AN ARMY REGULATION WITH A GRAIN OF SALT

Washington—Here's one regulation the Army is taking with more than a grain of salt.

It has been found that troops undergoing strenuous or prolonged physical activity in training or on maneuvers will lose an excessive amount of salt through perspiration. This often results in decreased efficiency, fatigue and heat exhaustion.

To overcome this deficiency, the commanders of troops have been officially instructed by the Chief of Staff to have extra salt available for use after such periods of activity in both temperate and tropical regions.

The proper proportions are one pound of salt to 100 gallons of water, or reduced to individual needs, one-fourth teaspoon to one quart of water.

Weaning Dogs Properly

It is pretty safe to say that the many thousands of puppies that die or develop rickets or malformed limbs before they are three months old would have grown into healthy dogs had they been properly weaned. No set time can be given as to when to wean puppies. This depends entirely upon the condition of the puppy to be weaned, but it is usually considered sometime between the ninth and the twelfth week.

Many people consider it is all right to abruptly change from a milk diet to a diet composed entirely of solids. This is incorrect and the stomach rebels. The best way is to make the weaning a gradual process, when the puppies are three to five weeks old. This gradual supplementing should be done with any one of the nutritious and palatable milk foods on the market. Then gradually add more and more until at the complete weaning the puppy's stomach will be adjusted to receiving a more solid food.

First Law Under Constitution

The first law enacted by congress under the Constitution was "An Act to Regulate the Time and Manner of Administering Certain Oaths," and was approved by President Washington June 1, 1789. Under this statute the form of the oath, taken by the vice president and other federal officials is as follows: "I, A. B. do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support and defend the Constitution of the United States against all enemies, foreign and domestic; that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the same; that I take this obligation freely, without any mental reservation or purpose of evasion, and that I will well and faithfully discharge the duties of the office on which I am about to enter. So help me God."

Moving Accident Victim Dangerous

Serious and unnecessary injury can be caused by a person who takes it upon himself to lift an accident victim and place him in a car or order to rush him to a hospital.

Medical authorities advise against moving an injured person more than actually necessary until medical help arrives or unless someone familiar with first-aid procedure is present.

In the majority of accident cases requiring hospital care the best procedure is to make the victim as comfortable as possible and allow him to rest quietly until the ambulance arrives. Unless there is a heavy loss of blood or unless the ambulance is greatly delayed the danger of an expert handling should be avoided.

'Don't Fire Till—'

Some day, some time, somebody will establish with certainty who actually gave this famous order.

That it was issued at Bunker Hill on June 17, 1775, to the Continentals who were about to be attacked by the British regulars under the command of William Howe is agreed, as is also the circumstance that the Minutemen were short of ammunition and heavily outnumbered.

Traditionally, credit for the line goes to Col. William Prescott, who, knowing that his men would be tempted by the crimson coats and white breeches of the king's grenadiers and cognizant of his troops' lack of sufficient equipment, had them hold their fire till the enemy was almost upon them.

Others to whom the words have been attributed are Corporals Israel Putnam, Warren and Stark, the last of whom is said to have advised his men:

'Don't fire till you see the whites of their eyes, or Mollie Stark's widow.'

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LET'S HOPE IT WORKS

Following a promise made last month, President Roosevelt has named a committee which will handle complaints against firms discriminating against Negroes in defense industries. The personnel of the group is listed elsewhere in these columns. The president selected representatives of capital and labor for the white members while a lawyer and a newspaper man represent the Negro. At least the committee is influential and if its hands are not tied, it is in a position to do a great amount of good.

Of course a great deal will depend upon the aggressiveness, persistency and diplomacy of the Negro members; much will depend upon William Green of the A. F. of L. who, though often expressing a willingness to give the Negro equal opportunity in industry, heads an organization many of whose units exclude Negroes from membership.

There never existed a better reason why Negroes should be permitted to participate freely in industry as today; there never was a better chance to break down some of the long standing barriers that have prevented them from enjoying full economic opportunity. The machinery seems to be set to make things work. And it will if those in authority do their share of the job.

Breeding Crime

A case of grand larceny in the Des Moines municipal court brought to light some rather startling facts surprising to many and yet well known to others who are acquainted with the policy of those who seek to squeeze every ounce of work from the unprotected, unorganized worker for a pittance in return.

A young woman recently graduated from one of our elementary schools was the victim. An employer required that she do the cooking, help with the ironing and do general housework. The mother of the employer lived next door and when there was nothing to be done she was required to help in the mother's home. The hours were from 7 a. m. to 8 p. m. seven days a week, and often she was required to remain all night. And the pay—three dollars per week.

While engaged in the home of her employer's mother, she picked up a ring, wore it home and lost it. She said, "Maybe she stole it. We make no defense of such acts."

But we do call attention to the terrible temptation under which this girl worked. By the time she paid her carfare she had less than two dollars left; by the time she put in all those hours at work she had not time for recreation or leisure.

Such treatment of unfortunate people is unfair and a blot on those who practice it. There is no wonder many such girls go astray. It is a big temptation not to do otherwise.

No Gains So Far

It has often been said—and with much truth—that one of the strongest enemies Negroes had in the south was a northerner who had gone south and become converted to their method of dealing with colored people.

The Bystander sometimes wonders if that same bit of reasoning may not be applied to the two republican members of President Roosevelt's cabinet—Messrs. Knox and Stimson.

During World War No. 1 democrats headed the war and navy departments. And while much criticism arose here and there over treatment of Negroes in the service, the then secretary of war, Mr. Baker, made a serious effort to do something toward rectifying some of the injustices the boys suffered.

True, Secretary Stimson has a Negro civilian aid on his staff as did Mr. Baker. But as far as the Bystander has been able to learn, he does not seem able to accomplish much.

Just what Messrs. Stimson and Knox have in mind to do about giving Negroes a fair chance in the army and navy we are not able to say but up until now the results have been very poor.

WHO AM I?

By Henry N. Wilcox. A great deal has been written about the achievements in the field of fine arts by the Negro, particularly in the arts of drama, music and poetry.

The Negro's imagery and sentiments expressed in these arts are essentially the result of the conditions under which he has lived in the western hemisphere. His "Deep River," or "They Shall Not Die" (by John Wesley), or "Clorindy" (by Dunbar). Too, his achievement in the arts of painting and sculpturing have attained distinction, while we as a race have been slow to show our appreciation and love for this type of art—or perhaps we are not ready for it—it has been most readily accepted by art-lovers of other races and art to be found in the galleries and museums throughout the world.

Like the dramatist and the poet, the deep emotion and serious passion of the painter—what he saw or what he felt or what he heard—has been depicted and expressed with the tip of his brush. "The Freed Women" (by Edmonia Lewis) was exhibited at the Philadelphia Centennial Exposition as early as 1876. "The Silent Appeal" (by Meta V. Warrick-Fuller) is the most noted sculptor of the Negro race in America today.

I was born in 1884, attended the Chicago Art Institute for five years, and won scholarships and prizes to the amount of nine hundred dollars. I studied under Henry O. Tanner, at the Julian Academy, Paris. A number of my paintings are to be seen both in France and in the United States.

Of late I have interested myself in Negro subjects, I would like to do in paintings what Dunbar has done in verse.

Who am I? Answer: William Edward Scott.

Parasitic Fungus Growth Attacks Potatoes, Beets

That finicky fungus, known widely as Rhizoctonia, and causing an equally well-known disease of potatoes, sugar beets and other crops, shows differences which may account for some of its eccentricities, according to E. L. LeClerg of Louisiana State University, as the result of investigations in co-operation with the United States department of agriculture.

Reported in Phytopathology, the plant-disease specialists' journal, LeClerg shows how the Rhizoctonia from the potato will not attack sugar beets, whereas the same organism from sugar beets will attack potatoes.

Investigating further, LeClerg found that the threads composing the body of the sugar-beet Rhizoctonia were appreciably and significantly thicker than those of the potato organism. The sugar-beet form also grew faster in laboratory tests, and made its best development around 86 degrees Fahrenheit, while the potato form, the slower grower, developed best at around 77 degrees. The sugar-beet Rhizoctonia also seemed to be more highly parasitic against other test plants than did the potato form.

HEALTH HINTS

UNDULANT FEVER (MALTA FEVER)

Malta Fever is an acute disease, which is widespread over North America, Asia and Europe and particularly in the Mediterranean area. The germ that causes this disease is infested from contaminated food and drink, particularly milk, butter, cheese made from milk from infected goats and cows. It is also contracted by those who handle infected meat (slaughterhouse men and butchers).

In these cases, although it may gain entrance through the skin, it is also probable that their hands are contaminated and thus they infect their own food. After infection the individual may become sick anywhere from five to 21 days, the average being two weeks. Although the disease may begin abruptly with a chill and sudden elevation of temperature it usually begins gradually with a progressive increase in the evening temperature which returns to normal in the morning.

Associated with this evening fever there are chilliness, sweating and a progressive weakness. It is quite characteristic of the disease that the sufferer may feel very ill in the evening but the following morning appear to be in his normal health, only for the symptoms to return as the day wears on. After ten days to two weeks there is an increase of the morning temperature also. A striking feature is the apparent well-being of the individual which does not run parallel to the body temperature.

DIAGNOSIS. A diagnosis should only be made after a careful history of the patient and the disease along with necessary blood examination.

PROGNOSIS. About fifty percent of these cases terminate in front eight to ten weeks; one third lasts from three to four weeks and another third may drag from five to eight months, sometimes longer. In spite of this long period of illness the death rate is comparatively low averaging about three percent of those who become ill with this disease.

TREATMENT. Treatment of this condition depends entirely upon the removal of the sources of this infection. Active treatment of an infected individual absolute bed-rest, high caloric diet, plenty of fluids, and necessary drugs for the control of pain. No specific treatment is yet available.
