"How's your eye?" he asked in his famous dead-pan tone. "They been working on me all night," replied Ezz. "How's yours?"

While later, they talked to each other again. The next day, Joe said he was "doing nothing—just looking at the ballgame on television—come on over." So Ezz went up to Joe's apartment at 555 Edgecombe Avenue and watched the ball game with Joe, rooting for the Dodgers. They still kidded each other about their left eyes. "Man, I'm gonna have you investigated," grinned Ezz. "You sure punched on my eye." Joe grinned too. "What do you think this is?" He pointed to his worked on shiner.

Tennessee U. Told to Accept Negro Students

Nashville, Tenn.—Faced with the possibility of an NAACP suit, the State of Tennessee agreed to accept the applications of three Negro students to admission to the law and graduate schools of the University of Tennessee at Knoxville.

A ruling handed down by Roy H. Beeler, attorney general of the state, on September 27, affirmed the right of Negro students to attend the University. Basing his ruling on decisions of the United States Supreme Court in the Sweatt and McLaurin cases, Mr. Beeler said:

"We must bow to the inevitable and go along as good citizens of the United States. The opinions of that court become the law of the land, notwithstanding any opinions that may be entertained by any individuals, however sound such opinions may be."

Two of the Negro applicants, Lincoln A. Blankney and Joseph H. Patterson, are seeking admission to the law school beginning with the winter quarter, January 2, 1951. The third applicant, Fred B. Renwick, now a graduate student in chemistry at Atlanta University, is seeking admission to the University of Tennessee in the fall of 1951 for further study in his field. All are veterans of World War II.

Centuries of Domination Show Imprint on India

Jefferson City, Mo.—"Unless something within us stands on God—there will be no world peace," challenged Dr. Sherman D. Scruggs, Lincoln university president, making his first appearance, Sept. 21, before the student body after a two month stay in India and Pakistan.

Using impressions and experiences gained on his trip as a springboard, Dr. Scruggs spoke on the topic, "Education in the New World Order," in the formal opening convocation held Thursday, Sept. 21, in Page Auditorium.

Before a capacity audience of students, faculty members and personnel, the speaker highlighted the skepticism, dire physical wants and serious concern of the people of the countries visited.

Among the countries where there is increasing unrest, dissatisfaction and disorder, he emphasized that, "India is the key ground."

"Bruised" because that country is still "bruised" by the "heel marks of domination" its people are still "skeptical" of government officials and observers. Too, because the people fear another Western dominating power, he pointed out. India will not accept any type of long range program. "Though India is free," he said, "centuries of domination are still imprinted on her."

He told of continued class derision and scorn, defeatism and violence that is upsetting the country.

Detroit Minister Known As 'Traveling Shoeman' Freed of Rape Charge

Detroit, Mich.—"The Traveling Shoeman" was given his freedom to continue his "walking" last Tuesday evening in a crowded courtroom which broke out in a bedlam when Recorder's Judge Charles E. Jones found him not guilty of statutory rape charges made by a 16-year-old girl.

The defendant, the Rev. Columbus C. Chapman, pastor of Faith Temple Church of God, was exonerated because of lack of evidence in the case which had police of two states at one time searching for the complainant.

The Rev. Mr. Chapman was charged with statutory rape of the daughter of a former usher board member of his church offices during treatment for a nervous condition which reportedly were started in October, 1949.

The pastor known to radio audience as "the Traveling Shoeman" was arrested the early part of this month after the girl's mother told police of her daughter's accusations against the minister. He was at liberty on a \$5,000 bond.

Dr. Bunche Has Won 40 Awards and 20 Honorary Degrees

New York.—For his success in ending the war between Israel and her neighbors, broad shouldered Dr. Ralph Johnson Bunche had been showered with 40 awards and medals and 20 honorary academic degrees, the Oct. 2 issue of Time magazine reveals.

One afternoon last week as Dr. Bunche, now senior director of the U. N. Trusteeship Department, was eating lunch in the delegates' dining room at Lake Success, his British Secretary, Mrs. Doreen Daughton dashed up with news of another honor.

"I have a surprise for you," she told Ralph Bunche. "You've won the Nobel Peace Prize." "One of the greatest," Bunche insisted on taking Mrs. Daughton's report with a grain of salt. Not until midafternoon, when he received

Secretary Acheson Adopts Walter White's Plan to Assist Korea in Post War

New York.—When Secretary of State Dean Acheson addressed the opening session of the General Assembly of the United Nations urging international assistance to Korea in post-war reconstruction, he incorporated a proposal first advanced by Walter White, executive secretary of National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

On August 10, Mr. White suggested in a telegram to Warren R. Austin, chief of the United States Mission to the United Nations, that "we offer through the United Nations to restore all property destroyed in Korea because of military necessity to beat back Soviet aggression."

This would serve, the NAACP executive said, "as an answer to Soviet propaganda in Korea that the United States is heartlessly destroying property."

Addressing the General Assembly on September 20, Mr. Acheson said: "The lives lost as a result of this aggression cannot be recalled, but as the people of Korea set about the task of re-establishing a free and independent nation, as they begin to rebuild their country, the United Nations must be prepared to marshal its resources and its experience to help them. . . . The United Nations and the specialized agencies can demonstrate to the world what they have learned about helping people to make the land fertile. . . . This is a job that can be done. It will take substantial funds and resources. Fifty-three governments have pledged their support to the United Nations defense of Korea. Some of them have been unable to contribute military personnel or equipment. But all of them, I am sure, will want to contribute food, transportation and industrial equipment, construction materials and technicians to the great task of reconstruction."

"My government is prepared to join with other member nations in making resources and personnel available. When the conflict in Korea is brought to a successful conclusion, many of the doctors, engineers and other technicians, and much of the resources now being used to support the United Nations military action, will be made available by my government to a United Nations Recovery Force."

ST. PAUL URBAN LEAGUE URGES YOUTH TO FINISH SCHOOL

Minneapolis, Minn.—"Many Negro youths drop out of school every year, convinced that a high school diploma will get them nothing more than an unskilled laborer's job," Thomas Tallye, industrial secretary of the St. Paul Urban League, said recently in discussing the empty seats in high school classrooms this fall.

The Urban League, a Community Chest agency, is urging these students to get their degrees, and the League will help get them a suitable job. But a job, any job, isn't enough. "The League is not so much concerned with unemployment now as under-employment, in which the only job to be had are those beneath the ability of the workers," S. Vincent Owens, executive secretary of the league, stated.

Of the 800 industries in St. Paul, only 128 employ Negroes, he said, but only 14 open all positions, including the professional, to them.

This means that some of St. Paul's Negro high school and college graduates take their ability and education to cities where they can find better jobs, Owens said. "When we don't use them here, other communities reap our harvest."

Murder and Suicide Shock Twin Minnesota Cities

Minneapolis, Minn.—While delivering his morning papers, at 6:30 o'clock Sept. 22, Newsboy Timm Hobbs found the body of Mrs. Daisy C. Hally Tresvan, 60, lying face up on the porch of her home at 2743 11th Avenue South.

Upon arriving at the scene, Detective Don Mealy and members of the homicide squad, found the dead woman on the porch with the door key still clutched in her right hand. Her body was clothed in the white uniform of the O. E. S. as she had returned to her home from an annual communication held at St. Peter AME church Thursday evening.

Entering the house, the officers found Joseph Tresvan, 64, the woman's husband, lying on the floor of the living room, dead of gunshot wounds. According to the officers, Tresvan, had apparently waited for the return of his wife from the meeting and shot her through the screen door as she bent down to insert her door key.

He, apparently, reentered the house and put the muzzle of the shotgun, a Winchester 20 gauge in his mouth and pulled the trigger, using a yardstick to trip the trigger.

The couple, who had been married for three years, was separated at the time of their deaths. According to neighbors, Mrs. Tresvan forced her husband to leave the house two days earlier. They also said she had repeatedly stated that Tresvan had refused to work. He had been employed by the Northern Pacific railroad as a waiter but had to quit

(j) Notwithstanding any other provision in the Articles, the corporation will not, unless in each case it is authorized by an affirmative vote of a majority of the total number of shares of preferred stock then issued and outstanding given by vote of authorized stockholders meeting called for that purpose:

1. Increase the present authorized number of shares of preferred stock of either class.

2. Authorize, create or issue any shares of stock of the corporation ranking prior to or in a parity with the preferred stocks in respect of dividends or assets.

3. Amend, alter or repeal any of the provisions of the Articles of Incorporation in any manner as to deprive or restrict the rights of the holders of the preferred stocks.

4. Merge or consolidate with any corporation or corporations unless such merger shall be approved by the Insurance Commissioner of Iowa and as a result of such merger or consolidation, the preferred stocks authorized by this amendment shall remain and continue to be preferred both as to dividends and as to assets against any stock of the corporation resulting from such merger or consolidation, but the foregoing shall prevent the corporation by vote of common stockholders from increasing and authorizing additional capital stock by way of common stock or of additional preferred stocks of the classes of preferred stocks of the classes of preferred stocks mentioned in this amendment. Meetings authorized by this amendment shall be held at the principal place of business of the corporation and shall be presided over by the President or the Secretary of the corporation, and the Secretary of the corporation shall give written notice fixing the time, place and particular purpose thereof at least ten (10) days prior to the meeting.

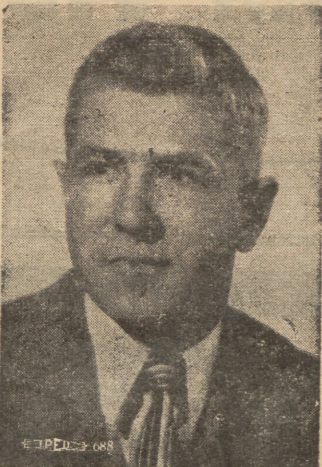

that breakfast is an important meal and should constitute from one-fourth to a third of the day's intake of food. Nutrition experts point out that, ordinarily, the stretch from dinner in the evening to breakfast the following morning is the longest period in which the body goes without food, and nourishment is needed

early in the morning. As a matter of fact, the person who skips breakfast and waits till lunch can be "losing" every morning of his working day in terms of production and enjoyment. Results of many experiments among students, housewives, and working people show that those who neglect

breakfast are generally less efficient and less alert during the morning than people engaged in similar pursuits who start the day with a nourishing meal.

Like all meals, a "good breakfast" doesn't necessarily mean a great deal of food, but rather a well-balanced menu of "energy foods" and those which build tissue and supply vitamins and minerals. A satisfactory breakfast, one that can give a person a good start for the day's tasks, can consist of fruit or

fruit juice, an egg, milk, bread (preferably whole wheat or enriched), or cereal.

Lack of time to prepare a nutritious breakfast is not a valid excuse these days. Modern packaging of breakfast foods has reduced the time needed for preparing and serving them to a minimum. Actually, most of us could enjoy a tasty, healthful breakfast if we got up a few minutes earlier. And the formation of this habit can mean generally improved health, more efficiency for

the day's tasks, and even greater enjoyment of living.

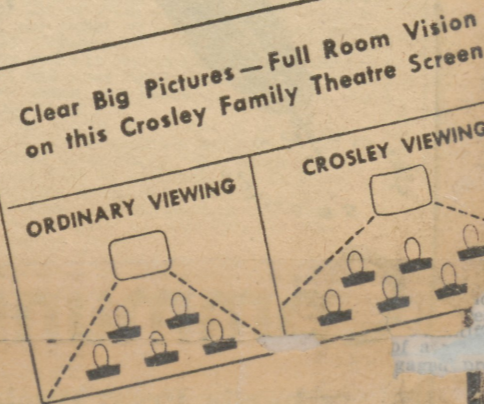

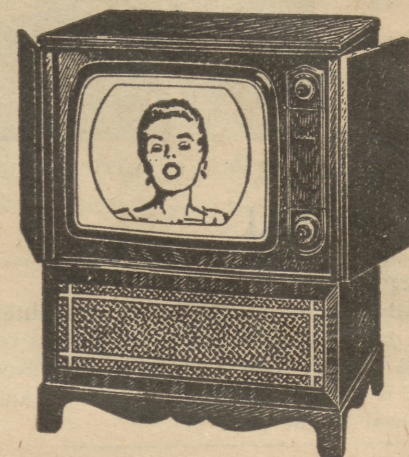

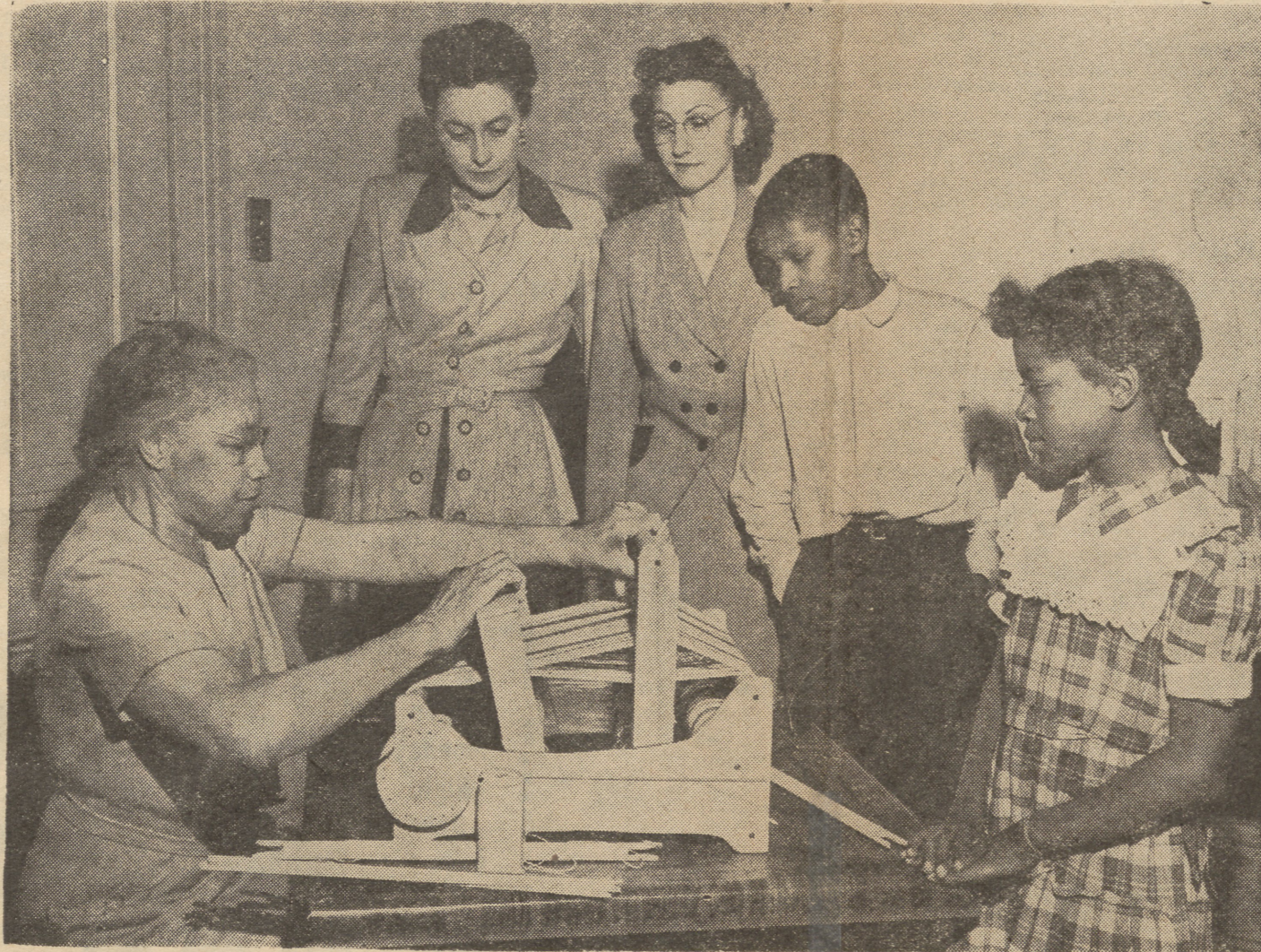

NEW COACH AT IOWA GETS RESULTS

When Iowa football coach, Dr. Eddie Anderson, resigned last spring, the Bystander immediately suggested that it be accepted, that Leonard Raffensperger be given the post and Corriedo be replaced by some other backfield coach. It so happened that a lot of other people thought likewise for just that was done.

The victory Friday night over Southern California proved that the athletic department knew what was needed in making the changes.

It was a joy to listen to the game; to realize that the poor showing Iowa has made during the past few seasons was not the fault of the men, but that of the coaching staff; that instead of playing listless and almost sand lot ball, the spirit was high, the tackling and blocking were good until the gun sounded ending the game.

Of course, this was the first game; it may be too early to judge. On the other hand, neither Iowa nor any other team is going to win all of its games. But if a team puts up a good fight and the men show a willingness to do a bang up job, the public will be satisfied.

That very thing has been demonstrated in Korea today. And our leaders, sensing the danger, have tried to impress the Koreans that the armies fighting there were UN forces.

Maybe UN could not have been formed had some nations known that such a force would be necessary, so maybe it was smart to have kept it in the background. Certainly, the necessity has been demonstrated in the battle against Communism and it seems that the chances of getting the job done is not going to be so difficult.

Experience is a great teacher; the lessons it teaches are more lasting than those acquired by other means.

Last Saturday was a big night for 800 popular music fans at the Drake fieldhouse when Billy Eckstine, vocal artist who is top man on jukeboxes, appeared in a three-hour show.

The artists were presented to Des Moines by Tommy Brookins.
