Philadelphia, (CNA)—One hundred families of South Philadelphia's Negro slum district are going to get modern low-priced apartments because a socially minded couple won a \$150,000 sweepstakes prize last April.

The prize award completely changed the lives of Benjamin and Pearl Mason and their two children. After existing on an \$11.40 weekly relief check, they now own their own home, an inexpensive automobile, and have paid back the \$2,133.00 they received in relief money.

Now they're going to share what's left with other members of their race. They'll replace a dilapidated block of slum tenements with modern apartments, with low rents.

Mound Bayou, Miss.—Headed by District Atty. Greek P. Rice, County Sheriff Joe L. Smith, Maj. Birdsong, thirty-three state guards and sheriff's deputies raided several business places in the all-Negro town, Thursday night, Dec. 7.

The raid netted six "one armed bandits" (shot machines) and a large quantity of bonded whiskey. Ten persons were arrested by the officers and jailed on charges of violating liquor, gambling and slot machine laws.

Those arrested were released Friday morning on bond pending hearing before county officers, Friday, Dec. 15.

WHY THERE IS NO PEACE

Peace on earth, good will toward men. The world cannot sing this carol with any degree of contentment when a large share of its population is at war and the other snaking in its boots for fear it will be involved next.

Of course our whole trouble arises when in our thinking we do not include ALL when we use the term men.

And the war demonstrates so many instances of this miserable omission, that it is not difficult to understand how conflicts continue to arise between CIVILIZED men.

When Russia began its conquest of Finland, the civilized world spoke out in horror. Italy was no exception to the rule and yet three years ago, the Italians committed this same act of rape on Ethiopia. In fact Italy's conquest of Ethiopia and the failure of nations to do anything about it were opening wedges for Germany and Russia to do the same thing to other small nations and feel perfectly justified in their conduct.

Now, the United States is all excited because Russia is pushing over Finland and Russia is raising a fund to help the Finns. Charity is a fine thing; certainly we sympathize with the Finns but why all this fuss? Have not the small nations suffered like the Finns? Were they any richer than the Finns? Or, are we doing this because their war debt or because we are interested in stopping Russia, and communistic influence?

No, peace on earth seldom includes all men. We sing it with reservations. That's why we are singing this age old carol without any thought or concern as to what the words imply.

WHY ALL THE NOISE?

Much is being made over alleged corruption and misconduct in the Des Moines police department. The Bystander has said nothing about that so far waiting for some of the smoke to clear. But the controversy grows more and more so we might well speak now as ever.

Unfortunately, most of the talking has been done by people who know nothing about the practical operation of the department or are misguided by hints and innuendo which have little foundation in fact. The Bystander knows that one of the best ways to get the best out of our departments is to have them work on a QUALITY basis.

and doing a fine job. And the Bystander was not been excited over the so-called "forgotten men of Garden Grove." True the officers made a mistake when they refused these men a chance to communicate with their people. The responsibility there is definite and fixed. Reasonable punishment is called for and should be administered. But worse things than that have happened and the folks higher up did nothing about them.

Now comes the civil service commission to make an investigation. Rotten. They are absolutely unqualified for this task. Their biased decision in the Coyle case which was not concerned in by the heads of the police department in that they punished the officers who beat Coyle and the jury in District Court which gave him a verdict for damages, proved that. Of course the present investigation will be no exception to the rule.

The Bystander believes that an occasional shift in heads of the department, reasonable opportunity of prisoners to inform friends of their arrest and a fair and impartial civil service commission will maintain the police department in an efficient basis; and we repeat, Des Moines has a better police force than most communities.

NEW BOOKS IN THE DES MOINES PUBLIC LIBRARY

"Why Babies?" by Rachel Violet Campbell is a book about the trouble and fun of being a parent by the mother of four children who takes her job seriously but humorously, too.

"Juggernaut," by Albert Carr is a collection of biographies of twenty-one dictators from Richelieu and Cromwell to Mussolini and Hitler. The author also tries to give a picture of the causes of dictatorship and the courses they run.

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Health Hints

ACUTE ALCOHOLISM

A small amount of alcohol, whether in the form of spirits, wines, or brewed liquors, produce exhilaration and a general feeling of well-being. It decreases the sense of fatigue, and gives to the individual an increased jollity and the idea of enhanced capacity for accomplishment and importance; but with larger amounts, particularly if taken in a concentrated form, this stage is rapidly passed and the individual enters a phase of mental confusion, loss of memory, and change of personality, some individuals becoming noisy and boisterous, and others morose and sullen.

There is muscular incoordination. In some individuals this affects all extremities, but in others chiefly the legs, and they may appear apparently sober until they attempt to walk. The skin is flushed and moist, while the pulse is full and accelerated; respirations are slow and deep. If sufficient alcohol has been taken these symptoms may progress to somnolence, unconsciousness and coma.

The treatment of these acute cases is directed toward the removal of the stomach contents (gastric lavage). After the stomach is empty, food of a liquid high caloric character should be introduced and the patient left alone in warm surroundings until the effect of the intoxication disappears.

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# Bishop Martin, Mayor Conkling and Civic Leaders Speak at Kyles Church Dedication

## Speaking of Church, Bishop Says 'There is No Better Business'

A capacity crowd overflowed the auditorium of the newly rebuilt Kyles A. M. E. Zion church Sunday Dec. 17, for the dedication services, which were conducted by Bishop J. W. Martin of the sixth episcopal district, who came to the city for the special event.

With Rev. P. M. Marshall as host, representatives of the city including the mayor, ministers, fraternal leaders, professional men, and members of other associations appeared on the program.

Using as a special text for the dedication Bishop Martin chose: "Then there shall be a place which the Lord your God shall choose, to cause his name to dwell there; thither shall ye bring all that I command you; your burnt offerings, and your sacrifices, your tithes, and the heave offerings of your hand, and all your choice vows which ye vow unto the Lord," Deuteronomy 12:11.

Many of our people who have a smattering of education," Bishop Martin opened, "have said that our people were very foolish to put money in church buildings."

"No Better Business" "There is no better business than the business of having the attention of people turned towards God," the bishop declared.

"Our progress since the days of emancipation has been because of the church," the bishop spoke and went on to point out how many great institutions, such as Tuskegee Institute grew out of some church. The great Tuskegee, he informed, started in a little A. M. E. Zion church—Butler Chapel.

Stressing the importance of the church Bishop Martin said that the church "helps create the proper atmosphere" for worship.

"This building is a symbol of our self-commitment and self-surrender to this ideal of Jesus Christ," Bishop Martin continued, after an explanation that the principle of Jesus Christ was one of "love" which he pointed out as being "willing to die for another."

"And," continued the speaker, "we must leave behind us the world, the flesh and the devil."

"Our coming together, centering our thoughts and our attentions on things eternal, we are enabled to leave behind us—to lay aside—to run away from those things that flit and flee," Bishop Martin assured.

Following an invitation extended by the Rev. A. Ross Brent, Mrs. G. M. Howell, pastor of Melick Temple, at Perry, led the offertory prayer.
