SOUTH AFRICAN AMBASSADOR

Withholds from UN Report on Natives

Says Government Was Censured in 'Unwarranted Manner' on Segregation

Lake Success, N. Y. (NNPA)—Dr. Ralph J. Bunche, director of the United Nations Trusteeship Division, last Friday heard the South African delegate to the United Nations, tell the General Assembly Trusteeship Committee that South Africa practices racial segregation "to prevent race deterioration, to preserve race integrity, and to give the different racial groups an opportunity to build and develop their race life."

Dr. Bunche presided over the meeting of the Trusteeship Committee last Friday as it took up the question of the refusal of South Africa to report to the UN on the economic and social life of its dependent peoples, as required by the UN charter.

Criticize

South Africa's Ambassador to the United States, G. P. Jooste, who heads his country's delegation to the UN, said his country had decided to discontinue to submit such reports to the UN because, among other things, the information submitted was being used to criticize his government in an "unwarranted manner."

He said there was little understanding in the UN of the "unfortunate" circumstances governing South West Africa's relation to the Union of South Africa and attempted to explain to the com-

mittee why his government felt it was necessary to follow strict policy of segregation, for which it is being so roundly criticized.

"Let me briefly tell the committee," Mr. Jooste said, "what are the main reasons for this segregation. Firstly, Mr. Chairman, to prevent race deterioration, to preserve race integrity and to give the different racial groups an opportunity to build and develop their race. Secondly, to protect each community against the penetration of the other. Thirdly, to prevent racial animosity which would inevitably arise if the whole life of the different races were inextricably mixed up. Fourthly, to prevent unemployment and the overcrowding of urban areas, with all the attendant evils.

Mr. Jooste said "segregation is not a measure against one or other group. It is actually the only way of ensuring the parallel development of differing groups and is quite obviously a stimulation for advancement. There is abundant evidence in South West Africa of the wisdom of the policy pursued by the Administration in this respect.

Mr. Jooste said the criticism in the UN against his government's segregation policy had been used by "agitators" in his country "to destroy the harmonious race relations upon which successful native administration is inevitably dependent."

Thousands of Mourners Pay Last Tribute to Tap Dancer Bill 'Bojangles' Robinson

New York (NNPA)—Bill Robinson, the tap dancer, died last Friday night at Columbia-Presbyterian Medical Center. He was 71 years old.

Mr. Robinson, known as Bojangles for almost all of his career, entered the hospital on November 14 for treatment of a heart ailment and had been in an oxygen tent for a week. At the bedside when he died were his second wife, Mrs. Elaine Robinson and her sister, Mrs. Dorothy Smalls.

Bill Robinson, the ageless perfectionist of tap dancing, reached the peak of his profession at an age when most dancers start to think about retiring. He was past 40 when his amazing performances on the big-time vaudeville circuits enchanted audiences. In 1946 he celebrated his sixtieth years as a professional entertainer.

Moved Slowly

As he moved slowly across the stage or did a graceful slow turn he spoke alternately to his audience

and his feet. He would wave an admonishing finger as his steps seemed to be getting out of hand.

His total earnings from stage and screen work during his career were estimated at more than \$4,000,000, with movie contracts running as high as \$8,000 weekly and Broadway appearances reaching \$3,500—but he never held on to his money long. He liked to gamble and he was often-finished in his charities.

Among his contributions to the minor arts was the stair dance, during which he worked his way up and down a four-step platform with a series of rhythmic hops and taps. This routine was so widely copied it became an institution of show business.

He also added the word "copacetic" to the American language to describe how he felt when everything was going all right. Lexicographers finally described "copacetic" as "better than OK." He was the unbeaten champion of running (See Page FOUR)

WIFE LAID TO REST WITH ANOTHER, HUSBAND SUES

Los Angeles, Cal.—Begging Willie B. Canson's pardon for levity in treating of the dead, a pardonably funny angle grew out of the suit for damages he filed Wednesday in superior court against Evergreen cemetery.

Canson, a postoffice employee of 1208 E. 48th street, charges that his faithful wife of 29 years slept for 17 days by the side of person or persons unknown!

It all came about when Mrs. Mamie Canson died and was buried Oct. 28 at Evergreen. For an added charge of \$81.50, Canson said the cemetery was to reopen his son's grave and enlarge it so that the two might lie side by side.

When the funeral party arrived at the open grave, the suit set forth, some doubt was expressed among the mourners as to the accuracy of the location, but nothing was said openly, out of deference to the bereaved.

Afterwards, however, said Canson, friends began to express doubt openly until his daughter, Miss Mary Frances Canson, decided to go back to the cemetery to check.

Accompanied by the family lawyer, Rayfield Lundy, she questioned cemetery officials, who at first denied that an error had been made, then allegedly promised to move the body.

His wife's body has been moved, Canson said, and now lies presumably at the side of his son, Ben, who died in an auto crash in 1944 at the age of 20.

But in view of the anguish and doubt which has been caused him, Canson said he can't be sure, and anyway wants the court to penalize the cemetery for carelessness and, also, to assuage his feelings.

MINNESOTA'S GOVERNOR ISSUES ORDER OPENING GUARD TO COLORED MEN

St. Paul, Minn. (NNPA)—Governor Luther W. Youngdahl last Tuesday issued an executive order opening enlistment in the Minnesota National Guard to colored men for the first time in the State's history.

Brigadier General Joseph E. Nelson, Adjutant General; Billy Williams, executive assistant to the Governor's Interracial Commission; Major Samuel L. Ransom of the Governor's Interracial Commission, and Clifford Rucker, informational representative of the commission, were present when the governor signed the order decreeing:

"There shall be equality of opportunity and treatment for all, including Negro citizens who shall serve in the military and naval forces of the state without segregation into separate units."

Later, announcement of the signing of the executive order was made at the all-day annual conference of the Minneapolis Council on Human Relations at the Hotel Nicollet.

General Nelson said New Jersey, Connecticut and Wisconsin, so far as he knows, are the only states where colored men have been integrated into the National Guard.

A year ago the Army Department authorized the activation of a colored unit of the Minnesota National Guard, but colored leaders and Governor Youngdahl refused to organize such a unit on the ground that it still involved racial segregation.

GETS TEN YEARS ON BURGLARY CHARGES

Izear Lewis, 48, captured Nov. 1, one minute after he burglarized a downtown jewelry store window of \$1,850 in jewelry, Monday was sentenced by District Judge O. S. Franklin to not more than 10 years in Fort Madison penitentiary.

Lewis pleaded guilty before Judge Joseph E. Meyer to charges of breaking and entering.

Responding to a burglar alarm from Victor's jewelry store, 519 Locust street, two American District Telegraph men captured Lewis 15 feet from the store, with the jewelry in his possession.

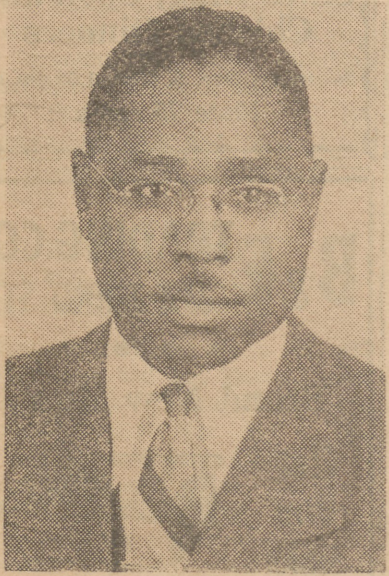
Lewis, a transient, broke out the store window with a brick and scooped up 29 rings and seven watches from the display.

Testimony Begins Here in Pastor's Suit for \$10,000 Against 2 D.M. Detectives

Trial of a \$10,000 damage suit brought by a Coffeyville, Kas. minister against two Des Moines detectives, opened Tuesday before a jury in District Judge Tom K. Murrow's court.

The Rev. Alonzo Fitch, pastor of Sardis First Baptist church in Coffeyville, is seeking damages from Detectives James McGuire and James Allen, claiming they forced their way into his hotel room last June, pushed him around and threatened him with revolvers.

The Rev. Mr. Fitch, in his petition contends that the detectives rushed into his room at the Parker-Roach hotel at 2:30 a.m. with revolvers drawn, and accused him of being a "vagabond, a criminal confidence man and a fortune teller."

According to the minister, he motored to Des Moines on June 9 to enroll at Drake university to spend a term working on his master's degree. Through Rev. J. E. Tunstall, pastor of Burns Methodist church, he had made arrangements to reside at a home but his room was not ready for occupancy until the next day. With the aid of Rev. Mr. Tunstall, Mrs. E. J. Roach was contacted and a room secured for one night at the Parker-Roach hotel.

McGuire and Allen have denied the charges of abuse and misconduct and contends that the matter was a routine detective investigation.

Testimony in the case began on Wednesday morning when Roosevelt Clarke, who said he has been a clerk and janitor at the Parker-Roach hotel, 762½ 9th street, where he resides, was called as the first witness.

Examined by Attorney McKnight, Clarke told the court that he registered about 9:30 o'clock on the night of June 9, the Rev. Mr. Fitch

was accompanied by the Rev. J. E. Tunstall, pastor of Burns Methodist church. He assigned the Coffeyville minister to room 105, located four doors from the office, and three doors away from the room, 102, in which he slept.

Mr. Clarke, who informed that he was on duty the rest of the night, said he was awakened about 2:30 o'clock the next morning by the two detectives, McGuire and Allen, who knocked on his door. They asked about newcomers to the hotel and Mr. Clarke said he told them of the minister who was registered. After checking the card that the minister signed, Clarke said that the two detectives went back to room 105 and that "I closed my door and went on back to bed."

Clarke said he did not see the Rev. Mr. Fitch again until the next morning when he was accompanied by the Rev. Mr. Tunstall.

Cross examined by Attorney Howard, Clarke revealed that the minister signed the hotel's registration card without the title "Reverend," and had no baggage or luggage.

Clarke was ordered to bring the registration card that the minister signed to the courtroom.

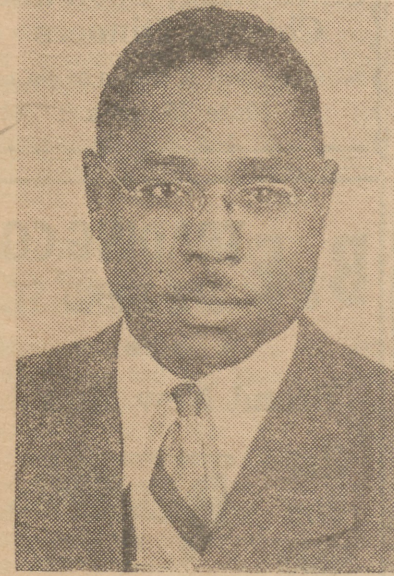

He came to St. Paul, Minn., from Portsmouth, Ohio, to take over the Mt. Olivet church in December, 1947.

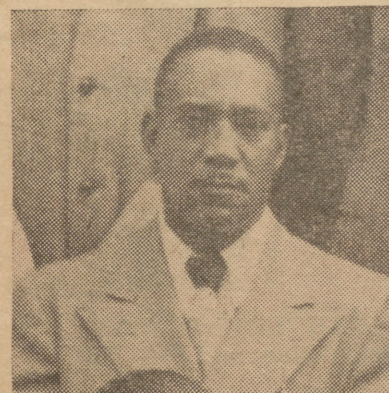
'Americans All' Make History on Station KWDM

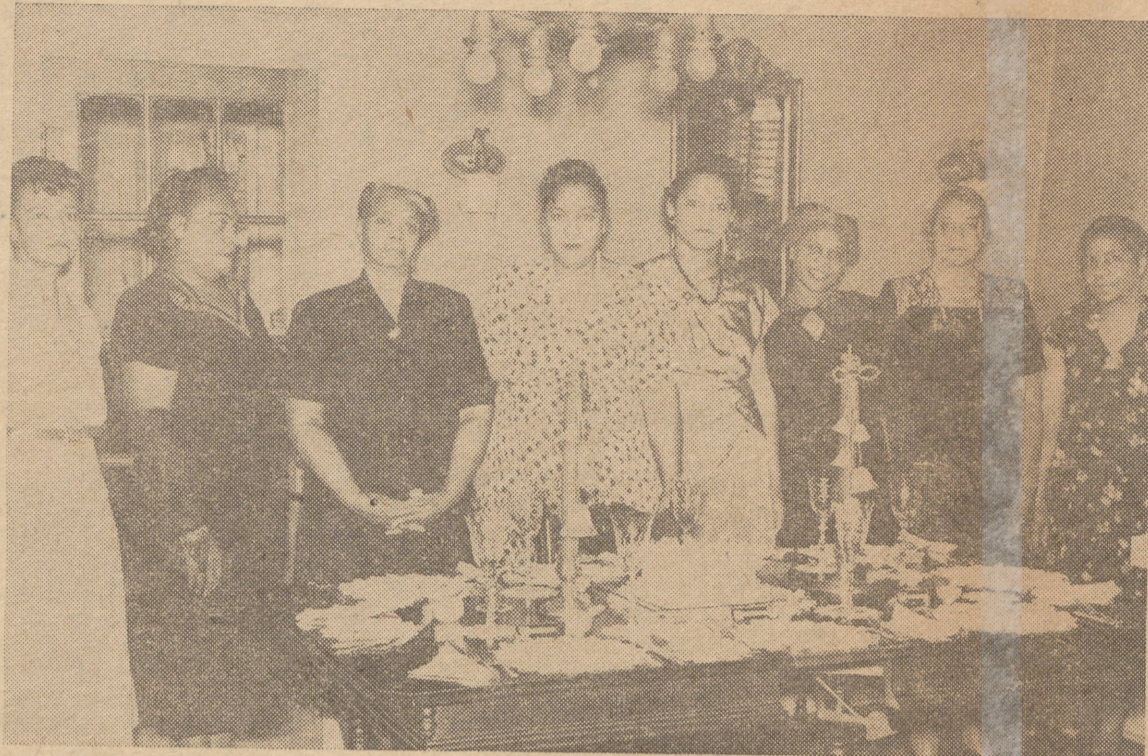

RESPECT FOR LAW DISCOURAGED IN CIVIL RIGHTS CASES

Des Moines citizens are continuing to file civil and criminal charges against Katz Drug Company alleging discrimination on the ground of race.

In the municipal court where these cases are filed it is the practice to place habitual offenders under bond in cases of misdemeanor.

However, in the case of the Katz store, these habitual offenders are not even required to answer a warrant, but are tipped off that charges have been filed against them and they in turn appear by counsel for arraignment.

But the program which is being following by some of our officials in the municipal court encourages Katz to disobey the law rather than obey it.

Some people are still narrow enough and foolish enough to oppose the enforcement of the civil rights laws in Iowa. They are ignorant, back numbers and out of step with the world trend to liberalize rather than restrict the rights of minority groups.

Ordinarily a newspaper does not write editorials telling judges what to do. But as a citizen of Iowa and a member of its largest minority group, the Bystander knows that certain people are attempting to make a farce of the enforcement of Iowa's civil rights laws and unfortunately some of our law enforcement officials are being used as stooges to help do the job.

The first case decided by the Iowa Supreme Court sustained the right of a Negro to be dealt with as a citizen of the United States. The United States Supreme Court held recently that the courts being a part of the state could not be used to uphold contracts which barred Negroes from living in the neighborhood in which they purchased property.

The intelligent people of Iowa must not allow the courts to aid in the denial of the civil rights of any man on the ground of race, creed or color.

UN has what is known as the trusteeship committee. Monday the Rev. Michael Scott, Anglican cleric who champions native groups in the former mandated territory of south west Africa appeared before that body protesting the unfair treatment of these people by the government.

CHICKENS COME HOME TO ROOST

G. P. Jooste, South African ambassador to Washington and leader of nation's delegation, charged that the appearance of Rev. Michael Scott before the committee, was a violation of the U N Charter and said:

"In the light of what has taken place, my government has instructed me to withdraw my delegation from all discussions in the trusteeship committee on this item."

Well, if this had been the Russian delegation there would be little surprise. South Africa is about as rotten as they come in its treatment of its natives and wants nobody to interfere with this rotten conduct.

It is no wonder that several days ago, the British delegate said that

if individual groups continued to appear before U N protesting mis-treatment of darker races in other nations, it would open the door to Paul Robeson to come in and object to the mistreatment of minorities in America.

The champions of white supremacy and mistreatment of minority groups die hard. Their funeral day is on the horizon.

Fitch Damage Case

The Rev. Mr. Fitch testified that "Mr. McGuire led in—he was in front."

"What did Mr. McGuire do?" Attorney McKnight queried.

The minister replied that "he had a gun in his hand and demanded me to stick 'em up—what the hell!"

"I told them I don't have anything men. I thought they were hold-up men," the minister continued.

Attorneys Henry T. McKnight and Luther T. Glanton, Jr., are representing the plaintiff. In opening the case to the jury Attorney McKnight said that the evidence will show that the Rev. Mr. Fitch suffered "humiliation, embarrassment and mental strain" and lost one week of his schooling on account of this ordeal.

Then they got to wondering why they should confine their activities to tennis when there was so much work to be done on the East side.

So they went from there, and the idea snowballed until now they have some projects lined up that frighten the members. But we know most of them and we know they will be just scared enough to pitch in and get the job done. Congratulations and good luck fellows.

luncheonette. "The Katz corporation brought jim crow across the Missouri border into the state of Iowa. This was and still remains a violation of the Civil Rights code of Iowa, passed in 1936. "The Committee - To - End - Jim - Crow - At - Katz Drugstore is concentrating all its time and effort upon this luncheonette because it is part of the most powerful corporation of its kind in the city of Des Moines. It is our opinion that when Katz is forced to abide by the Civil Rights Code, other places now discriminating against Negroes in public eating places will quickly fall in line.

"Experience indicates that court action alone has not and cannot stop jim crow because the penalty exacted under the law is not sufficiently heavy. The maximum penalty is one hundred dollars or thirty days in jail. If the main violators of the code were individuals rather than corporations, the present penalty might carry some weight. It is clear that a hundred-dollar fine against a million dollar corporation is hardly a penalty. There is no record in Iowa of a judge sentencing a corporation representative to jail. There is also no record of a corporation representative choosing a jail sentence rather than pay a fine.

"The inadequacy of the Civil Rights code is apparent in the fact that Katz Drugstore, Inc., in spite of two jury verdicts of guilty returned against it, October 7, 1948,

and again, October 15, 1949, continues to refuse to serve Negroes in the luncheonette. For these reasons additional legal measures in support of court action are necessary. Therefore, the Committee-To-End-Jim-Crow-At-Katz Drug store, Inc., extends a cordial invitation to every citizen in Des Moines, both Negro and white, to join us at lunch between the hours of 11 a.m. and 2 p.m. each Saturday until the jim crow policy is abandoned.

"Why do we invite guests to lunch in a place where we have no reason to believe that they or we will be served? It is our presence in the luncheonette which turns the jim crow policy of the drug store into an economic boycott. It is our presence which brings to the attention of uninformed white citizens this particular violation of the law and wins their support in addition to the support of those who wait for service with us. Our slogan which says 'Don't Buy At Katz' is an appeal to both Negro and white. Our slogan 'Don't Eat At Katz' is addressed to those white people who are not our guests at lunch.

"We urge every Negro and white person who believes in civil rights as a safeguard for democracy to be our guests.
