Service Officer Runs for Supervisor



J. MERLE CLEMENS (Service Officer for Baldwin-Patterson Post)

The duties of a legion post service officer are many and varied. He is the post trouble shooter—the post's handy man.

A service officer must be familiar with all the rules, regulations and problems that confront a veteran or his family.

He must know about veterans' compensation, veterans' widow employment problems, pensions, hospital benefits, widow's compensations, social security benefits, disability pay problems and many other questions. If any parent wishes to have the body of a fallen son returned to this country for burial and asks the legion for help, that is referred to the service officer for information and aid as to the proper steps to take.

The service officer is endowed with the power of attorney by the post. As any service officer, some of the stories I listen to are funny and some are heart breaking.

Some veterans are in trouble and want sincere advice and help. Others have problems which are not so serious and require only a good talking to, while others at times impose on the service officer to straighten out troubles that they could easily correct themselves.

An opportunity to file application for a Civil Service (career) appointment in the Federal Service was announced this week by the Secretary, Board of U. S. TOMATO-SALMON PIE

- 2 tbs. chopped onion
- 1/2 c. chopped green pepper
- 1/2 c. minced mushrooms
- 2 1/2 c. sliced tomatoes
- 2 tbs. butter
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 2 tbs. sugar
- 1 1/2 lbs. can salmon
- grated cheese
- 1 unbaked pie crust

Saute onion and green pepper in margarine. Add the tomatoes, floury seasonings and sugar. Cook about 15 minutes. Fit pie crust into baking dish; spread salmon over top of it. Cover with the tomato sauce. Bake at 400° F. for 20 to 25 minutes.

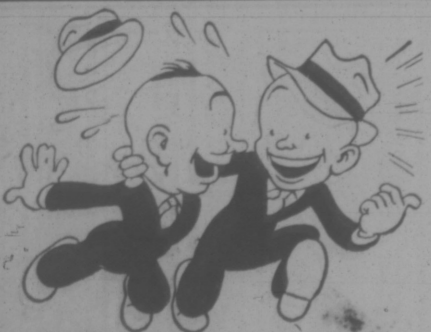
