### News Briefs From Far and Near

#### DIVINE'S FOLLOWERS WANT TO VOTE UNDER 'RELIGIOUS' NAMES

PHILADELPHIA.—(NNPA).—Three of Father Divine's followers last Friday asked Judge Gerald Fenerty, in Common Pleas Court No. 5 to override the Registration Commission's refusal to enroll them as voters because they would not state their birth names.

Using their "religious" names in the suit were Job Patience, 49, of 972 South Broad street; Prodigal Son, 42, of 507, South Broad street, who said he served in the Army under that name, and Miss Victory Love, of 895 North Forty-first street, who pointed out her original name had been washed upon her ancestors by slave-holders. Judge Fenerty took the case under advisement.

#### COMMUNIST PARTY WITHDRAWS DAVIS AS ITS CANDIDATE

NEW YORK.—(NNPA).—The Communist party last Monday withdrew the name of Benjamin J. Davis, Jr., city councilman, as its candidate for United States Senator along with all other names of its candidates for state offices except one.

This move was interpreted as meaning that the Communists will follow the strategy of the American Labor party and vote for the Democratic candidates in an effort to defeat the Republicans.

They decided to run Robert Thomson for state controller to permit an outright Communist to try to make a show of strength.

In a statement, the Communist campaign committee said that the Republicans "can and must be defeated."

#### HOWARD U. TO FIND HOMES OFF-CAMPUS FOR 300 WOMEN STUDENTS

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The Kelly Miller House home of the late Dean Kelly Miller, just off the campus of Howard University, is being converted into a recreation center for off-campus co-eds, it was learned last Wednesday.

Conversion of Dean Miller's residence is only one of a number of moves being made by the university and the dean of women, Miss Susie Elliott, to make university life more attractive to the hundreds of women students forced to live off the campus because of the shortages of dormitory facilities.

With over 700 women students already having applied for admission to Howard for the fall term, Dean Elliott estimates that the university will have to find homes in the city for more than 300 girl students.

In preparation for this, Miss Elliott has elaborated on a plan begun last year whereby the university exercises complete control over women students living off the campus. The plan, which was a complete success when first initiated, has been placed under the directorship of Mrs. Myrtle Graves, of West New York, New Jersey, whom the university has hired as a full time, paid director, of activities for off the campus women students.

#### URBAN LEAGUE FIELD MAN TO MAKE SURVEY

Reginald A. Johnson, director of field service of the National Urban League, will arrive in the city on Sept. 30 to make a survey among Negroes here. A local committee will be appointed by the Council of Social Agencies for whom the survey will be made, for the new Negro Community Center.

### PENN COLLEGE PRACTICES DEMOCRACY



Professor of the biology department at Penn College, Oskaloosa, Ia., is a Negro teacher, Mrs. Madeline Clarke Foreman, who came to Iowa, September, a year ago. She was photographed here last June in her department with two students, Dan L. Wilcox, Eddyville, and Warren Cadwalder, Oskaloosa. Mrs. Foreman taught for fifteen years in the biology department of Hampton Institute, Va. At Penn college last year she taught biology courses, leading to medicine, nursing and laboratory techniques. This year the department has added four more staff members, including teaching assistants. The increased enrollment of the college, with a majority of returned veterans, added more students to Mrs. Foreman's department.

### NEGRO TEACHER HEADS BIOLOGY DEPARTMENT AT PENN COLLEGE

While residents in the Des Moines are praising and protesting the board of education's recent hiring of its first Negro school teacher for the public schools here, just sixty miles away, the city of Oskaloosa is so busy making homes for its new faculty members and students that residents have almost forgotten that a Negro teacher was hired there last September by the William Penn College.

The Negro teacher is Mrs. Madeline Clarke Foreman, professor of biology, whose teaching staff in the department she heads, has increased from one to five members this year.

There was no flare-up of racial animosities when this Negro teacher came to Penn college, a Quaker school founded 73 years ago on the principles of making "a practical application of the ideals of Christian living." Like the Des Moines board of education-picked its newest kindergarten teacher who topped the list of applicants, Penn college chose its biology professor, "the most capable applicant available," Mrs. Foreman, who happened to be a Negro.

#### Years of Experience

A teacher with years of experience in college instruction, Mrs. Foreman did her undergraduate work at How-

ard university, Washington, D. C., and received her master's degree at Ohio State university. She also did graduate work at the University of Chicago. For fifteen years she taught at Hampton Institute in Virginia.

Teaching on a mixed faculty is not a new experience for Mrs. Foreman who has taught with some of the "best people of the world" at Hampton institute where Negro and white teachers are members of the faculty, she revealed.

At Penn college last year, she taught biology courses, leading to medicine, nursing and laboratory techniques. Mrs. Foreman also taught biology to students from other colleges in the area. The widow of Dr. Walter Foreman, widely known surgeon who built the Whitaker Memorial hospital at Newport, News, Va., and served there as its surgeon-in-chief, Mrs. Foreman is a descendant of the Tynes family of Virginia, a family of Negro free-lancers of historical note. Her grandfather was an officer in the Union army.

During the summer months this year, Mrs. Foreman and her sons spent their vacation in Des Moines. One son, Walter, was a lieutenant in (SEE PAGE TWO)

### Refused Scholarship in Missouri Art Competition

NEW YORK, N. Y.—When young James W. Anderson of Cleveland, Ohio, was informed that he had won second prize in the 11th Annual National High School Competition of drawings and paintings conducted by the Kansas City Art Institute and School of Design, he had to pinch himself. It seemed almost too good to be true.

The prize he had won was a half-year scholarship to the Art Institute. Jim's dreams of truly becoming an artist seemed about to be realized. Subsequent letters from the Institute's Registrar indicated, that all

arrangements were being made for his admission, and Jim was congratulated and feted by his friends and family.

#### Rejoicing Premature

That his rejoicing was premature was painfully obvious when, a month later, Jim received a letter from the manager of the Institute telling him that the school had just learned he was a Negro and would therefore be unable to accept him as a student in view of the fact that Missouri is a border state "with strong southern tendencies".

Jim was disconsolate. He had been

## Commerce Sec. Points Out In 'Cases at Home' Recent Lynchings-Mob Violence

NEW YORK.—(NNPA).—The mass lynching of four persons near Monroe, Georgia, July 13, was cited by Secretary of Commerce Henry A. Wallace last Thursday night as an illustration of the kind of prejudice that makes war inevitable.

Secretary Wallace spoke in Madison Square Garden at an anti-Dewey anti-Republican rally sponsored jointly by the Independent Citizens Committee of the Arts, Sciences and Professions and the National Political Action Committee.

The subject of Mr. Wallace's speech was "The Way to Peace." In it he set forth a detailed foreign program which in effect marked out spheres of influence for both Russia and the Western powers.

"The coat of peace," Mr. Wallace declared, "is to be measured not in dollars but in the hearts and minds of men." Continuing, he said:

"The price of peace—for us and for every nation in the world—is the price of giving-up prejudice, hatred, fear and ignorance.

#### Cases At Home

Let's get down to cases here at home.

"First we have prejudice, hatred, fear and ignorance of certain races. The recent mass lynching in Georgia was not merely the most unwarranted, brutal act of mob violence in the United States in recent years; it was also an illustration of the kind of prejudice that makes war inevitable.

"Hatred breeds hatred. The doctrine of racial superiority produces a desire to get even on the part of its victims. If we are to work for peace

in the rest of the world, we here in the United States must eliminate racism from our unions our business organizations, our educational institutions, and our employment practices. Merit alone must be the measure of men.

"Second, in payment for peace, we must give up prejudice, hatred, fear and ignorance in the economic world. This means working earnestly, day after day, for a large volume of world trade. It means helping undeveloped areas of the world to industrialize themselves with the help of American technical assistance and loans."

#### Represents Policy

Secretary Wallace was hissed several times during his speech. The first outbreak occurred upon his mention of President Truman's name when after Mr. Wallace said he was neither anti-British nor pro-British, neither anti-Russian nor pro-Russian, he reported that when President Truman read these words, he said "they represented the policy of his administration."

In Washington, at his press conference Thursday afternoon before the delivery of Mr. Wallace's speech was begun, Mr. Truman said he approved the speech in its entirety.

The second outbreak of hissing came during a discussion of American aims in China.

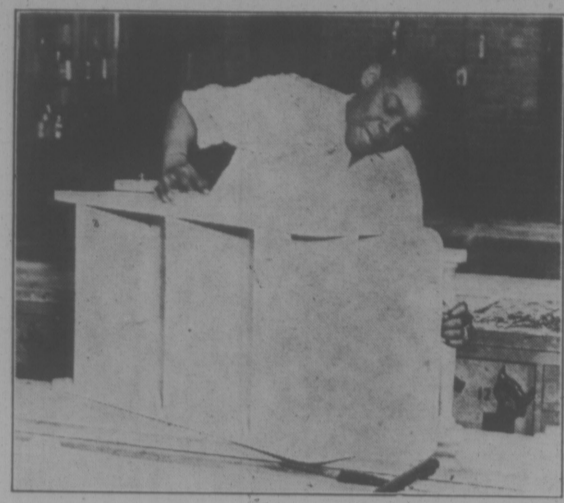

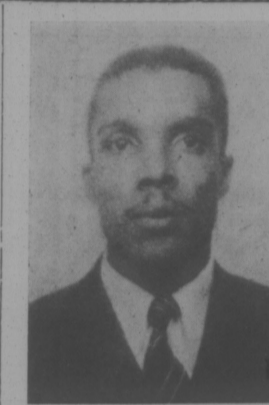

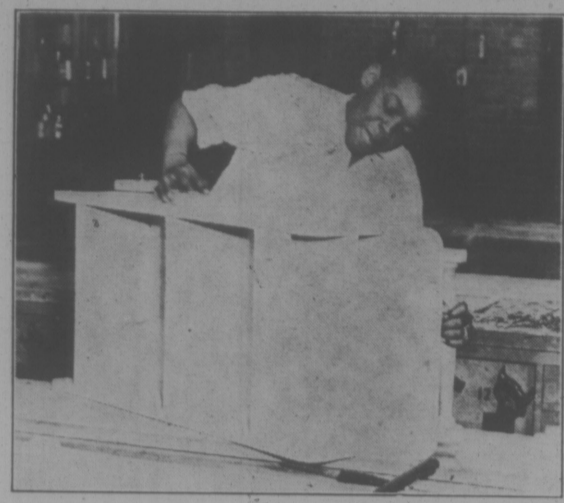

**RECORDER OF DEEDS DISMISSES WEAVER**  
WASHINGTON, D. C.—(NNPA).—The Rev. Marshall L. Shepard, Recorder of Deeds of the District of Columbia, last Friday summarily dismissed his first deputy recorder, Frederick S. Weaver.

The dismissal, effective at the close of business August 30, is likely to have repercussions. Whether Mr. Weaver will carry his fight against his dismissal to the White House, Congress, the Democratic national committee, or all three could not be learned last Friday.

Whether the dismissal of Mr. Weaver was an outgrowth of the investigation into the office of the Recorder of Deeds by the Federal Bureau of Investigation could not be learned. The FBI completed their investigation in the Recorder's office on August 16, but continued to interview former employees.

As far as can be learned, it has not been disclosed at whose instance Attorney General Tom C. Clark ordered the investigation covering the conduct of the office and of some employees. The office was said to be about 18,000 papers in arrears in recordings. When it was turned over to Mr. Shepard two years ago, it was said to be less than 800 papers behind.

Mr. Weaver has been an employee of the Recorder's office for eleven years. He has worked in various capacities - from messenger to first deputy recorder. On October 21, last, Mr. Shepard gave Mr. Weaver a one-grade promotion, for meritorious services, increasing his salary from

MR. MASSEY SHOULD BE FRANK

The Watkins Hotel was raided Monday on direct orders from Safety Superintendent Massey, because he "had heard that musicians were frequenting the hotel after hours, bringing Marijuana there and using it. No Marijuana was found in the raid."

Come on Mr. Massey and say just what you mean. You certainly did not, if the one quoted above is what you said. And if rumors called for raids, few hostilities in town would escape regular visits from the police department.

SCHOOL OFFICIALS SHOULD BE ENCOURAGED

The Des Moines school board and officials have had fine support from a lot of decent people because they had the courage to put into practice a type of democracy all of us have been preaching about, talking about, fighting for, when a competent Negro woman was appointed to the teaching staff. They deserve that support both in word and deed.

Much of that support has come from organizations. On the other hand there are organizations which, because of the very things for which they stand, ought to be counted among these supporters.

Of course, as the Bystander said in the beginning, the controversy will subside as the die hard gets a bit more accustomed to the innovation. So the less said the sooner that will come, but it pays to let the fellow who dares to do what is right, know that decent fairminded people approve his action.

THE STATE SHOULD PROTECT ITS CITIZENS

There are people who in periods of hysteria assume too much authority or misinterpret just how far they ought to go under certain circumstances.

Down in Warren County, a group of Jehovah's Witnesses have scheduled a series of meetings in Laconia. Prior to the first one, some people threatened to prevent the assembly. That information had gone out pretty generally so every body, including the sheriff, knew about the meeting. Neither the sheriff nor any of the law enforcement officials showed up. These who objected to the meeting carried out their threats; some of the witnesses were injured.

The Jehovah's Witnesses had planned another meeting last Sunday, but "fearing trouble" the sheriff deputized two hundred men to block the highways and prevent the meeting. The Bystander carries no brief for Jehovah's Witnesses for it insists that a man ought to be willing to defend a country which protects that man and offers him much for which to be thankful.

On the other hand, the Bystander believes that a citizen is entitled to protection by the law enforcing officials of his community as long as that citizen so conducts himself that he does not break the law. And as far as we have been able to learn, these people have not broken any law.

The job was poorly handled in the beginning for private citizens have no business setting themselves up as law enforcing officials. When they do, they take the law in their own hands and become mobs.

Now that the situation has gotten out of hand, the meetings are a source of trouble and should not be held in Warren County at this time.

Then he put up as neat a job of blocking as we have seen, cutting down defenders like a farmer cutting corn stalks. As a line backer, Motley really stood out. His speed put him always in the right place at the right time and his tackling was so hard that several times people yelled "Oh!" When a ball carrier was unlucky enough to get nailed by Marion—Boy! how that guy smacks them! He is just about sixty percent of the Cleveland Browns' defense against breakaway runners. Ask "Crazy Legs" Higsh of the Chicago Rockets.

Willis was just as tough at guard as he must have been at tackle for Ohio State. Nobody gained anything through him frequently he ran down plays from behind that were headed for the other side of the line. When we think that were it not for this new pro-league, such fine players as these two would have been passed up, we wonder why this thing was fought so bitterly by the national pro-league.
