," the guest speaker continued and stressed that "we have been carried for years on the philanthropy of the white man."

That condition is changing "for the best of us," the speaker said. Dr. Manuel commented upon the "marvelous progress that the Negro has made economically," and he went on to say that this progress "has caused the white man to think that we should carry our own."

Citing as examples of progress, the guest speaker pointed out the "well-dressed people at our churches," "our fine homes," and "our limousines;" and he paused—"don't think that the white man doesn't notice that."

Two Solutions

"Two things are important in the solution of the problem of the Negro," Dr. Manuel told the group.

"One is the vote and the other is the dollar," he pointed out. "The vote—we all have—but the dollar is hard to get."

In using the vote the speaker urged the Negroes to form independent voters clubs for the betterment of the Negroes.

He stressed that backing particular political parties or lining up with politicians for the success of the party, or the man had their faults and gained nothing for the supporters if the party or the man lost his political battle.

"We want to organize in every precinct an independent voters league—as a permanent organization—not voting for any party or politician but for the man who will do something for us. We will get somewhere. We will get jobs—we will get representation," Dr. Manuel urged his listeners.

Invest in Stocks

"Now about the dollar," the speaker continued discussing the second solution to the Negro problem.

Members of a group like the Negro Chamber of Commerce do have reasonable incomes and sometimes surpluses to put in the bank, the speaker observed.

"In my idea it is more important for Negroes to invest in stocks and bonds," Dr. Manuel stated and went on to "show how these types of investments will mean more to the Negro than saving small surpluses in banks.

Recent reports show that more stocks are held by the common people than ever before which proves that the white man in buying American," he cited.

"One-hundred dollars in stock is more important to the race than in the bank," the speaker assured and explained to the group how that amount of money spent in investments made the spender—the Negro, a buyer—a boss in a small way in big companies.

"Big companies like the Yellow Cab companies wouldn't dare refuse you jobs."

"Learn to use the vote to the advantage of the race regardless of politics," was the speaker's closing thought.

Approximately forty business and professional men and women were in attendance at the luncheon which was presided over by Atty. Charles P. Howard, president.

The guest speaker was introduced. Columbus citizens feel proud to boast of the young Dr. Manuel as one of their leading business as well as professional men.

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### INTO ACTION

Indications are that Negroes are stiffening their opposition to segregation and racial discrimination on many fronts. Possibly one of the most recent examples is that of the Negro citizens in Miami, Fla., who, in spite of attempts of the Klu Klux Klan to frighten them, went to the polls and voted in large numbers.

The young man who led this fight was a speaker at the NAACP convention in Richmond, Va., last month where he told delegates from all over the country just how the job was done.

On September 12, a city primary election is to be held in Greenville, S. C., and in spite of warnings and pillow case and white-robe parades by the Klan, Negroes are registering in order to be able to vote on election day.

These are just the types of intelligent action Negroes must take in order to secure a full enjoyment of their rights under the constitution.

No race or nation ever won its freedom without paying a price for it. Others may help but the fellow who seeks freedom must fight for it—fight intelligently.

The Negroes of these two communities are to be admired. Their efforts and success ought to be an incentive for others to follow.

### COLONEL SPINGARN

The death of Col. Joel E. Spingarn, president of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, was a shock to thousands of people. At one time a professor, and later a literary critic for a publishing house, Colonel Spingarn was better known as the head of the NAACP which has done such admirable work during his stay in office. He was the donor of the coveted Spingarn Medals given to the Negro annually who makes the greatest achievement during the year.

A Jew at birth, Colonel Spingarn knew personally of some of the injustices of race prejudice. He was opposed to race prejudice against his own group as well as against other groups and did not hesitate to translate that opposition into action.

Interesting of course, he was an example for other Jews. In recent years there has been much talk that Negroes are becoming antagonistic toward Jews to an alarming degree. Undoubtedly, there is some truth in it, and there is a reason. Jews operate an increasingly large number of establishments in America and in some cases have gone even further than their customers in demanding the exclusion of Negroes. Discriminated against themselves, Negroes have expected better treatment from the oppressed who have become oppressors.

In other words, we don't have much patience with the fellow who is being destroyed by Hitler and at the same time employs some of Hitler's methods to destroy others.

Colonel Spingarn was not this type of Jew. There are many others like him. But we detest those who take the opposite view.

"Drums at Dusk" is a story of the Negro rebellion in Haiti which occurred during the course of the French Revolution. The hero is a young Frenchman, who is in sympathy with the Negroes. He numbers among his friends the man Toussaint.

"Americans; a new history of the peoples who settled the Americas," by Emil Leopold Jordan, is an account of the contributions made by the various racial groups to our common civilization.

People planning a trip to New York and the World's Fair will find these new books useful: "A Key to New York," by Rosalie Slocum; and "Here is New York," by Helen Worden.

John Gunther's new book, "Inside Asia," is a readable, but thorough account of politics of Asia, and of the personalities behind the news.

"When You Buy," by M. B. Trilling, is one of the currently popular books designed to aid consumers in buying wisely and getting their money's worth.

"Wind, Sand and Stars," by Antoine de Saint Exupery, is the autobiography of a French war-time aviator. The book also tells of the author's experiences flying South American commercial routes. Saint Exupery is the author of the well-known book, "Night Flight."

Among the novels which are being read and discussed a great deal at the present are:

"Rebecca," by Daphne Du Maurier; "Nebraska Coast," by Clyde Brion Davis; "Ordeal," by Nevil Shute Norway; and "April Was Warm," by Barry Benfield.

## Health Hints

### THE COLON

Until recent years the colon was considered only as a viaduct to carry off the refuse of digestion its importance in completing digestion was little appreciated. The average individual is usually unconscious of the presence of a colon. There are, however, many who are colon minded, in whom a variety of vague gasteral intestinal symptoms arrive. These symptoms vary from an acute colicky cramps to periods of distensions, sometimes accompanied by vomiting and palpitation. Many of these cases are called spastic or irritable colon. This is usually based upon X-ray evidence which reveals an abnormally contracted condition. There may be spasms in one part, dilatation in another, in other words disturbance of tone, or of irritability or both. In such cases, there is constipation, and stools are small, hard and dry.

Closely allied in many ways to this condition is a disorder of the colon commonly called mucus colitis. This is characterized by periodic attacks of abdominal pains down low, and large amounts of mucus in the stools. The bowels are usually constipated except during paroxysms when small stools consisting almost entirely of mucus maybe passed.

These patients are usually a nervous and emotional disposition, and may at times have cold hands and feet, sweating, tremors, and palpitation. Physical examinations usually do not reveal very much.

### Treatment

As this condition is intimately associated in many patients with certain articles of diet, careful study of the patients diet should be made. Skin test to suspected foods are sometimes helpful to determine what foods are harmful. Certain drugs to relax the colon are always indicated.
