ATLANTA ACTING GOV. TRIES TO SHOW LYNCHING LEGISLATION NOT NEEDED

Atlanta.—(NNPA).—Acting Governor Melvin E. Thompson last Friday took two steps calculated to show the country that Federal anti-lynching legislation is not needed. He ordered two accused white killers, Alfred and Spence Edwards, together with two women arrested with them, openly transferred to the scene of their crime, and called for a state law to prohibit "intimidation" meetings of the Ku Klux Klan. Klan meetings should be banned, Governor Thompson maintained, because they "cut the ground from beneath the feet" of southern members of Congress, who are opposing Federal anti-lynching legislation on the ground that the South itself is wiping out the crime of lynching and a Federal law is unnecessary. The governor also urged all persons who had been "misguided" into parading with the Klan to quit the organization "so that the South may present its best face to the nation and demonstrate that we do not need the proposed laws, duplicating our own."

ST. PAUL WOMAN HELD FOR SLAYING HUSBAND

St. Paul, Minn.—Mrs. J. Austin, 40-year-old housewife, stabbed to death with a five-inch skinning knife her husband, Joseph Austin, 45, allegedly over his gambling. Austin, a packing house worker, was found dead on the kitchen floor of his home by officers summoned by his wife. Mrs. Austin readily admitted the stabbing to police. She told them she was married to Austin in 1923, divorced him in 1939 and remarried him in 1945. She is being held by police.

\$10,000 CONTEST OPEN TO STATE'S YOUNG GARDNERS

Iowa junior growers whose members won three awards in the 1947 production and marketing contest of the National Junior Vegetable Growers Association will have another opportunity in 1948 to improve their stellar records. In announcing the eighth annual contest, Prof. Grant B. Snyder of the University of Massachusetts, senior advisor to the association, points out that Iowa boys and girls between the ages of 14 and 21 are now eligible to compete for the \$6,000 in agricultural scholarships offered by A & P Food Stores each year.

Honor Dr. Mary Bethune in Recognition of 'Service'

New York.—Dr. Mary McLeod Bethune, of Daytona Beach, Florida, and Washington, D. C., was honored

at a testimonial dinner at the Hotel Roosevelt last Thursday night in recognition of a lifetime of service to Negro advancement.

Dr. Bethune, 73, who left a cotton farm to win recognition as an educator, was one of the speakers of the evening. Others were Dr. W. J. Johnson, President of Howard University, and Rabbi Stephen S. Wise, president of the American Jewish Congress. Justice Hubert T. Delany of the Domestic Relations Court presided. Dr. Channing H. Tobias, director of the Phelps-Stokes Fund, was chairman of the dinner committee.

Dr. Bethune has been active in uplift work and the promotion of better interracial relations, and has held several offices during her lifetime, but she is perhaps best known as the founder of Bethune-Cookman College at Daytona Beach, which she is president and founder of the National Council of Negro Women, which has headquarters in Washington, and was the chief of the Negro division of the National Youth Administration.

Case Anti-Lynching Bill Up for House on March 16

Washington, D. C.—(NNPA)—The Case anti-lynching bill will probably be called up for action on the House floor about March 16, it was learned last Wednesday.

The Republican House leadership has given the green light to anti-lynching legislation, and action of the Case bill is to be swift and certain.

As soon as the hearings have been printed and Representative Clifford P. Case, Republican, of New Jersey, has prepared the committee report, the House Rules Committee will be asked for a rule making it a special order of business.

The rule is expected to be granted. It will not be expected to exceed six hours, equally divided between the proponents and opponents of the measure. Members, who do not get an opportunity to speak, will be allowed to extend their remarks in the Congressional Record.

Favorably Reported
The Case Bill was ordered favor-

ably reported by the House Judiciary Committee last Tuesday by a vote of 18 to 8. Twelve Republicans and six Democrats voted for a favorable report, and two Republicans and six Democrats voted against.

Republicans who voted for the bill were Representatives Earl C. Michener, of Michigan, Judiciary Committee chairman; Chauncey W. Reed, Illinois; Louis E. Graham, Pennsylvania; Earl R. Foot, Connecticut, and William M. McCulloch, Ohio.

Democrats for the bill were Representatives Emanuel Celler, New York; Francis E. Walter, Pennsylvania; William T. Byrne, New York; Thomas J. Lane, Massachusetts; Martin Gorski, Illinois, and Michael A. Feighan, Ohio.

UN Conference at Drake March 16-17

Death Sentence to Widow And Sons Called 'Shocking Miscarriage of Justice'

New York, N. Y.—An urgent appeal for funds for the legal defense of Mrs. Rosa Lee Ingram, widowed mother of 12 children, and her two young sons, now under sentence of death in Americus, Ga., went out this week to the 1600 branches of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, and to other friends of the Association.

Calling the Ingram case "one of the most shocking miscarriages of justice in the 39 years NAACP has existed," Walter White, secretary, urged the branches to arrange mass meetings and send speakers to the churches, trade unions and other organizations in a concerted campaign to raise funds for the Ingrams and other legal defense work of the Association.

Pigs Escaped

The death sentences imposed on Mrs. Ingram, an impoverished sharecropper, and her sons originated in an argument last November with a neighboring white farmer, John Ed Stratford. Mrs. Ingram's pigs had rooted under the fence dividing Stratford's land from the farm on which she worked. Armed with a rifle, Stratford set out to shoot the animals. He encountered Mrs. Ingram and struck her with the butt of the firearm, inflicting a deep and bloody wound. She was struggling with him to prevent him from shooting her when two of her sons, Sammie Lee, 14, and Wallace, 7, rushed to her aid. Sammie Lee used the hammer with which he was repair-

ing fence to strike the white assailant and save his mother's life. The blow was fatal.

One-Day Trial

Mrs. Ingram and her sons were arrested and held without bail or trial for three months. In a one-day trial on February 3, with only court-appointed counsel to defend them, the mother and two sons were convicted and sentenced to death. Proceeds of a party here Saturday night will be donated to the defense fund for Rosa Lee Ingram, 40-year-old widow, and two teenage children, under sentence of death in Atlanta, Ga., for the killing of a white man.

Speck Redd will play at the party, to be given at the Crocker YMCA, 1333 Keosauqua way.

Mrs. Stanley Griffin, chairman of the committee to aid the Ingram defense, said contributions for the fund also are being received.

Mrs. Ingram and two of her 12 living children were convicted of the fatal beating Nov. 4 of John Ethron Stratford, 66, after an argument in Stratford's cornfield.

HAZEL SCOTT'S INCOME TAX RETURN SHOWS NET OF \$85,000

NEW YORK.—(NNPA).—Hazel Scott, wife of Representative Adam C. Powell, Democrat, of New York, did such terrific business on her 1947-48 concert tour that her income tax return shows a net of \$85,000, it was learned last Wednesday.

Appearing under the management of Columbia Concerts Corporation for the first time, Miss Scott left New York City on September 29, opening at the University of Massachusetts. She travelled across the top of American to Vancouver, British Columbia, down the west coast to Santiago and back again through the west and Virginia.

Watkins Pleads Innocent To Murder Intent Charge In Shooting of Ex-Wife

Owen Watkins, 62, of 832 Keosauqua way, Tuesday pleaded innocent in municipal court to a charge of assault with intent to commit murder after the shooting of his former wife, Mabel, 41.

Judge Ralph D. Moore set hearing

for April 6. Watkins was released under \$5,000 bond.

Mrs. Watkins of 855 Sixteenth street, wounded in her right side Tuesday morning, March 9, was reported in "good" condition Tuesday night at Broadlawn General hospital.

Watkins told Lt. George Cessna and Detective Vance Nordaker that he accidentally shot her when the .38 calibre revolver he had in his hand discharged while the two were scuffling in his second floor apartment in the Watkins hotel at 832 Keosauqua way.

He said Mrs. Watkins came to the hotel Tuesday morning and was attempting to force her way into the apartment when the shooting took place.

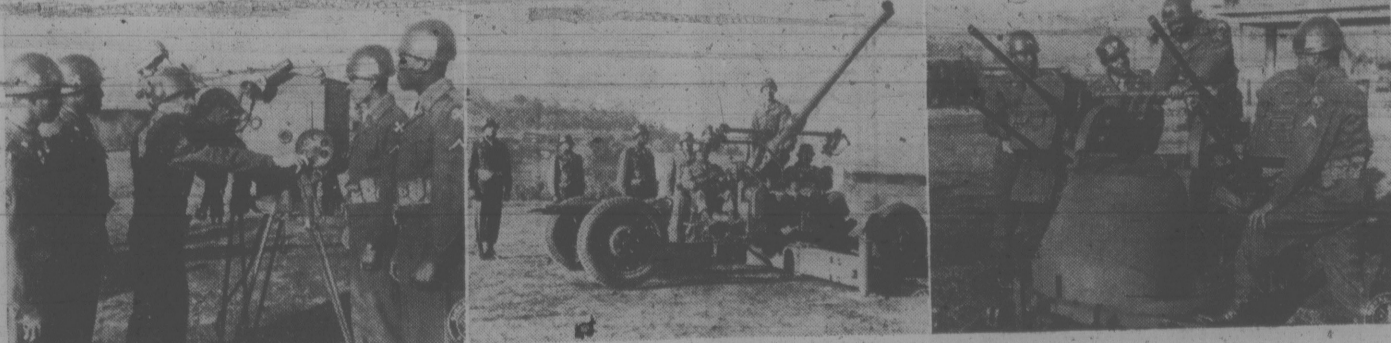
After she was shot, she left in a taxi. Police were called to the Sixteenth street address shortly after 9 a. m. by the cab driver, Ray Steele, after he learned that his passenger was injured.

In a statement to the police Watkins claimed he and his former wife have "had considerable difficulty for several years." He admitted "another woman" was in his apartment when the former wife arrived.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF MID-WEST SALES CORPORATION

That the undersigned do hereby associate ourselves together as a body corporate and legal entity under the provisions of Chapter 491 of the 1936 Code of Iowa and acts amendatory thereto.

The name and style of this corporation shall be MID-WEST SALES CORPORATION. The corporation shall have no stock.

The period of existence and duration of this corporation shall be twenty years from and after the issuance of the certificate of incorporation by the State of Iowa, unless sooner dissolved by the affirmative vote of the stockholders representing at least two-thirds of the outstanding stock as shown by the books of the corporation.

The principal office and place of business of this corporation shall be the City of Des Moines, Iowa. It may, however, establish such branch offices, agencies or places of business in the State of Iowa, in any other state, territory, or province of Canada, as the Board of Directors may deem necessary or advantageous to the business.

This corporation shall possess all the rights, privileges and immunities now enjoyed by corporations for pecuniary profit in the State of Iowa, including the right to manufacture or sell, wholesale or retail, or by automobile, airplane or farm equipment accessories, household appliances or other personal property, to buy and/or sell patent rights, to pay royalty on the same or to assist others in obtaining patents, money and to borrow money.

Section 1. The capital stock of this corporation shall be \$100,000.00, divided into \$100.00 each. No stock shall be issued, however, until the same shall be fully paid in cash or in property approved by the Executive Council of the State of Iowa.

Section 2. The business and affairs of this corporation shall be directed, managed and controlled by a board of directors, consisting of not more than five directors, to be elected at the annual meeting of the stockholders. Until the first annual meeting of the stockholders, the Board of Directors shall be composed of: Frank B. Hallagan, Des Moines, Iowa; James W. Jeffers, Des Moines, Iowa.

Section 3. The officers of this corporation shall be the president, vice president, secretary and treasurer. Any two officers may be combined and held by one person. Until the first annual meeting of the Board of Directors, the following officers of the corporation shall be: President and Secretary, Frank B. Hallagan; Vice President and Treasurer, James W. Jeffers.

Section 4. The Board of Directors may also appoint such other assistant officers, superintendents, managers or other agents as they deem necessary to conduct the affairs of the corporation.

Section 5. Vacancies occurring in the Board of Directors shall be filled by the remaining directors, and vacancies occurring in the officers shall be filled by the directors, in each case to hold office during the remainder of the term.

Section 6. All deeds, mortgages, contracts or other written instruments conveying any interest in real estate owned by the corporation and all notes or evidences of indebtedness shall be executed in the name of the corporation by its president or vice president and secretary or treasurer, after approval of its Board of Directors.

Section 7. The officers and directors shall hold office for the term following their election at the annual meeting, or until their successors are elected and qualified.

The annual meeting of the stockholders for the election of directors and for the transaction of the business shall be held in the principal office of the corporation on the second Monday in February, 1949. Special meetings of the stockholders may be held at any time when called by the president or vice president.

Brand as False, Truman's Board Objecting to Photos At Gov. Hastie Reception

Charlotte Amalie, St. Thomas, Virgin Islands—(NNPA)—Governor William H. Hastie branded as "utterly false" a statement made by John O'Donnell, a syndicated columnist, that masterminds on the Truman board of political strategy deemed it very bad politically for photographs to be taken of the President standing in the receiving line with Mrs. Hastie at the reception given by her husband.

Numerous pictures were taken of the receiving line, Governor Hastie said, and one has already been published in the local press.

One Misstatement

Except for this one misstatement of fact, Governor Hastie said the stories filed by reporters who accompanied Mr. Truman to the Virgin Islands, "seem to have been accurate, fair and generously detailed."

Beyond the cited falsehood, the people of the Virgin Islands resent

the effort of this columnist to distort the President's unaffected and genuine friendliness and his continuing interest in this community and all of our territories by misrepresenting the Presidential visit as "election year politics," the governor said adding:

Planned Visit in 1947

"In March, 1947, a visit by the President to Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands was planned and announced, but unfortunately had to be cancelled because of circumstances requiring the presence of the Chief Executive in Washington. At that time the President assured the people of Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands that he would visit these American possessions at first opportunity. This promise was fulfilled by his recent visit.

"The actual program of the President's stay in the Virgin Islands contained the very features that had been arranged for the 1947 visit."

CITY COUNCIL NEEDS BUSINESS EXECUTIVE SAYS HABERKORN

"I, John Haberkorn, am a candidate for Safety Commissioner in the City of Des Moines. This is a very important office. Besides being a member of the City Council, the Commissioner of Public Safety is the head of the City Police force, the City Fire Department, and Public Health Department. They recall that but a few weeks ago we beheld the amazing spectacle of a local gambler 'of 30 years experience' going before the Polk County Grand Jury in an effort to make six other prominent members of his profession allow him his fair cut in the business. This action gave him no relief and his attempt fizzled out leaving, supposedly, the organized 'six' in complete control.

"Gambling is a crime in the State of Iowa, and the Department of Pub-

lic Safety must tolerate no law violations. We are told that we must leave this situation alone—that it can't be cleaned up. I don't believe that! I am no politician, but I can't understand, and I never could understand why a vice that is supported by less than 2 per cent of our people should be condoned when we see that repeatedly and inevitably it casts its corrupt reflection over so many city affairs.

"Des Moines has had a series of very bad fires in the past few months. This was due only to sheer bad luck. Our fire equipment and personnel is of the highest and we must try to maintain it at that high level. However, we must try to improve it whenever possible, and to prevent fires by closer and more frequent inspection, with a department properly staffed.

"In the city government matters like juvenile delinquency, public playgrounds and safety in traffic continually challenge us. All of these conditions are capable of much improvement. We must try constantly to improve them.

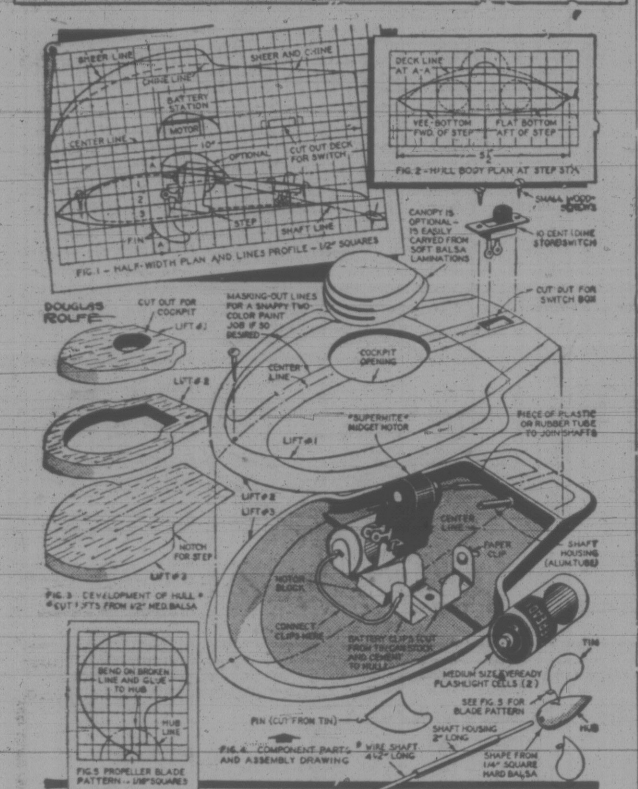

Dear Dad:

The hull is carved. The Supramite motor is driven by one or two Eveready flashlight batteries.

First, lay out full-size patterns of the hull (Figures 1 and 2). The hull is built in three "lifts." The two upper lifts are to be cemented together to form the removable deck section. The lower lift forms the actual hull. Figure 3 shows how the lifts are assembled. Pin them together temporarily and carve the outside to shape. Figure 3 shows a typical section through the hull. After shaping the outside, separate the pieces and hollow out the upper and lower lifts. Cement the two lower lifts together and, when they are dry, hollow out No. 2 lift to conform with lift No. 3. Put in the motor block and the battery clips and fit the switch as shown in Figure 4. In making the connections, allow enough wire so that the deck portion can be raised to replace batteries. Put in the propeller shaft housing. This may be any piece of metal tubing of just the right size to allow any easy fit for the shaft. Make the propeller as shown in Figs. 4 and 5 and mount it on the shaft with cement. Hook up the propeller shaft to the motor shaft with a short length of plastic or rubber tubing.

Next cut out the fin and press it into the bottom just ahead of the step station. Later it can be cemented in place; but first sand down the entire hull with very fine sandpaper. Give the whole works a coat of sanding sealer (costs 10c) and sand down again.

The paint job is up to the builder. Masking-out lines are indicated for a two-tone deck paint job; but this is not essential. Nor is the motor hood or canopy, also indicated; but this detail improves the appearance of the boat and seals it against water damage to the batteries. Check any tendency to turn off course by bending the fin as needed and... let her go!

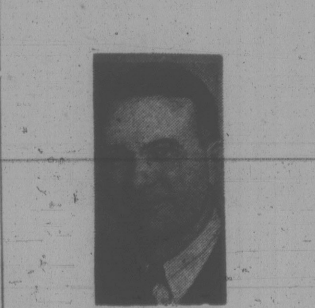
