DIVINE'S 'ANGELS' IN BOND 'VICTORY'

New York, N. Y.—A singing, shouting, arm-waving horde of Father Divine's followers was triumphant Sunday night.

They were permitted to buy war bonds in New York under the "heavenly" names they have adopted since joining the cult—but it took an "invasion" from Philadelphia, Penn., to achieve the victory.

Postoffices in Harlem had refused to sell the "angels" bonds inscribed with their religious names and the Father Divine adherents refused to revert to their original names.

Then Police Capt. Henry Brown of Philadelphia and Louis J. Amarando, a U. S. treasury official and a member of the Pennsylvania war finance committee, set up shop in Harlem.

The "angels" converged 5,000 strong and within seven hours had purchased \$80,000 worth of bonds—all for cash.

All the money will go back to Philadelphia, which has not filled its bond sale quota in the fifth war loan drive.

NEGRO OWNED WAR PLANT MAKES GARMENTS

Cleveland (ANP)—The American Enterprises Association, Inc., one of the few Negro-owned and operated war plants, produces military garments under United States army and lend-lease contracts.

Tucked away on the second floor of the Hart building, the five-month-old plant employs 135 skilled, unskilled and clerical workers of all races and creeds, resembling a miniature united nations.

The room is alive with the constant droning of 110 power-driven sewing machines, buttonholders and food-off-arm machines operated by Negro, Italian and Spanish women.

Iowa Masons Elect New Grand Master, H. Brown

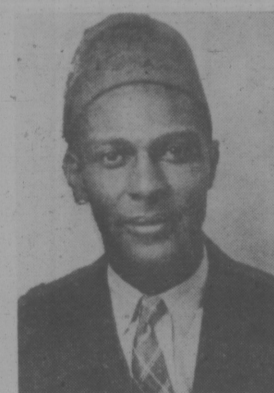

FORMER and NEW CHIEFTAIN

Completing twelve years as leader of the Brotherhood, Inc., Noble F. Gray, organizer, retired as noble chieftain on June 25.

Elected to head the Brotherhood as its second chief was Gilbert H. Randle, a resident of Iowa for twenty-five years and a member of the organization for four years.

The Brotherhood which devotes its efforts to the improvement of the community has grown from twelve to 250 members since the organization of the non-political, non-denominational body. Mr. Gray related, and added that "I have never received a penny salary and I have done all for the interest and improvement of the Brotherhood."

"I retire after twelve years because I feel that the organization needs young blood," Mr. Gray commented.

A native of Missouri Mr. Randle is a prominent citizen of Des Moines, where he is employed as a deputy sheriff under Vane Pip Overturf. Educated in the schools here, he studied in Kansas City, Mo.

Active in Republican affairs here he organized the Young Negro Republican League in Polk County, in 1936, and served as Fifth District chairman of the young GOP league for four years. Prior to his present employment he served in the maintenance department at the court house under W. H. Cotton, supervisor of Lee Township. He operated a concession at Good park for six years under the supervision of the park board.

In the Brotherhood lodge he has served on the planning committee for two years. The organization is now excavating for a building and recreational grounds at Thirteenth and Center streets.

Residing at 1155 Fourteenth street with his wife, Mrs. Carrie Randle, he is the father of eight children. A son, Gilbert Randle is a corporal in the army, stationed at Camp Lee, Va.; a daughter, Dorthea, is a private in the Women's Army Corps, at Ft. Des Moines; another daughter, Mildred, who graduated from North high in June, is in government training at the American Institute of Business in Des Moines. Five minor children are at home.

The Randles are members of the Maple Street Baptist church of which he is trustee.

Citizens Get 'Lesson' In Democracy

Lessons in "democracy" have been coming up in the Des Moines courts of justice this week.

Monday, July 10, five white women appeared before the city council and desired to prevent possible occupancy of a house in their east side neighborhood by a Negro family.

Mayor John MacVicar told the white women:

"We can't do that, you know. This is the United States of America. The younger of two spokesmen for the women had a petition which she said would have asked the council to "restrict" York, E. Fourteenth and Idaho streets, from University avenue northward to Washington avenue.

Constitution The petition was not accepted by the council.

Mayor MacVicar and Streets Commissioner John Budd said the United States Constitution does not permit segregation.

The young woman said a woman who owned a house at 1354 E. Fourteenth street, "told me yesterday she was closing a deal with a colored family. Later, she asked: "Is there no place in Des Moines that's restricted?"

The mayor said there was not. "Let's make a place for these people," she said. "I have no racial prejudices." Afterward, she remarked that Negroes had increased income and, that she believed they needed more living space.

"I'll sell to colored, too, to get my money out of my home," she told the council.

Up to Owner "That's entirely up to the owner," MacVicar answered.

An older spokesman had asked, "Isn't it fair and just that they live in another portion of the city?"

Sgt. added, "They do it in the south—we can do it up here."

The mayor said the southern practice violated the Constitution. Later the women talked to Bruce J. Flick, assistant city solicitor. He said he told them the same thing the mayor had.

WFA To Lease Kerford Limestone Mine To Store Many Perishable Foods

Atchison, Kan. (ANP)—In what is one of the largest transactions negotiated by the government with a Negro business concern since the beginning of the war, the War Food Administration is completing arrangements for leasing the famous Kerford limestone mine here. The government plans to use the 12 million feet of cubic space to store lard, eggs and other perishables in an unprecedented project which promises to revolutionize storage of the nation's food supply, ANP learned this week.

The mine, which is operated by the George W. Kerford company, and located at the edge of Atchison, has long been one of the most substantial business enterprises conducted by Negroes in the nation. Founded in 1897 by George W. Kerford, pioneer colored Kansan, the mine was bequeathed at his death to his two sons, Lloyd and George Kerford. George Kerford II died three years ago and the third generation has entered the business, George Ed Kerford sharing management with Lloyd.

Long Attracted Attention

The mine has long attracted the attention of stone quarriers. Instead of digging into an open quarry, the Kerfords have mined their rock using labor saving machinery and digging straight into the hills which comprise their holdings. The result has been a huge cavern, with level floors and ceilings, the thousands of tons of remaining rock supported by great pillars. Among the firm's clients are most of the railroads of this section, the states of Kansas and Missouri, the army and navy and the governmental river and flood control projects. Their operations have extended over three or four states and they have valuable rock holdings under

lease in other areas. They work both Negro and white workers and at times have had as many as 500 men on their payroll.

The mine has a normal temperature of 50 degrees. Refrigerating machinery will be installed by the government to give it a temperature of between 30 and 32 degrees. It will thus become the largest single cold storage house in the United States. To construct a building with equivalent floor space would cost approximately \$15,000,000 according to government estimates. Between 3,000 and 3,500 carloads of foods, with an estimated tonnage of between 600,000 and 700,000, can be stored with ease.

What Mine Will Mean

For the farmer it will mean that government support price on hogs will be met particularly in times of peak marketing. WFA can continue to buy hogs even after commercial storage has been taken up.

For the consumer it will mean less wastage of food. It will no longer be necessary to divert eggs to livestock feed or lard into soap as WFA finds itself with oversupplies. The agency will simply route the foods to Atchison for future use.

Lloyd Kerford and his wife have a son and a daughter, the son in the army at Kessler field and the girl in high school here. The late George Kerford had two sons one of whom is office manager of the concern and the other in the army.

The Kerfords under the contract will continue to mine limestone, carrying on business as usual and constantly providing more and more storage space for the government. Lloyd Kerford was the first delegate-at-large ever named from Kansas to the Republican convention last month.

NAACP Opens Wartime Conference In Chicago

New York—Regarded nationally among Negroes as the most significant meeting of the year, will be this month's Wartime Conference of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, convening in Chicago July 12-16 in Metropolitan Community Church, 41st and South Parkway. Purposal planning for the future status of 15 million Negro Americans will be the objective of conference speakers, national officers and working delegates.

The battle-scarred 35-year-old organization, pioneer in the fight for equal rights has maintained an almost invulnerable defense against prejudice, insults and unconstitutional assaults made upon the nation's much-oppressed tenth man.

Successful in 19-out of 21 precedent-breaking supreme court decisions, granting each time another inch to the Negro citizenship statute, the Association is vocal largely thru its Executive Secretary, Walter White, veteran of 25 years to the cause of oppressed minorities.

Over 600 Branches

Besides an interracial Board of Directors who help formulate Association policy, the staff personnel comprises outstanding executives, national officers, and field secretaries who aid local leadership in more than 600 branches and youth councils, representing individual memberships well up toward a million to say nothing of the distinguished list of "Life and organization enrollments."

At the Chicago Conference the grave responsibility for immediate disposal of those its hampering democratic realization of constitutional rights for Negroes at war and on the home front, will be the major con-

consideration superceding all other goals in the NAACP's program to safeguard the destiny of minorities. Unequivocal in its affirmative stand for the extension of all human rights to all peoples, this year's program will point the way to new social, legal, and political action to obtain those inalienable rights now being denied great numbers in areas resisting the ordinary processes of democratic government.

How the Negro Should Vote, What the Negro Soldier Expects, The Stake of Organized Labor and The Negro in the November Election, The Legal Attack to Secure Civil Rights, Negro Youth in a Free World, and How the Negro Can Hold His Job, are among topics listed to receive major attention because of their bearing on the future status of Negro Americans.

Uncensored Report A crowd of 30,000 to hear the uncensored report of What's Happening to the Negro Soldier Overseas, is anticipated at the Sunday Mass Meeting in Washington Park, July 16, 2:30 p. m. by Mr. White, who spent 14 weeks as a war correspondent. He will reveal for the first time undisclosed observations on the plight of Negro servicemen and officers in European theatres of war.

On the same program, the Spingarn Medal will be presented to the 29th winner, Dr. Charles R. Drew of Washington, D. C.; Dr. Earnest R. Hoeten, eminent anthropologist of Harvard University will make the presentation to Dr. Drew for his outstanding work in blood plasma and his establishment of the blood plasma bank now in use by the American

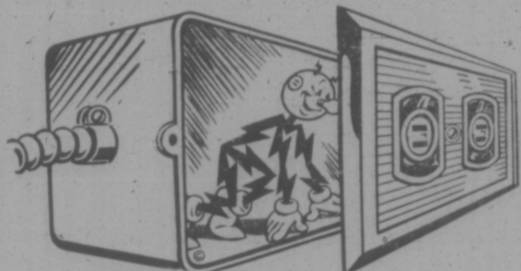

ONE-SIDED LAW ENFORCEMENT BY THE U.S.A.

Several weeks ago, most newspapers carried a picture showing Sewell Avery, chairman of the board of directors of Montgomery Ward Company, being carried out of his office in Chicago by United States soldiers because he refused to surrender his office to the federal government.

Ward had questioned the legality of a board order and therefore refused to obey it. The case was taken to court but the judge refused to rule on the legality of the seizure since the property had been returned to the owners before the court reached a decision.

In April of this year, the United States Supreme Court by a vote of 8 to 1 handed down an exhaustive decision outlawing the exclusion of Negroes from voting in the Democratic primaries. However, Georgia officials including Senator George declared that in spite of the decision Negroes would not be permitted to vote.

Here we have two entirely different attitudes on law enforcement: In the Chicago labor dispute the federal government takes a firm position, even in cases where there is doubt as to the legality of the action because the Supreme Court has not passed on that particular feature of the law; in the Georgia case involving the rights of Negroes to vote in the Democratic primaries, even though there are flagrant violations, even after the United States Supreme court had declared what the law is, no effort is made to enforce it.

We detest class legislation. Law enforcement on the basis of class is even worse. It is despicable; no twist of reasoning can justify it. And we are battling with the Axis nations to put down their practice of dealing with minorities in this very way.

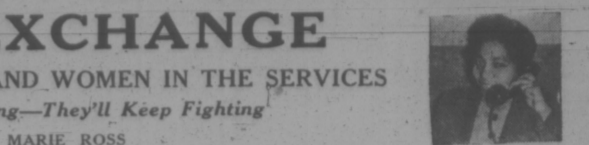

"Many Units Could Be Used" "But no fooling, there are many units that could be used to help win this war sooner if they would forget so much of this—Discrimination and Segregation!"

"I have found and fit it more since I have been in service than during the rest of my life put together. "I could tell you things that you would never believe—until you saw it with your own eyes. And I thought I knew a little something about life and people.

"While I was stationed in Georgia, I found out that a colored man or woman wasn't anymore than a dog. A soldier couldn't go on the street at night with a girl in the colored section of town without the civilian police asking for a health card or something else. That included any girl—no matter what kind of family she came from.

"It is really things like that that make one wonder if living and trying to do what is right is worthwhile!" "Well, I trust you will find something interesting or good in this letter and that the people back there can use in helping to make our lives a little more happy. When we do return home—they say they are not going to do this and that. Just wait and see. Give my regards to all who know me."

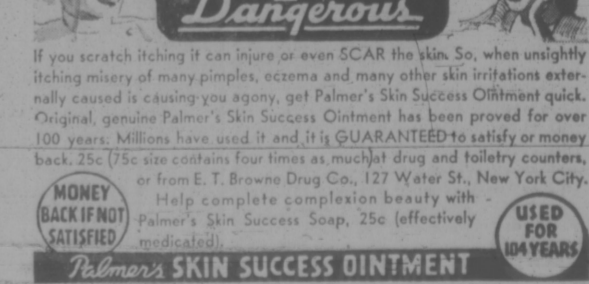
