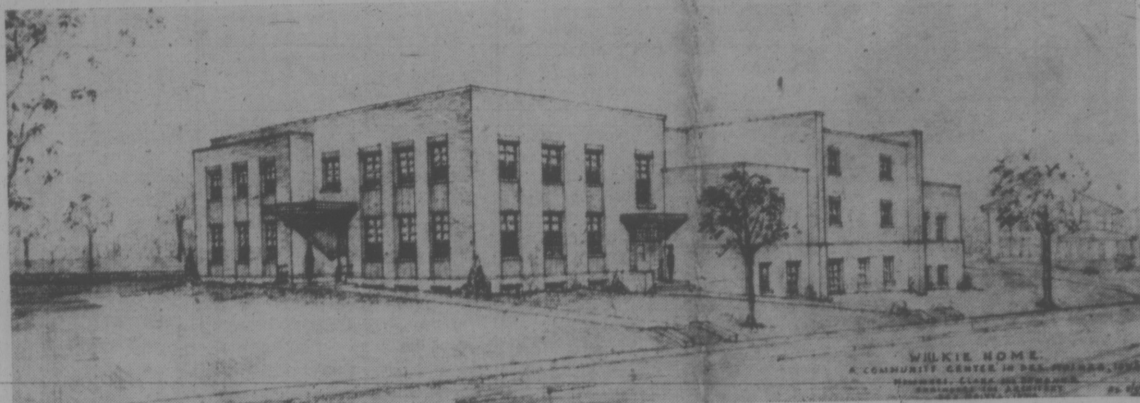

## Louisiana Lynch Witness to New York

DRAWING OF NEW \$100,000 COMMUNITY CENTER BUILDING



The architects' drawing of the Seventeenth Street view of the \$100,000 community center building, named Willkie House, Inc., which will be built at Crocker and 17th streets. The front view of the building will be on Crocker street. The Gardner Cowles Foundation made the gift of \$100,000 to the Negro Community Center board in May 1945 for the construction of a new building. Over \$11,000 was raised by gifts from Negro citizens to supplement the gift. An expansive playground will be located in front of the building, to make use of all available sunshine for winter and summer outdoor activities. A. A. Alexander, president of the Center board revealed. Construction is set for the first of next year.

### News Briefs From Far and Near

#### VIRGIN ISLANDERS TO BE EXCLUDED FROM DRAFT

WASHINGTON, D. C.—(NNPA)—The War Department has asked the Selective Service System not to include any Virgin Islanders in the 25,000 men to be called up in the September draft, it was learned last Friday.

Colonel Campbell C. Johnson, executive assistant to Major General Lewis B. Hershey, director of Selective Service, has been sent to the Virgin Islands to consider the advisability of ending conscription in the islands, Selective Service officials said. Colonel Johnson left Washington last Thursday.

The Virgin Islands won the right to furnish men for the United States armed forces in June, 1944. Between that time and the draft "holiday" last July, the islands furnished a total of 807 men.

The exclusion of inductees from the Virgin Islands is in line with the War Department's announcement recently that it will not accept any more colored men until its colored strength is substantially reduced.

#### TO STUDY SOCIAL CONDITIONS IN SOUTH AMERICA

NEW YORK—(NNPA)—Miss Irene Diggs of 409 Edgewood Avenue will be the first colored woman assigned by the State Department to study social conditions in South American countries, it became known last Monday.

Miss Diggs, who has served for nine years as research assistant to Dr. W. E. B. DuBois, author and lecturer on racial problems, left last Wednesday for Montevideo, Uruguay, by plane. She said she would apply herself primarily to the history of the descendants of African slaves brought into Montevideo by slave ships. The assignment poses a research problem; she added, since records have been neglected and none are available in English.

A native of Monmouth, Illinois, Miss Diggs is a graduate of the University of Minnesota, Atlanta University and the University of Havana. She was a Franklin D. Roosevelt Fellow of the Institute of International Education at the Cuban institution from 1943 to 1945, and received a doctorate in philosophy and letters.

#### SMALLPOX VACCINE RUSHED TO LIBERIA

WASHINGTON, D. C.—(NNPA)—Twenty thousand points of smallpox vaccine was rushed by airplane to Liberia last Sunday by the American Red Cross and the United States Public Health Service to combat an epidemic which has broken out in the Liberian hinterland, the Red Cross announced.

The epidemic was reported by R. O'Hara Lanier, American minister to Liberia, who said in a cable to the State Department that the disease had reached the proportions of an epidemic in the hinterland areas, but the death rate so far has been low.

The special plane to fly the vaccine to Liberia was chartered by the Firestone Tire and Rubber Company, which owns a rubber plantation in the West African republic. The plane left the United States Sunday.

### L.A. Negroes Plan Federal Loan Firm

LOS ANGELES—(Pacific Press Syndicate)—Marking something of a precedent in Negro business circles, redoubled efforts are now being made to complete plans for the formation of a Federal savings and loan association in this city, following notification of approval received this week by H. A. Haward, prominent realtor, from Frank H. Johnson, president of the Federal Home Loan Bank of San Francisco.

Formation of such an institution will set another record in business foresight for Los Angeles Negroes. According to latest Department of Commerce records, there is only one other Federal savings and loan firm in the country operated by Negroes, the Illinois Federal Savings and Loan Association, located in Chicago.

Not less than 150 persons must be responsible for the initial capital shares totaling at least \$150,000, payable in cash upon issuance of the charter, according to Federal stipulations.

The association will be under direct supervision of the Federal government. Local business interests are hailing the move to form a Federal loan institution here as a godsend to thousands of underprivileged families in the lower income brackets who desire to build homes in this area.

It is further cited that establishment of this institution marks the beginning of a war against "loan sharks" firms now infesting this area.

## NAACP Finds Eye-Witness To Murder of Vet, After Intensive Search in South

NEW YORK—The intensive search conducted by the NAACP through Louisiana, Texas, Pacific Coast and Middlewestern states resulted in finding Albert Harris and his father, Negro fugitives from Louisiana mob justice. Young Harris, eyewitness to the blow torch, meat cleaver lynching of Negro veteran John C. Jones, had been the object of a dramatic search conducted by the FBI and the NAACP as well as members of the Louisiana mob who, fearing the youth would identify them, rushed to Texas on August 19th in hopes of silencing him.

Both Harris, father and son, were finally discovered August 23rd by the NAACP which had alerted each of its 1001 branches throughout the nation to offer protection to the fugitives wherever they appeared. Madison Jones, Administrative Assistant, was rushed to an undisclosed middlewestern town to bring the youth and his father to New York where their testimony will be made available to the FBI. The Harris arrived in New York on Wednesday, August 28th.

Young Harris was attended upon arrival in New York by Dr. Robert S. Wilkinson who stated, "The deep scar on the boy's forehead where he was beaten with the butt end of a .45 caliber pistol is still infected. There are healing scars on both wrists, arms and ankles caused by ropes. His thighs and buttocks are also badly scarred after a terrible beating. He shows evidence of a

severe shocking experience but his youth and good physical condition will pull him through."

Albert Harris Sr., the youth's father, was also severely beaten when deputies and others attempted to force him to disclose the whereabouts of his son.

Tells Details

Young Harris told reporters at a press conference held at NAACP offices in New York's Freedom House, the horrifying details of his ordeal in the Louisiana woods. His description of returning consciousness and hearing veteran John Jones groan for water left seasoned-reporters shocked and silent. Harris said he then crawled to a creek, filled his shoe with water which he carried to the horribly mutilated man who only a short time ago fought for his country in the great Battle of the Bulge in Belgium. Albert Harris said that all he could do was to lift Jones's head to his lap and sit quietly as he died. "I thought that would make it a little easier," said the quiet youth.

Albert Harris is considered one of the most important witnesses ever found by the NAACP in its long years of fighting southern lynch terror. It was pointed out that in spite of the critical nature of the recent lynch wave, the FBI has not apprehended one white southerner on a lynch murder charge. One observer pointed out "that it would be extremely odd if no arrests were made in this case since young Harris can positively identify members of a mob."

### While Residents Protest, Miss Curley Has Pleasant Classes in Kindergarten

Though the fire burned in the hearts of some of the white residents of the Perkins school district and protests were made by them, twenty-one-year old Harriette Curley, Des Moines first Negro school teacher hired by the Des Moines schools, has been enjoying her work at the Perkins School, Forty-third and College avenue, since school opened Tuesday.

The second day of school Miss Curley was "tired" just like any seasoned school marm. "The teachers are lovely and the parents are fine," she commented.

Outside of the school building—in the district—were some residents who did not feel so happy about the thoughts of a Negro kindergarten teacher in their school. A group of 20 persons appeared before the Des Moines school board Tuesday to protest the hiring of the Negro teacher at Perkins school.

"The group met with the board while it was in the executive session which precedes the regular 4 p. m. open school board meeting. Spokesmen of the protesting group had asked for a closed meeting.

No Petition Presented

Although spokesmen for the group asked that "no Negro teachers be used in Perkins school," no petition was presented. Superintendent of Schools N. D. McCombs said the board had understood a petition was to have been received.

After hearing protests for nearly an hour, the board announced it would take no action upon the request at this time. Superintendent McCombs said the board had received calls for people in the Perkins district holding views opposite those of the group.

Protests from the group which appeared before the board were made "purely on economic grounds." It

was contented that a Negro teacher in Perkins school would lower property values because prospective new residents "will not want their children in a kindergarten taught by a Negro."

None challenged the qualifications of the new teacher, Miss Harriette Curley, 21, a Drake university graduate, to teach. One of the two spokesmen for the group, Bert R. Merrill, jr., insurance man, of 1818 Forty-fourth st., checked the file on Miss Curley's credentials following the session.

Another spokesman for the group was Neal Adamson, 1525 Forty-first st., a real estate salesman. It was Adamson who asked that the meeting be closed.

Qualifications Explained

Miss Curley's qualifications and background were explained by McCombs.

"She topped the list of applicants by a wide margin," McCombs said. "The board has had a policy, in

### For Meals of Distinction Serve Your Own Homemade Jelly

Home made jelly adds distinction to any meal. Good jelly is made by cooking the correct amount of sugar with the juice of any full flavored fruit. Many juices can be used as is, but some require the addition of fruit acid or a solidifying agent called pectin and others need both acid and pectin.

Tart apples, blackberries, dewberries, cranberries, currants, gooseberries, grapes, sour plums, sour oranges, usually have enough of both acid and pectin for making jelly. Apricots, cherries, peaches, raspberries, pears, strawberries usually lack either or both acid and pectin, but make excellent jelly when combined with an equal amount of tart apple jelly juice or with commercial pectin. If pectin is used, the instructions supplied with it must be followed.

It is a good plan to can unsweetened fruit juice and make it into jelly as needed, because freshly made jelly has a much better flavor than that which has stood several months.

We are indebted to Gladys Kimbrough, Home Service Director for Ball Brothers Company, manufacturer of fruit jars, for a few notes which should be helpful to those who have not already mastered the art of making jelly or superior quality.

#### JELLY NOTES

For natural jelly "like mother used to make," use fruits which under normal conditions contain enough pectin and acid to yield a good jelly.

For "unusual jellies," combine the juices of such fruit as red cherries, strawberries, or apricots with an equal amount of apple juice or with a good commercial pectin.

Fruit should be hard-ripe for jelly making. Under-ripe fruit lacks flavor, that which is "cream and sugar" ripe won't jelly, however, some persons prefer it.

#### UNDER SECRETARY OF LABOR HAS INTERVIEW

WASHINGTON, D. C.—If in the District of Columbia the correct appellation of colored people is Negroes and not "niggers," he guesses he will have to learn to pronounce the word Negro, Keen Johnson, Under Secretary of Labor, said last Thursday.

Interviewed in his office at the Labor Department after a delegation from the Congress of Industrial Organizations had protested to him against his use of the word "niggers" in addressing Labor Department employees, the former governor of Kentucky not only admitted he had used the epithet several times at ceremonies at which he took the oath of office, but also used it several times during the interview.

The union charged that Mr. Johnson, in his first official appearance before the entire Labor Department staff, had used the epithet several times while telling humorous stories. Mr. Johnson appeared amused at the entire incident. Admitting he had told stories about colored people, the lanky Kentuckian said he found it difficult to pronounce correctly the word "Negro" with his southern accent.

"I'm just an ignorant country boy, chuckled Mr. Johnson, who aspires to be another Irvin S. Cobb, "but I had no intention to offend anyone."

#### State GOPs Hold Meeting to Plan For Fall Campaign

An organization meeting of the State Republican advisory committee and representatives from twenty counties where sufficient Negro votes justify an organization, met in Des Moines on Labor Day conference here at the Crocker Street YMCA to organize plans for the state and congressional campaigns this fall.

Presiding over the meeting was A. A. Alexander who was appointed assistant to State Chairman Willis York, in charge of the Negro work of the state. Reports were made by county representatives who discussed their problems, experiences and plans for getting out the vote in their respective places.

Considerable money was pledged to the state committee's campaign fund. A special department for the returned veterans' activity in the campaign has been planned.

Mrs. Rose B. Johnson of Marshalltown, assistant to Mr. Alexander, and in charge of the women's work of the state, and James B. Morris, publicity director, explained to the county workers their responsibility to the state organization.

As was to be expected, some of the people living in the neighborhood of Perkins School made a protest to the school board against the appointment of a Negro kindergarten teacher. And at the meeting of the board on Tuesday about ten people appeared.

The Bystander is convinced that the flurry will blow over because the school board and the officials have followed the rules and standards by which they have run the system. One of the rules is that of preparation and qualifications.

Among those who appeared in opposition to the appointment was a minister of the gospel. Undoubtedly he preaches to and teaches his congregations all about the ten commandments. And we are equally sure that he has never told them that the ten commandments make no distinction as to the color of "thy neighbor."

DON'T LET RUFFIANS DESTROY OUR REPUTATION

During the last few years—as economic conditions improved in Des Moines, Negroes have done much to better their home surroundings and business establishments. New ones have sprung up far out in front of what was here before.

Generally speaking these places are well conducted, are spots of interest and give a pretty good return upon the investment of the owners. Among the patrons of these places are some who have little respect for themselves or anyone else. They create disturbances, fight and use vile language often doing physical damage to the property as well as to those in attendance.

Sometimes there is a disposition on the part of some of the owners to go easy on such people. It is a mistake for easy treatment after one disturbance simply encourage another; they just don't appreciate kind treatment.

"And they are not hired" on a basis of color, creed or nationality. Miss Curley, he said, holds an advanced elementary certificate which is the highest issued to an elementary teacher. To qualify for this, she completed her work at Drake university in August and received a bachelor of science degree in education.

Born in Des Moines Miss Curley, born in Des Moines, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William J. Curley, of 1262 Stewart st. Her father is custodian at Crocker school and has been a school board employee for 15 years.

She was graduated from East High school, completing her high school work in 2 1/2 years. McCombs emphasized that she is especially talented in music, both in voice and piano. Her recommendations from professors at Drake university emphasized that she is "a natural for teaching."

Among those in the protesting group were Mrs. Sam Orebough, of 1509 Forty-first st. Her husband, a Des Moines attorney, is a former state representative, former city clerk and former member of the city legal department.

Mrs. Orebough said she was presenting her own views—not her husband's. This is something I am doing on my own," she said.

Only one other woman was present at the meeting. As it adjourned she left without identifying herself.

Assistant Pastor Speaks The Rev. Frederick J. Sager, of 1731 Northwest drive, assistant pastor of St. John's Lutheran church, was another who spoke. He contended that Negroes have their rights, but said he did not approve of the board's move in placing Miss Curley in Perkins school.

Another in the protesting group was William E. Marohn, city detective, of 1427 Forty-eighth st.

Holds Opposite View A spokesman for persons in Perkins district who have taken the opposite view from that of the group which appeared before the board is the Rev. Will W. Orr, pastor of the Westminster United Presbyterian church.

Informed of the group's action, he said: "I am quite pleased to have our 5-year-old girl under Miss Curley's direction.

"She is the best choice the board had available and I support the board's action in hiring her."

Questioned His Daughter The Rev. Mr. Orr said that after his daughter came home from school Tuesday he questioned her about school.

"The little child had not noticed that her teacher was colored and we did not tell her, although I questioned her about her teacher—whether she was tall or short. It was very revealing to me; how our children do not have our prejudices."

The Rev. Mr. Orr said he was proud that his church's 2,000 members only one had expressed any criticism on Miss Curley's hiring.

At her home after school, Miss Curley reported an entirely pleasant day at school. She and Miss Dorothy Towne, who has been at Perkins school several years, will teach kindergarten. The students have been divided alphabetically between the two. Miss Curley has students from M to Z, inclusive.

Miss Towne was absent from school Tuesday because of illness. There were 19 kindergarten B pupils in Miss Curley's room Tuesday. There will be 26 kindergarten A's starting in her room today. Each teacher will have about 45 pupils.

Miss Curley reported that several mothers had asked to have their children placed in her room and that none had asked to have their children kept out.

Although Miss Curley is the first Negro teacher hired by the Des Moines schools, Negro practice teachers frequently have taught in the schools here. One, a Drake student taught a full semester at Perkins last year and no protests were made.

Miss Curley, while at Drake, did practice teaching at Cattel school, Twelfth and Hull ave., and Wilbur school, E. Thirtieth st., and Dean ave.

She also has been active in church work. She is president of the Baptist Young People's union of the Corinthian Baptist church, Ninth and School streets.

"AND WE CRITICIZE GEORGIA!"

Addressing two worship services in the Westminster United Presbyterian church, 4114 Allison avenue, the Rev. W. W. Orr, pastor made the following statements Sunday morning, August 25.

"The news came that a colored girl, a Negro, has been employed and appointed to teach kindergarten in our neighborhood grammar school, Perkins School. I was disturbed about some of the results of that appointment. I made it a point to phone Mr. McCombs, superintendent of our Des Moines schools, and I want to make this statement I think will effect the Christian people of our community.

"I think—men and women, we have in northwest Des Moines an opportunity to express our Christian attitudes. I call upon you to let your race prejudice in no way separate you from or mar your Christian profession. I want to say that as the father of a five-year-old girl, who will be in this Negro teacher's kindergarten. Personally, I am happy at the privilege of having our little girl have a year's instruction from a very fine Christian Negro girl. Such a thing would be impossible in Georgia and how we roundly criticize Georgia! It is only when it comes close to home that someone produces an ugly attitude. If you have any way of exerting a Christian influence in connection with this appointment, I call on you to exert it." Dr. Orr is a southern born minister. This statement was sent to the Bystander from Rev. George W. Robinson, pastor of Corinthian church, to whom the Rev. Mr. Orr wrote.

TRIAL OF COLUMBIA NEGROES BEGINS IN TENNESSEE RIOT RACE

LAWRENCEBURG, TENN.—In a prejudice ridden atmosphere, the trial of 25 Negroes indicted in charges of "attempted murder" when the resister a howling police-led lynch mob in Columbia, Tenn., last February began Tuesday in the two-story Lawrenceburg County Courthouse.

Southern mob-rule tendencies were quickly revealed to observers in the packed courtroom from the outset when NAACP attorneys defending the courageous Negroes failed to win a single argument, with the court ruling with the state prosecution on every issue. The court has also consistently refused to allow the defense to argue the points of law they are attempting to press. They were dilly dallying to get these arguments across in raising objections to the adverse ruling of the court.

10 NEGROES SERVED AS FULL COLONELS DURING WORLD WAR II

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Ten Negro officers, four of whom are still on active duty, who either rose to the rank of full colonel or were called in that grade, served with the Army of the United States during World War II, the War Department reported today.

When the Japs struck at Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941, there were four Negro Colonels in the Army; on August 1, 1945, one month and a day before VJ—Day, nine were serving at home and abroad.

The Regular Army lost its only Negro colonel on the active list on July 31, 1941, when Brigadier Benjamin O. Davis, now assigned to the Office of the Inspector General, Washington, D. C., was retired. However, General Davis was recalled to active duty on the retired list the following day. He was accepted as a brigadier general (temporary) on November 16, 1940 to become the first and only Negro officer ever to achieve that rank.

Colonel West A. Hamilton, Washington, D. C., is the senior AUS Negro colonel, having been promoted to that rank on August 3, 1933. He was ordered to active duty on March 3, 1941.

Weaver and Leon A. Ransom, Attorneys for the defendants, immediately challenged the jury panel on the ground of systematic exclusion of Negroes from the jury. Looby charged that, in Tennessee, "it had long been the custom to eliminate certain qualified Negroes and, due to illegal manipulation of the lists, the indicated Negroes would not be granted a fair trial."
