News Briefs From Far and Near

SAN BERNARDINO APPOINTS FIRST NEGRO SCHOOL TEACHER

SAN FRANCISCO, CALIF.—(Pacific Press Syndicate)—Marking the first time a Negro has been appointed to teach in the city school system here, Mrs. Mary Lou Smith, wife of J. Robert Smith, editor of the Tri-County Bulletin newspaper, was appointed last week to teach at the Mt. Vernon elementary school.

While Negro teachers are employed in the county schools, only whites and Mexicans—previously were appointed to the city schools. Mrs. Smith, a teacher in the Los Angeles school system for the last four years, is a graduate of San Bernardino schools and the University of California at Los Angeles.

ALL-NEGRO TOWN THRIVES IN MISSISSIPPI

CHICAGO—From fever-ridden swampland to prosperous modern metropolis boasting an up-to-date hospital is the amazing record of Mississippi's all-Negro town Mound Bayou declares a pictorial feature in the September issue of Ebony.

"Prosperity has come to Mound Bayou in the strangest way," the article explains. "No big factory has opened to give Mound Bayou its current boom. The all-Negro town cashed in on something more vital to the 1,074, 578 Negroes in Mississippi.

"Mound Bayou cashed in on Jim Crow. With less than 900 hospital beds available for Negroes in the Delta state," the article continues, "the little town opened a modern, well-equipped hospital and became a Negro medical center."

FBI INVESTIGATES RECORDER'S OFFICE

WASHINGTON, D. C.—(NNPA).—Neither the Federal Bureau of Investigation nor the Reverend Marshal Shepard, Recorder of Deeds of the District of Columbia, would comment last Friday on an investigation of the office of the Recorder of Deeds recently made by FBI agents.

A spokesman for the FBI said it was the bureau's policy not to comment on pending investigations because allegations made are often proven false and it would not be fair to the persons under investigation to comment until the inquiry is completed.

CENTERVILLE CAFE MANAGER FOUND NOT GUILTY

CENTERVILLE, IA.—A jury in the court of Justice of Peace H. H. Henderson here found the manager of the Thompson's cafe not guilty in a civil rights case which grew out of a refusal to serve Mrs. Bernice Palmer and Miss Fannie Mae McGregory of Des Moines while the NAACP state conference was in session here in June.

The case was prosecuted by County Attorney Hugh Gurnsey and assisted by James B. Morris of Des Moines, chairman of the legal redress committee of the NAACP.

Gov. Arnall Asked To Form Georgia National Guard

ATLANTA, GA.—(NNPA).—Governor Ellis Arnall was asked last Thursday by C. A. Scott, editor and General manager of the Atlanta Daily World, to establish a colored unit of the Georgia National Guard as a means of assuring colored people of security in Georgia.

Mr. Scott wrote Governor Arnall that "the cold-blooded and obviously planned massacre" of four persons—two men and their wives—near Monroe, Georgia, July 25, revealed clearly "the precarious positions" in which colored persons find themselves in Georgia.

He added that the crime involved "the whole idea of law, order and decency to say nothing about justice," and the fact that no arrests have yet been made "aggravates the situation" insofar as colored people are concerned.

To alleviate a feeling of insecurity among the colored people of Georgia and to cause the masses of white people in the State to realize that the colored people also have rights guaranteed by the Constitution, Mr. Scott suggested the formation of a colored unit of the National Guard in Georgia.

"Unfortunately, in the past," he stated, "white troops have not always acted unbiassedly in interracial conflicts."

Lynch Terror Flares Up in Texas; Two Veterans Victims

NEW YORK, August 22nd—Lynch terror continued unabated in several Southern States, flaring up in Marshall, Texas, where two Negro veterans met death at the hands of "unknown persons". Although Texas police attempted to characterize the lynchings as isolated murders, Negroes in Marshall live under the pall of lynch law.

NAACP investigators have reported what they believe to be two new lynchings to the National Office in New York and are continuing their investigation in spite of an ominous lack of cooperation by the town's police. The two new victims of the terror both former GI's were Richard F. Gordon, 31, and Alonza Brooks, 25.

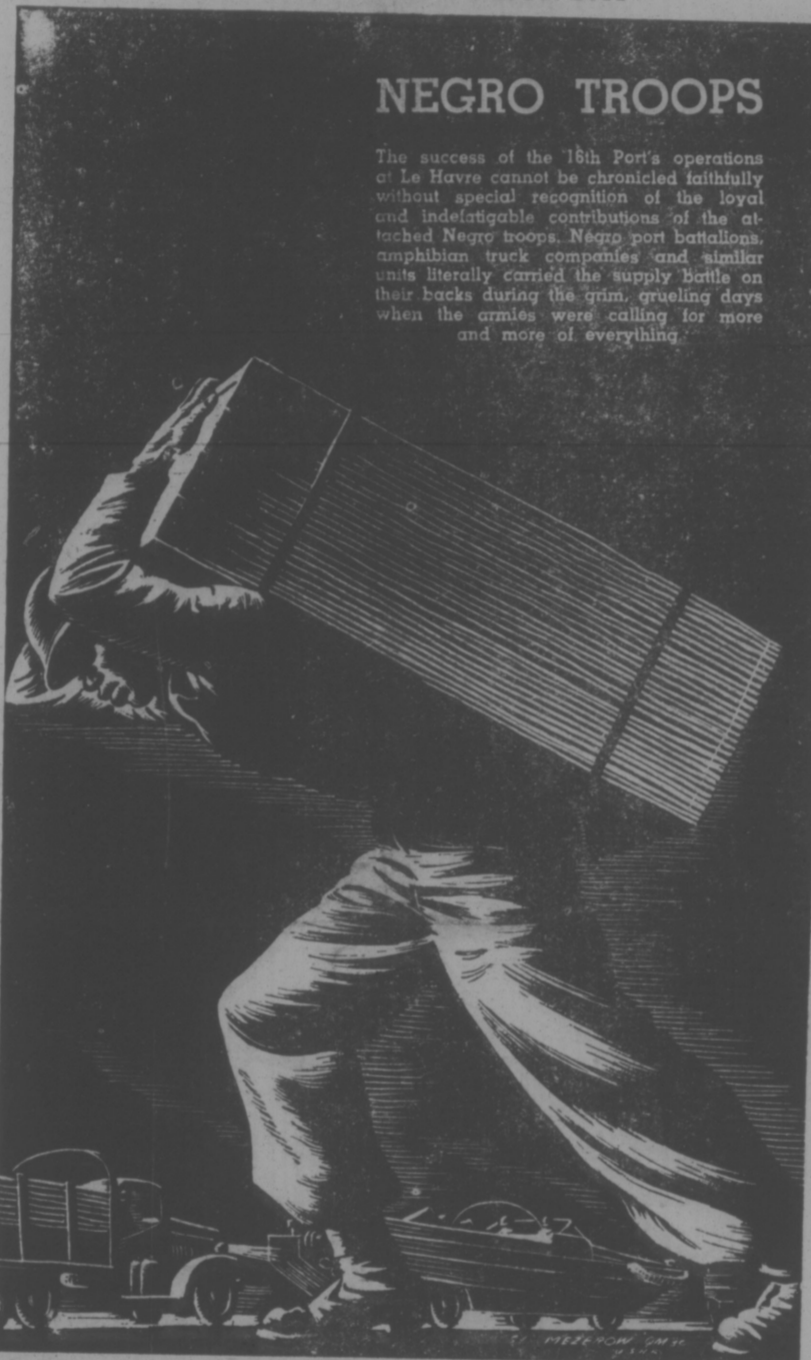
Gordon's death, according to police, was at the hands of a hit-and-run driver. But one of the people who saw his body lying on the road before it was taken to the morgue, stated that his throat had been slashed from ear to ear, undoubtedly by a knife, that his head and body were horribly cut and bruised, and that prints on the road leading to where the vet lay, showed evidence that he had been dragged through the streets tied to the rear of an automobile. Negro residents in the vicinity of the killing, said they were awakened early in the day by two automobiles containing

groups of white men, who were making a great deal of noise, and who remained on the scene of the killing until the police arrived, leading to the belief that the lynchers and police were in a conspiracy together.

Several days before his death, Gordon had been questioned by the police on a charge of stealing his wealthy white employer's whisky. Although he had no knowledge of the theft, and vehemently told the police so, he was fired. Two days later, he was rehired by his former employer, and was killed at dawn the next morning.

More Mystery
There is even more mystery about the death of Alonza Brooks, who was found dead in the woods near Marshall, three days after he had left home in his car to visit friends after driving his family to church. He had no known enemies, yet his autopsy revealed death from blows on the nape of his neck and strangling. The motive obviously not robbery, as his wallet and wrist watch were still on his person when his body was discovered.

Schwellenbach Knew 'Such Practices'; Proposed to Do Nothing About Them

WASHINGTON, D. C.—(NNPA).—Admitting he knew of the existence of race segregation and discrimination in the District of Columbia offices of the United States Employment Service, Secretary of Labor Lewis B. Schwellenbach last Wednesday indicated he proposes to do little or nothing toward wiping out such practices.

Secretary of Commerce Henry A. Wallace brought to the personal attention of Mr. Schwellenbach "the unfortunate segregation practices" which displaced Commerce Department workers ran into the USES offices. These practices include Jim Crow lines for interviews and segregated application files which restrict employment opportunities of colored job applicants.

Complicated
Replying to Mr. Wallace, Secretary Schwellenbach said the problems was "complicated and involved" because the practice of segregating job applicants has been followed in the local

USES offices for several years. Mr. Schwellenbach, however, promised to work for a satisfactory solution.

In contrast to Mr. Schwellenbach's inaction, Wilson Wyatt, national housing expediter, took immediate action in the case of two Commerce Department employees, who had received notices of separation by reason of reduction in force. These two employees, Miss Gullénia Nixon and Miss Geneva Davis, applied for employment at the Federal Housing Administration and got the impression that they were not considered because they were colored.

Mr. Wyatt immediately investigated the circumstances of their cases, found that an employee in the personnel office of the FHA had implied that there were certain positions for which colored applicants would not be considered, and reprimanded the employee, and reaffirmed in writing to all members of the placement section, personnel division, FHA, the policy of non-discrimination in federal employment.

Some Signs That Blinked 'Welcome' at State Fair Did Not Mean Negro Guests

Some of the "welcome visitors" signs that glittered and glowed at Iowa's Centennial State Fair here this week were no more sincere than were they gold.

The Des Moines Branch NAACP found out about this after Negro guest complained of segregation and discrimination on the part of some of the managers of eating concessions at the fair.

Testing the warmth of the "welcome" signs for the Des Moines Branch NAACP were Bystander Reporter Marie Ross and witness Nadine Robinson Ware who spent Tuesday afternoon going from one eating stand to another—eating or trying to get served.

To say that the experiences were disgusting would be untrue—for both of the women ate so many hotdogs, hamburgers, peanuts, popcorn, ice cream and ectera—and got so much fun in anticipating and watching the varied "floor shows" put on by managers and waiters when the brown guests entered cafes and restaurants that there was no need to go to the sideshows or midway to see any of the comical sights.

Generally speaking, the hotdog and hamburger stand clerks waited on customers as they crowded in at the counters—and all of the other take-your-money operators with strings, rats, balls, bingo—were seemingly glad to take your money at twenty-five cents per.

Keep Walking
Keep walking and eating hotdogs, popcorn and peanuts and looking at the sights or stopping to ride on this or that—and the brown guests were really enjoying the fair.

But when the brown fair guests got a glimpse of some steaks sizzling in hot fat, or chicken getting golden brown—from the glass front of some restaurant, cafe or eat house—and would enter the spacious dining room with many tables where other fair guests were eating—then, even if the neon signs all over the front of the restaurant blinked "welcome," managers and waiters began an impromptu floor show of perpetual motion and whispers.

Action Starts
One house, (No. 11) just below the postoffice, had a welcome sign to "Talbot's Home Cooked Meals." The brown guests entered and took a seat at a front empty table. A waitress

went to the back. A waiter came to the front and told the guests that they would have to come back to the back to be served. That was reasonable as Talbot's served cafeteria style from the rear. Back in the back, a white-haired waitress informed the brown guests "to come back into the kitchen to eat." The manager, Mrs. Talbot, speechless—went farther back into the kitchen and went with their trays to the front table to dine with the accompaniment of buzzing and whispering from the kitchen.

Another Show

A few more doors down Grand avenue fairway, west of the Old Mill, was a glass-front restaurant which displayed many appetizing meats and foods for the hungry fair-goers. More neon signs blinked "welcome." The brown guests entered, spied the nearest empty table (near the front). The floor show started.

The manager whispered to a waiter who smiling, informed that "we will serve you in the rear." The brown guests found on fault with the front table so sat. The waiter said "we have no sandwiches"—just \$1 and \$1.50 dinners—"served at the rear."

The brown guests sat. The woman manager, a Mrs. A. Lindquist from Springfield, Ill., addressed the brown guests that "they would have to go to the rear—"I have my sign up" and "I'll get the police." But the brown guests did not move and neither did the police come. Before leaving though—a kindly cashier consoled that "there is a place out here especially for you people," asked "why especially?" and the cashier informed that the special place to eat was because "you know you are a minority group—and that if our customers saw (SEE EDITORIAL PAGE)

other races to give them jobs, Roscoe Dunjee, president of the National Negro Business League, told members of the league meeting in convention here last Wednesday.

Charging that the very nature of economic progress in America has developed an individualism which today is proving the colored man's most trying handicap, the Oklahoma publisher of the Black Dispatch, lashed out at successful colored people who oppose organizing the collective economy of the race by pointing to their own individual efforts as a paragon of success.

In denouncing them as "stupid individuals" Mr. Dunjee cited official figures showing that though the colored man's annual spending power is eleven billion dollars, the annual turnover in Negro business is only \$110,000,000.

Colored people, as individualists, scratch only the surface of one per cent of this eleven billion dollars, he declared.

Mr. Dunjee said the colored business man must decide whether he belongs in the ranks of the middle class or of the rich.

"To my judgement," he declared, "too many Negroes, as soon as they become established in business take on the complex of the rich, without ever realizing that all Negroes in the United States have placement in the ranks of the middle class."

The Board related to the Crocker Branch, states that, "the Crocker Branch is going to be one of the most influential character building agencies in our city. It has passed the stage of experimentation, and is now getting ready to serve its greatest usefulness in the building of character in the life of youth of this city."

Judge Carlson, who formerly was also president of the National Council of the Y. M. C. A. and is now a member of the International Committee of the Y. M. C. A., Geneva, Switzerland, further stated, "the Crocker Branch will soon take its place as one of the many outstanding Y. M. C. A.s of great influence for good in this country and around the world."

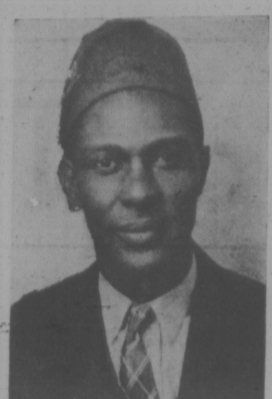
CIVIL SERVICE EXAM ANNOUNCED FOR ENGINEERING, SCIENTIFIC, AND BIOLOGICAL AID

Examinations for probational appointment to Engineering Aid, Scientific Aid, and Biological Aid positions have been announced by the Civil Service Commission. The vacancies to be filled are in Washington, D. C., and the immediate vicinity, and entrance salaries range from \$1,822 to \$2,644 a year.

To qualify in these examinations applicants must pass a written test and must also have had experience, or education above the high school level, in engineering, physical science or natural science; or a combination of such experience and education. For all positions above the SP-2 (\$1,822) level, applicants who qualify on the basis of experience will be required to show experience in a specific branch of engineering or physical or natural science.

The age limits for these positions are from eighteen to sixty-two years. These age limits will be waived for persons entitled to veteran preference.

Applications must be received in the Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C., not later than October 10, 1946.

STATE MUST NOT TOLERATE LAWLESSNESS

The State Fair in Des Moines brings a large number of various concessions each year. Some of these concession holders have been violating the laws of Iowa by discriminating against colored people.

The Des Moines Branch NAACP has reported the matter to state and fair board officials, but in order to get action at this time it is necessary that criminal charges be filed in court against violators of the law.

Some years ago we had a most unfortunate criminal case in Des Moines growing out of the refusal of an itinerant concession holder to grant equal accommodations to Negroes. And operate here, and notified them that discrimination against Negroes in Iowa was illegal and that its employees must obey the law if it continued to operate.

The enforcement of the civil rights law places an undue hardship upon Negroes in that they are forced into the position of prosecutors rather than that of a prosecuting witness. In other words, it is necessary for a Negro to "make" a case in order to get some sort of redress for wrongs done.

Certainly the state cannot, and must not, be permitted to grant concessions to anyone who violates its laws and yet this is just what happens when people doing business at the fair discriminate against people because of their race.

DIFFERENCE BETWEEN BILBOISM AND DEWEYISM

In reply to the statement of Governor Dewey of New York that there would be no Bilboism in his state, Senator Bilbo answered that there would be no Deweyism in Mississippi; that Deweyism meant FEPC, intermarriage, unrestricted voting in the Democratic primaries, racketeering such as occurs in Harlem.

Bilbo dies hard but he comes back for more. He is the typical demagogue who is never embarrassed about what he does against Negroes and is willing to stand up and defend that position no matter what happens.

Most of the things Bilboism complains about are simple rights given either by the law of nature or the laws of the land. They are a part of our so-called Americanism to which every citizen is entitled. On the other hand, racketeering and gang murder occur everywhere, but the real complaint lies on the manner in which the law is executed. Generally it turns out that no matter how inhuman the crime against Negroes nobody gets punished. In fact, it happens too often that law enforcement officials are in cahoots with mob leaders. And where an official has the courage to do his part the jury blocks further progress in a proceeding to secure redress.

LABOR HAS COME A LONG WAY

In this country, the first Monday in September has been observed as Labor Day since 1884. While labor had begun to organize earlier, it was about this time that it made itself felt. The day is observed as a legal holiday.

A lot of progress has been made since that beginning. Rates of pay, working conditions, hours, safety measures, bargaining representation were brought about or so changed that old timers themselves have been surprised when they look back over the route from which they came.

Like most groups which gain power and influence, labor has been forced to watch pretty carefully that

the misuse of their newly acquired strength did not cause set backs. Generally speaking, the leaders have done a pretty good job.

There was a time when labor unions helped the aristocrats of labor only, leaving the rest on the lower rung of the ladder unprotected. Conditions have taught that this was not a good policy; that when labor of whatever strata is penalized the whole labor movement suffers.

Now that labor has grown up pretty well, it must not forget that at one time it was helpless at the hands of capital; that the interest of all labor must be protected to the extent that the fellow at the lower round of the ladder gets decent pay, decent working conditions and fair representative bargaining rights just as the fellow on top.

Obviously, we do not propose to heed the admonition in the bible which speaks of first removing the mote from your own eye so as to see clearly the mote in thy brother's eye.

WE ARE QUITE INCONSISTENT

The United States continues to complain about the uses the Navy as a show of strength in its call for free elections in Europe. But as yet very little is done for securing free elections within its own borders.

More recently, Fitch worked with Louis at Pompton Lakes, New Jersey, where the champ is in training for Tami Mauriello.

Appointed by Commissioner William J. Prince, he was sworn in at the State Capitol by Attorney General William L. Hadden.

DAYTON TO CONSTRUCT FEDERAL HOUSING UNITS

DAYTON, OHIO—(NNPA)—The city has arranged the purchase of twenty-eight lots on the West Side to construct a series of federal housing units for colored war veterans. City Manager Fred Eichelberger told the weekly commission meeting last Wednesday.

He said the lots are located on Bolander avenue, between Summit street and Euclid Avenue, and offer sewer and water installations. The city will pay O. B. Weaver estate the sum of \$4,200 for the ground, on which housing units will be built to accommodate thirty-two families.

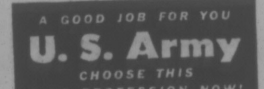
