#### GENERAL DAVIS

##### ASSIGNED NEW ASSISTANT

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Captain T. Jackson, Warrenton, Virginia, has been detailed to the War Department, Inspector General's Department, for duty as assistant to Brigadier General B. O. Davis, Sr., Assistant, The Inspector General.

Inducted into the Army in February, 1942, Captain Jackson was appointed a cadet at Tuskegee Army Air Field and eight months later he graduated as a second lieutenant, Air Corps.

Assigned to duty as a pilot he served with the 322nd Fighter Group in the United States and Italy. While overseas he was commander of the 302nd Fighter Squadron and is credited with 146 combat missions in the 12th and 13th Air Forces.

NEW YORK (Global)—A dinner to celebrate the birthday of Premier Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru of India was held last Thursday at the Hotel Pierre under the sponsorship of the National Committee For India's Freedom.

## AME Bishops 'Unfrock' One, Suspend Another, Exonerate Third at Special Session

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (NNPA)—The "unfrocking" of one bishop, the suspension of another and the exoneration of a third marked the closing last Friday of the first extra session of the General Conference of the African Methodist Episcopal Church in the history of the church founded 150 years ago as a protest against intolerance.

Bishop G. E. Curry of Jacksonville, Florida, was the second bishop to be "unfrocked" by the conference. Bishop David H. Sims of Philadelphia has been "unfrocked" the day before.

The action against Bishop Curry was based on charges of embezzlement seeking to defeat the action of a majority of his colleagues, inciting a riot, and mal-administration. The vote to "unfrock" him was 812 to 94.

Bishop Monroe H. Davis of Baltimore was suspended without pay until the meeting of the Bishops' Council in Columbia, South Carolina, in February. He was found guilty of conduct unbecoming a bishop. The verdict and sentence in his case was approved by a vote of 806 to 2.

Bishop William A. Fountain of Atlanta was exonerated of charges of seeking to defeat the action of a majority of his colleagues. The vote in his case was unanimous.

The extra session of the A.M.E.

General Conference was the result of a long standing controversy in the church, in which Bishops Sims was the center. As the result of charges of irregularities in his administration of the affairs of the New York Annual Conference, the Bishops' Council in Kansas City, June 21, designated Bishop R. R. Wright, Jr., of Wilberforce, Ohio, as "associate bishop" with Bishop Sims to preside over the New York conference.

#### CONFERENCE ILLEGAL

PHILADELPHIA, (NNPA)—The Rev. David H. Sims declared last Saturday that his "unfrocking" as a bishop of the African Methodist Episcopal Church by a special session of the General Conference was illegal.

The position taken by the Rev. Mr. Sims indicates that the question of the legality of the extra session of the General Conference, called by ten of sixteen bishops of the church, will be threshed out in the courts. Already pending in Washington, D. C., is a suit to restrain A. S. Jackson, secretary-treasurer of the A.M.E. Church, from paying out any funds of the church to defray the expenses of the extra session of the General Conference, held in Little Rock, Arkansas, November 20-23. This suit questions the legality of the call for the extra session.

## Shots Fired in Fight After Baptist Ministers' Meeting

#### Occurs at 9th and Washington

KANSAS CITY, KAS.—Two revolver shots were fired in a fight Monday afternoon between two members of the Baptist Ministers' union following the ministers' regular weekly conference in Kansas City, Kansas. Neither of the shots took effect.

Participants in the fracas were the Rev. S. M. Mitchell, pastor of the Mt. Olive Baptist church, Third street and State avenue, and the Rev. J. H. Alexander, pastor of the Oak Ridge Baptist church at Bethel, Kas. Mitchell is president of the ministers' union.

The fight occurred shortly after 1 o'clock just outside the Metropolitan Baptist church at Ninth street and Washington boulevard where the ministers had met.

Starts at Mitchell's Car  
As related to Edward Hayes and Lester Riley, detectives, the argument started when Alexander went to Mitchell's car to question him relative to a statement he allegedly had made Sunday about Alexander.

Tempers flared almost immediately and the two exchanged blows, with Mitchell swinging from inside the car and Alexander reaching through an open front window, the detectives were told.

Other ministers rushed to the car. The Rev. W. E. Burns, pastor of the Greystone Heights Baptist church, 58 Greystone avenue, seized Alexander while the Rev. L. C. Rice, pastor of the Bethel Baptist church, Seventh and Sherman streets, grasped Mitchell and pulled him from the car.

Once outside the car Mitchell leveled a revolver and fired at Alexander as he started across the street, witnesses said. Alexander then began to run west on Washington boulevard. Mitchell fired a second time, police were informed. That bullet, too, missed Alexander.

To Courthouse to Report  
Mitchell then got in his car and drove directly to the Wyandotte county courthouse to report to authorities while Alexander returned to the church to await the arrival of police.

Several of the ministers accompanied police and Alexander to the county attorney's office where a truce was negotiated between the two ministers. They shook hands, agreeing the whole affair was a mistake. Mitchell surrendered a sheriff's deputy-commission which had given authority to carry a weapon. He said he had carried the revolver in the glove compartment of his car. No charges were filed against either man.

Mitchell required medical attention for the left side of his face where he was injured in the scuffle at the

#### BOOKER WASHINGTON COINS READY



ROCKY MOUNT, Va.—S. J. Phillips, president of the Booker T. Washington Birthplace Memorial, announces that the Booker T. Washington 50-cents pieces are being coined at the Denver, Philadelphia and San Francisco Mints, and will be ready for distribution on December 14.

This coin will be one of the most interesting in American history in that it is the first coin ever to be minted in honor of a Negro and the

first ever to be designed by a sculptor of the same race. The coin was designed by Isaac Hathaway of Lexington, Kentucky.

Coins may be secured through the Booker T. Washington Birthplace Memorial, Rocky Mount, Virginia; at a cost of \$1.00 each plus 10-cents for postage and mailing for those coined at the Philadelphia and San Francisco Mints, and \$1.50 each plus 10-cents postage for those coined at the Denver Mint.

## Say Some of 838th Were Involved in Clash with White Americans In Italy

#### WASHINGTON, D. C. (NNPA)—

The entire 838th Aviation Engineer Battalion, consisting of about 1,000 men, has been returned to the United States from Italy because some of its members were involved in a clash with white American soldiers in Caserta, it was learned here last Wednesday.

Twenty-eight members of the 838th Battalion were reported to be held in confinement at Livorno, Italy as a result of the clash. A colored woman Red Cross worker, a Mrs. Mildred A. Fortson of Youngstown, Ohio, also was reported to have been taken into custody. The American Red Cross said last Wednesday, however, that she has returned to this country. She is the daughter of Mrs. Estelle Clark, also of Youngstown.

According to information received here, the trouble began when 800 replacements were assigned to the 848th, which was stationed near Caserta.

Army Information and Education officers immediately set about arranging suitable recreational facilities for the troops within their camp in order to prevent their crowding into Caserta on leave. To carry out their arrangements Italian women were transported from Caserta to take part in activities at the camp.

This plan worked well. It was reported, until a sudden change of officer personnel in the 838th took place. According to reports, the new white officers immediately barred the Italian women from attending affairs at the camp and when the colored soldiers sought entertainment in Caserta a clash with white troops over the women followed.

#### Reach Climax

The conflict reached a climax when white troops are alleged to have gone to their area after several fist fights, armed themselves, and returned led by their company officers.

The colored troops are reported to have gone to their area, broken into their supply room and obtained arms.

No report on the outcome of the battle was available, but immediately following the incident the battalion was placed aboard ship and returned to the United States. Members of the battalion said the outfit was returned to the State so suddenly that port authorities in this country had not been notified of the time of their arrival and the unit's ship was forced to wait in the harbor several days before the troops could embark.

The War Department admitted that the unit had been ordered back to the States but would not comment on the cause. The 848th was overseas almost two years.

Information concerning the unit was given to William A. Hill, executive secretary of the District of Columbia Branch of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, who communicated with the War Department.

Mr. Hill was informed that the information had been transmitted to Marcus H. Ray, civilian aide to the Secretary of War, who is touring United States Army installations in the European theater, and he in turn notified the Department that he would look into the matter.

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## NAACP Plays Major Role In Senator Bilbo's Hearings

#### NEW YORK—According to an un-

impeachable southern source, professional race-baiters, backing Senator Theodore Bilbo's fight to retain his seat in the upper house, were nervously anticipating introduction of a heretofore closely guarded brief.

Prepared by NAACP legal counsel, assisted by powerful liberals with years of top-level Washington experience, this brief is expected to provide a sensational legal basis for the expulsion of the violently anti-Negro, anti-Semitic Mississippi demagogue, after the hearings get under way in Mississippi on Monday. Attorney Charles H. Houston, of Washington, D. C., is representing the NAACP during the hearings.

Attorney Houston, in Washington this week, declared that it would probably require special permission from the special committee in charge of the hearings before the lethal brief, which he considers a most comprehensive one in terms of legal and other pressing elements, can be presented. In his opinion, the NAACP brief will provide the most practical basis for the Senate's right to act in the unseating of Bilbo. Mr. Houston is expected to remain in Mississippi at least one week and perhaps two. In addition to the brief, he will carry a substantial amount of photostatic material which he expects to aid materially in the action.

## NAACP Youth Hold Eighth Annual Meet

NEW YORK—The 8th Annual Convention of NAACP Youth Branches ended in New Orleans with an outdoor mass meeting on the spacious Dillard University campus, Sunday, November 24, as hundreds of delegates and spectators listened to blinded veteran Isaac Woodard tell them, "I wouldn't want what happened to me to happen to anyone, black or white. But unless we all get together now before it is too late there are going to be others like me."

Woodard spoke after Thurgood Marshall, NAACP Special Counsel, speaking for the first time since his narrow escape from violence at the hands of terrorist Tennessee State Highway Patrolmen and deputies. Also speaking was Oliver W. Harrington, NAACP Public Relations Counsel.

Delegates to the annual conference, which boasts 25,000 members in youth councils and college chapters, all

under the age of 25, meeting November 20 and 24, heard several nationally prominent speakers in discussions of problems affecting Negro young people in America today.

Justice Hubert Delany of the New York City Court of Domestic Relations delivering the keynote address warned the delegates that Negroes must seek "unadulterated equality in every field" and "stop apologizing for being alive." Negroes must learn to say "I want a job, I want a decent place in which to live, and I want to live like a free human being," continued Judge Delany. "It is no longer possible for the middle-of-the-road inter-racial philosopher to hide the truth from the minds of intelligent white people."

## POLITICS HURT DES MOINES APPEARANCE

The housing commission of Des Moines has approved permits for two prefabricated houses which have already been assembled. These units were brought in to help relieve the housing shortage. New houses are not being completed. This is well shown in a recent announcement by the housing permit department stating that 1,000 houses have been started but few more than 200 completed in 1946. This is not a very impressive record in view of the acute housing situation in Des Moines.

Last week, following an order from the city council that no more permits for prefabricated houses be issued unless approved by that body—this job is done ordinarily by the housing bureau—an application was before the council for approval. Of course there is a good political reason for this. The issuing employees in the housing bureau are under civil service, fairly clear of political pressure and thus are able to act on the basis of what is best for all the people rather than expedient for the politician.

The city council turned the permit down because the building trades in Des Moines objected to the issuance of permits for any more prefabricated homes in Des Moines.

If employment was widespread among building tradesmen and the housing situation in Des Moines had cleared up, there would be some sense to the objection of labor; there would be some logic for the action of the city council. But as the situation stands, ordinary construction at least is not relieving the housing shortage so it would seem that some other method might well be followed in this emergency.

It is just this kind of political demagogery which has the country in a bad way today and the people suffer all because a few politicians want to remain at the public trough the rest of their lives and some labor leaders would rather the public suffer than make a reasonable adjustment in cases of great need.

The city of Des Moines has a housing ordinance requiring that certain specifications be met before a house is built here. But do they enforce it? No. Go up and down street after street and one can observe shacks, chicken pens, dumps and numerous obnoxious places in the course of construction or completed which have been put up since the law went into operation. Has the city council done anything about these unsightly places? No. And yet they detract from the looks of homes around them and help make Des Moines, as a national housing figure from New York told us, one of the worst looking towns in the country. There has been a lot of talk about bottlenecks in the housing program but nobody does anything about them. One of the reasons is—as the Des Moines city council has—that the wrong symptom is tackled by those who are charged with making a program work.
